She increased her lead over Aimee Herrera, who is in second place, by a point. Aimee is now tied with Greg Taylor, Sheryl's husband.

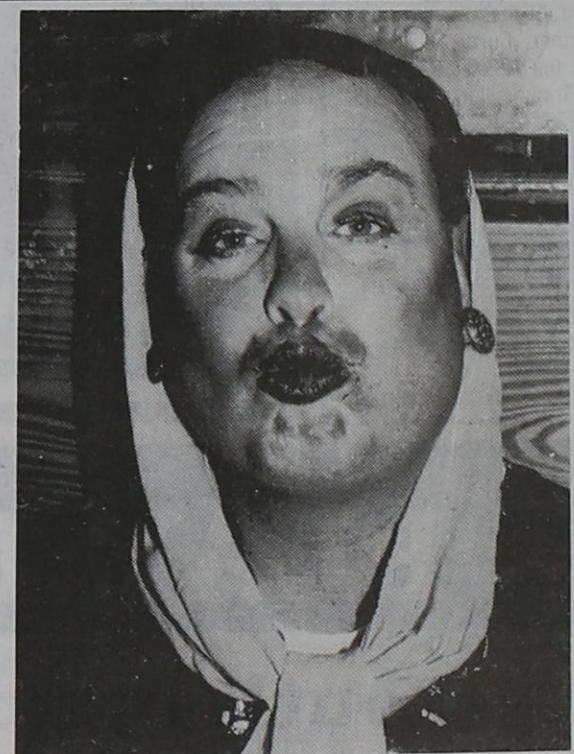

Texico signs agreement with High Plains group

The Texico City Council voted 3-1 on Tuesday to approve an ordinance aligning them with the High Plains Waste Management Association.

In favor were councilmen Ronnie Warmuth, Oran Jay Autrey and Eddie Dunsworth. Opposed was Rick Queener, who felt using the Clovis landfill was cheaper. Although he didn't vote, Mayor Butch Tharp favored High Plains, also.

Texico has been part of the High Plains group for several years. It consists of 18 small governmental entities which plan to use a landfill near San Jon. What the ordinance does is pledge Texico's environmental gross receipts tax, about \$3,000 a year, toward the project. Texico has been spending about \$1,900 a year toward High Plains since its initial membership. That cost will stop.

The High Plains landfill won't be ready until late next year. When it does open, Texico will need to decide whether to send its trash there, or continue using the Clovis landfill. A third option is to use the Hobbs landfill operated by Waste Management, which currently picks up Texico's trash.

Farwell Schools okay drug-testing program

The Farwell School Board Tuesday unanimously approved a mandatory drug-testing program for students participating in extra-curricular activities, such as sports, band, school clubs, UIL activities, etc.

Sometime during the current school year, all students in high school who qualify will be tested. In future years, students will be tested at random.

The test involves a urine sample taken at school and sent to a lab out of state. Results are back within 48 hours.

If a student refuses to give a urine sample, it will be treated as a resignation from all extra-curricular activities.

Students in 7th and 8th grades will be randomly tested.

Parents of students who are not in extra-curricular activities may put their children into the drug-testing program, also.

In the resolution approving the drug testing program, it was noted that a 1995 survey showed that 26 percent of Farwell secondary students reported they had used illicit drugs in their lifetime and 14 percent reported using marijuana in the months prior to the survey. Also, 7 percent of the students said they had attended school during the prior year while under the influence of marijuana.

A special assembly was held the morning of Nov. 14 to inform students of the new policy. Each student was given a consent form to take home. It must be signed by the parent and student and returned to the school by 3 p.m. Nov. 22. If the form is not returned, the students are ineligible for extra-curricular activities.

Sanctions for offenses involve having the student enter a drug assistance program and suspension from extra-curricular activities. The length of the assistance program and suspension from activities is determined by the number of offenses.

The drug testing program was formulated by school personnel with advice from the community. An attorney checked on the legality.

In other business, the board: -- Approved a grant request by Farwell Junior High, which is seeking \$117,658 from the state for a telecommunications infrastructure to let students use the Internet. This involves equipment, leases and telephone lines. The presentation was made by Kay Stanton, Kay Ray, Dawn Hill, Candy Dyer and Hayley Christian.

Lazbuddie senior trip approved for Los Angeles

In other business, the board:

The main discussion before the vote dealt with costs. The cost to Texico's residents will increase regardless of which option is taken. High Plains manager Chet Wyant said long-range costs put High Plains in the same ballpark as Clovis.

Texico's contract with Waste Management allows the contractor to pick the landfill. But Clyde Blakeley, of Waste Management, said his firm will go along with what Texico desires.

In other business, the council:
-- Heard city attorney Marion Ty Rutter report that he plans meetings with the owners of the two buildings directly east of city hall and the Kelly Green Seed property about problem structures.

-- Was told that the Santa Fe Railroad says that the storage tank and other equipment between Texico and Farwell on railroad property is actually owned jointly by Texico and Farwell, and the railroad wants them removed. The cost of removal is projected over \$10,000. Rutter will look into it. The topic is expected to come up at Farwell's city council meeting next week.

-- Asked Tharp to appoint a committee to put together rules for groups using the new community center, which may open with the next two months.

-- Called for an executive session to discuss property acquisition, litigation and personnel matters.

-- Will ask EPCOG officials to attend the next council meeting to discuss the declining water table. Tharp said the city's water supply was crucially low at irrigation time this year.

-- Heard Queener report that his zoning committee met last week. It meets the 1st and 3rd Tuesdays. If anyone would like to join, call Queener.

-- Heard that Tharp and Warmuth attended a state meeting in Albuquerque. They were told, as they have been in the past, that if Texico wants state help on projects dealing with water, the city needs to raise its water rates first -- they are considered too low.

-- Heart Tharp and Warmuth say that the way to get state grants is for a community to have a lobbyist, usually a part-time or fulltime city manager. The topic was put on the next council meeting agenda.

Sugar yields forecast

Kenneth Frye, president of the Texas Sugar Beet Growers Association, spoke at a combined TSBGA-Holly Sugar press conference in Hereford Nov. 7.

This year, about 15,000 regional sugar beet acres will be harvested by about 350 growers from Dalhart to Plainview to Clovis. Yields are expected to end up averaging 20-21 tons per acre. Sugar content is expected to settle in the 14 percent range, a little below than was expected during mid-summer.

However, higher sugar prices created by short supplies across the nation are foreseen. Fryer said "with a net selling price of \$27 per hundredweight -- about the highest price we've ever seen here -- many growers will gross from \$700 to \$800 per acre. Some, with higher yields and sugar content, will approach \$1,400 or more per acre in gross income."

Holly Sugar will pay regional growers from \$15 million to \$20 million for this year's crop.

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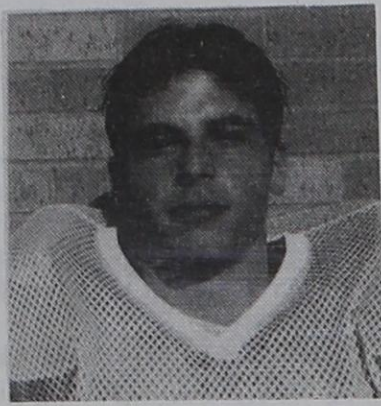

Longhorns clinch state playoff berth

The Lazbuddie Longhorns rolled to an easy win in their final regular season game over Amherst to clinch a berth in the state playoffs. The Longhorns won 68-26.

Lazbuddie finished the regular season at 9-1 and 4-1 in district, where they were runnerup to Whitharral. The Longhorns open state playoff action tonight (Friday) at 7:30 at New Home. Rochester is 8-2 on the year.

Amherst scored first, on a 38-yard pass to take a 6-0 lead. After that, it was almost all Lazbuddie. The Longhorns took a 14-6 lead at the end of the first quarter on scores by Chris Smith (on a 19-yard pass from Josh Morris) and Jason Thomas (on an 11-yard pass from Morris).

The Longhorns made it 4 TDs in a row when Brice Foster scored on a 3-yard run and Edward Terry plunged over from the 1. Two extra point kicks by Thomas aided during this spree. Amherst then scored again, on a 25-yard pass. Then Smith tallied on a 25-yard pass from Morris as the Longhorns went into halftime comfortably ahead 36-14.

After Amherst scored shortly into the 3rd quarter, the Longhorns went on a tear again. After racking up a safety, the next three scores were: Foster on a 37-yard pass from Morris, Smith on a 30-yard pass from Morris, and Foster on a 9-yard run. Thomas provided extra points on two successful kicks. And Lazbuddie's last score came on another 1-yard plunge by Terry, followed by a kick by Cameron Turner for the two extra points.

Morris completed 14 of 16 passes for 232 yards and 4 touchdowns. Foster ran for 96 yards on 14 carries and a TD. Chris Smith grabbed 9 passes for 148 yards and 3 touchdowns.

Coach Mark Scisson was obviously delighted with the easy win. He noted that the team has met its goal for the year -- make the playoffs.

Justin St. Clair didn't play against Amherst due to illness. He's expected to be ready against Rochester. Also, brother Adam St. Clair just played in the first half due to back problems.

As for Rochester, Scisson said he hadn't seen any film on the team but scouting reports say they are big, block well and like to run the ball.

Team stats were: first downs, Lazbuddie 21, Amherst 7; rushing yards - Lazbuddie 39 for 294, Amherst 25 for 93; passing yards - Lazbuddie 14 of 16 for 232; Amherst 7 of 20 for 107; punting average, Lazbuddie no punts, Amherst 4 for 27 yard average; penalties, Lazbuddie 1 for 17 yards, Amherst 1 for 5.

The Red Ribbon Week message is important

The last two weeks of October were spent by area school children observing Red Ribbon Week.

As I wore my Red Ribbon around town, I was, quite frankly, surprised at the number of times I was asked what the ribbon was for.

The war against drugs, tobacco and alcohol abuse has been one of the most widely publicized and scrutinized efforts to protect and educate our children.

Sadly, drug use among teenagers has skyrocketed. It sickens me to see how popular it is to look like, act like and use like a "druggie." The Red Ribbon campaign is just one of many efforts in our schools to emphasize the benefits of being drug, alcohol and tobacco free. Yet somehow the message is still not getting out to the teenagers and many adults.

I got to see firsthand during the last two weeks, that the message is out and the impact that the message is having on our elementary and junior high school children.

I was honored to have been asked to be a judge for the Red Ribbon poster contest at Farwell Elementary School. I also talked to several of the students in the Texico schools about their poster projects.

The young kids know that drug use is wrong and that lives are permanently damaged or extinguished by using drugs, alcohol and, yes, even tobacco products like snuff, cigarettes and cigars.

I specifically state that it is the "younger kids" who know these facts. They seem to be committed to the statement: "I choose to be drug free." Sadly, many of the "older kids" have not remembered or even been made aware of this message that is being put before our children at every point and turn.

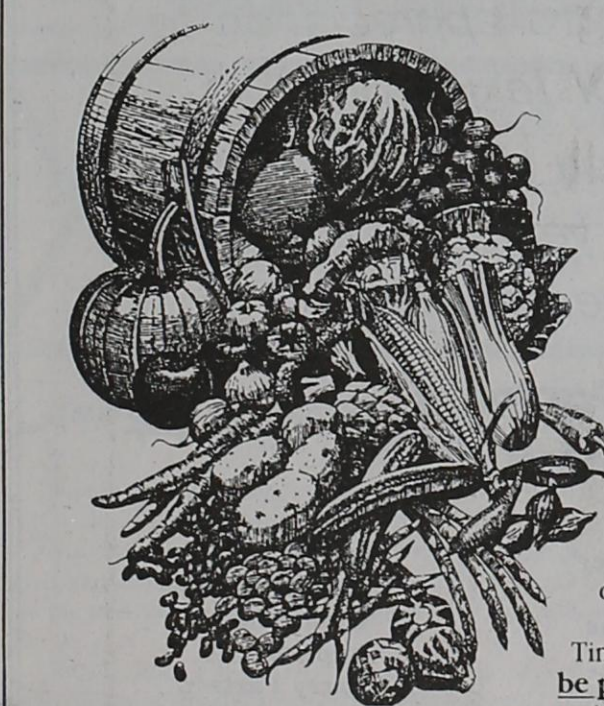

Recipe of Week

VERY BERRY PIE

- 1 1/2 cups blueberries
- 1 1/2 cups raspberries
- 1 cup blackberries
- 1 cup sugar
- 3 tablespoons MINUTE tapioca
- Pastry for 2-crust 9-inch pie
- 1 tablespoon margarine or butter

Heat oven to 400°F. Mix blueberries, raspberries, blackberries, sugar and tapioca in large bowl. Let stand 15 minutes.

Roll 1/2 of the pastry to 11-inch* circle on lightly floured surface. Line 9-inch* pie plate with pastry, allowing 1/2-inch overhang. Fill with berry mixture. Dot with margarine. Roll remaining pastry to 12-inch circle. Cover pie with pastry; seal and flute edge. Cut several slits to permit steam to escape.

Bake 1 hour or until juices form bubbles that burst slowly. Cool.

*Roll pastry 2 inches larger than pie plate.

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'Texas Tomorrow Fund' explained

Parents with children in college or preparing to enter college all know how expensive it is today to pay for a college education. Unfortunately, it is looking like the rising costs of tuition and fees will only worsen in the years to come. Based on these recent trends, the cost of tuition and fees will quadruple by the time a baby born today graduates from high school.

But, thanks to a program developed by Texas State Comptroller John Sharp, parents now have a way to affordably budget for and pay for their child's college education.

The "Texas Tomorrow Fund" has been established and

enables Texas families the ability to lock in today's tuition prices for their children.

The fund covers the tuition and required fees at any state-supported college and university in Texas and it pays a large part of the same at private colleges or even out-of-state schools.

The way it works is that a parent, grandparent or any person interested in a child's future may set up a payment schedule or pay a lump sum to the Texas Tomorrow Fund based on the type of college plan chosen and the year the child is expected to graduate.

Community colleges, Junior Colleges (2 year) and Senior colleges (4 year) are eligible. There are also plans available for students who start their education in a Jr. College and then complete their degree in a Senior College.

The fund is flexible and allows for changes in plans, monetary amounts paid and for refunds when needed.

"This just makes plain good sense for families with young children today," said Weldon Killough, counselor at the Farwell Schools. "I urge parents with children in Elementary and Jr. High to come and talk to me about this plan."

Killough has a booklet available that thoroughly explains the Texas Tomorrow Fund. He can be contacted at Farwell High School or by calling 481-3351 weekdays.

The Chief's Corner

From Farwell Police Chief Roy McGaa:

This article is prompted by a recently overheard statement, "the kids don't think smoking marijuana is a big deal."

Rules are established by a society so that a group of people can live together in relative peace and harmony. Each person in that society has a will of their own and personal desires. When a person's will or desire is in conflict with society's rules, it's necessary for that person to exercise self-discipline and restraint.

Criminals are the element of society that lack restraint and self-discipline. They choose not to live by the rules and can justify anything in disregarding those rules. "What you have is mine, unless you are strong enough to keep it." "That is a stupid law and I will do what I want."

When a young person smokes marijuana he or she is knowingly violating a law, and they justify it. That is a program set into the mind of that person and it makes the next step easier, possibly cocaine because "I am different, I won't get hooked." Keeping up with the cost of illicit drugs is easy because you can steal from your parents or take someone else's property.

When the young person programs his or her mind to justify illegal behavior, there is an immediate short term result. Peers who have the self-discipline to resist marijuana will lose respect for those who don't. And because a human being needs friends, where do you go for friends when decent people won't associate with you? You gravitate toward the losers in society. They will welcome you with open arms. When you have reached the point where a loser supports a loser, you have reached the dregs of society and will likely stay there.

Think! You more than likely know "good kids" from Farwell who are on probation now, who face prison if they slip up once, and who also knew better than society. I think of the comments I have heard -- "He was a good athlete." "He was from a good family." "How could this happen?"

It happened because "he" thought he had all the answers, he didn't have any use for self-discipline and couldn't be bothered with society's rules.

Young people -- it's your choice. I would rather help you, support you, respect you, cheer for you and love you. But, I will also bust you in a New York minute if I catch you with drugs.

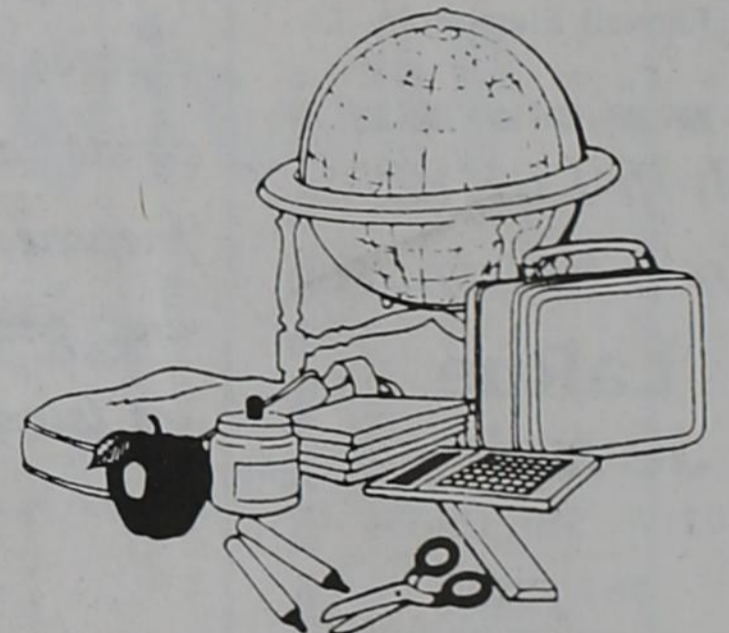

Swifts tip Steers

The Nazareth Swifts defeated the Farwell Steers, 34-24, in the season finale for both teams. Farwell ended the 1996 campaign with a winning 5-4-1 overall record and was 3-4 in the toughest district in the state of Texas. All four losses came to teams ranked at the state level.

Farwell got some bad luck early in the game when Jason Miller was injured on the third play of the game and missed the rest of it.

Nazareth started at its 30. Scott Meeks had a tackle for a 3-yard loss. Darren Rubio, Steve Miller and Mark Lunsford combined on a good tackle forcing Nazareth to punt to the Farwell 20. Preston Ketcherside ran for 13 yards. Nazareth intercepted and returned it to the Steer 35. Steve Miller had a strong tackle. Nazareth was forced to punt.

On offense, Brock Anderson ran for 12. On 4th and 11, Farwell coach Stan Stroebel called for a fake punt, with Anderson passing to Preston Ketcherside for 15 yards and a first down.

Anderson hit Preston Ketcherside with another 15-yard pass as the first quarter ended. Farwell was held. Daren Rubio had a tackle behind the line of scrimmage. Preston Ketcherside had a good tackle. Farwell tried a field goal on 4th and 14 but it failed. But the Swifts recovered a Steer fumble at the Farwell 19. Three plays later, Nazareth scored from the 1 to take a 6-0 lead at 5:04 of the second quarter.

Farwell was held and Russell Williams boomed a punt to the Swifts 36. Nazareth was held and the teams traded punts with Nazareth ending up on its own 3. But a 97-yard TD run made the score 12-0 with 45 seconds left in the first half.

Nazareth tried an onside kick, recovered by Farwell's Adrian Gonzales at the Steer 40. Anderson hit Gonzales with a 15-yard pass. Then Anderson combined with Williams on a 40-yard pass play to the 1. Anderson plunged over for the TD with 9 seconds left in the half. A pass from Anderson to Williams was good for the extra points and it was 12-8.

Farwell opened the third quarter on a 85-yard TD kickoff return by Preston Ketcherside with good blocks by Steve Miller, Rubio, Gonzales and Spencer Ketcherside. The Meeks' kick put Farwell up 15-12 at 11:45.

On defense, Williams, Meeks and Anderson had tackles so Nazareth punted to the Farwell 35. On 3rd and 25, Anderson threw a 65-yard pass to Preston Ketcherside for a TD at 7:17. The Meeks' kick made it 22-12 in Farwell's favor.

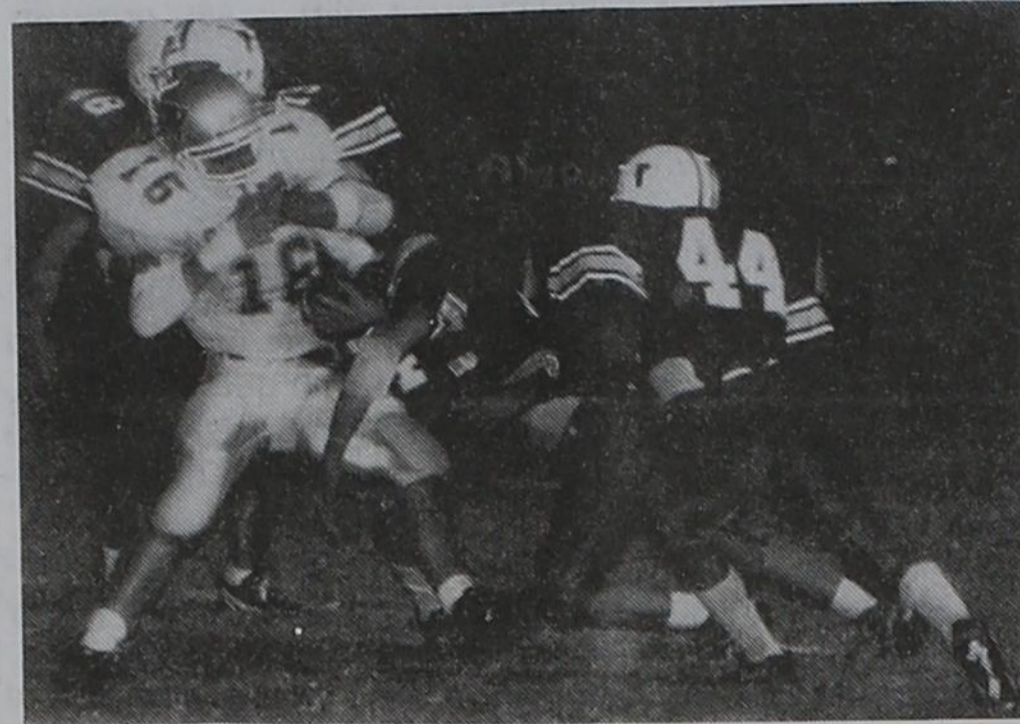
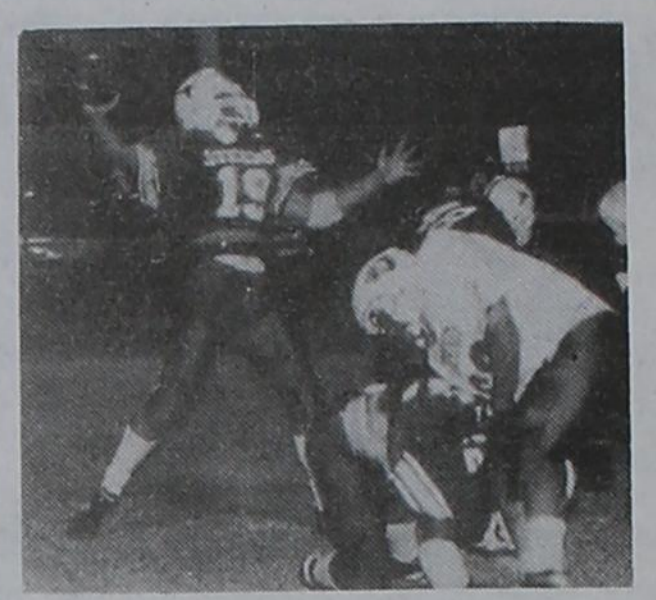
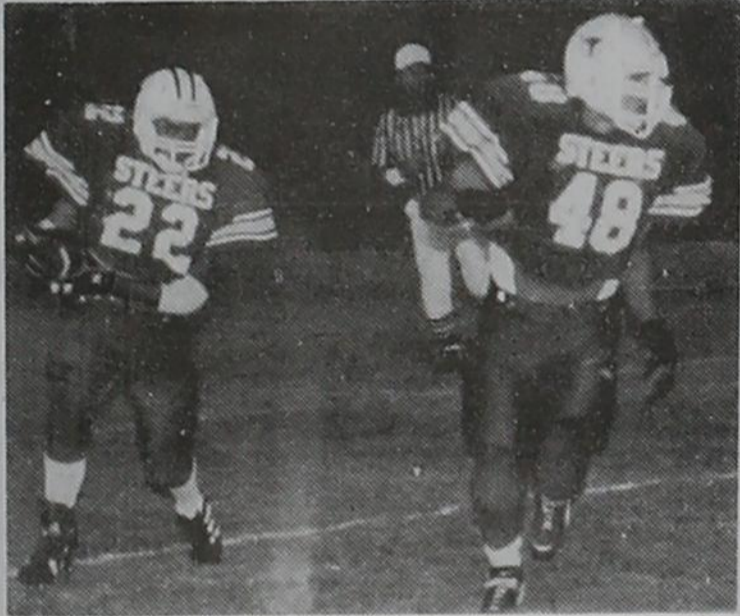

With 1:20 left in the game, Gonzales, Steve Miller and Michael Arce tackled the Swifts' runner in the end zone for a safety, ending the scoring.

Wolverines blast Capitan in playoffs

Saturday afternoon was a perfect day for football, and the Texico Wolverines took full advantage of it to blast the Capitan Tigers, 48-0, in the state playoff quarter-finals here.

Texico advances to the state semi-finals at Tatum at 1:30 p.m. mst Saturday. Tatum defeated the Wolverines on Sept. 13, 14-7. Tatum beat Escalante, 42-6, last week.

Texico is now 8-3 on the season. Capitan finished up at 4-6. Against Capitan, Texico came out strong in their defense, holding the Tigers to only two first downs in the first half. Meanwhile, the Wolverine offense put up 4 touchdowns before half.

Mel Askew had a great day passing, hitting 7 of 13 for 148 yards. That included 2 TDs, plus he returned both an interception and a punt for two more TDs.

Tobie Askew and Matt Holguin caught touchdown passes and had outstanding games, too. Tobie Askew also scored on a 13-yard run, and tacked the Capitan QB in the end zone for a safety.

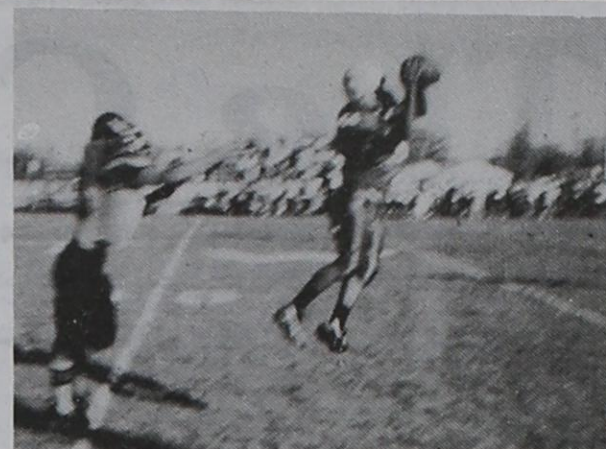
Pecos Chumley scored on a 4-yard run and was injured on his second scoring play, a 25-yard TD. Reports are he broke his collar bone.

The Texico defense provided 3 interceptions and 4 fumble recoveries. Mel Askew, Holguin and Clint Hamilton intercepted passes, while Shay Norvell, Caleb Cloud, Jake Boazman and Seth Ketterling recovered Capitan fumbles.

Texico's scoring was balanced with 2 TDs in the first three quarters each and one in the last. To recap, the scores were in this order: Mel Askew, 33-yard punt return; Mel Askew, 22 yard interception; Tobie Askew, 13-yard run; Chumley, 4-yard run; Tobie Askew, safety; Holguin, 48-yard pass; Tobie askew, 14-yard pass, and Chumley, 25-yard run. Philipp Schneemeier provided 4 extra point kicks.

Ordinance No. 280

Authorizing the execution and delivery of a loan agreement and intercept agreement by and between the town of Texico, New Mexico, and the New Mexico Finance Authority, evidencing a special limited obligation of the town of Texico to pay a principal amount of \$1,569,389.00 together with interest thereon, for the purpose of defraying the cost of acquiring and constructing a solid waste disposal facility as a member of the High Plains Waste Management Association; providing for the payment of the principal and interest on the loan solely from the net revenues of the solid waste disposal system and from the distributions of environmental gross receipts tax revenues received by the town of Texico and gross receipts tax revenues received by a particular member from the New Mexico Department of Taxation and Revenue; providing for the distributions of environmental gross receipts tax revenues and other gross receipts tax revenues as described above from the New Mexico Department of Taxation and Revenue to be redirected to the New Mexico Finance Authority or its assigns pursuant to the intercept agreement for the payment of the principal of and interest on the loan and approving the form of the loan agreement and the intercept agreement and other details concerning the loan agreement and the intercept agreement; ratifying actions heretofore taken; repealing all action inconsistent with this ordinance; authorizing the taking of other actions in connection with the execution and delivery of the loan agreement and the intercept agreement; and declaring an emergency.

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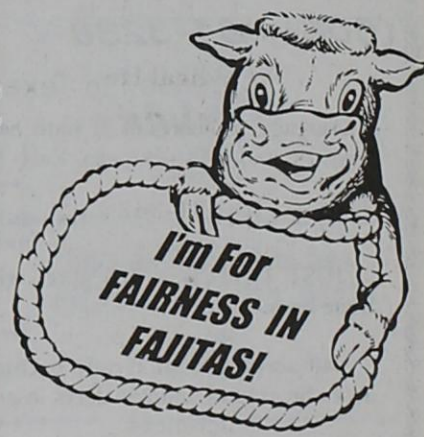

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

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
