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New Texico City Hall to be built

The Texico City Council on Tuesday accepted a bid to build a new City Hall.

This was the 3rd time the city council had investigated the possibility of building a new city hall in the past 15 years – but it was the first time the goahead has been given.

The new city hall will be built at the north side of the community center.

Three bids were re-

LCI2, \$318,623; Wilson & Wilson, \$374,540; and Wilhite Construction, \$384,953. All are Clovis firms.

LCI2's bid was accepted, upon the recommendation of architect Paul Reid.

Work is expected to start in June and be completed in December.

How will the city pay for this? It has \$135,000 on hand, and has budgeted another \$15,000 for this year toward the proj-

The remainder will be borrowed from the state and paid back through gross receipts taxes over the coming years.

The winning bid includes demolition of the current city hall. But before that happens, asbestos removal is necessary.

Grimes & Associates will be asked to put together an asbestos abatement plan. The removal is expected to cost about \$50,000. Again, this extra fund will be bor-

Originally, there wee 17 candidates for the post with Neugebauer and Conaway finishing 1-2 in the May election. Thus, a runoff was necessitated because neither candidate received at least 50 percent of the vote.

National organization comes to assistance of Bovina couple

There has been an unusual follow-up to the report earlier this month of a Bovina baby dying in his crib.

After the initial investigation, charges of endangering a child, a second degree felony, were placed against the parents, Amanda Garcia, 20, and Fidencio Fierro, 26, both of Bovina.

The charges were placed after the Bovina police investigation found that the child had not been supervised for about eight hours.

The child died of strangulation from a window blind cord, police said.

The story was reported in the Tribune on May 15, then later by the Lubbock newspaper. The story apparently also went out on the national wire service to other papers.

Last week, the Parmer County District Attorney's office received several emails and letters about the case from all over the U.S.

What the DA is being told, through a national organization called "Par-

ents for Window Blind Safety," is that many babies are dying due to this type of accidental strangulation.

One letter sent by a member of the organization to District Attorney Johnny Actkinson said:

"I am sending you a report from the Consumer Product Safety Commission which you will be able to see the numerous deaths that have occurred with inner cord strangulation. This is not an uncommon death. Since our daughter's death, we have been trying to educate police and parents across America about the dangers of window blinds and the way children can die."

The attached report listed dozens of babies which died the past two years, apparently from cord strangulation.

According to the organization, there have been over 500 children killed by corded window treatments.

The Bovina case will go to a grand jury in June which will decide whether to indict the couple or drop the felony charges.




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colleges and advance their education is just wonderful to see.

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
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31 years of making Braille books...
