behoove this columnist for me to pen a postscript on the recent national elections. (In other words, this is an "I told you so" column.)

What really got me as I watched the election returns on TV that night was this high-priced national broadcaster saying how surprised he was that so many incumbents were being re-elected despite the "groundswell" of folks who had indicated they would throw the bums out.

This just shows again how much TV newscasters are out of touch with reality. And if you think that's awful, just remember they're the folks you get your information from. Think about it.

What really happened was what I had forecast: 98 percent of the congressmen were re-elected. That's correct - 98 percent.

This is why I believe we need to put limits on the number of terms congressmen can serve. Otherwise, there is no real hope for long-term planning to keep this nation strong.

The main thing I saw was that the old Democratic machine put together in the 1930s has come back, but with a different mechanism.

For many years, Democrats have used labor, the black vote and "Democrats" (especially the big city machines) as the backbone of their vic-

In recent decades, we have seen the decline of the big city machine as many voters have moved to the suburbs and changed their allegiance to the Republicans. Also, the labor vote has been more evenly divided between the two parties.

But a new twist has been added: a growth in minority voters, besides the blacks. I'm referring to Hispanics and Asians. I believe these new voters are going Democratic in mass numbers just as preceding minorities have done throughout American history.

One example, I believe, is that the Hispanic vote gave the victory in the Texas' governor's race to Ann Richards.

My prediction is that you will see a further decline in GOP strength in Congress. Also, Bush may be re-elected president but it's a safe bet a Democrat (Phil Gramm?) will be elected in 1996. (Unless the Democrats shoot themselves in the foot again

Grant sought for new well

The problem of the contaminated well at KKR Park dominated Tuesday's Texico City Council meeting.

Last week, the council was forced to close the well due to particles being found of carbon tetrachloride, a cleaning agent for metals. It is a carcinogen, meaning it possibly causes cancer.

environmentalist for the state **Environmental Improvement** Division.

So the council voted Tuesday to apply for a Community Development Block Grant to help build a new well. Mayor Doyal LaRue and councilman Butch Tharp will shepherd the application to Santa Fe for a hearing Friday.

In 1987, Texico received a \$50,000 state grant after going down to one well.

Texico now has three wells: one at the Santa Fe property is dry, the KKR one is closed and the Tower Park one is functioning.

The council was told that federal health inspectors and EID personnel will be in Texico this week to try to

find out the cause for the contamination. If the source is found, they will be forced to clean it up.

Meanwhile, a "hold" has been put on planting pecan trees at KKR Park. This is because of the possibility that the entire park may have to be dug up and removed. It seems that old car bodies, The problem was found in etc., were junked in the park new tests taken by a field area, then covered with dirt from the landfill.

LaRue reported that tests taken so far have cost the city \$2,000, with more tests scheduled. The latest tests confirm the presence of carbon tetrachloride there. The pump has been removed from the KKR Park well and the council voted to put a safety lid on the well so no one will fall in.

The council discussed where to put a new well. It has the power to condemn land in such a situation. The council will look into Warren Estates, on the south side of the tracks; other Santa Fe property, and seeking water rights outside the city limits.

Travis Gene Lambert pled guilty in District Court Wednesday morning to attempted capitol murder with a deadly

He was found guilty last December in the shooting of then-Bovina Police Chief Gary Coleman in July 1989.

He was offered a plea bargain of 50 years in prison, which he rejected. In a jury trial, he received the maximum sentence: 99 years in prison and a \$10,000 fine.




Vega opened their game with a new quarterback. It showed because the QB was involved in two lost fumbles in Vega's first five plays.

Wolverines move into state title tilt

In a real nail-biter, the Texico Wolverines, ranked No. 1 in New Mexico, won their state semi-final football game against the Carrizozo Grizzlies last Friday at home, 13-12.

The victory improved Texico's record to 10-1 and put them in the state championship game against Hagerman.

The title game will be played at 7 p.m. mdt Friday (today) at Texico against Hagerman, which won the other semi-final game over Loving, 33-8. During the district action, Texico beat Hagerman - coached by ex-Wolverine coach Dave Lynn - by a 21-5 margin.

The Carrizozo game opened with it looking light a high-scoring affair as both teams scored on their first possessions. But then the necessary defensive adjustments were made, resulting in only 2 TDs by both teams.

Texico began in good field position as Josh Autrey returned the kickoff 33 yards to the Wolverine 43. Immediately, Autrey broke a pair of tackle as he burst up the middle, then turned outside to the Grizzlies' 35. But the big gain was nullified due to a clip - the first of several penalties which hurt Texico throughout the game.

Texico shook off the bad luck, and continued marching down field: Autrey for 8, Benjy McDaniel for 11, Autrey for 4, Autrey for 2.
