its facilities

Members of the St. John Lutheran Church congregation in Lariat are using a combination of old-fashioned hard work and modern ingenuity to expand their facilities.

With luck and a lot of hard work the spacious addition which will serve the whole community, and is expected to cost little more than an ordinary new home.

Ground-breaking took place during the Aug. 22 worship service. Rev. E. Richard Greenthaner used the traditional shovel to break the ground. Then members of the congregation, led by Wilburt Kalbas, used an old fashioned plow to loosen the soil in the area where the foundation would later be poured.

The building committee hoped to show that the job could be done if all the members of the congregation pulled together and expended some old fashion hard work.

"This is kind of a team thing with the whole congregation - both the old and the young working together," said Rev Greenthaner.

Steve Meeks was chosen as the local contractor. He will use trained professionals to do the skilled labor, and as many untrained volunteers as possible to complete the job in the most cost effective manner.


For instance, the congregation has already removed brick from the portion of the building where the addition will join the present building. They laboriously took down each brick and removed the mortar that held them together. They also ripped out a sidewalk and four trees before professionals poured the foundation.

"We did a lot of 'sweat equity," Greenthaner quipped.

The project will expand the Sunday school classrooms, add an office for the pastor, enlarge the braille printing room, double the size of the church kitchen, add handicapped bathrooms, improve the furnace, add a lighted basketball court, and eventually, enlarge the size of the church itself.

The project will be done in two phases. The first phase which has already been started, will enlarge the total size of the building, and the second phase will change the way the space is used within the structure. For instance, members of the congregation will be asked to help gut the current kitchen and remove a wall so that the room will be about double its current size. Volunteers will remove cabinets and ounters. They will also be asked to help with cleaning, painting, and moving furniture.

Rev. Greenthaner estimates that the building project will cost about \$125,000 - \$140,000. The more that the members of the congregation are able to do for themselves, the less it will cost in the long run. The crux of the problem for the project's contractor is knowing when to call in professional help, which professionals to contact for which parts of the job, and when to rely on enthusiastic, but (Continued on Page 7)





By winning the match, Texico won the right to face Dora for the volleyball championship Saturday night.





Sheriff's Report

Here is the weekly report from Parmer County Sheriff **Rex Williams:**

H.E.A.T., or Help End Auto Theft, is a voluntary statewide vehicle theft prevention program designed to help reduce auto theft in Texas.

A vehicle owner may register his vehicle with a participating local law enforcement agency.

This registration allows law enforcement officers to determine whether a vehicle is being operated by the owner or with the owner's permission. Owners also may voluntarily extend the authority to stop the vehicle whenever the vehicle crosses or is about to cross the border into Mexico.

Vehicles may be registered at the Parmer County sheriff's office at the county courthouse in Farwell weekdays between 8:30 a.m. and 5 p.m. Registration fee is \$2 per vehicle.


