Do you remember the 'Farwell Banner'?

When Robert White was doing some fall cleaning at his Tri County Tire store in Farwell, he found a "chattel mortgage" deed from 1909 that involved one of the State Line Tribune's predecessors, the Farwell Banner.

The Banner was one of five papers that eventually became the Tribune. The others were the Texico Democrat, Texico-Farwell News, Texico Times and Texico Trumpet.

The mortgage was filed from R.B. and B.F. Edgell to the First National Bank of Farwell on May 22, 1909 in the Parmer County clerk's office.

The property involved included "all of our printing outfit, including presses, type and all implements and machinery used in our printing business for the publication of the 'Farwell Banner' and for other work in the printing line."

The mortgage said the the Edgells "90 days after this date, we promise to pay to the other of the First National Bank of Farwell, at its banking house in Farwell, Texas, \$313.50 with 10 percent interest from maturity until paid, and 10 percent additional if placed in the hands of an attorney for collection, or collected by process of law."

The property involved was known as the "Hamlin Black (sic) of Bricks" in Farwell.

A guest column today, from J.R. Jacobs, of ENMR Telephone Cooperative, is most appropriate during National Cooperative Month. The source is "A Day in the Life of Cooperative America," the National Cooperative Business Association.

Every day in America, the lives of as many as 100 million folks are affected by cooperatives.

When most folks hear the word "cooperative," they think of a 1960's era natural food store, or perhaps a high-priced apartment in New York City. The fact is, cooperatives are flexible and endlessly adaptable, and in the 1990s they provide almost every imaginable product and service a person should ever need, from the cradle to the grave.

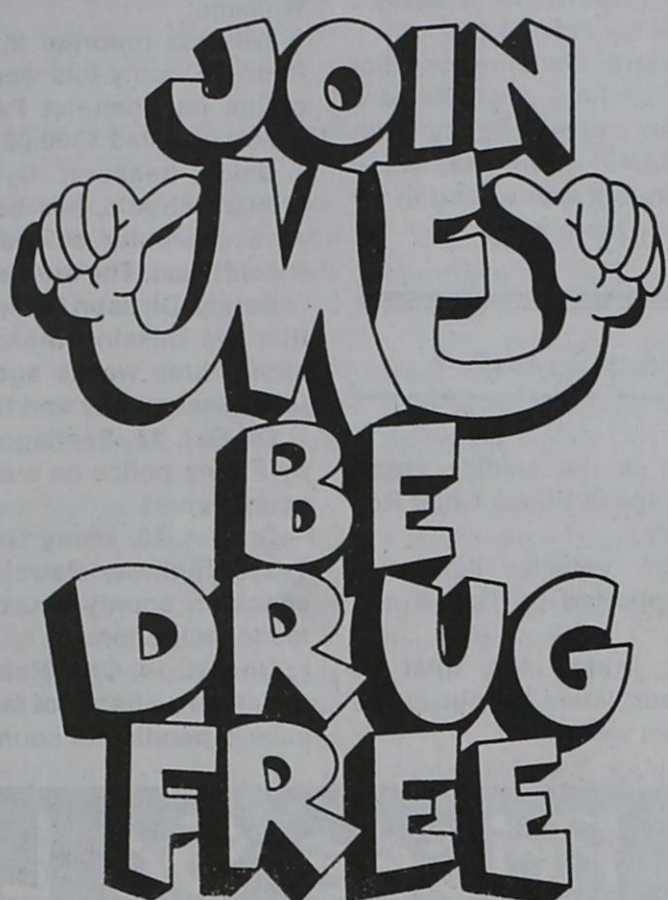
The first cooperative in the U.S. was established by Benjamin Franklin in 1752. It's called the Philadelphia Contributorship for insurance of houses from loss of fire -- and it still exists today.

The modern cooperative form was defined in 1844 by the Rochdale Equitable Pioneers Society, a group of 28 workers in Northern England who created a food cooperative. Their tiny store was stocked with flour, sugar, butter and oatmeal that the cooperative's members bought in quantity and sold to each other at low prices. Their idea was eventually borrowed by 700 million people in more than 100 countries.

The workers: weavers, shoemakers, cabinetmakers, tailors, printers, hatters and engineers called themselves the Rochdale Equitable Society, taking their name from the town they lived in, Rochdale, about 12 miles north of Manchester.

They believed they could save money if they pooled

Red Ribbon Week activities scheduled

Texico

Red Ribbon Week events will be held Oct. 21-25 at Texico Schools.

On Monday, there will be an all-school assembly at 9:30 a.m. at the educational complex. Speakers include Texico police officer Larry Garrison and school nurse Chantel Ward. Also, Student Council members will hand out red ribbons.

On Tuesday, a speaker from Mothers Against Drunk Drivers will speak at 9:30 a.m. at the educational complex to junior and senior high school students.

On Wednesday, a "Danger Zone" program is scheduled at 9 a.m. with nurses Chantel Ward and Scott Tatum and the Texico marshal's office. And at 1 p.m., there will be an all-school balloon launch at the football field.

A demonstration by the Clovis police K-9 corps will be given on Thursday, and on Friday winners of the poster, sack, video and radio contests will be announced.

Lazbuddie

Red Ribbon Week activities will be held Oct. 21-25 at Lazbuddie Schools.

The school day kicks off Oct. 21 with students from FHA, FFA and the National Honor Society talking with elementary school pupils about helping make the community drug-free and giving anti-drug messages. Speakers will rotate to a different classroom every morning during the week.

FFA members will tie big red ribbons on the school buses.

FHA members will help make a paper chain to go in the cafeteria as a pledge to remain drug free. The theme will be "we are all connected -- don't let death from alcohol or drugs break this Chain of Life."

High school Student Council members will present each pupil in grades 1, 2 and 3 who complete drug-free activity books with drug-free certificates.

The National Honor Society will sponsor a poster contest for pupils in grades 4, 5 and 6. Points of focus will be: 4th grade -- "I don't use drugs because I care about my health"; 5th -- "My friends and I don't need drugs to have fun"; 6th -- "I never use drugs because I want to reach my dreams."

Teachers and students will present a drug-free skit at Friday's pep rally. Friday will be "Make 'Em See Red Day" with everyone wearing red.

There will be a DARE drug education program booth at the Harvest Festival. Officer Smith will have handouts parents can pick up. Smith also will present a lesson to elementary pupils during the week, and later a lesson to high school students.

High school students will be at the Silverton football stadium to tie red ribbons on Lazbuddie vehicles.

The Education Service Center has paid for the Straightway Group to perform once for each school in the Drug-Free Schools' Co-op. They provide a song and dance-based program focusing on the message of staying drug-free.

Junior high students will tie red ribbons on all vehicles in the school parking lot one day during Red Ribbon Week.

The advanced child development class will make hand puppets with pre-k and kindergarten pupils. It will relate to only taking medicine when supervised by an adult.

Farwell Schools will conduct Red Ribbon Week activities Oct. 28 through 31.

On Oct. 28, there will be Decoration Day and poster contest. Grocery sacks will be decorated and judged on Oct. 30, then taken to Capitol Food and re-used. Ribbons will be given out with numbers on them. There will be a drawing each day for prizes.

On Oct. 29, a Fun Run is scheduled.

On Oct. 30, it's "Wear Red Day."

On Oct. 31, it's "Reach Out Day" and the junior and senior high school students will give out ribbons to the community.

their resources, so they opened the food cooperative at 31 Toad Lane. Originally, they planned to sell only four items, but when the local gas company refused to light their store they purchased candles in bulk and sold them, too.

Eventually the cooperative began to operate a library and a drapery and a shoe repair service. By the end of its first year of business, it had 74 members.

Cooperative societies had existed previously, but the Rochdale Pioneers were doing something different that touched a nerve. They established the principals that have governed the operation of cooperatives ever since, among them:

-- Heard water supt. Dee Hammit report that Shirley Mitchell, whose property adjoins where the new water well was drilled just south of the post office, complained that part of the concrete in her driveway was broken off by trucks putting in the well. She wants the city to pay for the repairs, Hammit said.

Hammit will talk with the builder.

-- Was told that a "no alcohol" in public places in town ordinance was passed in 1978.

At a previous council meeting, Police Chief Roy McGaa said such an ordinance was needed. City clerk Cynthia Thigpen recently found it already on the books.

-- Heard McGaa report on drug activity problems and

"game playing" (see "Chief's Corner" elsewhere in today's Tribune for details).

-- Heard Mace report that Farwell School Supt. Richard Boothby wasn't happy with the DARE drug education program but was willing to try it for one more year.

Police Report

Here is the weekly report from Farwell Police Chief Roy McGaa:

Motor vehicle burglaries were reported on Oct. 8 and 12.

This brings the total of such burglaries to four in the past two weeks.

Sheriff's Report

Here is the weekly report from Parmer County Sheriff Rex Williams:

Williams reported that the FBI said it will send agents to Parmer County this week to interview persons about an audit of the now-defunct Parmer County Teachers Credit Union which revealed \$300,000 to \$350,000 missing.

Union treasurer Cynthia Smith, a longtime teacher at Friona Schools, has been suspended with pay from her job as a computer science teacher at Friona High, Supt. Hal Ratcliff said. The suspension is indefinite.

Randy Dickson, union president, told the Amarillo paper that the missing money caused the organization to close about three weeks ago. He said no members of the credit union lost money and the bonding company took care of it.

On Oct. 13, Santiago Ceballos, 60, Hereford, was arrested by Friona police on a charge of DWI. The case is pending in county court.

On Oct. 13, Henry Graves Jr., 40, Bovina, was arrested by Texas Highway Patrol on a charge of theft by worthless check. In county court, he was fined, paid court costs and made restitution.

On Oct. 14, Cruz Ruiz, 20, Farwell, was arrested by Farwell police on a charge of failure to give notice of an accident. The case is pending in county court.

1) Open membership. It's open to anyone who's willing to accept the responsibilities of membership.

2) Democratic control. Unlike traditional businesses, where owners receive a vote for every share they own, cooperatives operate on a one member, one vote basis. Every member has an equal say in the organization and management of the business.

3) Not for profit service. Any profits that cooperatives earn are either re-invested in the business or returned to their members.

4) An educational mandate. Today, the original store rented by Rochdale Pioneers houses a museum that preserves the history of the cooperative movement.

And today, there are 47,000 cooperatives in the United States, generating more than \$100 billion in annual economic activity. All told, as many as 100 million Americans, 40 percent of the population, are directly served by some type of cooperative endeavor.

Not much remains in our world from the mid 19th century England, but today, 150 years later, the Rochdale Pioneers' legacy has endured.

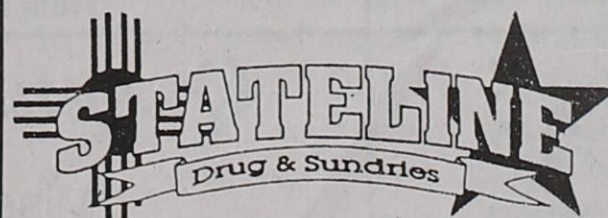

The Wolverines got its 1st first down of the game at 3:14. Rubio and Adrian Gonzales had strong tackles. On 3rd and 3, Springlake-Earth was stopped on a combined tackle by Michael Treadway and Williams. Farwell started at its 26, but lost a fumble on a pitch play.

The Wolverines' Williams threw a 20-yard TD pass at :46 of the first quarter for a 6-0 lead. The pass for extra points was intercepted by Preston Ketcherside.

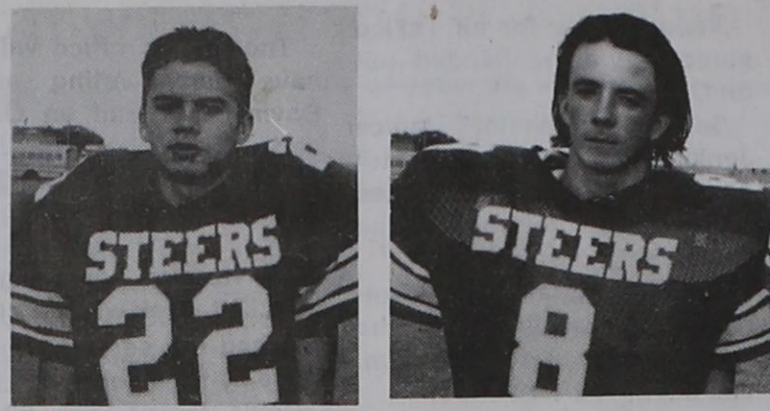

A 4th and 11 pass by the Wolverines failed, defended by Dion London. Farwell was held but Williams boomed a 51-yard punt out of his end zone. On defense, Gonzales and Treadway had a good tackle.

The 4th quarter opened with the Wolverines' Williams hitting a 54-yard pass to make it 20-0. The extra point kick was blocked and Treadway picked it up and returned it 68 yards but was stopped short of the goal line. If he had scored, Farwell would have gotten the point.

Farwell was held. Mark Lunsford had a good tackle of the punt returner at the Farwell 38. The Wolverines scored on a 5-yard run by Williams. After recovering a Farwell fumble, Williams scored again from the 4 only 90 seconds later.

-- Farwell, net payment this period, \$3,820.58, up from the same period last year of \$3,134.18 -- an increase of 21.90 percent. For the year, it's up 10.03 percent.

-- Friona, net payment this period, \$13,995.49, up from the same period last year of \$10,329.98 -- an increase of 35.48 percent. For the year, it's up 71.86 percent.

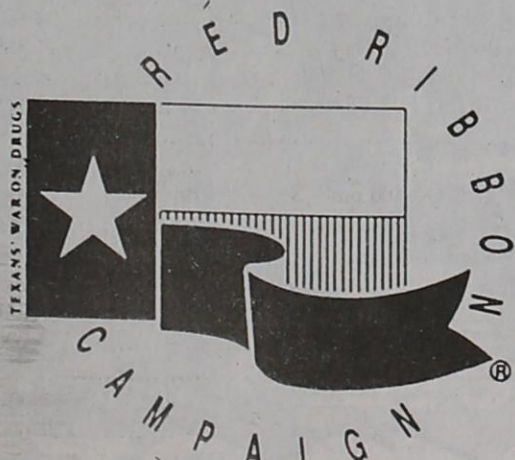

One of the Twin Cities' great landmarks is Rip's Western Wear in Texico, which celebrated its 50th anniversary in 1993.

Rip's opened in May 1943 as a shoe repair shop by Roy's parents, Rip and Thelma Snodgrass. During World War II, folks couldn't get shoes easily so the Snodgrasses made sandals for folks throughout the High Plains. For a lot of kids, all they had to wear on their feet were sandals.

The Snodgrasses quickly branched out into clothes. At the time, the store was called the Electric Shoe Stop. When Roy left the U.S. Navy in 1958, he changed the name of the store to that of his father.

Rip's has been located at the same site, 314 Wheeler Ave., throughout its history. The building was built in 1910 and had housed several businesses, including a bank, drug store and post office.

Starting in 1987, Rip's added a large selection of ladies' sports and casual wear, to go along with the traditional western wear for men.

With a clientele that has remained steady and loyal customers, Rip's has stayed a strong Texico-Farwell business. Roy has no plans for expansion, "but I'll try to keep it a quaint store -- a large retail outlet with a small-town feel. I don't want to make it a big, fancy store. I'm going to try to keep it in the family."

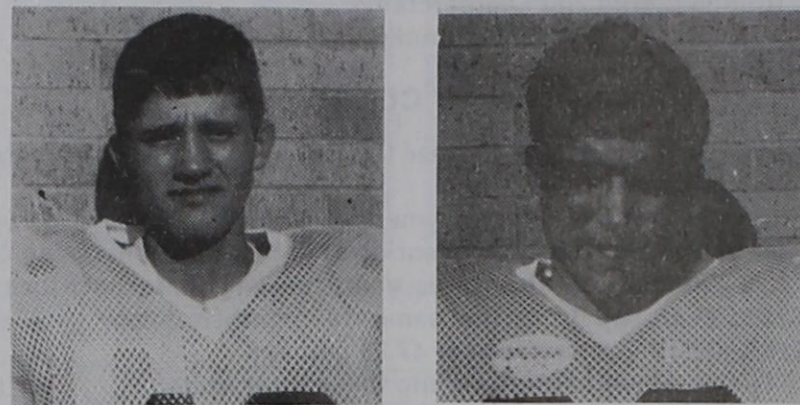

FRESH BERRY PANCAKES

- 1 cup all-purpose flour
- 1/2 cup Kretschmer wheat germ
- 1 tablespoon sugar
- 1 tablespoon baking powder
- 1/2 teaspoon salt (optional)
- 1-1/2 cups skim milk
- 1 egg, lightly beaten
- 1-1/2 tablespoons vegetable oil
- 2 cups fresh berries
- 1/2 cup light pancake syrup

Combine flour, wheat germ, sugar, baking powder and salt in large bowl; mix well. Add combined milk, egg and oil; mix just until dry ingredients are moistened. (Do not overmix.) Heat nonstick skillet or griddle over medium heat or electric griddle to 375°F. Skillet is ready when drops of water sizzle, then evaporate. For each pancake, pour about 1/4 cup batter onto skillet. Turn when bubbles appear on top and edges appear cooked. Meanwhile, combine berries and syrup in small saucepan; bring to a boil. Remove from heat; spoon over pancakes. **12 Pancakes**

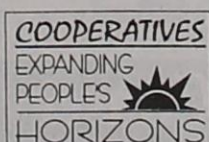
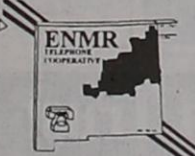

Moore pleads guilty

A survivor of a 1995 vehicle accident that killed two people has filed a wrongful death suit against Curry County and the county commissioners.

The driver of the other vehicle, Phillip Moore, pleaded guilty earlier this month under a plea agreement that calls for a maximum sentence of 9 years in prison.

Moore is undergoing diagnosis treatment by the state. A sentencing hearing will be held either at the end of October or in November.

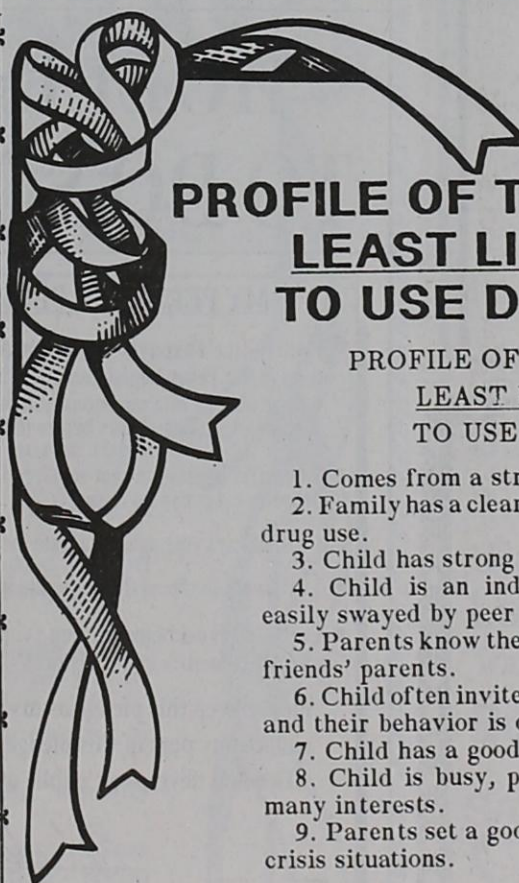

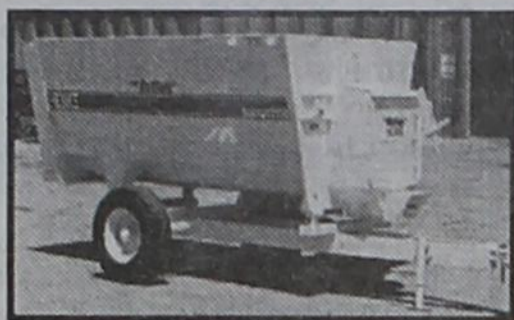

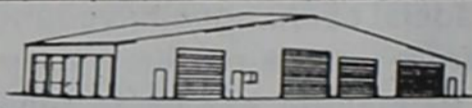
