Yes, he changed

It's been a while since I've written a column about the federal bureaucrats in Washington, D.C. I guess I've got a lot of venom out of my system. I still shake my head at the goings-on I saw while living in the Washington suburbs for five

Remember how I've written that many of those folks don't give a hoot about the rest of the country; that their priority is No. 1--themselves?

Well, just take a look at the recent exposure of a long-standing scandal: the amount of money paid for supplies by the Pentagon. That \$500 hammer, for example.

It's ugly enough that companies have taken advantage of our government. But I'd like to meet those folks who worked at the Pentagon and approved those monstrous bills.

How could anyone approve a \$500 bill, for example, for a hammer? What does that say to us taxpayers?

This is the type of thing that causes me a real problem when the President calls for heavy expenditures for the Defense Department. If I knew that the money sought was truly needed, and that the amount of waste was cut to the bone, I'd back him 100 percent.

Unfortunately, I don't believe that is the case. I believe there is a lot of "fat" that the defense contractors and military folks have put into their proposals. I'll never forget my own experiences in the Army. At my own low level, the amount of waste was unbelieveable.

Personally, I believe the Congress could chop out a lot of money from President Reagan's proposed military wish list, and our national security wouldn't be harmed at all.

Living in the Washington area changes people. That's hard for a lot of folks to understand. I know that if I hadn't undergone the experience, I would have a problem believing it. But the fact is Washington is unlike

anywhere else in the nation. The federal bureaucrats, for example, don't see poverty. They live in exclusive areas with fancy highrises or beautiful estates. And they don't see elderly people. Senior citizens are excluded due to financial reasons; they simply can't afford the rents. The bureaucrats can afford it because they are paid much higher salaries than regular working people.

And the bureaucrats don't see the type of everyday problems that other communities are faced with, such as street repairs, water line extensions, etc. When a problem of this type arises is Washington, it's simply fixed; there's plenty of money.

When I look back on my experience, I wondered why I didn't pick up the "Washington syndrome." I think it was because I kept getting letters from my previous Indiana home about 22 percent unemployment, people just trying to survive. I found it hard to equate those horrors with the freeflowing funds in Washington, where the unemployment rate in my Virginia County was 2.4 percent.

But people do get caught up in the Washington glamor. Let me give you an example:

A couple of months ago I attended a Texas press seminar. In the hospitality suite, I found myself talking with several other newspaper publishers, plus the legislative aide to a Texas congressmen (not Larry Combest's).

The aide was a decent fellow but I decided to have a bit of fun with him. He had been an aide (which is the chief advisor to a congressman) for a year.

So I started in on my theme of how people get caught up in the Washington glitz, and change, and forget about the folks back home. I pointed out how his friends and neighbors are now the folks living in the adjoining apartments in his high-rise, while the folks back in Texas are now foreigners to him.

All the time, I was doing my bit, he kept shaking his head, saying, "No, that wasn't the case. That wasn't true. I haven't changed at

Finally, another publisher, who had known him for a long time, said to the aide:

"What clothes are you wearing today?"

"I'm wearing a three-button suit.

"Last year, when we saw you, you were wearing blue jeans. You were

Bonnie went to California, while there started working at an airplane factory. She made wings for



Farwell School Board to renovate old gym

The Farwell School Board voted unanimously Monday to renovate the old gym at an estimated cost of

The work will include markings for one basketball court and one volleyball court; new glass backboards for the new gym so the old ones can be moved to the old gym; replace ceiling in the gym; replace ceiling in boy's dressing room and paint.

Also, repair girls dressing room and paint; repair west walls around heaters, patch holes; put door in east wall and fix large storage area; cover floor with Pro Gym, repair plumbing in south dressing room, and build lockers for the south dressing room.

Other work to be done with funds from the 1984-85 budget will include: ceiling and lighting for kindergarten and special education rooms, estimated cost \$3,200; lighting for elementary school and lunchroom, estimated cost \$9,000; ceiling and lighting for three junior high classrooms and hall, estimated cost \$2,800, and door for front entrance to kindergarten and special education room, estimated cost \$2,100.

The motion for the work outlined in the preceding paragraph was also approved unanimously. An earlier motion to add a \$6,000 estimated cost for improved lighting in the new gym to that work failed 4-2. For it were Doyle Johnson and Maxine Williams; opposed were Ed Corn, Richard Haseloff, Steve Pierson and Joe Schilling.

In other business, the board:

--Appointed John Grigsby, who becomes school superintendent July 1 upon the retirement of Willie Roberts, to three posts: authorized representative for the school lunch program; testbook custodian, and representative to the joint committee of Region 16 education service center.

-- Authorized the Parmer County Appraisal District to contract with lawyers for the collection of delinguent taxes.

-- Agreed to seek bids for a house it owns at 506 Eighth St., Farwell.

-- Agreed to pay half the cost of curb and gutter and paving on the half;block on Ave. I east of the intersection of Ave. I and Seventh Street.

-- Accepted the criteria presented by the principals for placement on

the career ladder. Teachers will be selected for Level 2 of the career ladder if the following are met:

A bachelor's degree, three years of teaching experience and nine semester hours of higher education course work or 135 hours of advanced academic training or an equivalent combination so that one semester hour of higher education course work is equivalent to 15 hours of advanced academic train-

ing, or: A master's degree in the subject taught and two years of teaching experience.

Placement on Level 2 of the career ladder will be based on prior years' evaluation of performance. -- Tentatively approved the 1985-86

-- Decided not to authorize the use of a school bus for the AAU girls tournament.

-- Approved the school calendar for 1985-86. It includes: Sept. 3, school starts; Thanksgiving vacation, Nov. 28 and 29; Christmas vacation, Dec. 23-Jan. 1; Spring break, Feb. 21-26; and last day of school, May 29.





electric age in rural areas can't

No hot water unless you heated it on a wood stove.

No refrigerators. No icemakers. No air conditioners. Countless "no's."

Ironing day in the summer was

torture for the women: A roaring fire in the kitchen stove was necessary to keep the flat irons warm. Flushed faces beaded with perspiration, damp blouses, blistered fingers, drudgery, and aching backs were the inheritance of every farm

wife and daughter.

The twin to the misery of ironing sat in the backyard-the iron washpot, black-stained from wood fires that burned in hot weather and cold. Nearby was the back-breaking, knuckle-burning washboard.

The wait for electricity was almost unbearable. As a young farm boy in Central Texas, I sat on the roof of our farm garage for hours, each day for weeks, watching the distant crews as they "set" the light poles and strung the wire. I thought they would never reach our farm. Finally the house was wired with single-drop sockets and bulbs in each room. No other electric appliance was then affordable.

Finally, finally, finally, came the day when the meter was installed and the final connection made.

A magic moment. No thrill since has matched it.

As you read about the 50th birthday of the Rural Electrification Administration, it's important to remember that electricity came late to the rural areas of Americalong after the cities and towns routinely enjoyed its benefits. Rural America lived in darkness and suffered back-breaking labor until the momentous REA legislation was

enacted into law.

The fierce pride that farm people once held for their rural electric cooperatives (REC's) has since subsided into indifference, and the luxury of electric power is now taken for granted.

Judge Roberts: State passing on costs to counties

Parmer County Judge Porter Roberts said that "the state has found a way to get through the legislative session in Ausin without raising any state taxes, but the way they have decided to do it means that the property taxes may have to be raised at the county level or services cut."

Judge Roberts indicated that the cost of state programs such as the administration of justice, including increased local costs of the judicial system and costs of incarcerating state prisoners, and even the cost of driver education in the public schools, may be financed out of county and district court fees if pending legislation is passed.

"The way this works," Judge Roberts said, "is that the state increases its share of fees that the county collects in order to raise revenue for state programs. This could decrease the future amount of money that the county gets to retain from the fees. The county could be forced to take up the slack by increasing property taxes just to stay even." It seems that such legislator who comes up with a bill that needs funding, states in his bill that the county will raise their fees on certain items and send this additional money to Austin.

The judge said that counties only

have four sources of revenue: property tax, fines and fees, and federal revenue sharing. He said that revenue sharing "has been going down for most counties for several years, and that the administration proposes to eliminate it by Oct. 31, 1986.

"Revenue sharing averaged 16% of county budgets state wide in 1977 but in 1982 it amounted to only 11%. It's dropped even more since 1982

and will be gone entirely by late 1986," the judge said.

"Taxes may have to be increased even more by the county if inflation causes increased costs. And while the state is taking more of historical county revenue, legislators are devising ways to have the county take on more and more responsibility that normally would be handled by the state. The more responsibility they give us, the more property taxpayers have to pay.'

"What this means," the judge said, "is that the federal government is passing costs to the state, the state is passing costs to the counties and they are both telling everyone that they aren't raising


taxes. They're not. Local government has to do it for them.

"During this legislative session, for the good of everybody concerned, we need to keep a close eye on bills coming up for vote. If we find a bill that we are particularly in favor of or definitely against, it behooves each of us to call our Representative or Senator and tell him our feelings."
