Since October is National Cooperative Month, I'm using this space today for a guest column, from Marsha Vohs, who handles public relations at ENMR Telephone Cooperative:

Cooperatives began springing up across our nation some 50 years ago. Since that time, a lot of changes have occurred. New services have been offered and new ideas have shaped the future for rural Americans.

Comprised mainly in the rural areas, cooperatives provide a bounty of resources for those who live and work and give their all to sustain our natural commodities. Cooperatives provide elements such as electricity, tele-communication services, even goods and supplies.

Still, cooperatives are made of ordinary people reaching for a common goal. Those who choose to work the land; raise livestock; live where they choose; while having access to the same comforts offered to congested metro areas. Cooperative members are not deprived of these services, rather these areas thrive and excel because of the accessibility of services provided through various cooperatives.

In the rural areas, the flick of a finger lights up a surgical room in the local hospital and ready to care for a patient. While driving the open roads, a touch of a button reaches an important number through cellular communication. A farmer is able to drive a few miles to buy goods and supplies rather than travelling more than 40 miles to the nearest city.

Through cooperatives, a multitude of services are provided and millions of people are served.

The quality of life in the rural areas has attributed much to our nation, as the farmers, ranchers, industries and businesses, sustain the needs of America. You won't find cattle grazing in the city park, nor will you find a wheat field on Main Street. Cooperatives go where the people go, and serve right where the people live.

Cooperatives sustain the economic resource of each city and county served. The preservation of livestock, industry and local business, generate tax resources to each community, and counties are able to preserve their assets in meeting various obligations.

Everyone benefits directly or indirectly through the benefits of services provided by cooperatives. Schools have survived the threat of consolidations. Education thrives through the use of two-way interactive video via fiber optic telephone cables. Homes are heated, and foods preserved through refrigeration.

A step toward better health and the decrease of stomach cancer in the rural areas - due to the provision of electricity. The benefits of cooperatives continue to extend beyond what one sees on the surface.

During October, cooperatives across the nation work to celebrate National Cooperative Month. It is a time to recognize the sincere dedication of literally thousands of people, working together to sustain and strengthen the rural backbone of America.

A time to realize that in combining efforts and meeting general and specific needs - American truly remains the "Land of the Free." Free to produce, serve and preserve our land through the brave efforts of cooperatives who care enough to go beyond the city limits to "The Home(s) of the Brave."

Sand, dirt removed before new well is used

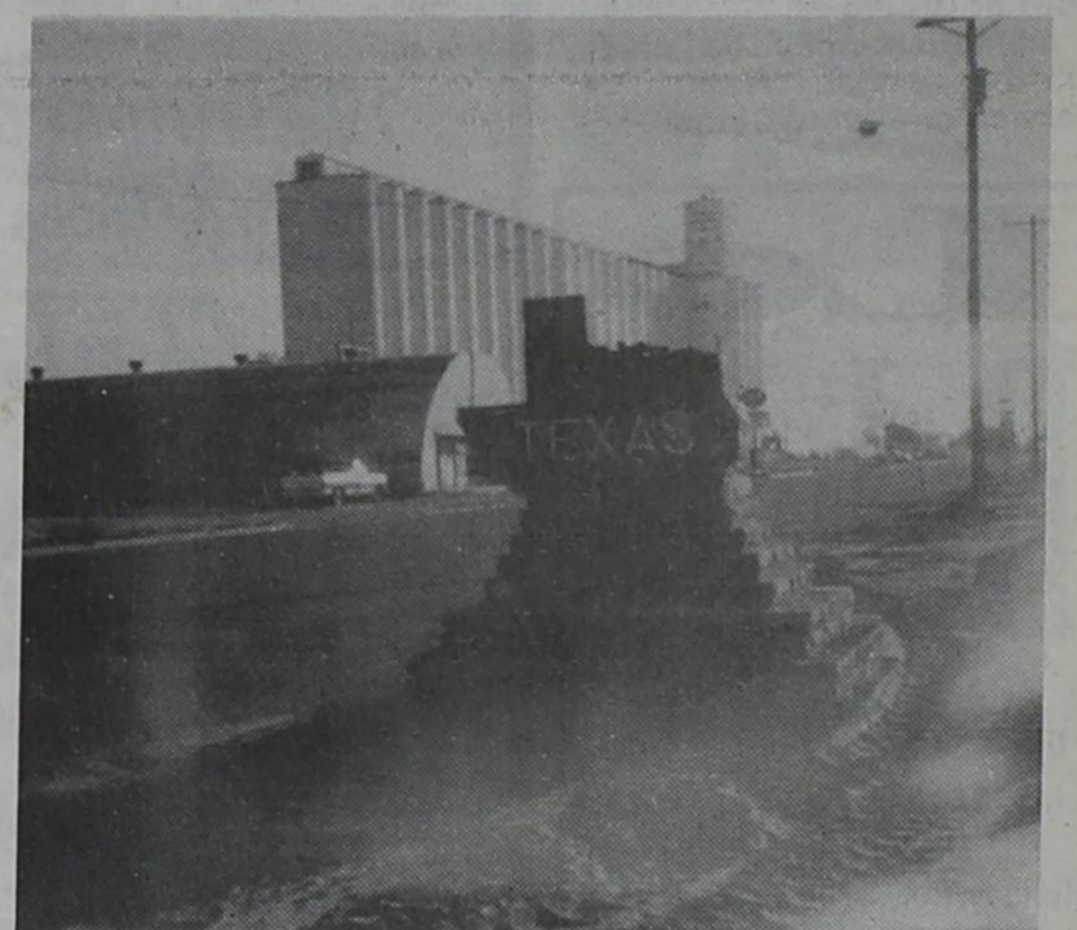
The ribbon of water that flowed from an open pipe at the Farwell city well between 6th and 7th streets on the loop this week caused residents to raise a few eyebrows.

Picnic shelter eliminated

The picnic table, and picnic shelter which stood beside the State of Texas marker on Hwy. 84 in Farwell are no longer there.

Neither is the grass nor the tree that stood in that spot. All that remains is the Texas marker and a pile of dirt.

According to Margaret Coleman, whose City Cleaners is beside the marker, visitors had stopped at that spot almost daily to photograph themselves with the sign, and they often stopped to eat at the picnic shelter.

But she was really more concerned about losing the tree. "I just wanted to cry, digging up that tree was murder," she said.

Her daughter, Diana Johnson, said "We called the Texas Highway Department, and they said nobody was using it (the picnic shelter), and it would cost more to fix than it was worth."

Officials at the Texas State Department of Highways and Public Transportation in Lubbock did not know why the table was removed, but according to Mike Wilson of the Texas Highway Department in Bovina, "It's basically a mat-

ter of cost. The table had been damaged, and they were afraid somebody would get hurt. And it would cost too much to have it fixed."

Wilson also made the point that there is no parking along the highway, so it was inconvenient for tourists to use the facilities.

Extra tax statements sent out

Parmer County taxpayers will soon be getting an additional copy of their 1991 tax statements in the mail.

The reason for the second mailing is that the state has told the county appraisal district that the name "Parmer County Education District" is to be used in place of the name of the local district (Farwell, Bovina, Lazbuddie or Friona).

The tax amounts won't change. But the county has to comply with the name change due to Texas Education Agency requirements.

# Rural Parmer County roads may be renamed

An update on the change in the 911 emergency number reporting system was given at Monday's Parmer County Commissioners' session.

In December, the entire county will be routed through the 911 switchboard at Friona police headquarters. The system will include a method for identifying where the calls are coming from.

Next spring, it's likely that rural roads in Parmer County will be renamed to make it easier for fire and police units to find addresses for the 911 system to work more effectively. This was done recently in Curry County.

In other business, the commissioners:

- Awarded the Lazbudie sewer project to low bidder Rhode Construction,

Lubbock. The award is for \$336,441. Work is expected to start later this month.

- Noted that Friona will be getting a new fire truck. Twenty thousand dollars of the cost is coming from the budgets of county commissioners Ernest Anthony and Tom Ware (\$10,000 each).

The fire truck being replaced will be donated to the Rhea community.

The Farwell JV was defeated 43-6 last week. The six points were scored when Jon Sullivan blocked a punt and Jason Taylor picked it up

and ran it in for the TD. Coach Larry Gregory reports that the JV will not play Thursday night.

Memorials may be made to the Bovina Ambulance Service or Bovina Cemetery.

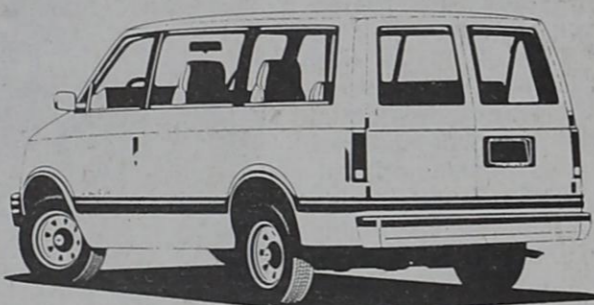

Aunt Theresa's Apple Slices

**Crust**  
 2 c. flour  
 1/2 tsp. salt  
 3/4 c. shortening  
 7 Tbs. water  
 1 Tbs. lemon peel  
 2 egg yolks  
**Filling**  
 8-10 apples, sliced

1 c. sugar  
 1 Tbs. flour  
 1/2 tsp. nutmeg  
 1/2 tsp. cinnamon  
 1/2 tsp. salt

Crust- Cut shortening into salt and flour until mixture is like coarse meal. Add eggs and liquid. Form into a ball. Chill. Roll 3/4 of crust out to fit a 14" x 10" pan. Retain the rest for strips to cover the top of the apple slices.

Filling- Peel and slice apples. Mix with sugar, flour and seasonings. Spread filling over crust.

top crust- Roll remaining crust out to form strips. Lay long strips of dough over the filling. Weave other strips horizontally across the top. Pinch edges together.

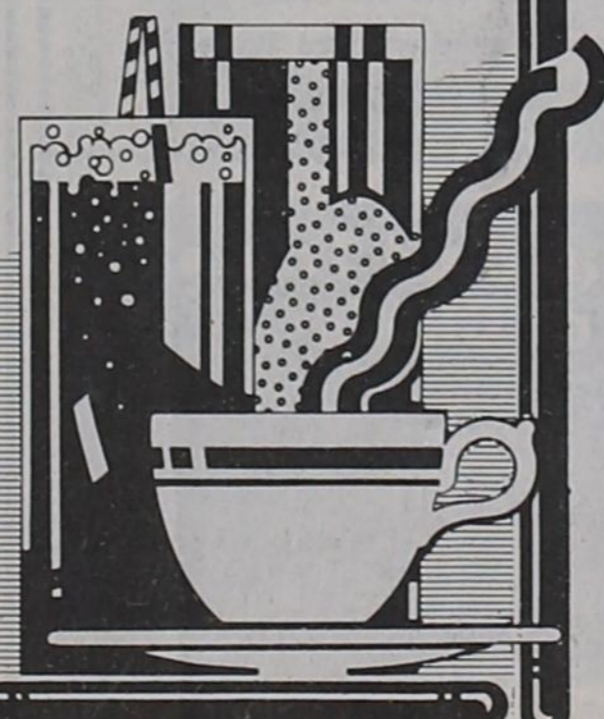

# Hagerman ends Wolverine victory streak, 21-9

The Texico Wolverines had their 13-game winning streak ended at home last Friday by falling to the Hagerman Bobcats, 21-9.

Texico is now 5-1 on the season and 0-1 in district. The Wolverines vie against Tatum in an away game tonight (Friday) at 7:30 p.m. Tatum is 7-0 overall and 2-0 in district and ranked No. 1 in the state.

Texico started the game on defense, with tackles by Johnny Salinas, Anthony Garcia, Matthew Williams Steve Horner and Pepe Gonzales. After Gonzales broke up a pass attempt, Kenny Shaw intercepted a pass but it was disallowed due to a penalty.

After an exchange of punts, the Texico defense did well, with tackles by Garcia, Gonzales, Billy Rogers, Horner and

Louis Delgado. Gonzales recovered a Hagerman fumble at the Wolverine 15 with 4:32 left on the clock. But Texico fumbled the ball away on the next play. At 3:55, Hagerman scored on an 8-yard run and the kick was good - Hagerman 7, Texico 0.

Texico was held on offense. On defense, Williams recovered a fumble. A pass interference call helped Texico. Gonzales hit a couple of passes and also ran for 6 yards. A TD run by Gonzales was called back due to illegal motion. After 2 incomplete throws, Gonzales hit a 4th and 9 pass to Shaw with 6 minutes left in the half. Texico's Luis Estrada then kicked a 27-yard field goal to draw within 4 points.

On defense, tackles were made by David Madrid, Williams, Greg Akers, Gooden, Horner and Rogers. Chad Dunsforth had a strong stop. Hagerman was stopped at the Wolverine 39 yard line. Gonzales then hit Delgado with a pass. And Shaw gained another first down. Gonzales scrambled up the middle for long yardage. Finally, Gonzales carried it in from the 14 for the TD. Texico now led 9-7 with just 55 seconds left in the half.

But Texico's kick was run all the way back for a 78-yard Bobcat TD. The pass for the extra points was good and Hagerman regained the lead, 15-9. On offense, Gonzales had a long run before the half ended.

In the third quarter, Hagerman recovered a fumble. Gooden had a strong stop on defense. On offense, Texico took to the air but wasn't successful.

Hagerman scored another TD for their final score. On offense, Gooden had a super carry for 15 yards. A 4th down pass failed and Texico was stopped again. With 3:22, Williams recovered a Hagerman fumble. But the Texico offense was halted again.

In the final period, Hagerman tallied on a 44-yard run. The pass for extra points failed and the scoring ended.

Texico, 7 for 45 yards, Hagerman, 9 for 65. Individual statistics were: rushing - Shaw, 5 for 17; Gooden, 4 for 37; Gonzales, 17 for 112. Receiving - Shaw, 2 catches for 26; Charles Williams, 1 for 13; Delgado, 1 for 25. Passing - Gonzales, 4 for 17 and 64 yards. Coach Bruce Scroggins commented, "We played real spotty and didn't have any consistency. In the second quarter, we played well, got ahead, then they ran back that kickoff and took the air out of us. 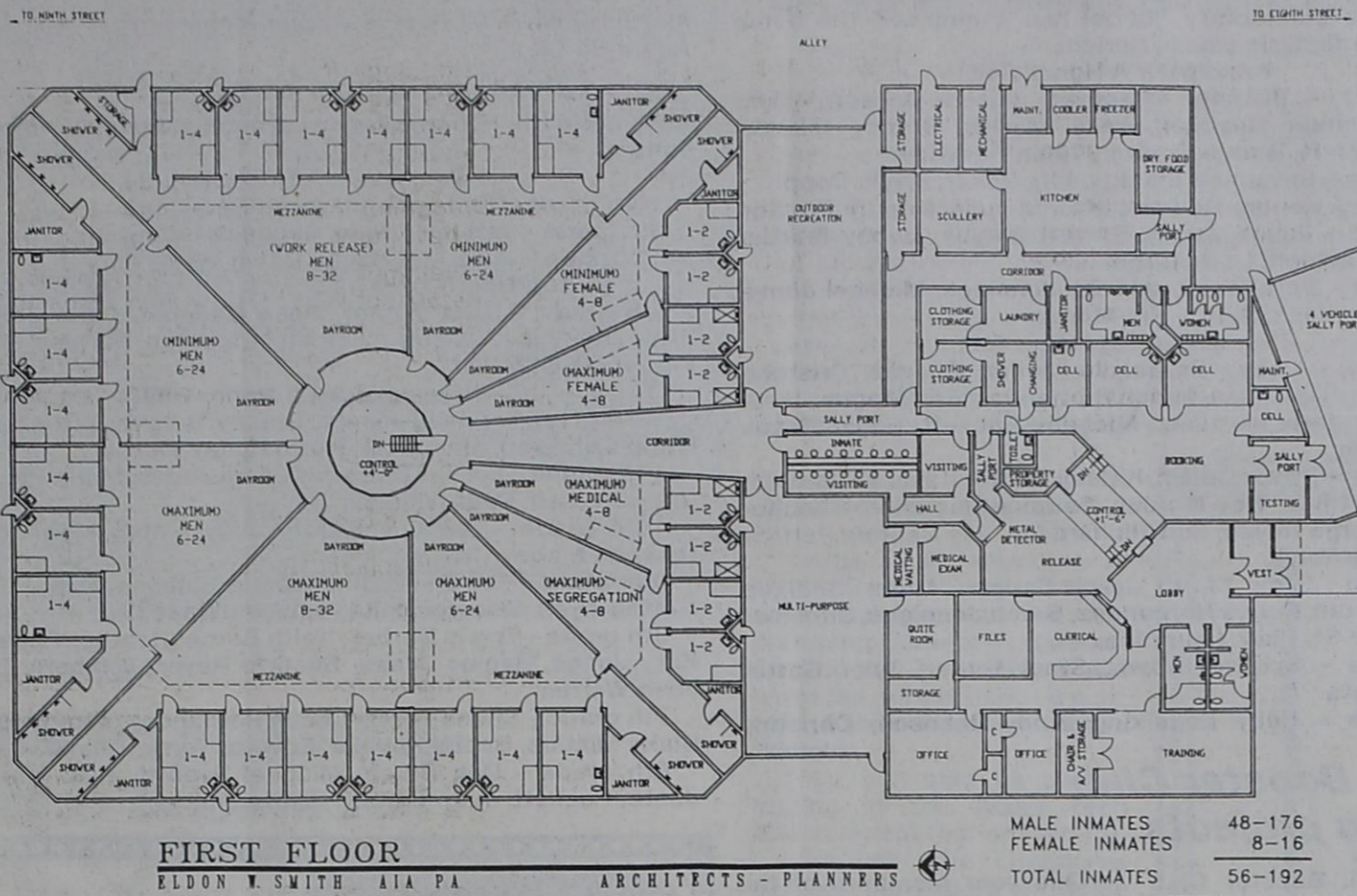
## Play Day slated

## Jail bond election upcoming

Curry County voters will be asked to vote for the authorization of a \$5 million dollar jail bond Oct. 22.

Polls will be open from 7 a.m. - 7 p.m. mdt.

Texico voters in Pct. 33 vote at the Texico Community Building. Pleasant Hill voters in Pct. 2 vote at the Pleasant Hill Fire Department.

Absentee voting is being conducted at the county clerk's office in the Curry County Courthouse through 5 p.m. on Oct. 19.

Curry County plans to build a new jail designed to house 150 prisoners. This facility

has been designed to meet all of the current standards, and yet be cost effective.

Some new jail features are: better double security system; increased operational efficiency; increased inmate capacity; space available for expansion; secure visiting area

Plans call for the new jail to be built on Mitchell between 8th and 9th streets. The site location will be close to the current Sheriff's Department.

Currently, the Curry County Jail is located on the third floor of the Courthouse. It was constructed in 1936 and

designed for 46 prisoners.

Last year Curry County had to spend about \$225,000 to house inmates in jails outside of Curry County because the current jail is too small. Four different Grand Juries have met and concluded that the current jail is grossly inadequate. It is only able to house about 35% of all County prisoners.

It is estimated that approval of this bond issue would raise taxes about \$2 per \$1,000 of assessed val-

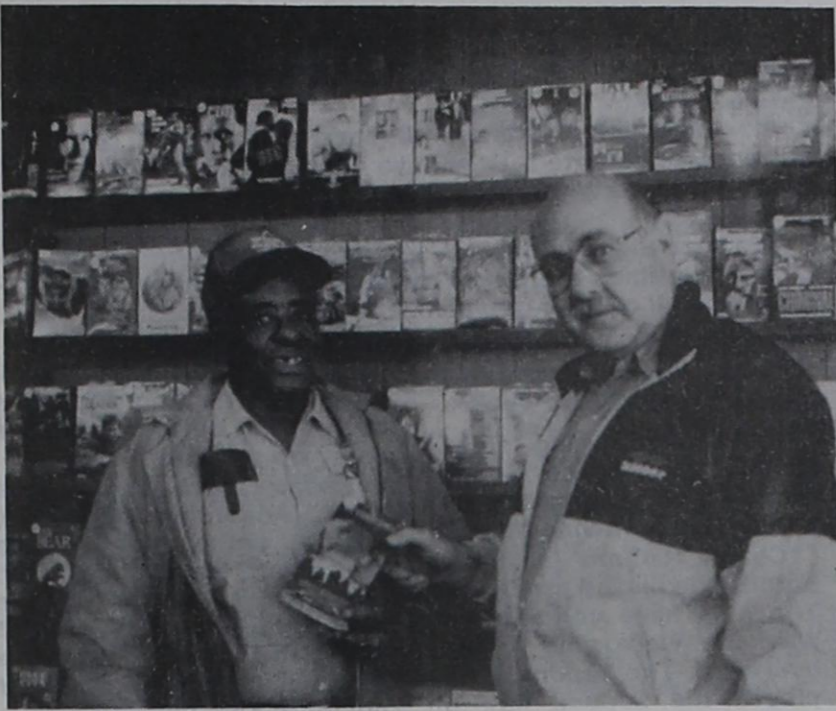

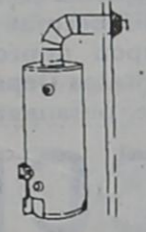

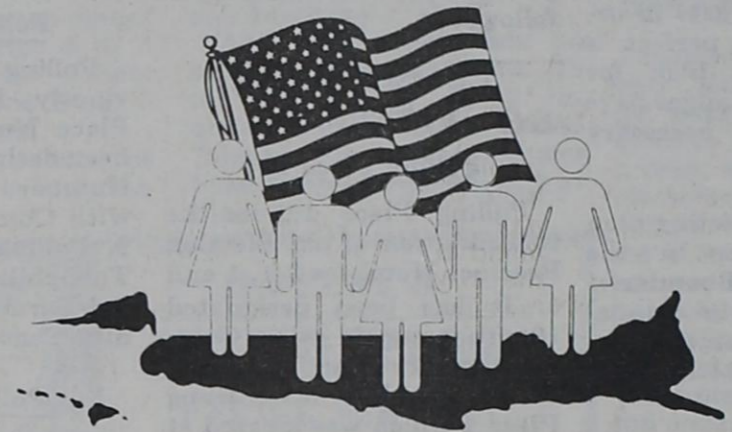

# Undefeated Lazbuddie blasts Whitharral, 59-14

The undefeated Lazbuddie Longhorns rolled to a shocking 59-14 victory over Whitharral's Panthers in what was billed as a showdown game. Both teams were 5-0 going into the contest. The game was called in the third quarter due to the 45-point rule.

Lazbuddie, 6-0 overall and 1-0 in district, hosts Cotton Center tonight (Friday).

Lazbuddie was aided by Panther turnovers, cashing in on three of them. Also, Lazbuddie's Eric Williams and Frank Gonzales blocked punts.

The first quarter was all Lazbuddie as the Longhorns took a 22-0 lead on these scores: a 75-yard kickoff return by Kirk Jesko (the Luis Gonzales kick was good), a 3-yard run by Jesko (kick failed) and a 67-yard run by Jesko (the Gonzales kick was good).

The second quarter was closer as Lazbuddie tallied 17 points to Whitharral's 14. Whitharral scored on a 45 yard pass and a 26 yard pass. One kick was good. Lazbuddie scored on a 23 yard pass from Mario Zamora to Frank Gonzales, a 63-yard return by Monty Foster of a fumbled point after, and a 19-yard pass from Zamora to Matt Cozbey (and Gonzales

kick).

In the third quarter, Lazbuddie scored thrice to end the game: on a 25 yard pass from Zamora to Brockman (Gonzales kick), on a 4 yard plunge by Luis Gonzales and an 8-yard run by Luis Gonzales.

Many folks were surprised by Lazbuddie's strong showing because this was Zamora's first full game at quarterback - injuries have temporarily shelved Paul Williams and Brett Thomas. But Zamora responded in a big way: he hit 6 of 11 passes for 101 yards, while rushing 4 times for 22 yards.

Jesko rushed for 148 yards, on 8 attempts, and caught 4 passes for 14 yards. Lazbuddie gained 301 yards and had 10 first downs.

Coach C.W. Williams commented, "Whitharral had a 5-0 record but they hadn't played the level of competition we had. We just took advantage of their mistakes." Lazbuddie blocked a couple of important punts, and got possession of the ball three times deep in Whitharral's field. "Their offense made mistakes, and our defense played pretty good. We had a lot of short drives."

## COMMISSIONER PRECINCT 1

# Bovina slips past Steers, 9-0

The Farwell Steers opened their district season last Friday by dropping a 9-0 game to Bovina in an away game. The Steers are now 0-1 in district and 0-4-1 for the season. They host Nazareth in a district game for Homecoming tonight (Friday) at 7:30 p.m. at Roberts Stadium.

The injury bug continued to haunt the Steers. Quarterback Chad Byrd was injured and may miss a couple of games. Farwell kicked off to the Mustang 41. Brent Harrison had a strong tackle for a 5-yard loss. Bovina was held and punted to the Steer 30. The Steers moved the ball well on the ground behind runs by Harrison and Kirk Lingnau. On a 4th and 2 situation on the Bovina 39, Lingnau crashed for a first down. But Farwell was held there and Lupe Garza continued his strong punting by pooch kicking to the Bovina 3. Bovina moved the ball to the 22 when Corey Kirkpatrick ran around end for a 78-yard TD at 2:25 of the first quarter. The Angel Porras kick made it 7-0.

Bovina kicked to the Farwell 22. The Steers tried a surprise lateral play on the kickoff return but it failed. On the second play, Farwell fumbled and Bovina recovered at the Steer 15. Farwell held and a field goal attempt from the Steer 16 was wide.

In the second quarter, Farwell was held deep in its own territory. A bad snap on 4th down resulted in a safety at 8:26, giving Bovina its 9-0 margin.

Garza boomed a 50-yard punt to make Bovina start at its own 37. On 4th and 1 at the Steer 40, Bovina lined up to punt

but ran the ball; it was stopped. Harrison hit on a halfback pass but Farwell was stopped and punted to the Bovina 20. On defense, Byrd made a strong tackle as Bovina was held as the half ended.

In the third quarter, Byrd had a good runback on the kickoff to the Steer 37. A reverse gained a first down at midfield. Lingnau then rushed for 15 yards to the Bovina 33. A holding penalty against Farwell put the Steers into a 4th and 10 situation. Byrd was sacked and Bovina started at its 39.

Farwell recovered a fumble at midfield but Porras intercepted at the Bovina 46. Brian Johnson had a strong tackle. But Bovina moved the ball to the Steer 20 on a pass interference call. Two runs gained a first down on the Steer 9. On 4th and 3 from the 3, an end run was stopped by Byrd and Garza.

In the final period, the Steers moved for a couple of first downs before Bovina intercepted a halfback pass at the Bovina 40. After an exchange of punts, Bovina controlled the ball on the ground for about 6 minutes, aided by a roughing the passer call. Farwell got the ball back with 25 seconds left but couldn't move it in time.

Coach Rex Cumpston commented, "We continue to struggle on offense. We can't be consistent. We do 3 things good and 2 things poorly. We played good "bend but don't break" defense, except for one play. In order for us to win, we have to put together some consistent drives on offense and continue to play well on defense."
