Still, cooperatives are made of ordinary people reaching for a common goal. Those who choose to work the land; raise livestock; live where they choose; while having access to the same comforts





## **Undefeated Lazbuddie blasts Whitharral, 59-14**

The undefeated Lazbuddie Longhorns rolled to a shocking 59-14 victory over Whitharral's Panthers in what was billed as a showdown game. Both teams were 5-0 going into the contest. The game was called in the third quarter due to the 45-point rule.




