

A vet recalls

As our nation is going through the present war on terrorism, it is with special thought and admiration that we prepare to honor the veterans of the previous wars and military conflicts.


In preparation for this Veteran's Day issue of the Tribune, I followed up on a lead for a human interest story involving a man named Chester Reeves. Ralph Franse had given the name to me and thought that Mr. Reeves' story might make a good read, especially on Veteran's Day.

I had the honor and privilege of meeting Chester and his lovely wife Maxcine last week at their home in Portales. It is a home filled with love and cherished memories of a 54 year marriage, five children, grandchildren and the hobbies that fill their days.

Chester is a quiet, unassuming man that honorably served our nation in the United States Navy during World War II. He can tell you exactly the time he served: "Three years, eight months and 22 days." He was a Seaman 1st Class and he served all three years aboard a Flagship heavy cruiser that had a distinguished thirteen year career and would take its' place in the annals of history.

What makes Chester Reeves such an incredible veteran is that, he not only served on the heavy cruiser, he survived the sinking of the U.S.S. Indianapolis.

The Indianapolis had been put into service and commissioned by the Navy on Nov. 15, 1932. It began its career as the Flagship of the Scouting Force, and later, the Scouting Fleet. Prior to W.W.II, she had served several times as President Franklin D. Roosevelt's personal ship of state. Throughout most of W.W.II, she served as the Flagship of the Fifth Fleet under the command of ADM Raymond A. Spruance, USN. She distinguished herself and all who served aboard her during her career in the Pacific, earning ten

Cindy Castleberry wins 10th contest


Surprises in the college and pro games put scores on the lower slopes in last week's Area Merchants Football Contest.

In the waters outside Okinawa, the Indianapolis was hit by a kamikaze (suicide plane) that caused 38 casualties. Following the repairs, she was chosen to deliver the world's first operational atomic bomb. On July 26, 1945, the Indianapolis effectively delivered the "Little Boy" atomic bomb that would be flown over and dropped on Hiroshima, Japan on Aug. 6, 1945 by the B-29 bomber, Enola Gav. This bombing and the subsequent detonation of the "Fat Man" plutonium bomb on Nagasaki, Japan effectively ended World War II. The empire of Japan unconditionally surrendered on Aug. 14, 1945.

After the Indianapolis delivered the atomic bomb, she reported to Commander-In-Chief, Pacific Headquarters in Guam for further orders. She was ordered to join the U.S.S. Idaho at Leyte Gulf in the Philippines to prepare for the invasion of Japan. Unescorted, the Indianapolis departed Guam at about 17 knots.

At fourteen minutes past midnight, July 30, 1945, the U.S.S. Indianapolis was 'struck by two Japanese submarine torpedoes. The first torpedo blew away the bow and the second hit about midship on the starboard side next to a fuel tank and powder magazine. The ship was rocked by a huge explosion that split the ship to the keel and knocked out all electric power.

Chester Reeves, 31 year old Seaman 1st Class, had just taken over his watch at the 20 millimeter gun, lookout when the torpedoes hit.

"I knew that something awfully big had just hit the ship," he stated. "Then the call to abandon ship started ringing out and I headed to a spot where I could get off."

Getting off the ship was pretty difficult because the ship was going down very fast. The ship was sinking by the bow and then began to roll starboard. Very few lifeboats could be released, so most of the men had to take to the open ocean with their standard issue kapok life jackets.

"I grabbed a line and just walked down the side of the ship as she was rolling," Chester recalled. "I then had to drop way, way down into the water. It was a big drop and I don't think I could even begin to tell you how far down it was. I knew I had better swim off away from the ship as fast as I could because the suck of the ship going down could suck you with it. I got off a good ways and turned back to look just as she went completely bottom up and then went down in a slant."

Of the 1,196 men on board the Indianapolis that night, 900 made it into the water in the twelve minutes before she sank.

Memories of the Titanic came to my mind as I listened to Mr. Reeves tell about jumping off into the water, but a huge difference exists between these stories. The Titanic sank in freezing cold Atlantic waters in the early spring of 1912. The Indianapolis sank in the warm Pacific waters in the middle of summer.

Hypothermia wasn't what the remaining 900 sailors faced in their fight for survival.

Chester Reeves, a native of Paris, Texas, and his fellow sailors were about to face the longest five days of their lives. Many would not live to recall the events of this historical time.

The shark attacks began at around sunrise the

following morning.

Chester had maneuvered himself to a floater net where he and a large group of sailors held on for dear life. They saw the sharks swimming and attacking.

"Someone hollered out 'churn the water,' so with all of us churning the water, I guess we might have scared the sharks closest to us away," he commented. "My naval training really hadn't prepared me for that type of encounter."

Chester figures he was floating in the water for about 104 hours (a little over 4 days) before he made it into a life raft.

"I made it into a life raft and not too long after that the rescue began of we survivors," he recalled.

A little after 11:00 a.m. of the fourth day, the survivors were accidentally spotted by LT. Wilbur C. Gwinn, as he was piloting his PV-1 Ventura Bomber on a routine antisubmarine patrol. He radioed his base in Peleliu and reported "many men in the water." A PBY seaplane under the command of LT. R. Adrian Marks was dispatched to lend assistance with life rafts and to report what he found. Before going to the scene, he alerted the captain of the U.S.S. Cecil Doyle to the emergency. The captain of the Doyle, on his own authority, diverted the ship to scene.

Arriving hours ahead of the Doyle, Marks' and his crew began dropping life rafts, drinking water, food and other supplies. While doing this, they saw the men being attacked by the sharks that had been constantly circling and attacking the groups of men during their days in the water. Marks had standing orders not to land at sea, but he disregarded them and landed as nearby as possible. He taxied the plane toward the survivors and began picking up the stragglers and lone swimmers who were at the greatest risk of shark attack. As soon as he learned what ship the men were from, he radioed the news and requested further and immediate assistance.

As night fell, Marks and his crew pulled 56 nearly dead men from the water. As soon as the fuselage was full, the rest were tied to the wings with parachute cord. The plane was beginning to sag and pull apart from the weight of the men.

The Doyle was the first ship on the scene and managed to find the scene in total darkness by homing in on Marks' PBY. The Doyle halted completely to avoid killing or further injuring the survivors. It also put itself in harms way when it pointed its' largest searchlight into the night sky to serve as a beacon for other rescue vessels.

The other ships that arrived were the U.S.S. Bassett, U.S.S. Dufilho, U.S.S. Register, U.S.S. Ringness and the U.S.S. Talbot.

Of the 900 men that made it into the water from the Indianapolis, only 317 remained alive.

"I was picked up first by the U.S.S. Talbot and then was transferred over to the U.S.S. Register." said Chester. "That man Marks' was pretty brave to have done what he did. That seaplane ended up sinking too. The pontoons busted out on it from all the added weight."

The survivors earned marks of bravery too by thirst and suffering from exposure and their wounds.

Chester was taken to the Naval hospital in Guam

where he was treated for many days for severe dehydration and exposure.

"I really remember how my eyes went bad out in that blinding sun after about a day," Chester recalled. "I tried to keep my eyes shut during the day and then I could see pretty well at night. I also knew that I had to just take it real easy to avoid wearing myself out. A lot of the sailors that just out right died were the ones that over-exerted themselves. The heat and the salt water were just too much to be exposed to for that long."

Chester and the other sailors of the U.S.S. Indianapolis were awarded the Purple Heart following their ordeal. This medal is pinned alongside the other battle medals that Chester was awarded and a folded American flag in a wood and glass shadow box that sits in a corner of Chester and Maxcine's living room. It and the large black and white photograph of the U.S.S. Indianapolis are just a few of the mementos of W.W.II that they have visible in their home.

I asked Chester if he thinks about the events of surviving the sinking. He simply shakes his head "No," and then emphatically states, "I told myself right away that I was going to have to have a good attitude about all this when it happened."

Chester said that he walked out of the hospital vowing to not dwell on what happened, but to simply live his life, make a good life for himself and to live each day as best he could.

He left the Navy at the end of the war. He came to visit his sister in Floydada, Texas and worked for his brother-in-law at his gas station. He met Maxcine while he was there and he soon married the Kenna, New Mexico native.

They made their home in Portales where he worked for a grocery store and then for Roosevelt County Electric. After retiring, he worked at seasonal jobs at the peanut mill.

"I've done exactly what I told myself I was going to do," said Chester.

Chester is the second oldest survivor of the U.S.S. Indianapolis. Thomas Goff, who was born in 1906 is the oldest and he lives in Canal Fulton, Ohio.

Chester and Maxcine enjoy traveling to the reunions of the Indianapolis survivors, when they can. A large nationwide reunion is held every two years in Indianapolis where the ships' memorial is located. Another reunion is held in Broomfield, Colorado every other year.

"This event is in the past for me," Chester states. "I don't mind answering questions about it, but it's not something that I want to, or need to, talk about all the time. Besides, sometimes, I can't remember all the details like I use to ... but that comes with my age now, too!"

Veteran's Day is but one small way to pay tribute to those that helped shape our history, our nation and our freedom. After learning the life stories of men like Chester Reeves, the new coming of age that our country is facing today is one that we can all face boldly, bravely and most of all...survive.





That decoration might well come from a supply of World War II vintage medals stocked by the Pentagon.

Yes, even today, medals struck in the 1940s are being pinned to the chests of young service members. That curious fact is linked to President Truman's decision to drop the atomic bomb on Hiroshima.

As part of the U.S. preparation for an allied invasion of Japan, in which heavy casualties were expected, production of Purple Hearts reached its peak.

In all, more than 1.5 million Purple Hearts were minted for World War II.

Obviously, since World War II, hundreds of thousands of Purple Hearts also have been awarded, mostly to Vietnam War veterans.

Back in the 1970s, the **Defense Supply Center in** Philadelphia determined that its aging stock of Purple Hearts needed to be replenished, and it ordered more medals to bolster the supply.

afterward, Soon though, an untouched stash of Purple Hearts was found in a warehouse, and the supply center bulged with nearly 125,000 more copies of the medal.

Demand for the medals was high and by the end of 1999, most of the refurbished Purple Hearts had been shipped out to other government clients. At that point, a limited production run of 9,000 new medals was ordered, the first large-scale production run of Purple Hearts in more than half a century.

The Purple Heart is perhaps the most famed of U.S. decorations.

The most recent version, authorized in 1932, harkens back to the original established by General George Washington in 1782.

Some interesting notations:

-- Due to shortages in its stock, the Navy borrowed 60,000 Purple Hearts from the Army in May 1945.

-- About 78,000 retroactive Purple Hearts were awarded between 1932 and 1942.

-- Authority to award Purple Hearts is given to hospital commanders and unit commanders for nonfatal wounds: and the War Department in case of fatal wounds (awarded to the next of kin).




Project awaits a loan



The Whitharral Panthers beat the Longhorns, 47-0, in a game called at halftime by the 45-point rule.


Whitharral is now 9-0 on the year, while Lazbuddie finished the campaign at 4-6 overall and 1-3 in district.

Whitharral had good field position throughout the contest, especially after recovering some early Longhorn fumbles.



FEEDER CATTLE: November Feeder prices are still boxed inside a narrow range between \$85.75 and \$87.75. A close outside either one of numbers should push prices in the direction of the initial move. 

So the NMAA told Navajo Prep that it was in the playoffs and Prep was to play Fort Sumner in the quarterfinal. Meanwhile, Dulce notified Fort Sumner that it was sending a team, too, to Fort Sumner -- which meant that three teams would take the field.

Meanwhile, Dulce went to court on Friday, and the judge overturned the NMAA decision. So the Navajo Prep team, already on its way to Fort Sumner, had to turn back after starting the long trip to this area.

The result: Fort Sumner beat Dulce, 54-0.

Need an Immunization? **Texas Department of Health** will be in Farwell on Nov. 14



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

Parmer County backs most propositions

The state constitutional election was held Tuesday in Texas. As expected, the turnout was very light.

Following are the propositions, and how Parmer **County voted:**

Proposition 1 -- Involves relinquishing the state's claim to some disputed land in Bastrop County. Proposition 1: 187 for, 100 against.

Proposition 2 -- For issuing \$175 million of state obli-

gation bonds to help counties with access road projects to serve border colonias (economically distressed geographic areas with inadequate public services).

Proposition 2: 122 for, 180 against.

Proposition 3 -- Exempt green coffee and raw cocoa held in Harris County from property taxes to help them become an exchange port for the New York Board of Trade.

Proposition 3: 154 for, 139 against.

Proposition 4 -- Set the term of the fire fighters' pension commissioner at four years.

Proposition 4: 195 for, 105 against.

Proposition 5 -- Allow a municipality to donate outdated or surplus equipment used in fighting fires to an underdeveloped country.

Proposition 5: 189 for, 118 against.

Proposition 6 -- Requires the governor to call a special session of the legislature so it can appoint presidential electors if the governor determines that an election for president is so tight that the regular electors cannot be picked in the time determined by federal law for the electors to cast their votes.

Proposition 6: 177 for, 122 against.

Proposition 7 -- Allow the Veterans Land Board to sell up to \$500 million of additional general obligation boards to finance more home mortgage loans to veterans. And it would allow the Land Board to create, operate and improve veterans' cemeteries with its assets.

Proposition 7: 207 for, 95 against.

Proposition 8 -- Authorize the Texas Public Finance Authority to sell up to \$850 million of general obligation boards to pay for construction and repair projects by more than a dozen state agencies, including the Department of Agriculture, Department of Health and Department of Criminal Justice.

Proposition 8: 158 for, 140 against.

Proposition 9 -- Allow the legislature, without an election, to fill a vacancy in the legislature. Currently, a special election must be held even if there is only one qualified candidate.

Proposition 9: 208 for, 101 against.

Proposition 10 -- Exempt certain items from property taxes if the items are warehoused in one part of Texas, then forwarded to another site.

Proposition 10: 188 for, 113 against.

Proposition 11 -- Allow certain state employees, such as teachers and retired teachers, plus school administrators, to get paid for serving on governing bodies such as school boards, city councils, water districts, etc.

Proposition 11: 162 for, 135 against.

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Proposition 12 -- Amend, repeal or relocate several sections of the state constitution to improve its clarity, organization

Proposition 12: 215 for, 83 against.

Proposition 13 -- Allow a school board to donate property and improvements to preserve that property even though it's no longer needed for the school district (helps with historical areas).

Proposition 13: 243 for, 58 against.

Proposition 14 -- Allow a taxing unit, other than a school district, to exempt travel trailers from property taxes as long as the travel trailers are registered with the state and not used for income.

Proposition 14: 146 for, 154 against.

Proposition 15 -- Create the Texas Mobility Fund to finance more state highways. It would be administered by the Texas Transportation Commission.

Proposition 15: 165 for, 129 against.

Proposition 16 -- Reduce the waiting period required for a valid home improvement lien on a homestead from 12 days to 5 days.

Proposition 16: 168 for, 117 against.

Proposition 17 -- Allow the state to relinquish claim to certain state land and to clear title defects for persons who claim title to those lands. It applies to land whose owners have disputed title to the land, but for which no patent from the state giving clear title to the land was ever issued.

Proposition 17: 156 for, 142 against.

Proposition 18 -- Create a program to consolidate and standardize the collection, deposit, reporting and payment of criminal and civil court fees.

Proposition 18: 237 for, 58 against.

Proposition 19 -- Allow the Texas Water Development Board to Issue up to \$2 billion of additional general obligation bonds to pay for water projects. Current law limits the amount of bonds that the board can issue.

Proposition 19: 182 for, 112 against.
