# Wolverine Girls Regional Champs

Once again Texico's female roundballers have captured another title, this one as Regional Champions.

To clinch the regional title and earn them a berth in the state meet this week, the Lady Wolverines defeated San Jon and Floyd in playoffs at Texico last weekend.

"Overall I was very pleased with the way we played during the tournament," commented a pleased coach Roy King following his team's two victories. "We had some outstanding performances during the tournament, but it takes a team effort to win consistently. We had four girls who shot the ball 20 and 24 times each."

Before advancing to last weekend's regional playoff games, number-one ranked

Texico defeated Floyd in district finals 52-37. "That was the best game we have ever played against Floyd," said King at the time.

Following their regional playoff wins, the Green and White ladies pushed their season record to an impressive 24-1.

Texico was to have begun round one of state playoff action Wednesday at the Portales High School gym.

Their opponent was to have been Rehobeth High School. "I really don't know anything about them," commented Coach Roy King before the game, "except that they were in the state tournament last year and they lost to Elida in overtime. Most of their girls are back from that team," he

added.

"I am looking for a good game, but it only takes one bad game and you are out of the tournament," the coach commented.

King cited Reserve, Carrizo and Floyd as teams to be strong in the state playoffs.

"Weed has a tradition, so they could be pretty good also," he said. "Other teams in the tournament are Wagon Mound and Cimarron. I haven't seen or heard anything about either of these two teams," he said.

If the Texico girls were successful Wednesday night, they were to begin their second round of playoff action Thursday night in the ENMU arena, beginning at 8:30 p.m. MST.

King does not give all the

credit to his girls for their winning season though. "I thought the fans helped us tremendously," he says. "The girls really appreciate the support the fans have given this year. It makes you want to play better when you have a lot of people yelling for you," he reflected.

Members of the Regional Championship team include 1980 all-stater Ruth Scott; 1980 second team all-stater Lisa Coffey; and Tracy Dobbs, who received honorable mention last year in all-state picks. Also on the team are Pam Hoyl, Jill Jesko, Sharlet Taylor, Carletta Fitz, Becky McDonald, Lisa Crooks, Valda Cavallero, Chary Jesko, and Schree Rucker.

One of our conservative oriented subscribers, P. Hicks Daniel, corresponds with us about the progress of the "Right To Work" legislation in New Mexico. During the last legislative go-around the bill was passed by the New Mexico legislature only to have it vetoed by Governor Bruce King.

It was re-introduced in the current session of the New Mexico legislature and in all probability it again will receive the lawmakers' stamp of approval. If it is to escape the Governor's stamp of disapproval it must be supported by the "people." A letter writing campaign to Governor King just might stay his veto stamp. It would be worth a letter to Bruce expressing your stand on RTW.

We personally have never believed that a body should have to pay dues to any organization to exercise the American privilege of freely earning a living. These guys entertain five to six thousand people in the Floyd High School Gymnasium with the very finest in country music entertainment.

This year their extravaganza will be March 19, 20 and 21 beginning at 7 p.m. (MST) each night. The cost is very nominal and the fun is great. Plan to attend.

### Old Fire Station - -

## Local Senior Citizens Move To New Building

Texico-Farwell Community Senior Citizens organization is currently very busy with moving from one place to another.

Since the building of the new Texico Fire Station, the Senior Citizens have been given the old fire station location, to include four rooms and a bath.

Director Maurine Caywood has been doing most of the moving recently, having moved all of the center's ceramics and supplies from its old location at the Texico Community Building to the new home located next door to the Texico City Hall.

The new center, with an April-May completion goal, will feature a fellowship room, ceramic room, lending library and reading room and kitchen. Presently, the members are

doing their craft and game work on "rickety old card tables" Mrs. Caywood said, but her son-in-law, Lewis Cooper, has already cut new table tops and legs for brand new tables to be placed in the building.

While three of the rooms require only a paint job and some cleaning, the main work is to be in what will soon be the group's fellowship room.

Currently, the room is nothing more than a vacant garage where it once housed Texico's fire trucks and ambulance.

But to hear Mrs. Caywood explain the group's hopes, one can already sense the "homeness" that will be found there in only a few months time.

Mrs. Caywood said plans of lowering the ceiling, pouring a

new concrete floor and then adding tiles, paneling the walls and adding tables are all on the drawing board.

Funding for the renovations are to be paid in part by the State of New Mexico.

"I have applied the last two years for State money," she explained, "and each year we were allotted just so much." Currently, the organization has approximately \$2100 to spend on re-doing the new room, all State monies.

Mrs. Caywood also expressed a desire to put in windows and a regular type front door in the room. "We're looking for volunteers to do most of the construction

work," she said.

Once completed, the room will be used for the group's social gatherings, including the regular potluck suppers, held the second and fourth Thursdays of each month. Mrs. Caywood also explained that during the pre-holiday period, the room will be used for ceramics as there are always several members working on projects just before Christmas time. A donated pool table may also be placed in the area.

As for the library-reading room, the director said she is hoping to "build up" the existing library with a wider variety and selection of books.

building. Once completed the Center will feature a ceramic room, library-reading room, fellowship room and kitchen. The Senior Citizens are seeking volunteers to assist them in their remodeling efforts, and invite all local senior citizens to join their group for their regular potluck suppers and game night.

The local senior citizen's organization was formed in 1974, Mrs. Caywood said, and it currently carries about 25 members on the roll call. To become a member of the group, a person pays annual dues of \$2.50. "But everyone is welcome at anytime," she said.

The organization is partially state-funded as Mrs. Caywood is paid a minimum wage salary for 20 hours per week as director. All of her other time is strictly volunteer.  
A CETA worker, Mrs. Anna Fenn of Texico began work this week with the local senior citizens group, assisting Mrs. Caywood.

According to Mrs. Caywood, Mrs. Fenn "will mainly be doing outreach work, and we are certainly happy to have her."

Among the many benevolent services offered by the group is that of house cleaning and yard work for low income elderly, the work paid for out of state funds; and the Outreach Program, where members get out and visit and "keep in touch" with the shut-in elderly. The program also aids the elderly in answering questions that may arise. "Most of the times I can help them with their problems, if not I refer them to our Clovis office," Mrs. Caywood said.

On the fourth Tuesday of each month members go out and pick-up "partial shut-ins" and bring them to the center for coffee and donuts, "and about an hour of fellowship," she said. "Everyone really enjoys this time. Our members pick them up from their homes or from the local rest home."

At last month's coffee and donut affair, the center hosted 23 persons "which was really a great turnout and the biggest one yet," Mrs. Caywood said with pride.  
Members keep active in the organization by taking ceramic or painting lessons, or by getting together for some quilting, or taking part in the Thursday night Potluck Supper and Game Night.

The painting lessons are taught by Lova Kersey from Bovna and cost \$6.50 per three-hour lesson.  
Ceramics are instructed by Lou Scioli of Texico and cost \$1 per three-hour lesson and include paints and firing.

Mrs. Caywood spills over with enthusiasm when she speaks of the companionship and activity to be found in the organization. "It's really a great thing. I know all our members enjoy themselves."  
Officers of the group are Dora Verner, president; Freda Smith, vice-president; and Aileen Teel, secretary-treasurer.

The group is also led by a board of directors, including A.D. McDonald, Freda Smith, Laura Schlueter, Dickie Magness, Allie Burris, and representing the City of Texico, Marie Christian.

## Showers Dust Off Local Wheat Crop

The rains started coming down last Friday and constant drizzles could be felt throughout the weekend in various parts of the area, with showers falling again on Tuesday, dropping between "a quarter to half an inch" of the precious liquid on the Twin Cities.

The rain fluctuated from intermittent showers to gentle mists, quenching the thirst of the area's wheat crops.

"It really helped a lot," said Prantice Mills of the ASCS office in regard to the recent showers. "It will definitely help the wheat crop."

Mills pointed out that while the rains lasted only a short period of time, "they washed the dust off (the wheat crops) and brightened things up a bit," he commented.

Sherley-Anderson Lariat grain elevator reported receiving half an inch of the wet stuff in their area and Fred

Chandler at Sherley-Anderson-Pitman in Farwell said his gauge read .4.

Walter Curd of Texico reported .6 inch of moisture in his area in the first burst of showers, and another .1 during Tuesday's downfall.

Area streets were slick and the swosh-swosh of windshield wipers could be heard. County roads turned to red mud but at presstime no grade work had been done.

"We just didn't get enough rain to do any road work," said Parmer County Commissioner Archie Tarter. "We tried it and it just flakes-out," he said.

"I would love to blade those roads but there just wasn't enough wet to blade," he commented further. "We need to pray for more rain. Right now road work would just make bigger holes."

## Farwell Schools Set Exemption Deadline

Dorothy Eason, tax assessor-collector for the Farwell Independent School District, has announced that April 1 is the deadline for the receipt of Exemption Forms.

"There are forms for residence homesteads for those who qualify," she said, "and Homestead exemptions for those 65 years of age or older."

Mrs. Eason also pointed out that exemptions are also available for qualified disabled persons, "and they do not have to be 65 years of age," she said.  
Other exemptions include

disabled veterans or survivors of disabled veterans; widows or children; and Agricultural use of Open Space for land valuations.

"All of these exemption forms must be completed and returned to the tax office by the April 1 deadline," Mrs. Eason said.

Mrs. Eason said that her office has available "copies of the pamphlet 'Taxpayers' Rights, Remedies, and Responsibilities' which may be picked up during regular office hours."

## County Tables Request To Sell Old Jail Bars

Parmer County Commissioners Court has decided to table a request and "do nothing at this time" concerning a request for the purchase of the door and bars from the old county jail.

"After much discussion as to what prices might be, the fact was mentioned that the bars in question were the original equipment of the first jail built on this location," said County Judge Porter Roberts. "It was decided not to do anything about this request for now."

The Court members were told of the purchaser's request at their February 23 bi-monthly meeting.

Also at the meeting, the Court approved unanimously to grant a substitution of securities, requested by the Friona State Bank.

"The bank asked to be allowed to substitute securities pledged to the county," Roberts said. "This would substitute \$25,000 Devine ISD bonds maturing February 1, 1984, for \$25,000 Haltom City bonds, maturing March 1, 1981."

Repairs to the second floor of the courthouse are to be looked into by Roberts. "It has been brought to my attention that some repairs and wiring were needed on the second floor," he said. "After a tour of the areas in question by the entire Court, I was asked to see about getting these repairs and wiring done," added Roberts.

Bills were also paid by the Court. Precinct 1 Commissioner Ernest Anthony had recently traveled to Austin with a group of Deaf Smith County officials in support of a bill that would give the county \$125,000 per year more money from the sale of license tags.

The Court approved payment of Parmer's share of the trip, in the amount of \$130.42.

Another bill approved for payment by the Court was that received from Potter County in the amount of \$90 for a Friona

man who needed aid while in Amarillo.

"Potter County authorities took this man to the hospital for aid with a mental problem and billed his home county," explained Roberts. "This being the usual course in this type of care, the Court approved unanimously to pay this bill."

Roberts advised the commissioners that he had been contacted by a lady in Friona requesting county help in the payment of a hospital bill for her daughter. "I presented this problem to the commissioners and after much discussion as to the size of the large bill and County finances being what they are, the commissioners decided to take no action on this request," the judge said.

The following conservation work was approved:

Extension Agent Seth Ralston brought up the subject of setting time limits on the spraying of 2-4-D or derivatives of 2-4-D. "This is to be discussed in the next regular meeting on March 9," said Roberts.

## Animal Shots Clinic Set For Twin Cities

The annual Twin Cities Rabies Clinic is slated for Friday, March 20, according to Marie Christian, Texico city clerk.

The clinic is to be held at the Texico City Hall from 1-4 p.m. MST with Clovis veterinarian G.H. Kendall administering rabies, distemper and Parvo virus shots at a reduced rate to all Twin Cities pets.

According to a spokesperson at Dr. Kendall's office, the rabies shot will be administered at a cost of \$5; distemper, \$8; and Parvo virus at \$7.

Rabies is considered one of the most serious of animal diseases, and is the one most feared as it can be transmitted to humans if proper precautions are not taken.

Distemper is a highly infectious inflammatory disease found especially in young dogs causing a disordered state of mind or body.

A relatively new disease, known clinically as Parvo Viral Diarrhea, Parvo is a virus of the intestine, and can strike a dog in less than 24 hours. Once a canine contracts the dreaded virus, the animal could die in less than a day's time.

Both Texico and Farwell have ordinances requiring pets to be vaccinated against rabies and distemper, and to be registered in the city.

In Farwell, registration for dogs and cats is \$2; and in Texico the registration tags are \$1.

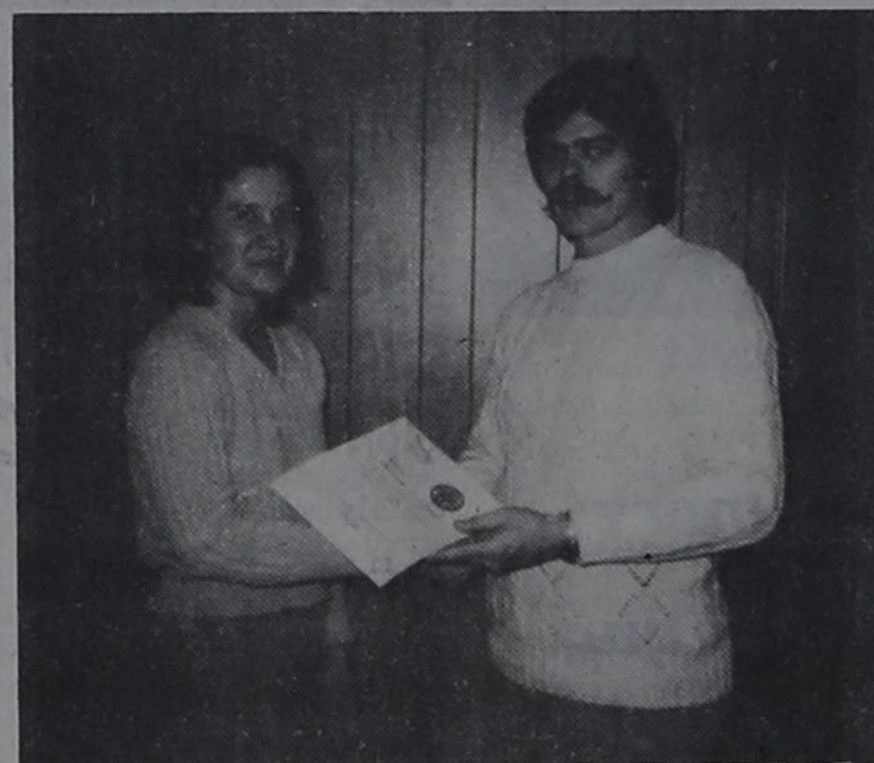

To capture the regional championship Texico's Lady Wolverines defeated San Jon and Floyd last weekend at Texico, earning the right to enter state playoff competition.

In their competition with San Jon on Friday, Texico eased in with an early first quarter lead of 12-5. Another 11 points in the second period put them ahead at the half 23-13.

Although San Jon managed to outscore the Green and White in the third quarter, Texico still retained the lead and took over the momentum in the final period to win the game with a 13 point edge.

Leading the Wolverines in points were Ruth Scott with 19 and Lisa Coffey with 14. Also pitching in were Schree Rucker with 10; Tracy Dobbs, 4;

and Becky McDonald, 2. Coffey lead in rebound action with 16, followed by Scott for 15. Also rebounding were Rucker, 5; Carletta Fitz, 4; McDonald and Jill Jesko, 3 each; Dobbs, 2; and Pam Hoyl, 1.

"Overall, I did not think we played very well," remarked coach Roy King following his team's victory. "But part of that could be contributed to San Jon. I thought they played excellent defense."

King cited rebounding as the key to the game. "Coffey and Scott completely dominated the boards," he said.

Players Schree Rucker and Tracy Dobbs were also cited by the coach for their contributions during the game. "Rucker hit some big baskets for us

when San Jon came within 5 points. And although Dobbs didn't have a great shooting night, she did give us the good leadership and ball handling that every good team has to have," he said.

"I thought we played a more relaxed game against Floyd than at any other time in the last three years," said King following Texico's win Saturday afternoon that captured for them the regional title.

"We let them get inside of our zone in the first quarter, but the girls played super defense during the second and third quarters, holding Floyd to two point each quarter," he recalled.

### Summer, fall storms boost rainfall reading

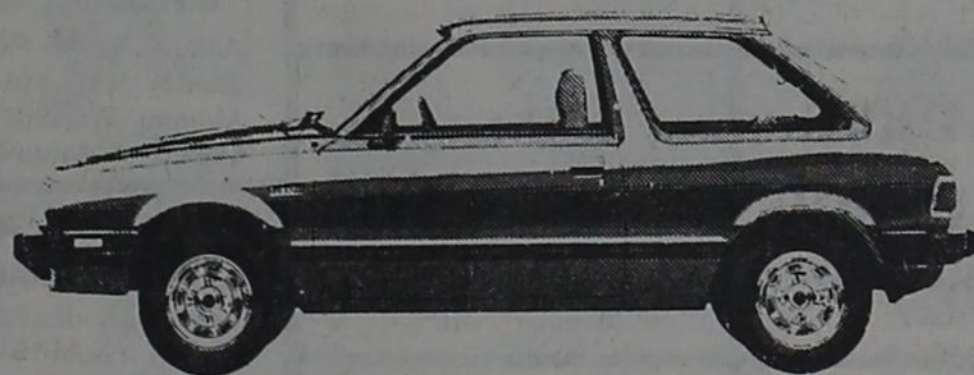

## HAVE YOU HEARD?

"... if ye have heard of the dispensation of the grace of God which is given me to you-ward..." (Eph. 3:2).

Could it be that those to whom Paul addressed his Ephesian letter had not yet heard that God had committed to him "the dispensation of grace?"

Next to the death and resurrection of Christ, the conversion of Paul and his commission to proclaim "the gospel of the grace of God" was the greatest event in history.

The apostles at Jerusalem had recognized the importance of Paul's part in the divine program. They themselves had at first been sent by Christ into "all the world," yet in Gal. 2:9 we find James, Peter and John publicly shaking hands with Paul in a solemn agreement that he should henceforth be the apostle to the nations.

Could it be that some twelve years later, when he wrote the Ephesian letter, there were any who professed the name of Christ who had not heard of Paul's special place in the program

of God as the apostle of grace? Little wonder his words "if ye have heard" carry with them a touch of sarcasm and reproach.

It is possible, of course, that there were some among them, but recently brought into the Church, who had not heard, but what seems almost impossible is that there should be even one believer at this late date who has not heard that after Christ and His kingdom were rejected and the world was ripe for prophesied judgment to fall, God intervened, saving Saul, His chief enemy on earth, and sent him forth with "the good news of the grace of God."

This good news is based, of course, upon the fact that since Christ was the spotless Lamb of God, His death is accepted by God as full satisfaction for the sinner. Thus Paul, by divine inspiration, declares that believers are "justified freely by His [God's] grace, through the redemption that is in Christ Jesus" (Rom. 3:24).

Organized by the U.S. Department of Labor and sponsored by the Texas Farmer Union Green Thumb, Inc., the week has been established to "encourage employers to recognize their older workers during this week," said Pauline Davis, area leader for the Green Thumb organization.

Mrs. Davis also pointed out that older workers "demonstrate the value of accumulated experience and wisdom acquired with age, and also contribute services that their communities might not otherwise afford."

Green Thumb director Diane Parris urges both public and private employers to recognize their older employees during this Older Worker Week.

"I've found that formal education and chronological age have nothing to do with one's ability," she said. "During their years of work, they have learned a great deal, have gained invaluable experience and have come to

appreciate and be proud of doing a good job," Mrs. Parrish added.
