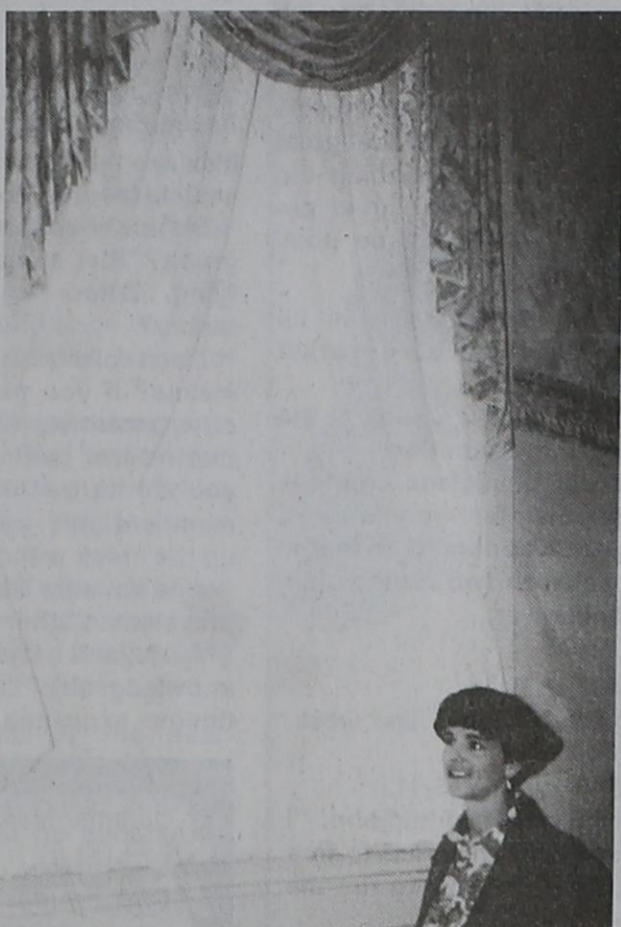

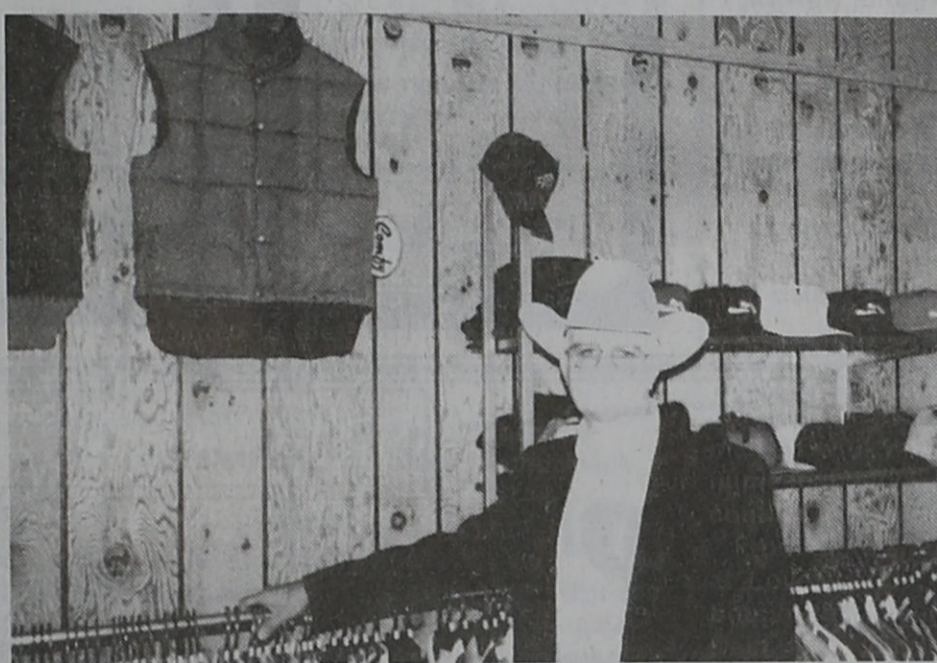
## Texico landmark remodeled

Rip's Western Wear and Ladies Apparel, a landmark in Texico, has undergone extensive renovation inside and out.

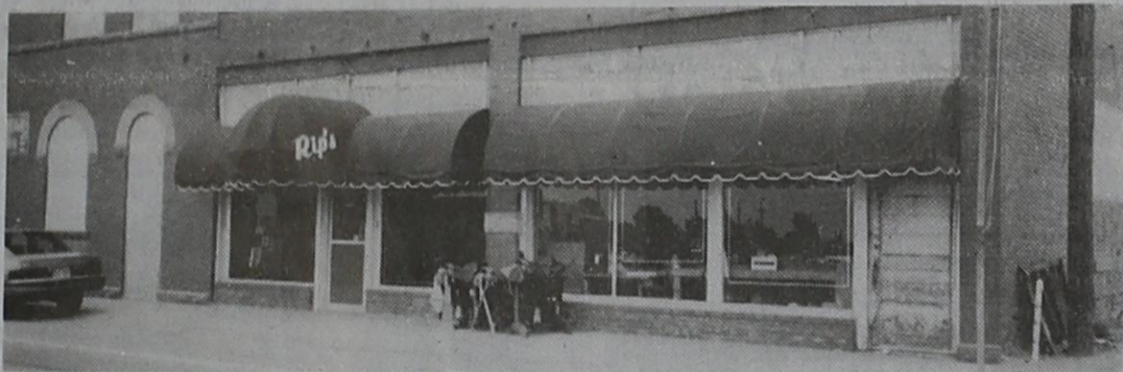

## County tax hike OK'd

The Parmer County Commissioners voted Monday 4-0 to increase the county tax rate by just under 2 cents per \$100 valuation.

The rate goes from .3246 cents to .3441 cents. This means the cost for the average Parmer County house goes up about \$5.

The proposed budget was

also approved by a 4-0 vote. The budget will be \$2,704,070, down from \$2,897,495.

The commissioners said the budget decrease of about \$193,000 is due to cutbacks in various department budgets, no pay raises for county employees and the fact that last year a large amount was included for courthouse and jail renovations.

Three persons attended the budget hearing, two from Farwell and one from Friona.

Friona's Ernest Anthony, a former county commissioner, said he stopped by on his way to Clovis. Anthony is rumored to be considering running for the commissioner's seat again. He was defeated by Johnny Mars last time.

William Dannheim did what no one else could do in last week's Area Merchants Football Contest -- he got 11 of the 12 games picked correctly.

## Texico crackdown continues

The Texico City Council on Tuesday continued its crackdown on persons violating the mobile home and zoning ordinances.

The council denied a request by Mario Montes to move a house from 503 2nd St. in Farwell to a site in Texico just north of the swimming pool.

The structure is on a list in Farwell where condemnation proceedings have begun.

Mayor Butch Tharp said the building inspector had issued an unfavorable report, several folks were opposed to this structure coming into the city and he opposed it, also.

In other business, the council:

-- Heard Tharp tell Max Carter that complaints have been received about a Turner Street site he is working at.

City Attorney Marion Ty Rutter told Carter to meet with city marshal Gil Holguin on how to rectify the situation.

-- Betsy Autrey, who has a trailer on her property which city officials said is in violation of the city code, said she disagreed with the city ordinance and was not applying at that meeting for the aesthetic review permit approval.

After being told that if the trailer does not meet the city code, and if it remains on her property, then if she doesn't seek the approval she will be

## Texico Judge Snider experienced in law enforcement

When Texico Municipal Judge George Herington resigned his position in May, the duties of the office were placed into very capable hands.

In fact, one could say that the newly appointed Municipal Judge carries out law enforcement and judging with a "woman's touch"... a touch that carries many years of security and law enforcement experience into the judges' seat.

Carol Snider was appointed to the Municipal Judges' position in June and was immediately sent to a Judge's conference.

"I really didn't know what to expect, but I was anxious to attend the conference and become further educated about

the laws that Texico and other towns in New Mexico fall under," she stated.

Carol brings to the position law enforcement experience and a lot of interest in criminal justice. She began her enforcement career as a plain clothes security officer at the Alco department store formerly in Clovis. She left this position to become an Adult Detention Officer at the Curry County Detention Center in 1986.

During this same time, she became a reserve officer with the Curry Co. Sheriff's Department. At the time she was the only female reserve officer in the program. She had remained with this program up until her appointment as the municipal judge. The two positions were considered a conflict of interest.

From there she went on to become the full-time bookkeeper at Lovelace Oil, after she and her husband David Snider bought the business. She also served on the Clovis Police Dept. for a very short time. The shift work didn't work out very well for her or her family, which had since expanded since the birth of their son, Bobby.

She later took another plain clothes security position with Wal-Mart. She thoroughly enjoyed this job, because she literally shopped all the time! The main purpose for this was to be among the customers and watch for shoplifters.

"You wouldn't believe the things that people will try to steal and the ways that they try to do it!" she exclaimed.

A position as a legal secretary came open in the Clovis law firm of Quinn & Quinn and she jumped at the opportunity.

"I wanted to explore the legal litigation side of law enforcement and felt that this was the best way to learn about

the other side to the system," she stated.

To this day, she remains a full-time employee of the law firm, the bookkeeper for the family business and being the municipal judge. All in addition to being a wife and mother.

"It's all a matter of scheduling and prioritizing," she said. "Flexibility is also the name of the game. All of my jobs are very family friendly and the hours that I hold for the judge's position are up to my discretion. In fact, the hours that I am here at City Hall are probably more convenient for most of the people who have to come see me."

Carol is enjoying the position and the variety of cases that she must decide upon.

The major issues that come before her are dealing with traffic citations. The court only hears petty misdemeanors involving accidents with no injuries, enforcement of nuisance ordinances and various other petty criminal cases. Another major aspect the court hears are the DWI first and second violations.

The most common complaint that falls under city ordinance enforcement are dog and trash complaints. Both of these are criminal trespass complaints.

Carol has been very pleased with the way that the Marshal's office has worked with her since she took the judge's chair. And she has been very glad that she hasn't had any hassles over the fact that she is a woman judge.

"I really see no difference in the way that people act toward the position just because of my gender," she stated. "I think that the main issue that people are (pleasantly) surprised about is my age."

given a citation and go before the municipal judge.

At Mrs. Autrey's request, the council granted her an extension until the next meeting to present her aesthetic review plan to get the trailer up to city codes.

-- Vonnie McIntosh complained of a trailer adjacent to her property which she felt was in violation of city codes.

The property owner, Adulego Estrada, appeared at the meeting but had not arranged to be on the agenda to seek the aesthetic review permit. He is now on the agenda for the next council meeting.

At that time, a full discussion will be held.

-- Plans to amend its traffic ordinance to increase traffic penalties either \$3, \$4 or \$5, which would go into a special fund for police department equipment and/or training.

Holguin said this is allowed under new state legislation and Clovis has added \$3 to its traffic fines for these purposes. Holguin supported a \$5 hike.

-- Asked Rutter to continue checking on the legality of adding electrical service for street light decorations on Wheeler Avenue.

The Chamber of Commerce has asked for his so it can put up holiday lights on both sides of Wheeler in December.

-- Heard councilman Oran Jay Autrey report that bids will be opened Oct. 5 for the new community center.

-- Is checking into amending its zoning ordinance at councilman Rick Queener's

request.

Queener asked about parking rules in commercial areas, such as at the flea market; and about putting private homes in commercial and industrial areas.

-- Asked Rutter to draft an amendment to the mobile home ordinance dealing with the skirting of mobile homes, at Queener's request.

The current ordinance language says the "texture" of the skirting must be similar to that of the home.

-- Heard Queener ask if a zoning committee was needed.

A zoning committee had been established by the city council about 10 years ago but disbanded within a short time when it discovered it was duplicating the city council.

In other words, the zoning committee would investigate a variance request, for example, then give a recommendation to the city council.

But the council also would investigate the request and issue its own decision.

-- Heard Carter ask what criteria are used to issue business licenses in Texico.

Some communities have policies that if you do business in a town, you need a license. Texico doesn't have such a policy now.

The topic was put on the agenda for the next meeting.

needed on one end of the spectrum, but it was a little too late in coming for many of the crops.

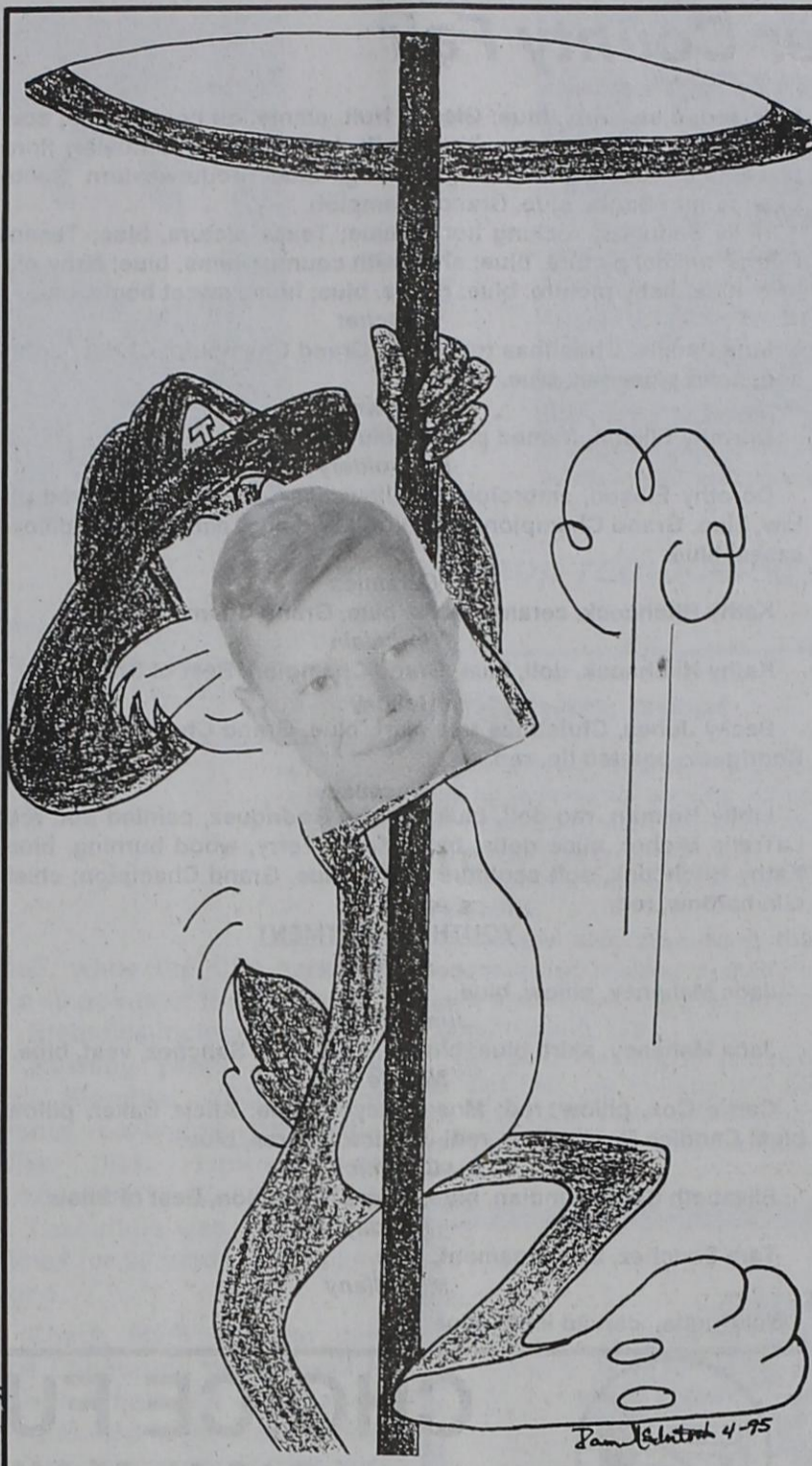
Cotton is one crop that needs moisture early on in the planting season, but thrives and produces better bolls when the conditions are hot and dry in the latter stages of growth.

J'Don Gallman, manager of the Farwell Gin commented that the weather conditions have impacted the quality of the cotton.

"The weather has stopped the plant for right now," he said. "The cotton isn't making any boll size."

The impact of the near-freezing temperatures on cotton fields, especially north of Lubbock, will be substantial, said Kater Hake, cotton agronomist with the Texas Ag Extension Service.

When the temperature dips below 45 degrees, the leaves on the cotton plant cease to provide the photosynthesis the bolls need to develop the fiber, he said.

### Recipe of Week

#### Breakfast on the Run

4 tablespoons apple butter  
2 tablespoons mustard  
3 wheat-berry English muffins, split and lightly toasted  
6 1/2 ounce slices low fat, cracked black pepper ham, chopped

2 tablespoons minced green onion tops  
3 ounces shredder low fat sharp cheddar cheese

In a small bowl, combine apple butter and mustard. Stir to mix well. Spread 1 tablespoon mixture on each muffin half.

In another small bowl, combine ham, onion and cheese. Stir or mix well. Place 1/6 of mixture on each muffin half. Broil until topping is bubbly.

NOTE: For a quick breakfast treat for the entire family, prepare apple butter mixture and ham mixture in advance, cover and refrigerate. When you're ready, toast the muffins and proceed as directed. Double or triple the recipe for a crowd-pleasing breakfast or brunch. Serves 6; 1/2 English muffin per serving.



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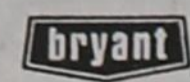

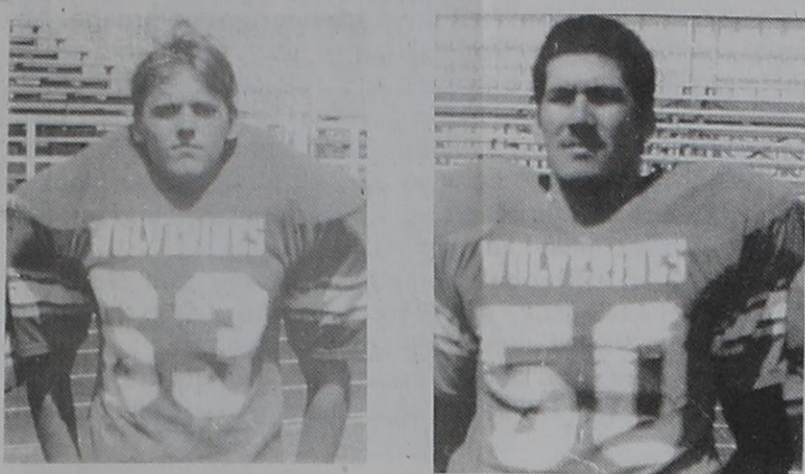

## Boll weevil eradication program kicks off

Kicking off the 1995 Enhanced Boll Weevil Diapause Program September 26, Lubbock-based Plains Cotton Growers (PCG) is putting the final pieces in place to begin what should be the beginning of the end for the boll weevil on the Texas High Plains.

Pilots and aircraft are reporting to their operational bases in Lamesa, Floydada, Seminole, Big Spring and Post for final installation of monitoring and guidance equipment to be used on the Program.

All of the 31 aircraft being used on the Program will be equipped with the Satloc Global Positioning System (GPS) hardware and software.

Preparations for the Program began early in the summer when cotton fields in 22 High Plains counties were located and plotted on maps to be used during the Program's treatment phase that begins on September 26. In all over 15,000 fields totaling approximately 2.4 million acres were mapped.

Early season trapping helped the program get a feel for what type of boll weevil pressure could be expected by the time treatment operations began. At this time an extensive gridwork of traps are in place, or are being put out as rapidly as possible after some weather delays.

Initial trap catches and manual surveys indicate that 1.5 to 1.6 million acres of cotton could be treated in the first application. This total would exceed the largest spray program ever completed in the 32 year history of the PCG Control Program. The 1965 program treated 1.5 million acres. Up to 5 million aggregate acres could be treated this year.

"The significant increase in the size of this year's Program is the direct result of five mild winters in a row. The number of acres infested with boll weevil

have dramatically increased during the 1995 crop year," says Roger Haldenby PCG Program Coordinator. "However, the foresight of High Plains cotton producers who recognized this building threat and overwhelmingly approved the formation of the High Plains Boll Weevil Eradication Zone will allow us to fight back against the pest."

Haldenby adds that the 1995 Program's "Control Zone" stretches some 225 miles from north to south and 130 miles from east to west. Carrying out such a large program takes the cooperation of many individuals and agencies.

While the PCG Diapause Control Program is not run by the federal government, USDA does help out in several important areas. The first is cost-sharing, mainly through the loan of government vehicles to be used on the Program. This year 49 vehicles are on loan from USDA and will be operating throughout the area.

The second is through the operation of the Environmental Monitoring Plan. This plan helps ensure that the High Plains Program is as environmentally friendly as possible. Soil, water and vegetation samples are taken throughout the control zone and sent to Gulfport, Mississippi for analysis at the National Research Analysis Laboratory.

"We look forward to taking this first step towards eliminating the boll weevil as an economically damaging pest to cotton on the High Plains," concludes Haldenby. "This is the first year of a three year plan to position the area for full-scale eradication. It will help us prevent the pitfalls and problems that have been encountered in other areas of the state. I firmly believe that the success of this program is vital to the future of cotton production on the High Plains."
