Texico support regional landfill plans

The Texico City Council Tuesday approved a joint powers agreement with other participants in the proposed regional landfill.

This has been the source of recent controversy because the cities of Clovis and Portales aren't happy with it.

Tharp said that it's the most inexpensive way for Texico to go.

In other business, the council:

- Hired Clarence Smith, of Texico, to join the city's street department. Texico has

been short-handed since the retirement last year of Billy Hammitt.

- Heard animal control officer Becky Stoico, of Clovis, report that 11 animals, mostly strays, have been picked up in March. And 27 residents had gotten animal tags. She also has issued 18 citations and the marshal's office has issued 2 citations.

- Agreed to seek an operator - manager for the city swimming pool. Applications are available at City Hall. The deadline is April 7 at 3 p.m.

An inmate at the Parmer County Jail pulled off a successful escape the night of March 18.

Praxedis Chavez, of Plainview, was in the jail awaiting transportation to the Texas Department of Corrections. He had been convicted of delivery of a controlled substance and had been sen-

tenced to 10 years.

Chavez got his chance to escape due to construction workers putting a new pitched roof on the jail.

To do so, they had to move the air conditioning units, leaving a space. Although ducts were put in to eliminate that possibility, Chavez was able to squeeze between the ducts and the hole to escape.

The Texico FFA students thanked everyone for their support.



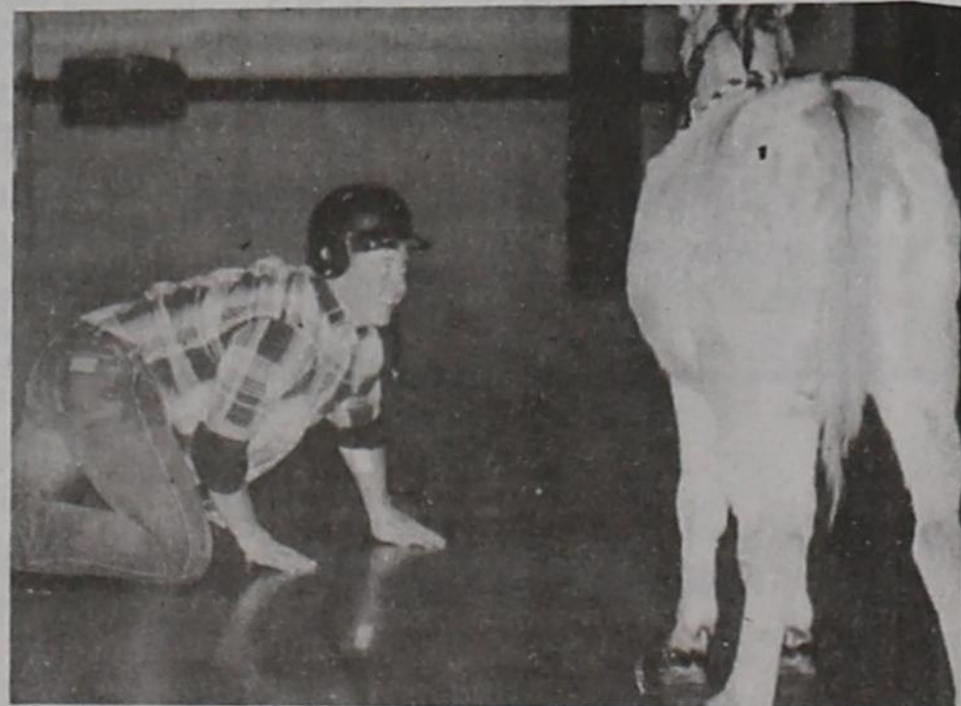

## Creation vs. evolution to be topic

The Church of Christ at 5th and Ave. C in Farwell will discuss creation vs. evolution fully on April 10, 11, 12 and 13 at 7:30 p.m.

The public is invited. There is no admission fee. Dennis Dillon, church minister, will be the speaker. Topics will be: April 10, "Concepts of God"; April 11, "The Compromise of Theistic Evolution"; April 12, "Evolution - Fact or Fiction"; and April 13, "Evolution's Effect on Society."

Question and answer periods will follow the Tuesday, Wednesday and Thursday lectures.

Dillon wrote the following:

"The geologic column, the fossil record, dinosaurs, radon daughters, carbon dating, suboptimality, punctuated equilibrium - do any or all of these have any effect on your life? Likely, you say, 'You've got to be kidding!'"

"In 1939, Adolph Hitler made his first major push into Poland. A historian would later write of the event: 'And the world sighed.' Had all men, everywhere, known at the time what would be the ultimate result of the Nazi leader's first push it is likely that more than a 'sigh' would have been

forthcoming from the world's populace. And so it is with 'organic evolution.'"

"Its tenets, yea, its tentacles, have taken hold of an unsuspecting society. In the last 40 years more effort to engrain within the human mind the 'theory of evolution' has been pushed than with any other philosophy of life. In some cases it has been promoted unabashedly unapologetically; and in others, subtly. It is taught 'matter-of-factly' through the mass media, public television, and in private and public schools.

"Geology itself is a relatively young science; it has been around for only 200 years. Yet from its inception, this science of rocks, minerals, and fossils has had a profound effect upon Biblical interpretation. Pioneers such as James Hutton and Charles Lyell rejected the Biblical record of Earth history. In their eyes, nature worked, and had always worked, at the same dawdling pace (uniformitarianism) in laying down and carving valleys. Their past had no place for a recent Creation (Gen. 1) and a worldwide Flood (Gen. 6). Within a century, the Earth had aged beyond human comprehension.

"In this maelstrom of change, scientists and theologians alike felt compelled to find these long eons of time in Holy Scripture. They attempted to show their increasingly skeptical colleagues that the Bible really did go back millions of years. But not everyone was fooled. Many saw this for what it was: compromise.

"Organic evolution is a theory. When finely defined and believed, it must be atheistic, or at least bring forth horrendously inaccurate concepts of Almighty God! At a point, you and your children must accept the Biblical account or organic evolutionary dogma. There is no fence to straddle. The two concepts are not even distant 42nd cousins!

"And when the latter concept is accepted, one must admit that he is precisely that which the advocates say he is: an animal. Folks who are 'told' day after day, either explicitly or through 'subliminal messages' will often acquiesce to the evolutionary doctrine. Are we seeing the fruits of these

animalistic tendencies? Is the earth relatively 'young' or is it billions of years old? Are we just the end result of our ape-like forefathers or are we, in fact, the crown of God's creation? Is there hope for us beyond the grave or, when dead, are we like the little dog Rover, dead all over?"

#### Kindergarten and pre-kindergarten Head Start registration

Thursday, April 13, is the day to register children for next year's Farwell kindergarten and pre-kindergarten / Head Start classes.

Registration will take place in the Farwell Elementary School library Thursday, April 13, from 1:00 to 4:00 p.m.

All children who will be four and five years of age by September 1st and live in the Farwell School District need to register for next year's classes.

To register, a child must have immunization records and a birth certificate. Only official copies of birth certificates are accepted and must have been obtained from state offices. Social Security numbers are also required.

Rebecca Smallwood, school nurse, will be available to review immunization records during registration.

#### Pre-K / Head Start requirements

To be eligible, a child must be 4 years old prior to September 1st, is unable to speak or comprehend the English language, or is from a family whose income, according to standards set by the State Board of Education, is at or below subsistence level (eligible for free or reduced-price lunches) and is a resident of the Farwell School District.

Head Start requires proof of participants meeting Federal Income Guidelines so income verification, such as check stubs, should also be available for review. Verification or other types of public assistance should also be available for review.

Head Start also extends its services to handicapped children.

Texas school districts are required to provide Pre-K if 15 or more students are identified.

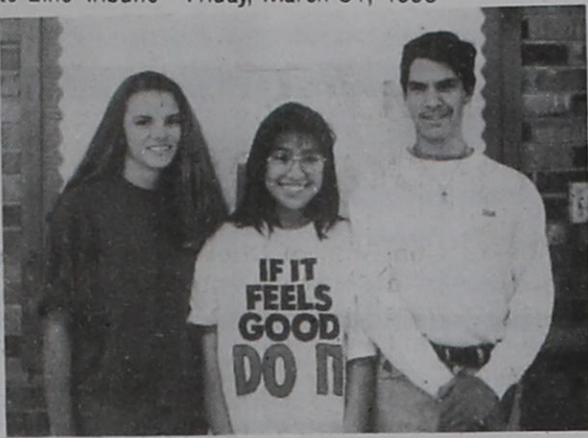

## Marshal's Report


Here is the weekly report from Texico Marshal Gil Holguin:  
 Four persons were injured in a two-vehicle accident near Town & Country on March 23 at 6:35 p.m.  
 Driver of one vehicle was Annette Gupton, 25. Passengers were Margaret Archulta, 25, and Kelly Bradley, 24, all of Texas. no town.  
 Th other driver was Elizabeth Galvan, 19, hereford. She was cited for careless driving and no insurance.  
 The Texico ambulance took all four persons to Clovis Hospital. None of the injuries were believed major, said a fireman.  
 Ms. Gupton said her vehicle was stopped at the railroad crossing and was struck by the Galvan vehicle.  
 The marshal's office also is investigating a hit and run on State Line Road on March 27 at 5:15 p.m. Police are looking for a white semi trailer with cattle trailer.  
 On March 24, an assault and battery complaint was investigated and found unfounded.  
 The marshal's office towed two cars to Clovis under the new trash and debris ordinance. They are continuing to tag vehicles which don't comply with the city ordinance. Owners of such vehicles will be cited and given 5 days to correct the violations or the vehicles will be towed away.  
 April has been designated Seat Belt Month and this will be strictly enforced.

## The Chief's Corner

Here is the weekly report from Farwell Police Chief Roy McGaa:  
 On March 22, he assisted Texico Police in an investigation on 1st Street.  
 On March 23, he responded to an alarm at the Allsup's convenience store. It proved to be a false alarm.  
 He has received another forgery case and has added this to the ongoing investigation that he is conducting.  
 On March 24, he was called about a suspicious vehicle parked behind the grain elevators and on March 25, he was called about another suspicious vehicle parked behind Lovelace Oil.  
 He also received a complaint of vandalism at 6th and Ave. B.  
 Nash Armstrong, 19, Levelland, was cited last week for leaving the scene of an accident in mid-March.

McGaa also reported that three scams are currently being used in the West Texas area:  
 1 - Persons representing "Signal Corp." of Dallas are taking orders for advertising signs. Primary targets are small businesses. Suspects use an official form to take orders but the address is bogus and there is no such phone listing. Victims put down a cash deposit and never see their money again. If contacted, please call Farwell police.  
 2 - Persons are seeking up to \$3,000 for heat detectors and \$500 for wind-up ionization detectors. This is perfectly legal. However, identical units can be purchased in Clovis for \$15 to \$50.  
 3 - Persons impersonating Internal Revenue Service. Primary targets are the elderly, who are told they owe back taxes now. The suspects show no identification, give no phone number and only meet the victims in person.
