There's an old cliché that says something to the effect that it's better to give than to receive.

I'm sure we all have heard it. And most of us probably agree with it (except a lot of our young'uns who enjoy the gifts at graduation, birthdays, etc.). It's the kind of topic that makes for a great sermon on Sunday in church.

The cliché has crossed my mind many times since arriving in the Twin Cities. Frankly, I just shake my head at the giving that I've seen here, the kindnesses shown.

What brought this to mind were some kind comments made to me by Helen Breckenridge, the wife of our new pharmacist. They arrived together here May 11 but her husband, Steve, had to drive back to Tucson, Ariz., for a week to train his replacement. So Helen was left on her own, without a car, six miles out of town.

No problem. One day, Terri Nichols, took her around. A couple of other days, Mary Kalbas showed her different places. And the rest of the time Helen was either getting her new house in order or my wife, Judy, helped her get around town. After the week passed, Helen commented to me on the kindnesses shown her by folks here. I laughed, and told her that is why my own family has become so enthusiastic about the Twin Cities: the kindnesses shown us as newcomers. People here are just downright friendly.

It's one more thing that's easy to take for granted: giving. But people here give of themselves to help others. That kindness, the norm here, is a rarity in other places I've lived. I guess that is why it has stood out so clearly in my mind.

Here's another example of kindness that we've found:

Right after it was announced that a pharmacist would be coming here, Wilbert Kalbas stopped by my office and said there was a small home at his farm that he would like the pharmacist to have if the pharmacist wanted. That really stopped me. Isn't that nice that a citizen here would realize that it's tough finding places in town to rent, and go out of his way to think ahead and help a newcomer.

After Wilbert left, I called Steve asap and he rented the home quickly. I was out there last week and it's a nice, little place for them; they're very happy with it.

That situation made me think back to the kindness shown my family when we decided to come here. I had told John Getz, the previous Tribune owner, that he had to find a place in town so my children could stay in one school. There was no way I wanted to disrupt their schooling again as I had to do when I worked for a big company.

So John and Joann Getz talked with Rita Dollar, who agreed to rent her house to us for six months. That was really appreciated, and it gave us time to find a home to buy here. Rita showed true kindness in being willing to help.

The fact that people here are kind came home again when we began planning the Celebrity Auction. I wasn't sure it could get off the ground because there were expenses involved and the idea is to make money for the Community Center, not to spend it.

Once again, folks were kind enough to help. Curtis and Pam Smith spent a bunch of hours individualizing the letters that were sent to celebrities. Plus they donated the stationery. Bernice Pennington spent a bunch of hours typing the addresses. DeAnn Curtis and my daughter, Patty, spent a bunch of hours putting the stamps on and mailing the letters. Six hundred letters take a lot of time. And all this work was done for free.

Kindness. An important ingredient in life. And one that, without a doubt, is alive in the Twin Cities.

'I wouldn't change any of my life'

Alma Purselley moved to the Texico area in 1918 from Granbury, Texas.

It took the family three weeks to come here by covered wagon. There were 12 children in her family and she was no. 5.

They lived in a three-bedroom house with no lights or indoor plumbing. They used kerosene lamps. They didn't have any way to refrigerate food.

Alma said, "The weather was a lot cooler and you could put milk and butter on the window sills. My father fixed a tin platform to set this on." They hung beef in their peach trees or from the windmill.

Her family raised kaffer corn, maize and chickens. They also raised a garden and canned some.

Alma met Riley Boss when he was home on leave in 1919. He had been overseas in France and Germany. In June 1920 they married.

Riley and his parents had moved here in 1902 from Trent, Texas. He was two years old. There were six in his family. They homesteaded on land about three miles south of Texico.

His family lived in a dugout. It took them four days to get lumber from Hereford. They didn't have electricity or indoor plumbing. They hauled water to their house in barrels by horse and wagon.

He went to Locust Grove School south of Texico.

Alma recalled, "The post office was in a railroad boxcar."

After Alma and Riley married, they bought a 1920 Model T Truck. Riley hauled grain for the farmers in the area. He did this type of work for 36 years. They moved to the

State Line Road. The roads were still dirt and Alma cooked on a kerosene stove.

In 1939, Riley helped Joe Blair run electricity to the rural area. Then in 1942 they received gas to their home.

During the 1930's, the Depression hit and there wasn't much money and not much hauling.

Alma took in ironing and did family ironing. She had eight or ten customers. She charged 20 cents for shirts, 25 cents for dresses and 10 cents for children's clothes.

The Boss's have two daughters: Wanda and Lilla. Both live in Albuquerque.

Alma remembers some of the business in the area: Trippett Bros., drug store, Ruby Stone dry goods store.

Riley died in 1969 at the age of 73. Alma is active in the Baptist Church and Senior Citizen's. She likes to crochet and does some quilting.

Alma said, "I wouldn't change any of my life."

BTD Queen contest opens

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Drug store schedules open house, opening

Farwell United Drug, the Twin Cities' new full-line drug store, will have an open house Sunday, June 2, from 1:30 to 4:30 p.m. CDT.

"We're very happy to come to the Twin Cities and we hope residents come to our open house so we can offer our appreciation," said pharmacist Steve Breckenridge.

Breckenridge and his wife, Helen, are renting a home just south of Farwell. They arrived three weeks ago and have been working to set up the store fixtures and stock the merchandise.

On Monday, June 3, the drug store will be open for business. Store hours will be 9 a.m. to 6 p.m. CDT Monday through Saturday. Breckenridge said he realizes some Twin City businesses close at noon Saturday and he might do so at a later date but wants to first see if people come to the store Saturday afternoons.

The slogan at Farwell United Drug will be "Home Town Service at Big Town Prices."

The new store is a member of a cooperative whereby merchandise can be purchased at bulk rates. "We will meet or beat all competitive prescription prices," said Breckenridge.

The new store will have a large selection of gift items, including coffee makers and other small appliances, watches, cameras and clock-radios. Greeting cards for all occasions will be available, too.

Breckenridge has set up a coffee bar at the rear of the store where folks can stop by and have refreshments. In the future, he hopes to offer something to eat, such as rolls.

The store will offer two free services to residents:

--Free blood pressure screening. Breckenridge will give residents cards so they can keep a continuous log. He suggests that persons with blood pressure problems have it checked at least once a month.

--Free blood glucose screening. This is done to see if a person has a problem with diabetes. Also, it can tell diabetics how well they are controlling their illness.

The pharmaceutical department will also have a large selection. "And if we don't have what a resident needs, it's likely we would have overnight delivery," said Breckenridge.

The Breckenridges are co-owners of Farwell United along with Dennis and Pat Mitchell of Hatch, N.M. The Mitchells were in Farwell the past two weeks helping set up the store. They own three other drug stores in Arizona and New Mexico.

Breckenridge, 27, was born in Anderson, Ind., and was raised in Farmington, N.M. He lived in Tombstone, Ariz., for eight years, then has been in Tucson, Ariz., ever since. He graduated the University of Arizona with a degree in pharmacy and was pharmacy manager at St. Mary's Medical Park Pharmacy in Tucson until coming here.

Kelley picked for foreign program

Kyle Kelley, son of Mr. and Mrs. E.C. Kelley of Farwell, has been selected by the College of Architecture, Texas Tech University, to attend a 6 week summer program in Paris, France and Barcelona, Spain with the School of Architecture at Rice University.

The program in Paris will trace the tradition of heroic or visionary architecture and urbanism from antiquity to today, ending with a 4 week design churette in Ricardo, Bofills Atelier in Barcelona, Spain. Other notable European architects, urban planners and designers will

meet with the students to work on the Port of Barcelona. Schools attending will include Rice, Texas Tech, Texas A&M, Tulane, and Penn State.

Kyle is also the recipient of the Preston M. Guen Memorial Scholarship for \$1,000 from Texas Tech and was recently nominated by Tech for a National AIA Foundation Scholarship.

Kyle also is a member of Tau Sigma Delta Honor Fraternity of Architecture and Allied Artists and will be a teaching assistant in the college for the coming academic year. Kyle also serves on the Faculty Search Board for the col-

lege and is also a Registered Intern.

Anna Garcia

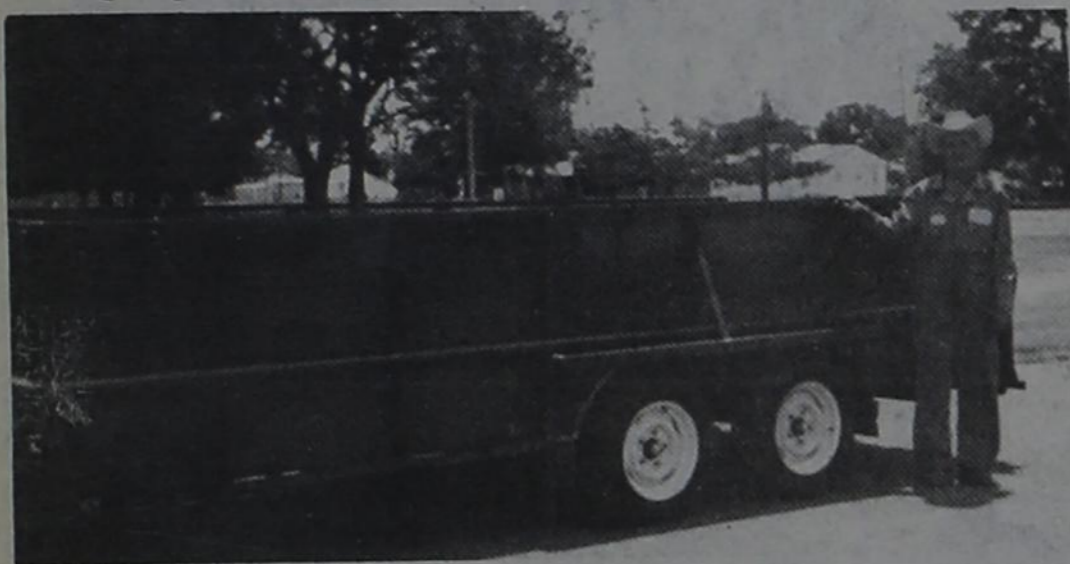

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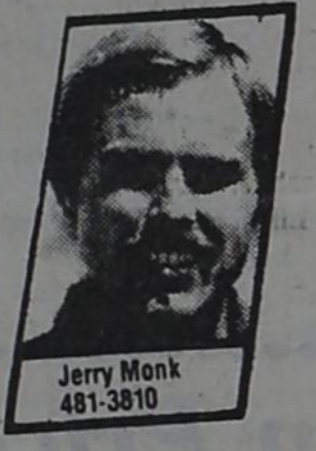

Keeping track of valuable papers

By Janette Pierce

Important money matters - insurance, savings, investments, real estate - create lots of paperwork. Once you sign those papers you may forget about them. And then when you need them the most they may be nowhere to be found.

It's just good household management to periodically take inventory of your valuable papers. It will help you locate the papers when they are needed, direct someone else to them in case of emergency and evaluate your financial affairs on a routine basis.

Prepare an inventory of valuable documents on paper or your home computer. Review it at least once a year and update it whenever important changes occur.

You might also want to prepare an inventory for an older relative, since you could be the person who needs to locate his or her important papers.

An inventory could include the following categories:

- * A family record listing names, birthdates and where the birth is recorded for each family member.
- * The name, address and telephone number of persons who should be notified in case of serious emergency.
- * The name, address and telephone numbers of your family advisors. These may include an accountant, banker, broker, financial planner, insurance agent, doctor, clergy and attorney.
- * The location of your valuable papers including wills and instructions, personal papers, property papers and real estate papers.
- * A list of all financial accounts, including the name and address of the firm, the identification or account number and in whose name the account is carried. This may include accounts with banks, savings and loan associations and credit unions.
- * A list of real estate and business interests you own, including mortgages. Basic information for each

property would include the kind of property, location, ownership situation, the date acquired and purchase price.

* A list of stocks, bonds, securities, mutual funds, property insurance, life insurance and annuities; accident, disability and hospital insurance; and other personal property you own, such as household furnishings and automobiles.

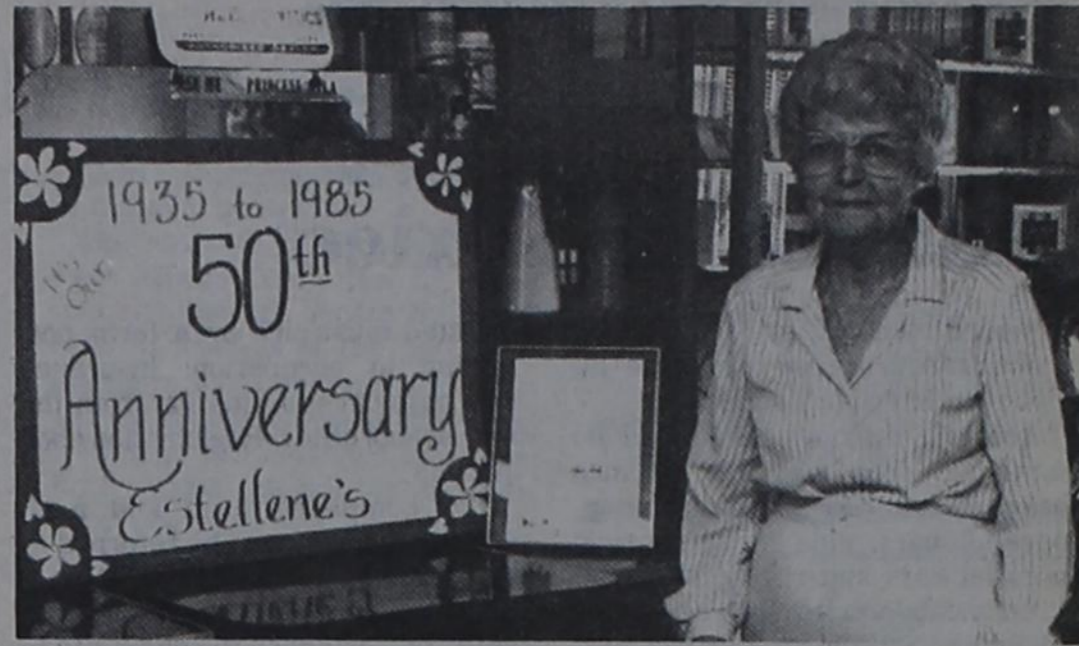
* Information concerning social security, retirement, pension and profit sharing plans. Dates of employment and employers are frequently needed for filing applications and settling estates.

* A list of money owed, and owed to you, size of debt and terms of payment. Making an inventory of valuable papers is a major task. Once you set up a system, however, updating as changes occur is not as formidable.

A variety of forms and computer software programs for financial inventories are available from commercial outlets. Your county Extension home economics agent has detailed papers to get you started on a financial inventory.

How to relax a budget that's stretched tight

Many farm families find they need a better balance between short-term and long-term debts. Any many times we can help with long-term Land Bank loans.

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- Do not climb electrical poles, towers or structures.
- Do not trim trees near power lines.
- Do not set ladders or scaffolds near power lines.
- Do not shoot at insulators on poles, towers or structures.
- Never climb on or go inside a substation fence. Call SPS to help you retrieve anything thrown into the substation or caught in its fence.
- Avoid using electrical tools like lawn mowers or hedge clippers when grass and leaves are wet.
- Be careful when digging. Call SPS to find out if there are any buried electrical lines in the area.
- Electrical cords should not be spliced or taped. Repair by shortening them or replace them entirely.
- Beware of exposed wires.
- Don't touch portable appliances (coffee makers, radios, hair dryers, etc.) with wet hands or while standing or sitting in water.
- Don't post signs on utility poles. A lineman hitting a nail with his cleat could slip and fall. Also, nails can snag protective gloves and destroy their insulation value.

Sarpalius: Alcohol legislation successful

Two years ago, we launched a campaign to get drunk drivers off Texas' streets and highways. We also made a commitment to making the state more responsible to the needs of its alcoholic citizens.

We're proud to say our campaign largely has been successful. Since 1983, we've toughened Texas' laws against drunk driving, raised the legal drinking age to 21 and given individual counties an easy way to fund alcohol rehabilitation programs.

This regular session has been a particularly successful one. Just this week we saw our Senate Bill 21 passed by the House and sent to the governor for his signature.

According to the terms of S.B. 21, the drinking age will be raised to 21 on Sept. 1, 1986 in order to comply with federal legislation that requires states to raise their drinking ages by October 1986 or lose federal highway funds.

The federal threat will expire in 1988, and the bill requires the Legislature in 1989 to vote to keep the drinking age at 21 or it will lapse back to 19. We're confident the dramatic increase in lives saved will convince our fellow lawmakers to keep the drinking age at 21.

Last week, we also saw two other critical bills pass the House. This week, we concurred with the House amendments to those bills, and they are now awaiting the governor's signature.

Senate Bill 620 probably is the most far-reaching of these meas-

ures. It allows counties to dedicate all or part of their fines from alcohol-related offenses to pay for alcohol-rehabilitation.

S.B. 620 is strictly permissive. Counties are not forced to do anything; the state merely is giving them permission. The measure already has been praised by the American Bar Association as the first of its kind in the nation.

Less of an attention-grabber but just as important was the passage of Senate Bill 111, which puts the finishing touches on the drunk-driving bill passed in 1983. S.B. 111 makes it easier for law enforcement agencies to determine whether alcohol was a factor in a traffic accident by giving morticians permission to take blood samples after a crash is suspected of being alcohol-related.

The only blight on an otherwise successful session was the failure of a House subcommittee to approve Senate Bill 135, the so-called open-container bill.

S.B. 135 would have made it illegal for a person to possess an open container of alcohol or consume alcohol while driving on Texas roads. The penalty would have been

a Class C misdemeanor, punishable by a fine of up to \$200.

The measure passed the Senate State Affairs Committee by a 12-1 vote and the full Senate by a 22-4 vote. At least 84 of the 150 House members were committed to supporting the bill. A recent University of Houston poll indicated 82 percent of all Texans backed the measure.

Yet one man, Rep. Kenneth Armbrister, was able to kill the bill. Armbrister, D-Victoria, was chairman of the subcommittee studying the bill and an avowed opponent of the open-container concept.

Armbrister alone said no to the Senate, no to the House and no to a majority of the state's people. He snubbed the testimony of Department of Public Safety Director Col. James Adams, who said putting an open-container bill on the books would eliminate 80 percent of the drinking while driving in Texas.

The San Antonio Express, reflecting on Armbrister's stand, said, "By thwarting the will of the people, who want to get drunks off the road,

self-serving politicians, are in effect sentencing many Texans to die at the hands of drunken drivers."

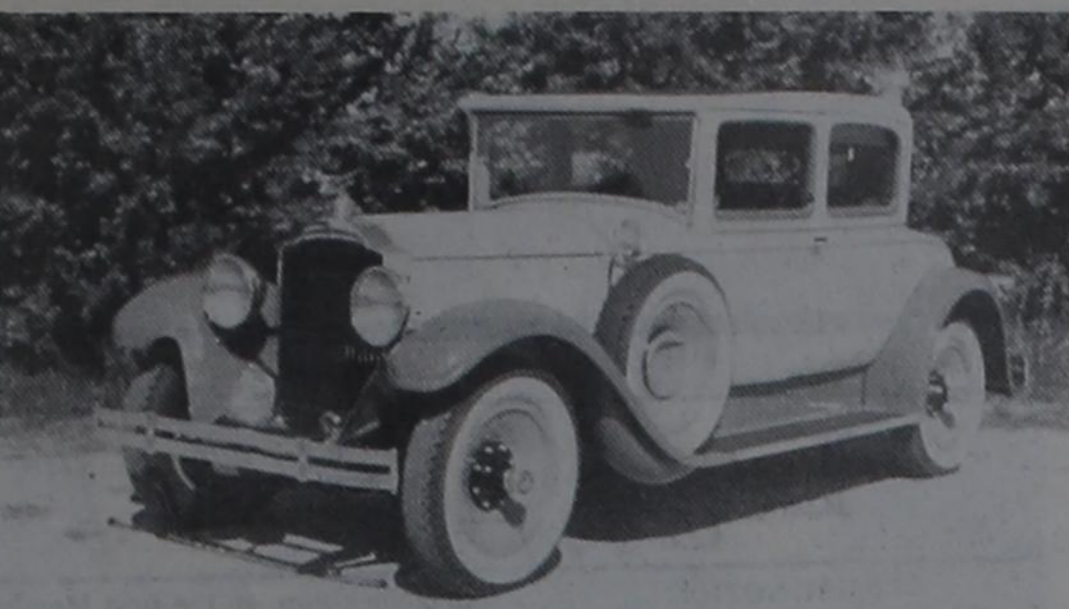

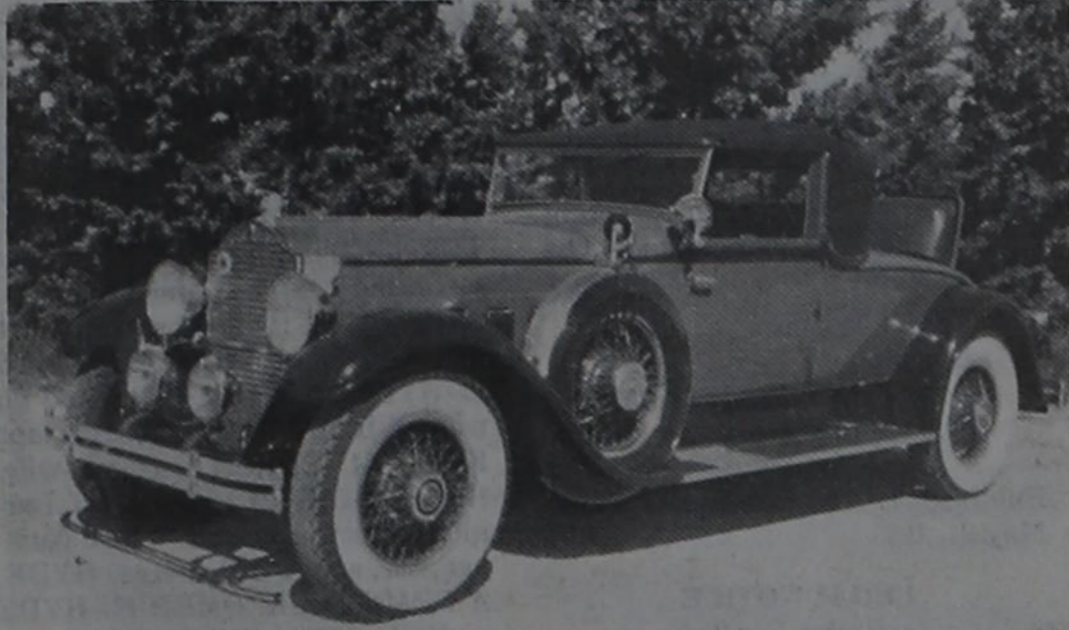

Combest: Congress can act quickly

Congress just completed action to repeal what were clearly some of the most unpopular regulations put forth by the Internal Revenue Service (IRS) in a long time -- the burdensome IRS vehicle record-keeping requirements.

These requirements, drafted by the Internal Revenue Service to implement the 1984 Tax Reform Act, called for individuals to keep detailed, up-to-date records of their business and personal travel.

When these regulations went into effect on January 1st of this year, Congress was immediately besieged by calls and letters of protest. Farmers, small businessmen and women and others not only found the rules to be time-consuming and impractical, but also considered their privacy violated by having to report their daily travel to a government agency like the IRS.

In mid-February, responding to public and congressional pressure, the IRS issued revised regulations that exempted certain taxpayers from the detailed record-keeping requirements. However, the IRS still required most people who deduct a portion of the sale price and operating costs of their vehicles to keep the records.

This was unacceptable to Congress, and outright repeal measures were passed. A conference committee was assigned to "iron-out" the differences in the House and Senate repeal bills. The House approved the conference com-

mittee report on May 8th, and the Senate approved it on May 16th.

The legislation repealing the regulations is retroactive to January 1, 1985. So, vehicle record-keeping rules that were used prior to passage of the 1984 Tax Reform Act are now back in effect for 1985. The framework for new regulations, to be effective in 1986, is spelled out in the legislation, but those requirements will be much less burdensome than the ones just repealed.

In addition, the legislation includes changes in the investment tax credit and depreciation rules for vehicles used in business. Under the legislation, the maximum investment tax credit will be \$675, the maximum first-year depreciation will be \$3,200, and the maximum depreciation in succeeding years will be \$4,800.

Repeal of the burdensome regulations is a good example of the public communicating with Congress and then Congress responding. My office, and those of my colleagues, received more mail on this issue than on most issues before the Congress.

The legislative process is long and complicated, however Congress can act quickly when the public demands it. The detailed record-keeping requirements were clearly not acceptable to the public, and I am very pleased that Congress has taken action to eliminate them.

Bagworms can be controlled

Bagworms are one of the major pests of junipers and other trees and shrubs in Texas.

Spring hatch began in early May in the Lubbock area this year, and is now almost complete. Insecticide control is most effective in late May and early June when the bagworms are small, says Gary Patterson, Parmer County Extension Agent.

In the spring, bagworm larvae emerge from hatching eggs inside last year's bags and begin feeding on leaves. They soon begin to construct their own protective bag of silk, twigs and leaves, making them camouflaged and hard to see. As the larvae and their bags continue to grow, control becomes more difficult.

Bagworms feed throughout the summer months, building their bags until the bags are about 1 1/2 inches long, Patterson adds. In the fall, the bagworms become adults, mate and the females lay eggs inside their bags. They then overwinter in these bags in trees and shrubs. Each overwintering female bag on a tree contains from 500 to 1500 eggs.

"Since the bagworm only completes one generation a year and spreads very slowly from plant to plant, picking the bags off infested plants in the winter will help a lot toward controlling this pest," says Patterson. "But if bagworms were present on the plant last year and control measures were not applied, chances are very good that an insecticide will be needed this spring."

Insecticides which can be used to control bagworms include sevin, dursban, diazinon, malathion, dylox and orthene. The biological insecticide Bacillus thuringiensis can also be used. To obtain effective control, thorough coverage of the foliage is important. Always read and follow label instructions when applying insecticides.

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
