Harvie Winkles Gives Life In Vietnam War

Mr. and Mrs. Perry Winkles of Texico were notified by Commander Earle G. Hallberg of the Navy office in Amarillo last Thursday that their son, Harvie P. Winkles III, 20, had been killed during fighting in Vietnam on Sunday, Dec. 8.

The young navyman, attached to a Marine Unit as a hospital corpsman, was killed in "Operation Mead River," while serving south of Da Nang. The parents were notified on Monday morning that the body is on its way home, but it is not known at this time when it will arrive in Texico-Farwell. Steed-Todd Funeral Home of Clovis is handling local arrangements. Burial will be in Lawn Haven Cemetery.

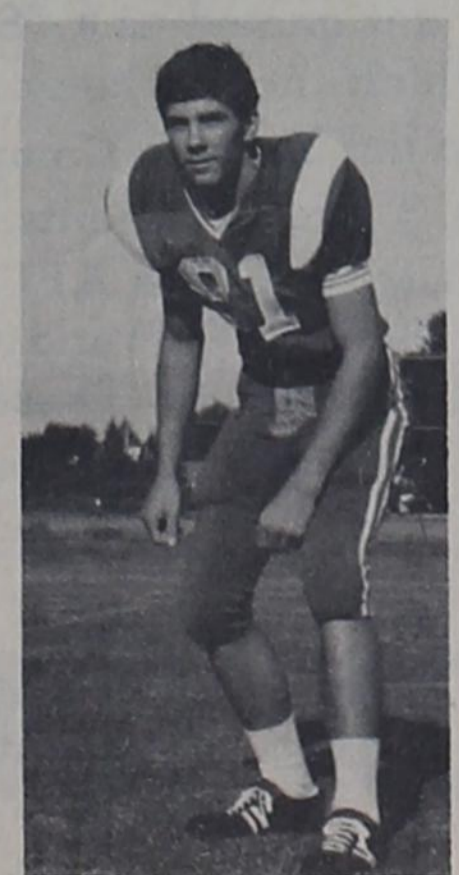
Harvie was born April 20, 1948, and died in Vietnam on Dec. 8, 1968, giving his life for his country. He had graduated from Texico High School in May, 1966 and entered military service, Dec. 13, 1966. He spent his boot camp training at San Diego and following a short leave, to visit relatives in Texico-Farwell, he was sent to Guam, where he spent the next eight months. He then returned to San Diego for special training as a hospital corpsman and following another short leave he arrived in Vietnam in June, 1968.

At time of his death he had only two days to serve until a replacement would have taken his place at Da Nang and he would have returned to serve in a hospital out of the immediate danger zone. He had earlier suffered shrapnel wounds in his leg but had returned to active duty some time ago.

As he grew to young manhood in Texico-Farwell, Harvie worked on several area farms, as a sack boy at Capital Food grocery store in Farwell, and was at one time a carrier boy for a Clovis newspaper. He had also been employed at Fab-Steel in Clovis. He was a member of

Flu Strikes Schools

Schools in both Texico and Farwell are following the national trend in absenteeism, according to word from the local superintendents early this week. In Texico on Monday, authorities report as much as 20% of the students absent due to colds and flu viruses with a number of teachers also absent. The large per cent of absenteeism was first noted on Friday, and by Monday it had increased.

In Farwell school, at least ten per cent of the teachers

and students were absent on Monday due to the flu and colds epidemic which has been taking its toll of schools in the area. Supt. Roberts stated that the absenteeism was first noted on Wednesday of last week and increased throughout the week and is still increasing.

Both superintendents stated that they hoped that with the Christmas holidays coming up, the attendance would be back to normal by time school resumes on Jan. 6.

Schools Set Holidays

Both of the local schools announced Christmas holidays early this week. In Farwell, students will be dismissed on Friday, Dec. 20, at 2:30 p.m. and will return to classes on January 6, 1969 at 8:30 a.m., according to W. M. Roberts, superintendent.

Students in the elementary school at Farwell will have individual trees in their classrooms while junior high school and high school students will see a play in the auditorium at 1:30

and return to their individual buildings at 2 p.m. for Christmas trees and exchange of gifts.

In Texico, students will have individual parties in elementary classrooms while junior high and high school students will hold a joint observance and gift exchange, prior to dismissal of classes at 2:30 p.m. on Dec. 20. Classes will resume at the Texico school on Jan. 6, 1969 at the regular time, according to Supt. A. C. McDonald.

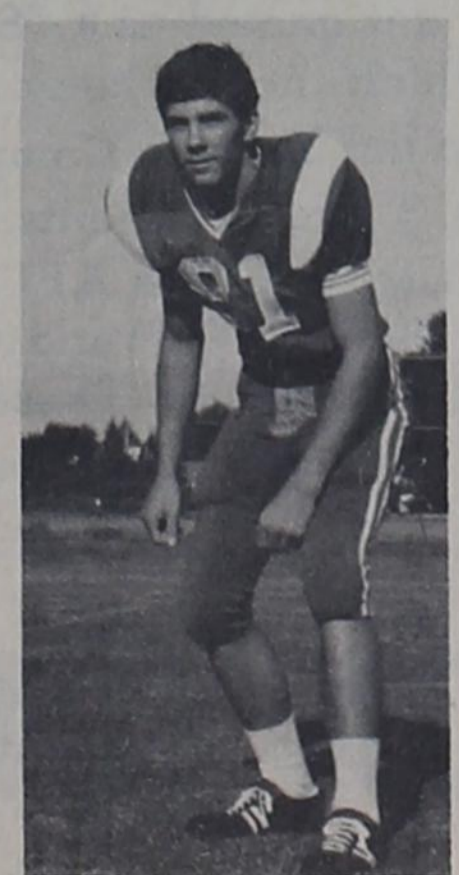
Any person wishing to be a candidate for one of the positions may pick up the form for declaring his candidacy in the office of the school superintendent.

Persons who have terms expiring in 1969 are Paul Skaggs and Luther A. (Buddy) Pearce.

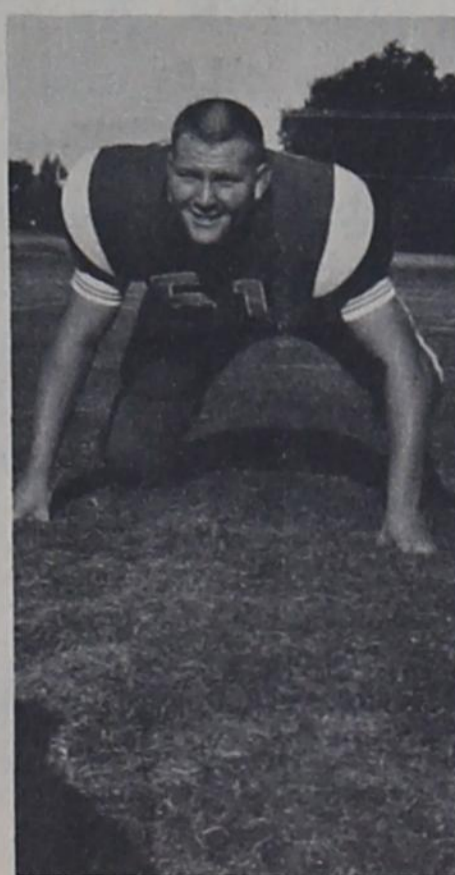
Open House Set At Post Office

Postal authorities at Farwell post office have set open house at the new post office building for Saturday, Dec. 21, from 3:30-5:30 p.m.

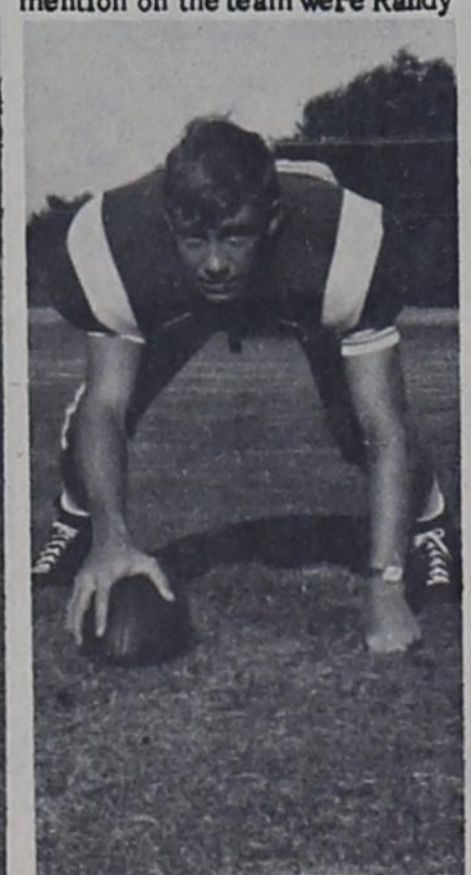

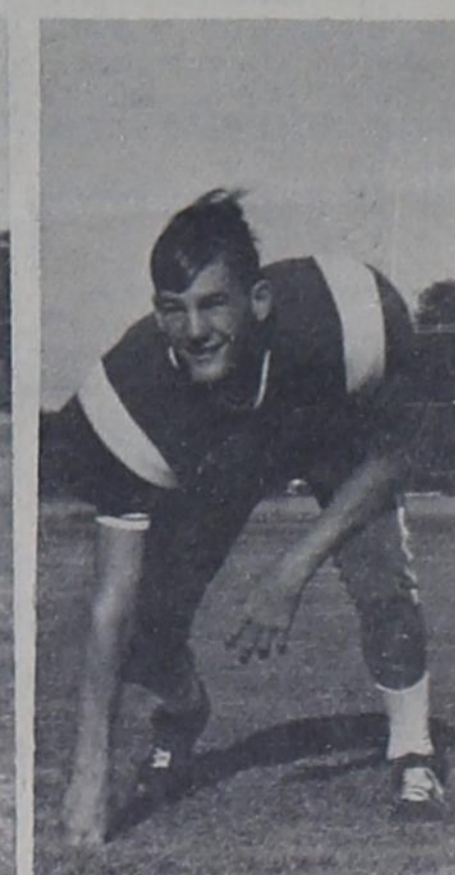

TO SOIL TEST

Farmers taking soil samples will now receive an early and fast recommendation. Later in the season things get rushed for time.

The Soil Testing Laboratory Agricultural Extension Service, Rt. 3, Lubbock, will test your soil and make recommendations for a cost of \$2.00 for each sample submitted.

Soil sample boxes and information sheets are available at the County Agent's office in Farwell.

Procedure for taking soil samples are listed below:

- 1. Take one soil-sample from each major soil type in the field. 2. Take a small amount of soil from 10 to 15 different places. 3. Place in clean container, mix thoroughly and take out approximately one pint for the sample. 4. When taking samples, scrape the litter from the surface and bore the auger or tube deep in the soil of cultivated land. For pasture sample to a depth of 3 to 4 inches.

Flexibility In Range Management

BY James G. Hinsley Range management is a long term investment in natural resources to insure an increase or stable income from your operations. The key to successful range management is the ability of the rancher to make adjustments in his operations to conform to existing conditions. Adjustments that should be considered include the proper degree of use or rate of stocking, the proper season of use of the range forage, the proper kind of livestock best suited to the range, and the proper distribution of grazing over all the range.

Conditions that should be considered include fluctuations in prices of salabel products, costs of operations, labor, land and capital resources, and any aspect of the business of ranching which would apply in a particular instance. The most significant condition to consider is the grazing resources of the rancher which vary in forage production from year to year, or from one season to another. Variation in range forage production is influenced by the amount and pattern of rainfall, the range condition in terms of the kind and amount of forage, and the response of the vegetation to grazing.

The basic principle in man-

aging rangeland is to keep the grass ahead of the livestock. Due to the variation in range forage production flexibility in management is necessary to accomplish this objective. Planned flexibility is much more logical, effective and profitable than is forced adjustments brought about by adverse weather conditions, over-grazing or any other deteriorating effect. Such adjustments are just as inevitable as are drought periods. Range proper use is basic to good management of all grazing land, and enables range improvement and maintenance which is reflected in better kinds and higher yields of range forage. When flexibility is included in range management, not only is the conservation objective more nearly met, but the cost and return balance is actually more favorable and more stable.

'Operation Motorcide' Effective Dec. 24-Jan. 1

AUSTIN—A warning that 33 persons may die in traffic accidents in Texas during the Christmas and New Year's holiday periods was issued today by Colonel Wilson E. (Pat) Speir, director of the Texas Department of Public Safety.

Speir said the DPS will activate a special "Operation Motorcide" in an effort to remove unsafe drivers from the roads and lower the holiday traffic death toll. As part of this program, all available DPS officers will be on duty during the two holiday periods. In addition, Speir noted that the Department will make full use of radar, helicopters, and VASCAR as enforcement aids to officers.

"DPS Statistical Services estimates that 19 persons will be killed in traffic accidents in the state during the Christmas period, with 14 fatalities estimated for the New Year's period," he added.

Lack of Vitamin A & C from citrus fruit and fresh vegetables contribute to healthy gums and skin. Also lack of vitamin C

found in citrus fruits causes a weakening of the walls of the blood vessels and the person bruises more easily. In addition, vitamin C builds resistance to infections such as colds and viruses. 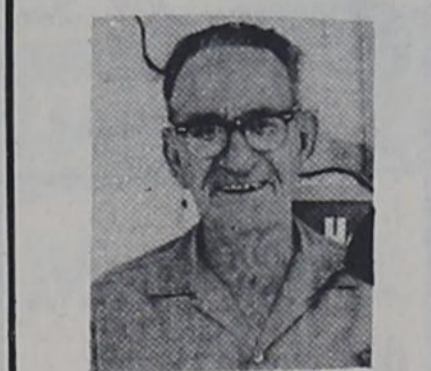

Portraying Area Homemakers

Homemakers, as we all know are not of the same size or age, and this week we learn that any male or female who enjoys cooking, sewing or in general assisting in making a home might be classified as a homemaker.

While Phil Baker, pastor of Hamlin Memorial Methodist Church would be the first to tell you that he is in no sense a typical homemaker, and we add AMEN, he does on occasion assist his wife with a few chores around the house, and he "did" work his way through college working in a cafeteria and also for a catering service as a cook. He confesses that to this day he has not learned how to cook for only a few people, but does like to assist with cooking duties when guests are expected.

Phil grew up in Houston and later attended college at the University of Texas, Sul Ross, and Perkins School of Theology at SMU in Dallas. He has been in the ministry for the past 14 years and not only finds his ministerial duties fulfilling but time consuming. He has little time left over to pursue his hobbies of fishing, playing bridge and golf, but does still find time to read, something he has always enjoyed.

The entire Baker family is musical, with Phil having taken voice lessons; wife Sammy, first grade teacher in Farwell, has taught music before moving to this locality; daughter, Sammy (Sissie), plays a flute, son, Phil, plays drums; and Mary, the other daughter, is taking piano lessons from Mrs. Dot Christian.

The entire family enjoys handicrafts and spends time working together on several different crafts for pastime.

Phil stated, "We like to entertain and our home is always open to anyone who would like to call!"

A recipe which has almost become a tradition with the Baker family, and one which was used at the Methodist Church on Sunday evening in what is hoped will become a traditional celebration, is a plum pudding. Phil can and does make the pudding on occasion and is sharing the recipe for the delicacy with our readers this week, just in time for Christmas baking.

PLUM PUDDING
1 lb. currants, 1 lb. citron,

1 lb. raisins, 1 lb. ground suet, 3 cups flour, 2 1/2 cups sugar, 1 teaspoon salt, 1 teaspoon allspice, 1 teaspoon ginger, 1/2 teaspoon cloves, 5 eggs, 1/4 cup lemon juice, 1/2 cup grape juice, 1/2 cup apple juice.

Mix together raisins, currants, suet, flour, sugar, salt and spices. Add beaten eggs, then lemon, grape and apple juices. Steam for four hours—pour off excess fat immediately. If you have never prepared a steamed pudding before, directions follow: Use a casserole or mold and grease heavily (unless it is Teflon). Add batter and cover tightly with foil. Place container on a trivet or rack in steamer. Add water until it comes one-half way up on mold. Add boiling water when necessary. Keep simmering gently. Cover the steamer—a pressure cooker without the pressure will do nicely.

The pudding may be made several days ahead of time as taste improves with age. When ready to serve, place sugar cubes which have been soaked in lemon extract on top and light for a "delightful" and eye catching climax to a meal.

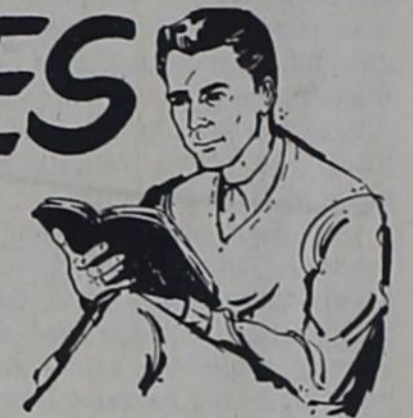

TWO MINUTES WITH THE BIBLE

BUT NOW

The words "but now" are found in many places in the Bible, but most often in the Epistles of Paul.

These two words are most significant, for they indicate a change in program. If my secretary is transcribing some dictation and I say: "But now I would like you to take a letter," this indicates a change in program.

So it is with this phrase as we find it in Rom. 3:21:

"BUT NOW the righteousness of God without the law is manifested."

Prior to this time God's people were under the law. There was no other way to approach or obey Him.

But though under the law, they constantly broke the law, so that they stood before God condemned rather than justified. Thus the apostle says in Verse 20:

"Therefore by the deeds of the law there shall no flesh be justified

in His sight: for by the law is the knowledge of sin."

"BUT NOW the righteousness of God without the law is manifested" (Ver. 21).

How can this be? How can a man be declared righteous apart from the law? The answer—the only answer is, by grace through faith in Christ.

Though perfect and sinless Christ died for sin. Whose sin? Yours and mine. Thus as Paul declares in Acts 13:38:

"By this Man is preached unto you the forgiveness of sins, and by Him all who believe are justified from all things, from which ye could not be justified by the Law of Moses."

"Therefore we conclude that a man is justified by faith, without the deeds of the law" (Rom. 3:28).

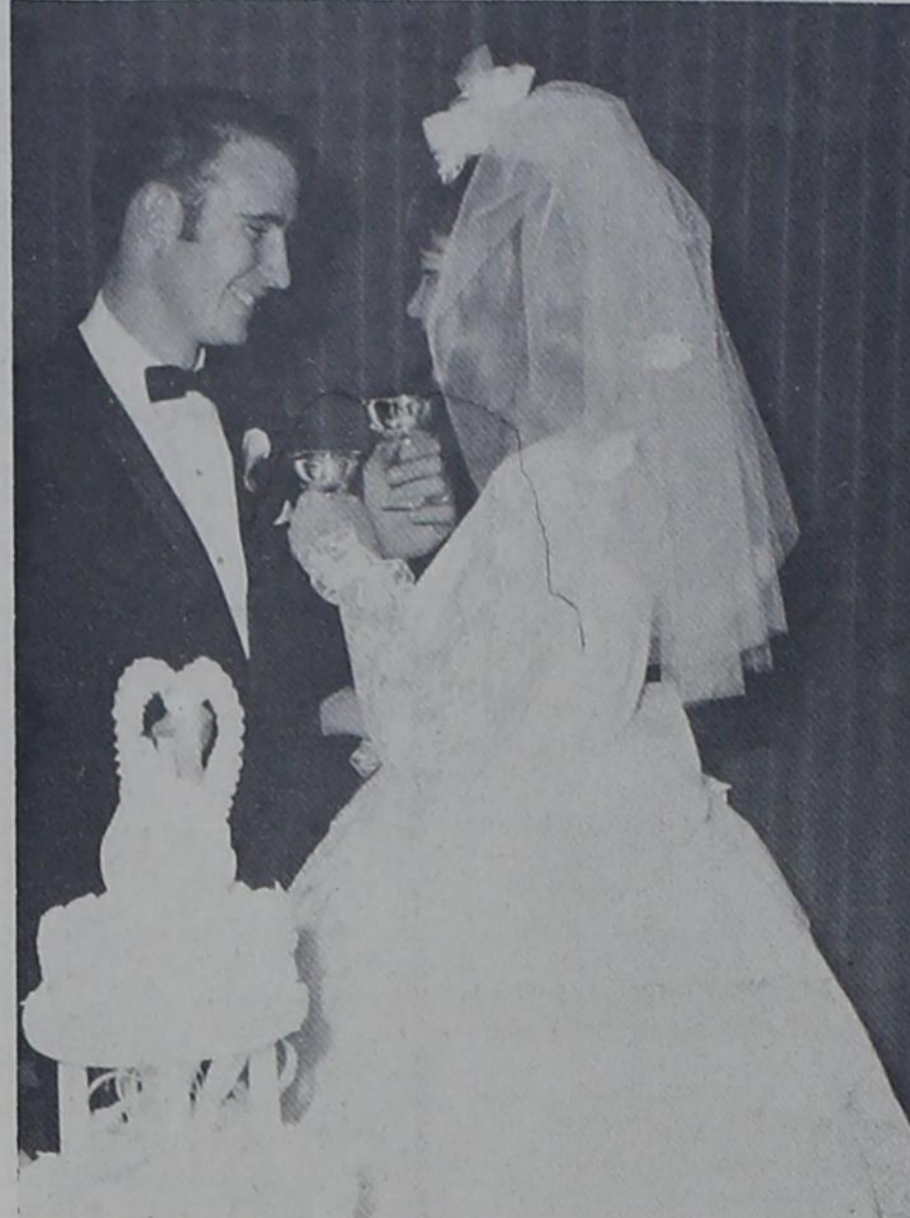

Proposed Legislation Explained

A draft of proposed legislation to enable creation of Master Import Authorities was submitted to the Board of Directors of Water, Inc. at a meeting held recently at its Lubbock office. The High Plains Water District, the North Plains Water District, and the Panhandle Water District cooperated in drafting the proposed legislation.

Bill Clayton, State Representative from Springlake and Chairman of the House Inerim Water Study Committee, explained the probable functions of a water import authority and led the discussion. Twenty-two Directors were present for the meeting.

The Corps of Engineers of the U. S. Army and the Bureau of Reclamation of the Department of Interior have been given almost a million and half dollar grant by Congress to determine if there is surplus water in the Mississippi River, the location and how to get the surplus water to West Texas and Eastern New Mexico. They are working diligently on this study and will be completed in about 18 months.

The Texas Water Development Board is scheduled to release its new Texas water plan December 17 in Austin.

Water, Inc. objective is to be surplus water imported into the area with its many facets by this time. The tri-state area now has 3.3 million people with a buying income of \$7 billion, retail sales of \$5 billion and the 1.25 billion farm income exceeds 44 of the 50 states. With the guarantee of imported surplus water to the area, the irrigation economy will reach 3.8 billion by the year 2020. Further development of the area's economy depends on imported surplus water delivered to the farmer at a price he can continue to make a profit on the products he produces. The plan is a multi-purpose system that would provide navigation, recreation facilities, municipal and industrial use in addition to irrigation water.

Company Announces Expansion Program

A 1969 construction and improvement program which will add nearly \$16,000,000 to the company's investment in its 45,000 square mile service area was announced by Roy Tolk, president of Southwestern Public Service Co.

"1969 will be the 22nd consecutive year in which we have increased our investment in our service area by 10-million dollars or more a year, with the average annual investment during the last 10 years being more than 20-million dollars. This investment is made for two reasons, both of them customer-related. The first reason is to stay ahead of the demand for electric service, while the second is to keep that service as efficient and economical as possible. Ever-increasing inflation is making economy more and more difficult, but we are taking every step that we can to keep our expenses down," Tolk said.

Transmission lines and substations will account for a little more than 5-million dollars of the 1969 program, slightly less than 5-million will be for new distribution facilities, the lines and equipment which bring service to the customer, while a little less than 4-million will be for power plant additions and improvements, including the start of construction on a new generating station near Lubbock with an original capability of 210,000 kilowatts.

The major transmission line project will be construction of a 230,000 volt line from the Tuco Interchange, north of Abernathy, to the South Lubbock Interchange. In addition to providing another major power source for the South Plains area, the new line will be constructed so that it can be used as the first transmission circuit when the new generating station near Lubbock goes into service in 1971.

The new generating station will be called Clifford B. Jones Station in honor of the West Texas civic leader and President-emeritus of Texas Tech, who has been a director of Southwestern Public Service Co. for more than a quarter-century.

Once again the company will contribute to the water conservation efforts of the area by using sewage effluent purchased

from the City of Lubbock as cooling water when the new plant goes into operation. Nicholas Station, near Amarillo, was the first of the company's generating facilities to utilize sewage effluent for this purpose.

Highlighting the economy efforts of the company will be the installation of special equipment on two generators at Plant X which will make it possible to shut down the two units during the night hours of lowpower consumption and yet bring them back into service quickly for peak periods of power usage.

"We anticipate saving about \$30,000 a year on our fuel costs with this equipment, so it will soon pay for itself. Normally, you can't just shut down a generator when you don't need it, because it takes too long to get it back on the line when you do want it. So, normally, you keep the things running with a minimum load, which is the most ex-

pensive way of operating, until you need more production. With this new equipment we'll be able to completely shut down the two generators, load the units still in service at the most economical level and still, and this is the part that's important to our customers, keep adequate spinning reserves in the event that we lose a generating unit for one reason or another," Tolk said.

Speaking of reserves, the company anticipates a 1969 peak load of 1,462,000 kilowatts and will meet it with generating capability of 1,835,000 kilowatts, providing a reserve capacity of 373,000 kilowatts. The largest generating unit on the system has a capability of 210,000 kilowatts, so that the reserve capability is large enough to handle the loss of the largest unit and still maintain a 150,000 kilowatt reserve.

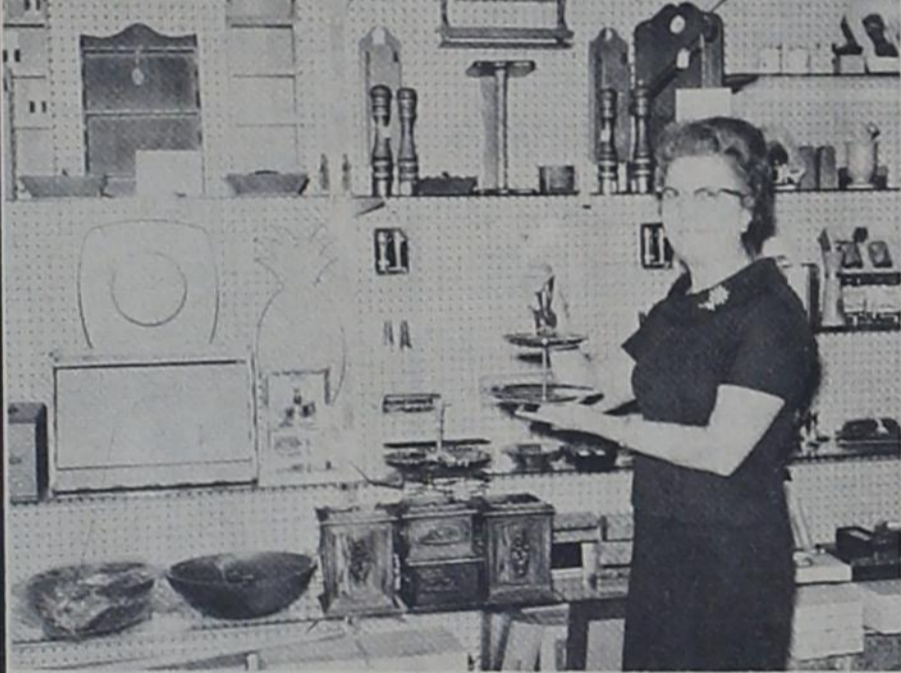
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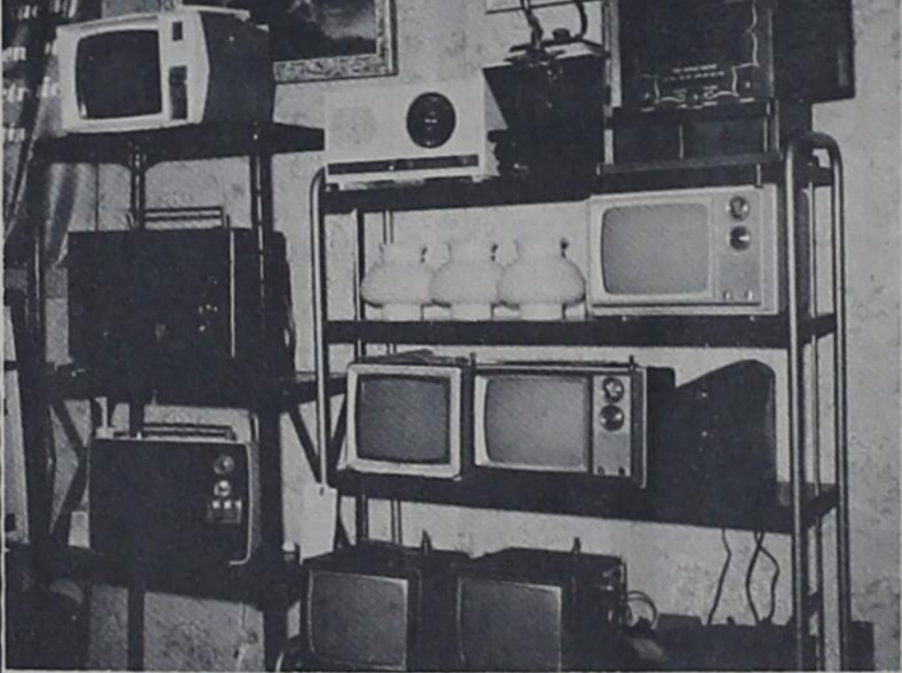
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
