Coaching questioned

I don't think I was ever angrier about a football game as I was while watching the Dallas Cowboys play the Philadelphia Eagles Sunday on TV.

I know that all the criticism will be directed at the players - QB Troy Aikman "eating the ball" so much; the leaky offensive line; soft pass defense, etc.

Frankly, those things didn't bother me as much as the Cowboy coaching staff did. I thought they were the main culprit for the disaster.

For example, I watched Dallas line up in a standard 4-3 defense the entire first half. It was a fatal error.

The Cowboy defensive front four are good players, but there's not an outstanding pass rusher among them. When that's the case for a team, it behooves them to rush more players, like a linebacker or two. Or blitz.

But the Cowboys went the entire first half without that obvious understanding. Instead, they allowed the Eagles to put 17 points on the board - all through passing.

Jim McMahon, the Eagle QB, had the proverbial all the time in the world to pass. And if you give a pro QB enough time, he can wipe you out as McMahon showed.

Finally, in the 2nd half, the Cowboys went to a 5-2 on defense and it stifled the Eagles except for one series when a pass interference call gave the Eagles the ball at the goal line.

The point I'm trying to make is that it was obvious midway through the first quarter that the defensive strategy needed changing - but that wasn't done until the 3rd quarter.

If I, an armchair quarterback, can start yelling at the TV set with 5 minutes left in the first period, than how come those high-paid coaches right at the stadium can't figure out the obvious? In a word - a lousy job by the defensive coach.

Let's not leave out the offensive coach. He didn't do any better.

Philadelphia has one of the best pass rushes in the NFL, if not the best. Two of their linemen are All-Pro.

But it was obvious the Cowboy game plan called for a lot of long passes. No way could Aikman have the time to do that. So he was sacked time and time again.

I didn't watch every single play in the game because church didn't let out until after noon. But I don't recall any flare passes to halfback Emmett Smith, which have been so effective in other games. Or to the fullback. Or to anybody.

In fact, I don't think Aikman threw more than one or two short passes until the final period when it was too late.

Surely, the Cowboy offensive coach knows that the way to beat a great pass rush is to use quarterback and tailback draws, screens and short passes. Apparently not.

And one more coaching "strategy" drew my ire - the use of the off tackle play on first down.

I willingly admit I have a fetish about this. I hate it when it's first down and the play is run off tackle. I got to hate it while watching the old Cleveland Browns in the early 1950s under Coach Paul Brown.

It was Brown's philosophy to start with the off-tackle play because it allowed the offense to warm up by hitting someone on an easily run

The Texico Wolverines have moved up to the No. 3 spot in the Associated Press poll among Class 1A football teams in New Mexico.

In statistics maintained by the Lubbock newspaper: Texico ranks 3rd among area New Mexico teams on offense with 348.5 yards a game, and 2nd on team defense,

allowing 101 yards a game. Kenny Shaw is 3rd among New Mexico area rushers, gaining 149 yards a game. Kelvin Gooden is 7th among the runners, with 96 yards a game. Josefre Gonzales is 7th among the passers, with 4 completions in 9 attempts for 99

yards. Shaw was mentioned on the newspaper's "New Mexico honor roll" for his efforts against Capitan: he gained 138 yards, scored a TD, knocked down one pass and had 4 tackles.

In Class 1A, Farwell ranks 6th on team offense, with 210.5 yards a game, and 9th on team defense, allowing 305 yards a game. Among area passers, Chad Byrd ranks 5th with 8 completions in 24 attempts for 157 yards. Ray Haseloff ranks 7th among the receivers with 4 grabs for 85 yards. Bovina ranks 1st on team defense in the area, allowing 112.5 yards a game.

Among Six-Man teams, Lazbuddie ranks 4th on team offense, gaining an average of 392.5 yards a game. Among the rushers, Kirk Jesko is 7th, averaging 137 yards a game. 
In reference to your recent letter addressed to my Washington office. I have contin-

CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENTS SPECIAL ELECTION **NOVEMBER 5, 1991**

PROPOSITION NO. 1 ON THE BALLOT

House Joint Resolution 114 proposes a constitutional amendment that would authorize home rule cities having a population of 5,000 or fewer inhabitants to amend their city charters by a majority vote of a city's qualified voters at an election held for that purpose. The amendment makes clear that home rule cities that have declined in population below the population required to initially adopt a charter of the state. The bonds and interest may nevertheless continue to amend on the bonds would be paid from the their charters.

The proposed amendment will be described on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment allowing home-rule cities with a population of 5,000 or less to amend their charters by popular

PROPOSITION NO. 2 ON THE BALLOT

House Joint Resolution 10 proposes a constitutional amendment that would allow the legislature to authorize the Texas Department of Transportation to expend money, from any source available, for the costs of the turnpikes, toll roads, or toll bridges of the Texas Turnpike Authority, provided that any monies expended from the state highway fund shall be repaid to the fund from tolls or other turnpike rev-

The proposed amendment will be described on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment mandating the repayment to the Department of Transportation of monies expended to assist the Texas Turnpike Authority in the construction, maintenance, and operation of turnpikes, toll roads and toll bridges."

PROPOSITION NO. 3

ON THE BALLOT Senate Joint Resolution 26 proposes a constitutional amendment that would authorize the Veterans' Land Board to invest, as authorized by law, moneys of the Veterans' Land Fund which are not immediately committed to the payment of principal and interest on bonds issued by the Veterans' Land Board, the purchase of lands, or the payment of expenses. Investment of such moneys would no longer be restricted to investments in bonds or obligations of the United States. The proposed amendment would also authorize the Veterans' Land Board to invest, as authorized by law, moneys of the Veterans' Housing Assistance Fund which are not immediately committed to the payment of principal and interest on general obligation bonds issued by the Veterans' Land Board for the benefit of the Veterans' Housing Assistance Fund, the making of home mortgage loans, or the payment of expenses. Investment of such moneys would no longer be restricted to investments in bonds or obligations of the United States. The proposed amendment gives the legislature as it deems necessary.

The proposed amendment will be described on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment to authorize the legislature to further implement and enhance the administration of the veterans' housing assistance and land programs and to expand the investment authority of the Veterans' Land Board."

PROPOSITION NO. 4 ON THE BALLOT

Senate Joint Resolution 4 proposes a constitutional amendment that would allow the legislature to authorize the issuance of a maximum of \$1.1 billion in general obligation bonds. The proceeds of the bonds are to be used to acquire, construct, or equip new prisons and substance abuse felony punishment facilities, mental health and mental retarda- each major political party; two

tion institutions, and youth corrections institutions, to repair and renovate existing facilities of those institutions and to acquire, repair, or renovate other facilities for use as state prisons or substance abuse felony punishment facilities. The \$1.1 billion is in addition to the \$900 million currently authorized by the constitution to be expended on bond issues for facilities of correctional and mental health and mental retardation institutions. The bonds would constitute a general obligation first money coming into the state treasury that is not otherwise appropriated by the constitution, less any amount in a sinking fund at the end of the preceding fiscal year that is pledged to payment of the bonds

PROPOSITION NO. 5 ON THE BALLOT

Senate Joint Resolution 39 proposes a constitutional amendment that would allow a county, junior college district, or municipality to exempt tangible personal property from ad valorem taxation if: (1) the property is acquired or brought Lieutenant Governor would not make into the state in an enterprise zone to be forwarded outside the state, (2) the property is assembled, stored, repaired, maintained, manufactured, processed, or fabricated in the enterprise zone, (3) the property is transported outside the state not later than 175 days after being acquired or brought into an enterprize zone, and (4) the person who acquired or brought the property into an enterprise zone is a qualified business. A county, junior college district, or municipality may exempt such property by entering into a written agreement with a qualified business that states the duration of the exemption and the terms on which the exemption is granted. Any action to exempt property must be taken before April 1 of the first year in which the property would otherwise be taxed. The term "enterprize zone" means an area that (1) has been designated as such by a ic development, and (2) has pervasive poverty, unemployment, and economic distress. The term "qualified business" means a business that meets the qualification established by general law, and requires that the qualified business is actively engaged in a new business in the enterprize zone or is expanding a business power to implement the amendment that is already active in the enterand to delegate such duties and au- prise zone. PROPOSITION NO. 6 ON THE BALLOT

Senate Joint Resolution 8 proposes a constitutional amendment that would establish a Texas Ethics Commission with the powers and duties provided by law. The commission would consist of eight appointed members selected as follows: two members of different political parties appointed by the governor from a list of at least ten names submitted by the members of the house of representatives from

two members of different political parties appointed by the speaker of the house of representatives from a list of at least ten names submitted by the members of the house from each major political party; and two members of different political parties appointed by the lieutenant governor from a list of at least ten names submitted by the members of the senate from each major political party. A major political party is a political party required by law to hold a primary. With the exception of the initial appointees, commission members would serve for four-year terms. A member who has served for one term and any part of a second term would not be eligible for reappointment. The commission would be authorized to recommend the salary of the members of the legislature and may recommend that the salary of the speaker of the house of representatives and the lieutenant governor be set at an amount higher than that of other members. "The constitutional amendment to allow the board of trustees of a statewide public retirement system to invest the funds of the system in a manner that the board considers prudent."

PROPOSITION NO. 8 ON THE BALLOT

Senate Joint Resolution 21 proposes a constitutional amendment that would permit the legislature to create debt by or on behalf of the state if the legislature submitted the debt question to the voters of the state in the form of a proposition and a majority of those voting approved the proposition. The legislature may call the election, by joint resolution approved by at least twothirds of the members of each house, during any regular session or during any special session if the subject of the proposition is included in the Governor's proclamation for that special session. A proposition must and must describe the source of payment for the debt. The amount of

PROPOSITION NO. 9 ON THE BALLOT

Senate Joint Resolution 11 proposes a constitutional amendment that would authorize the commissioner of the General Land Office to issue patents for certain public free school fund land for which there is not a valid transfer of title from either the State or the Republic of Texas to a private party. A patent is a document of title issued by the state. On application to the School Land Board, a person is entitled to receive a patent if: (1) the land is surveyed public free school fund land, (2) the land was not patentable under the law before the adoption of this proposed amendment, (3) the person acquired the land without knowledge of the title defect out of the State of Texas or the Republic of Texas and held the land under color of title, the chain of which dates from at least January 1, 1941, (4) the person has a recorded deed on file in the county courthouse and, in conjunction with his predecessor in interest, has claimed the land for at least fifty years as of January 1, 1991. and (5) the person, in conjunction with his predecessor in interest, for at least 50 years has paid taxes on the land together with all interest and penalties associated with any delinquency. If the applicant is denied a patent, the applicant may file suit against the School Land Board in a district court in the county where the land is located within 60 days from the date of denial. The proposed amendment does not apply to beach land, submerged land, or islands, and may not be used to resolve a boundary dispute. The proposed amendment also does not apply to land found by a court to be stateowned or to land on which the state has given a mineral lease that is in effect when a patent is sought. A patent under this proposed amendment for land within five miles of mineral production shall reserve minerals to the state in the manner provided by law for reservations of minerals in sales to claimants of unsurveyed school land within five miles of production. An application for a patent under this proposed amendment must be filed with the School Land Board before January 1, 1993.

The main difference is that under the earlier version the applicant for a patent to land had to have a chain of title that dated back to at least, or interests. as early as January 1, 1932.

"The constitutional amendment authorizing a state lottery."

PROPOSITION NO. 12 ON THE BALLOT

Senate Joint Resolution 34 proposes a constitutional amendment that would increase the total amount of bonds that may be issued by the Texas Water Development Board to provide wholesale and retail water and wastewater facilities to economically distressed areas of the state. The proposed amendment increases the maximum principal amount of the bonds from 20 percent to 50 percent of the \$500 million amount authorized by article III, section 49-d-7, of the Texas Constitution. The proposed amendment would increase the maximum aggregate dollar amount of bonds that the Texas Water Development Board could issue from \$100 million to \$250 million.

The proposed amendment will be described on the ballot as follows:

"The constitutional amendment to increase from 20 percent to 50 percent the percentage of Texas water development hands previously authorized by Texas voters that may be issued for economically distressed areas,"

PROPOSITION NO. 13 ON THE BALLOT

Senate Joint Resolution 2 proposes a constitutional amendment that would allow the legislature to pass general laws authorizing Texas Higher Education Coordinating Board or its successor to issue and sell up to \$300 million of general obligation bonds to finance education loans to students. The maximum net effective interest rate to be borne by the bonds would be set by law. The amendment would also authorize the legislature to provide for the investment of bond proceeds and to establish an interest and sinking fund to pay the bonds and provide for the investment of such fund. Bonds authorized under this amendment would be paid from the first money coming into the treasury in each fiscal year that is not otherwise appropriated by the constitution, less any amount in an interest and sinking fund established at the end of the preceding year that is pledged to the payment of the bonds

The proposed amendment will be described on the ballot as follows:"

"The constitutional amendment providing for the issuance of general obligation bonds not to exceed \$300,000,000 to continue existing programs to provide educational loans to students, with repayments of student loans applied toward retirement of the bonds."
