







## Perry's attend Methodist home meeting

Rev. and Mrs. W.T. Perry are in Waco, Texas the latter part of this week where Rev. Perry is attending a meeting of the Methodist Home for Children Boy's Ranch Board.

Rev. Perry was recently elected to membership on this group representing the New Mexico Conference of the United Methodist Church.

The Methodist Home Boy's Ranch, established 13 years ago as part of the Child-Care Facilities of the 92 year-old Methodist Home at Waco, is a 2,500 acre working ranch located six miles East of Waco. Some 40 boys reside on the Ranch, an additional 300-plus boys and girls live on the main Campus in Waco. During this meeting the members of the Ranch Committee will inspect the new Turner Ranch House, one of four units providing housing for the boys who are residents of the Ranch.

Ranch has been a gift of Gov. Bill Daniel and his wife, Vara of Liberty, Texas, who are personal friends of Rev. and Mrs. Perry.

Rev. Perry was first elected to membership of the Board of Commissioners of Methodist Home from the Clovis District of the United Methodist Church in 1970. Following that term of service he represented the Carlsbad District for several years, and then was elected to the Ranch Board in 1980. His rotating term ended in 1983, with 13 years of continuous service to Methodist Home. His current three-year term begins with the meeting this week.

The Ranch Committee is responsible for overall development of the Ranch, as well as providing guidance and assistance for improvement and expansion of the facilities and development of the lives of the boys who reside at the Ranch. The group meets at least twice yearly to inspect the premises, and oversee additional development. The cattle, swine and sheep herds provide table meats for the boys at the Ranch as well as the 300-plus children at the main Campus and the Staff and Home Parents. During the meetings of the Ranch

Committee, the spouses of members will meet for informal discussion and also tour the premises. Highlight of the meeting will be a barbecue dinner with the boys who reside at the Ranch, who will act as table hosts for the members and spouses. Rev. Perry is the only representative from the New Mexico Annual Conference.

## Judge Roberts: State passing on costs to counties

Farmer County Judge Porter Roberts said that "the state has found a way to get through the legislative session in Austin without raising any state taxes, but the way they have decided to do it means that the property taxes may have to be raised at the county level or services cut."

Judge Roberts indicated that the cost of state programs such as the administration of justice, including increased local costs of the judicial system and costs of incarcerating state prisoners, and even the cost of driver education in the public schools, may be financed out of county and district court fees if pending legislation is passed.

"The way this works," Judge Roberts said, "is that the state increases its share of fees that the county collects in order to raise revenue for state programs. This could decrease the future amount of money that the county gets to retain from the fees. The county could be forced to take up the slack by increasing property taxes just to stay even." It seems that such a legislator who comes up with a bill that needs funding, states in his bill that the county will raise their fees on certain items and send this additional money to Austin.

The judge said that counties only

have four sources of revenue: property tax, fines and fees, and federal revenue sharing. He said that revenue sharing "has been going down for most counties for several years, and that the administration proposes to eliminate it by Oct. 31, 1986."

"Revenue sharing averaged 16% of county budgets state wide in 1977 but in 1982 it amounted to only 11%. It's dropped even more since 1982

and will be gone entirely by late 1986," the judge said.

"Taxes may have to be increased even more by the county if inflation causes increased costs. And while the state is taking more of historical county revenue, legislators are devising ways to have the county take on more and more responsibility that normally would be handled by the state. The more responsibility they give us, the more property taxpayers have to pay."

"What this means," the judge said, "is that the federal government is passing costs to the state, the state is passing costs to the counties and they are both telling everyone that they aren't raising

taxes. They're not. Local government has to do it for them.

"During this legislative session, for the good of everybody concerned, we need to keep a close eye on bills coming up for vote. If we find a bill that we are particularly in favor of or definitely against, it behooves each of us to call our Representative or Senator and tell him our feelings."

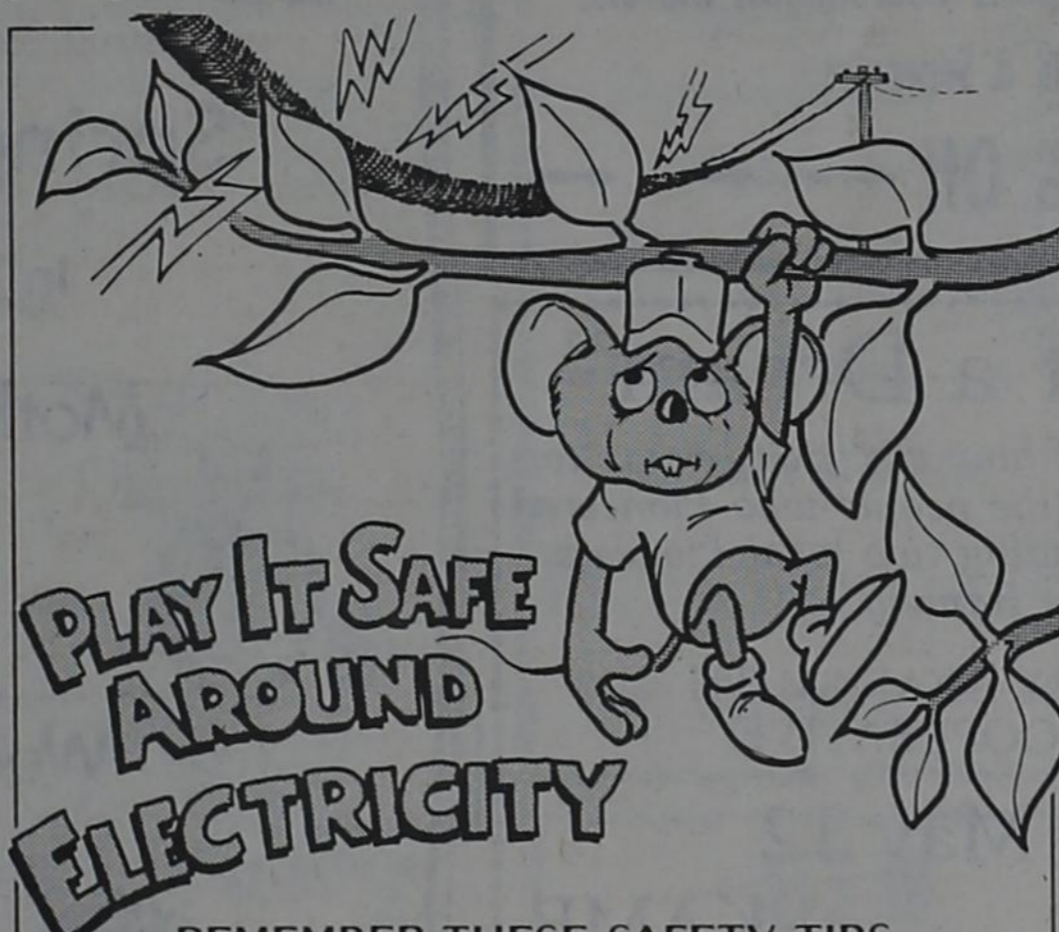

- Don't post signs on utility poles. A lineman hitting a nail with his cleat could slip and fall. Also, nails can snag protective gloves and destroy their insulation value.

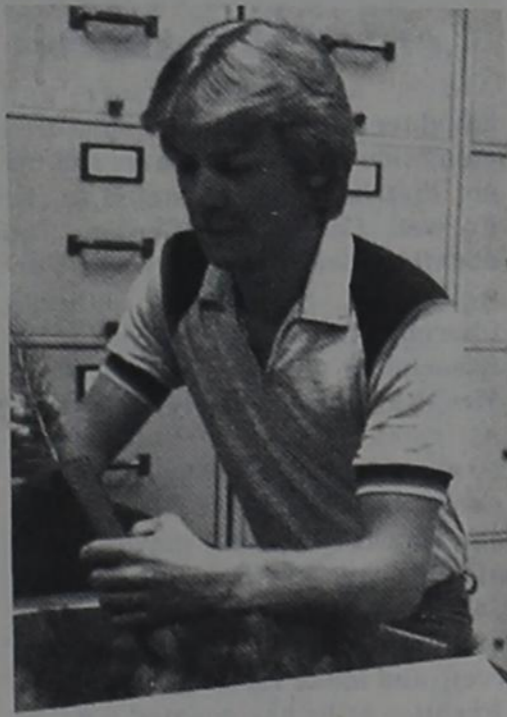

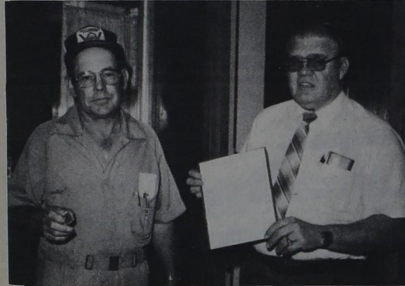
