Elsewhere in this issue there is a legal notice and also a story concerning a hearing on the matter of a ten per cent across-the-board increase in the salaries of the County officials and County employees that we pay or share in paying. This raising of salaries in Parmer County has been long overdue. In defense of our commissioners, we must say that funds are not as easy to come by in a county like Parmer as in one with a big business or oil field located therein.

There are two fields of public endeavor, salary wise, I feel have been neglected too long in this part of the country. One is our school teachers. Ah, that is a debatable subject with some folks, but we won't defend our views at this time, only state them. The other is in the field of political salaries, beginning with the lowest local level. Somehow or other, when a community begins to get organized and the need for governmental officials begins to be felt, the tendency is to treat it as a public duty and to set up a token salary at the best. Then the person in that job will of necessity be of independent means.

When salaries of other employees are set, they too are set low. Eventually you have public servants that are restricted to the very rich because they can afford it, the very dumb because they can't find any other work, or the very lazy because they don't aspire to anything better. When this situation is allowed to prevail, prudent management of our daily lives is put into the hands of incompetents.

Government controls our daily lives. We should demand the highest type of individual in government circles. We must, at all levels, make government employment attractive to the intelligent, industrious, and thrifty. A government that handles literally hundreds of billions of dollars cannot be managed by incompetents. We must have first rate people and we must compensate them.

I am happy to say that I think we have intelligent, honest, and competent County officials and employees. Let us make every effort to compensate them adequately for their work and effort in our behalf. The investment in better salaries will be repaid many fold in more efficient government.

Generally speaking, I am a conservative on the national level and a liberal on the local level. The more government we can keep at home, the better the return on our tax dollar. Let us strive to do for ourselves locally rather than to run to the state or federal government. All government monies come from the people in the form of taxes. There is no FREE money.

Therefore, it seems to me just good sense to get the most for our hard-earned and dearly-paid tax dollars by keeping them at home as much as possible.

## '65 News In Review

The New Year 1966 has arrived with a store of days to be filled with happiness, joy, sorrow, success and failure, while at the same time the old year 1965 has crept into the past. Here in Parmer and Curry Counties it has been much the same as over the entire country. In the following article we have tried to recall some of the major local events of the past year for our readers.

Top news in the State Line Tribune on January 8 was the ground breaking for the new Texico Baptist Church which was held on the first Sunday of the New Year.

Butch Ford and Larry Gregory were named to the All Regional South Plains football team and the County Judge appointed a Historical Survey Committee to find historical sights in Parmer County.

Jan. 15: The Texico post office which was begun in July is ready for use. Supt. Willie

Roberts of the Farwell school had his contract renewed; and Homecoming was set for the Texico school.

Jan. 22: Local Lions Club members announced that they were sponsoring Joe Helton, local businessman, for Baby Deputy Governor of District 40X; and a group of some 400 aroused citizens protested the consolidation of the Texico school with the Clovis school system.

Jan. 29: Formal opening for the Capitol Food Market was set for Feb. 1 through Feb. 6. Dr. F. M. Maddox, president of Lubbock Christian College, was selected for guest speaker at the Chamber of Commerce Banquet, New Mexico Governor Jack Campbell announced that there would be no consolidation of the Texico and Clovis schools in the foreseeable future.

Feb. 5: A bond election was called in the Texico School district for additional classrooms at the school. David Turner,

Wesley Engram and Buddy Pearce were elected to the Texico school board.

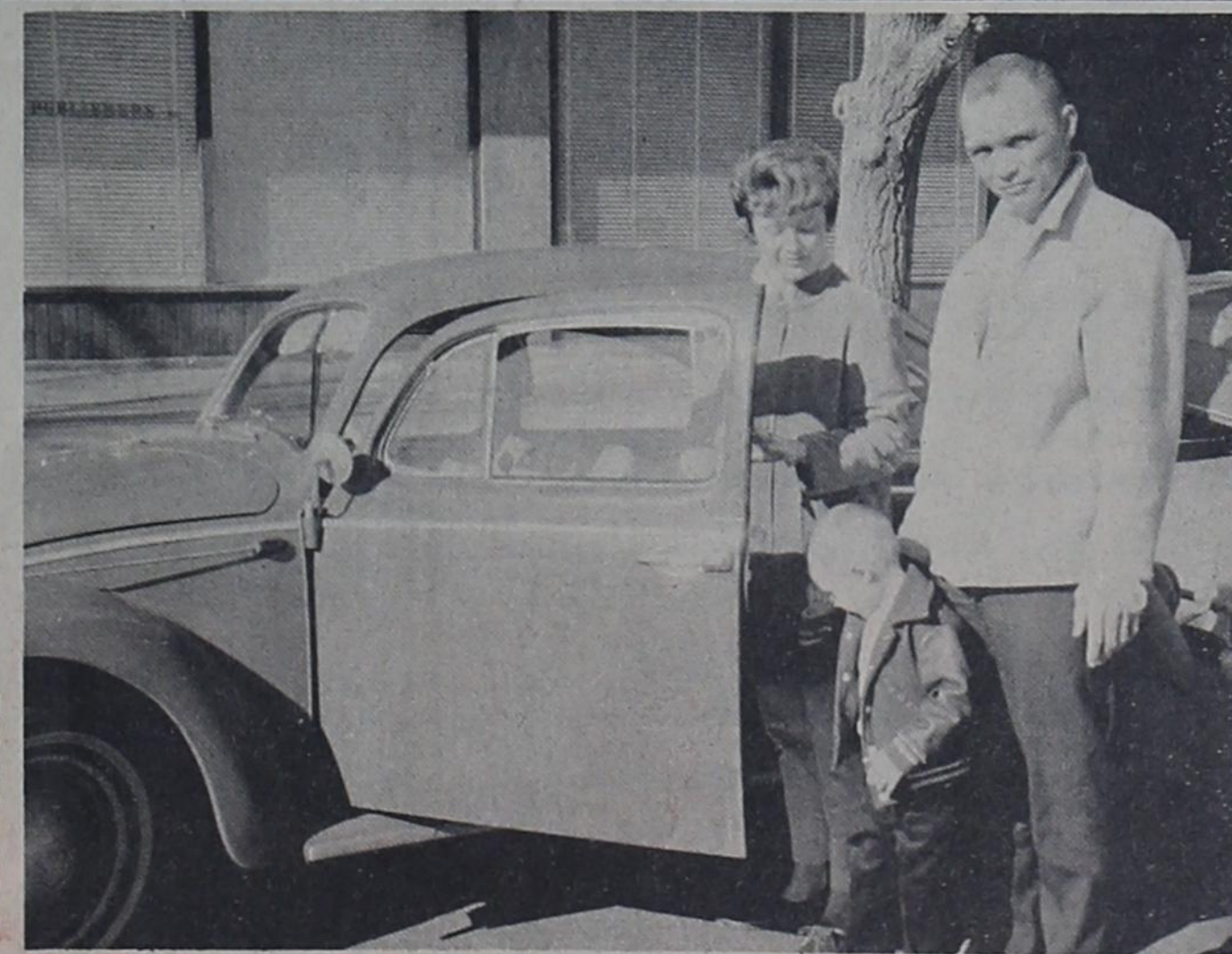
Feb. 12: Tax valuations were set for Parmer County. Farwell Steers were tied with Springlake for the District Basketball title with a play-off game scheduled for the following Saturday. Religious survey was held in Farwell on Sunday. Mothers March netted \$340 for the March of Dimes.

Feb. 19: Steers win the District Basketball Title for the fifth consecutive year. \$7,500 damage resulted from a train-truck collision in Texico-Farwell, but no one was seriously injured.

Feb. 28: Texico School patrons go to the polls to vote on \$130,000 bond issue.

March 5: The school bond issue in Texico passed by a 9-1 vote. Elmer Hargrove, Woodrow Lovelace and Carl Davis filed for the city offices in Farwell. Construction began on the

## SWPS Co. Announces Construction Program

A 1966 construction and improvement program which calls for the investment of an additional \$19,353,000 in new facilities throughout the company's service area was announced today by A. R. "Lon" Watson, president and general manager of Southwestern Public Service Company.

"Comparing our construction plans with a military operation, 1966 could be described as a year when we are going to strengthen and consolidate our position. In other words, this is a year when we are going to build into an already strong interconnected electric system new facilities which will provide even greater service dependability for our customers," Watson said.

New transmission lines, and related equipment, are the largest single investment in the 1966 program, with nearly \$7,500,000 of the total construction program designated for the construction and improvement

of the electrical highways which bring the power from the generating stations to the areas served by the electric company.

A principal result of this new construction will be that the "backbone" transmission line, or principal electric artery linking the three largest generating stations will become a 230,000 volt line. Nichols Station, northeast of Amarillo, Plant X, in Lamb County, and Cunningham Station, west of Hobbs, New Mexico are the three generating stations.

This means that early next year, it will be possible to move four times more power than we are able to now transmit between these three major plants.

"Let me emphasize that this conversion to 230,000 volts of the 'backbone,' or main, line is an addition to existing facilities, and means there will be one more way to move power throughout our system. In other words, there are other transmission routes, in addition to

this new one, which can transport the power between all of our 11 generating stations and carry the load in the event of an emergency," Watson reported.

Watson went on to point out that the generation and transmission of electric power is controlled automatically insofar as the principal transmission lines are concerned, and that the changeover to an alternate route is accomplished instantaneously in most cases.

Major construction will begin during 1966 on another 210,000 kilowatt steam-electric generating unit at Nichols Station, northeast of Amarillo. This will be the third generator installed since 1960 at this location and will increase the capability of the plant to 435,000 kilowatts. Completion of the new unit is scheduled for mid-1968.

"The continued installation of major electric generating units is, of course, the best kind of evidence of our confidence in the future of our serv-

ice area. There are many opportunities to attract small industries to this region, and a number of communities are actively engaged in well-planned industrial development programs. The advantages of this area are obvious, with our excellent climate, the optimism of our people, and good local governments. All of these will lead to new progress for the region," Watson said.

Electric power's role in meeting the municipal water needs of the region are a part of the 1966 improvement program. A 115,000 volt transmission line will be completed during the year to provide the power to pump the water from Lake Meredith to a storage reservoir near Amarillo. The Lake Meredith water is scheduled to be distributed to the 11 member cities of the Canadian River Municipal Water Authority, beginning in late 1967.

Funeral services were held from Steed Funeral Chapel on Sunday for Mrs. Nora Lee Moss, 91, who passed away at Clovis Memorial Hospital on Thursday evening. Ebb Randol, longtime family friend and minister of the Church of Christ, officiated at last rites. Burial was in the Texico Cemetery beside the body of her husband, J. A. Moss, who preceded her in death in 1952.

Mrs. Moss was born in Lone Oak, Ark., Nov. 2, 1874 and was married to J. A. Moss at Ardmore, Okla., in 1893. She moved with her family to Texico in 1907 and had lived on the farm where the family first settled until a few years ago when she moved into Clovis to make her home.

Mrs. Moss, one of the last pioneers of the area, came to Texico via covered wagon. She watched the area grow from a vast wilderness to the productive agricultural area it has become. She and her late husband were always interested in political affairs and the continuing growth and development of the area.

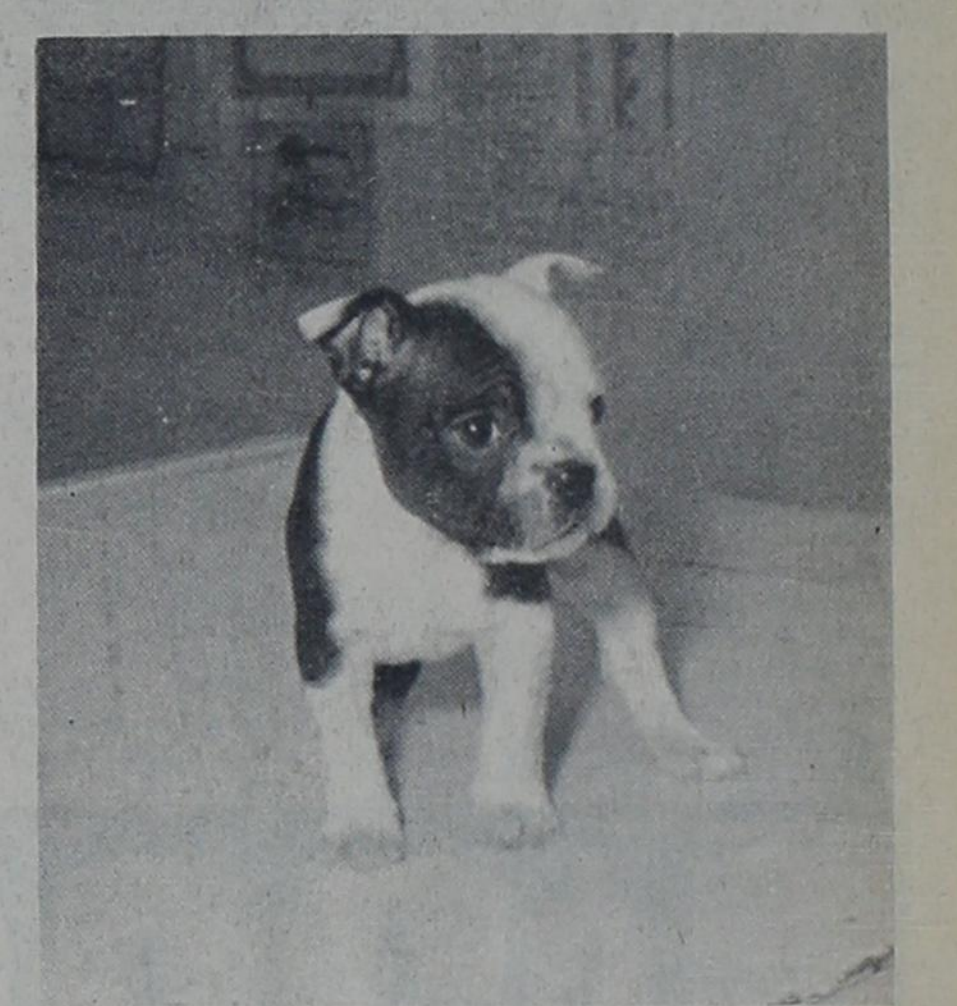

### Important Farm Program Dates And Deadlines Are Announced

- Farm operators and other persons (including landowners) should take notice of the dates and facts mentioned here.
1. Persons interested in transferring cotton acreage by sale, lease or ownership are reminded that their application for such transfer must be filed with the ASCS Office by January 3, 1966. This, of course, means the transferring ASC office.
  2. The final date for releasing cotton acreage or requesting cotton from those acres released is January 28, 1966.
  3. The sign-up period under the 1966 Cotton, Wheat, Feed Grain and Cropland Adjustment Program will start on January 24, 1966 and end April 1, 1966. The exception being that persons desiring to participate in the Cropland Adjustment Program will have until May 30, to sign an agreement.
  4. Notices of yields, payment rates and base acreages will be mailed to farm operators around the middle of January. Probably sometime between the 14th and 20th day of the month.

### Chamber Has Routine Session

The Farwell Chamber of Commerce, meeting in a routine session on Tuesday, discussed a speaker for the forthcoming Chamber banquet. No decision was reached. Although several matters were discussed, no decisions were reached on any of the matters and discussion was tabled until a later date.

### 10% Increase Proposed For County Officials

Residents of Parmer County are invited to attend an open meeting (Public Hearing) of the Parmer County Commissioners Court on January 10, 2 p.m., in the county courtroom in the courthouse at Farwell, at which time the commissioners court will review the proposed 10% raise in salary for all county officials and custodial personnel at the courthouse.

The proposed salary increases for the officials and other personnel was set up in the county budget which was approved in the fall.

Salary increases as proposed are: Tax assessor, \$5,300 to \$5,830; Deputies in the tax office, \$9,700 to \$10,670, to be divided among the three deputies; County clerk, \$5,000 to \$5,500; Deputies in the county clerk's office, \$6,400 to \$7,040 to be divided between two deputies; District clerk, \$4,500 to \$4,950; Sheriff, \$6,000 to \$6,600; Deputies and office assistant in the sheriff department, \$18,400 to \$20,240,

to be divided among five persons; County judge, \$4,000 to \$4,400 (the judge receives an additional \$2,600 from the state as ex-officio school superintendent); Stenographer in the judge's office, \$3,000 to \$3,300 (of this amount \$2,600 is paid by the state).

County Attorney, \$4,000 to \$4,400; Justice of Peace (three in county) \$1,500 to \$1,650 each; treasurer, \$4,500 to \$4,950; Commissioners, \$3,000 to \$3,300 each; Janitor at the courthouse, \$4,200 to \$4,620; county health officer, \$525 to \$577.50; County Agent, \$2,200 to \$2,420; and HD Agent, \$2,200 to \$2,420. The County Agent and the HD Agent each receive additional salaries from the state and federal governments. Not included in the proposed raise in salary is the travel expense for the County Agent and the HD Agent which will remain at \$500. In addition, the county also furnishes the County Agent with a pickup for use in his work.

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### On The Farm In Farmer County

We are planning a series of county-wide farmer meetings to help keep everyone up-to-date on the latest development in agriculture this winter. The first meeting is Thursday night, January 13, at 7 p.m. in Bovina School Cafeteria. We have three extension specialists for this meeting, James Valentine, Area Soil Chemist; W. N. Lyle, Area Irrigation Specialist; and James Murphrey, Area Farm Management Specialist.

These men will be discussing fertilizers, fertilizer recommendations, and new developments in the fertilizer industry. Value of soil and plant food lost in water run off and practical methods to reduce this will be discussed along with value and management of crop residues. Also, the management of fertilizer and water applications to get the highest net return from various crops will be discussed.

We urge everyone concerned, both farmers and businessmen, to attend this meeting on January 13 to hear the latest on fertilizers, irrigation and management of these two crop inputs. Meetings on herbicides, diseases and insects will be held in February and March. Also a meeting for livestock producers mainly on beef cattle developments will be held in February.

By attending this series of meetings a person can learn about recent developments and the latest recommended production practices that have been proven by research to be practical.

again allow hogs to set new record high prices. For the last half, prices will be influenced by how fast the apparent expansion in hog numbers builds up. But, based on past production cycles, there is real danger of over-expansion and low prices in 1967.

**CATTLE LICE**  
Cattlemen should be on the lookout for the annual invasion of lice on their livestock. These pests can take a real bite out of profits unless they are controlled.

We suggest that livestock producers get a copy of Extension publication, MP-691, "Texas Guide for Controlling External Parasites of Livestock and Poultry."

This publication is "chuck-full" of information on insecticide formulations and how to use them in controlling flies, lice, mites, ticks, fleas and cattle grubs.

Get a head start on lice this fall and winter by starting a sound control program now. The above bulletin is a good guide for such a program and is available without cost from my office.

### Whats Cooking At Farwell School

**LIVESTOCK LOOKOUT FOR 1966**

Also, 1966 may well represent one of the most profitable years experienced by sheep and lamb producers since the early 1950's.

The room and tea table were decorated with Christmas symbols.

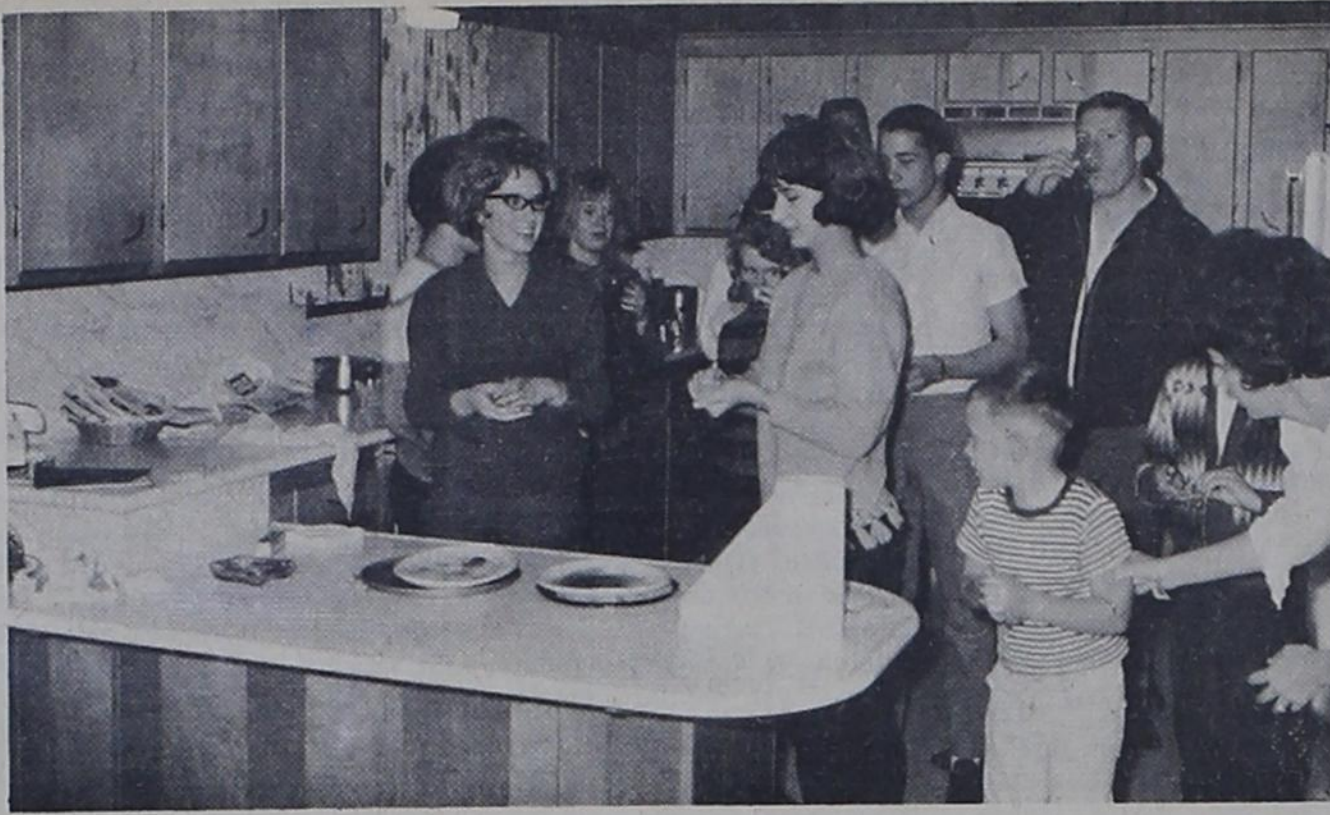

## Seven Rural Accidents In County In November

The Texas Highway Patrol investigated seven accidents on rural highways in Parmer County during the month of November, according to Sergeant W. E. Wells, Highway Patrol Supervisor of this area.

These wrecks accounted for one person injured and an estimated property damage of \$5,460.00.

The rural traffic accident summary for this county from January through November of 1965 shows a total of 123

crashes. As a result of these crashes, there were four persons killed and 69 persons injured. The estimated property damage amounted to \$104,871.00.

"If you think drinking and driving is not such a big problem as we picture it -- you are wrong," the Sergeant stated. "Drinking drivers are involved in more than half the fatal Christmastime accidents, a higher percentage than the one-out-of-three proportion during

the rest of the year. The problem is not only the heavy drinker but also the social drinker and even the person who only had a few at the office party or on the way home from work. Just a little alcohol takes a shortcut toward a driving accident by reducing judgment, self-control and driving reactions. The best solution is not to drive at all after drinking."

The Patrol Supervisor offered these suggestions to emphasize holiday traffic safety: restrain impatience, haste, inconsiderateness and preoccupation that may creep into the holiday attitudes. Know the safe winter driving techniques and use them. Obey the regulations and signs. And when you are the pedestrian, don't take chances with the traffic by jaywalking, rushing, obscuring vision with packages, or failing to allow extra alertness for dusk and hazardous weather conditions.

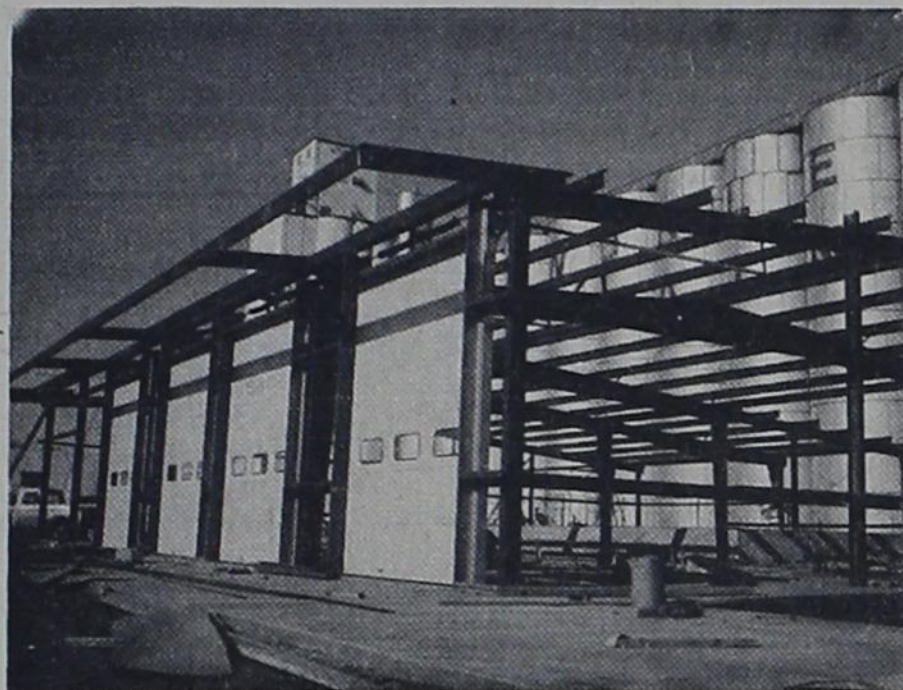

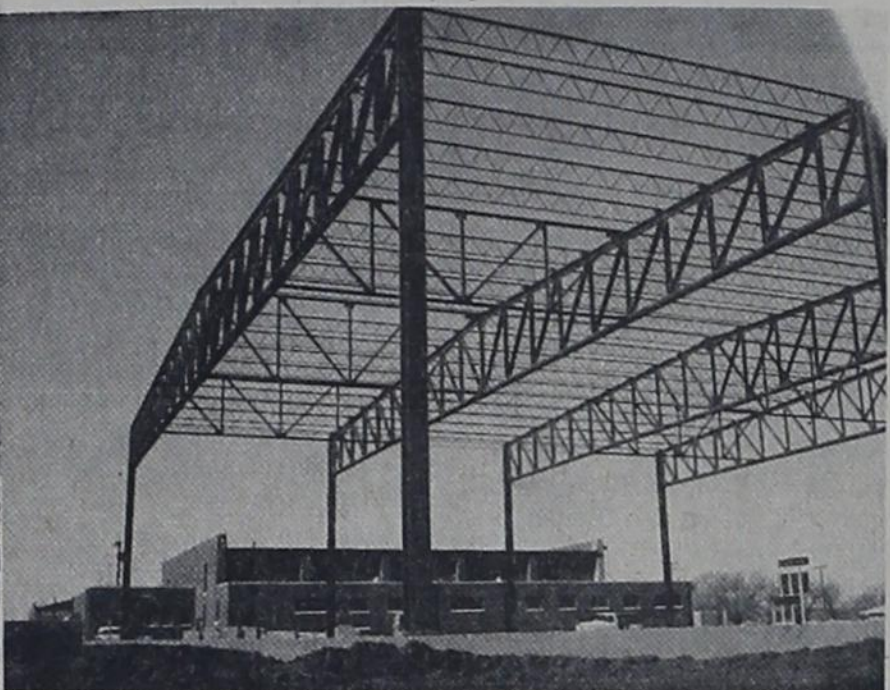

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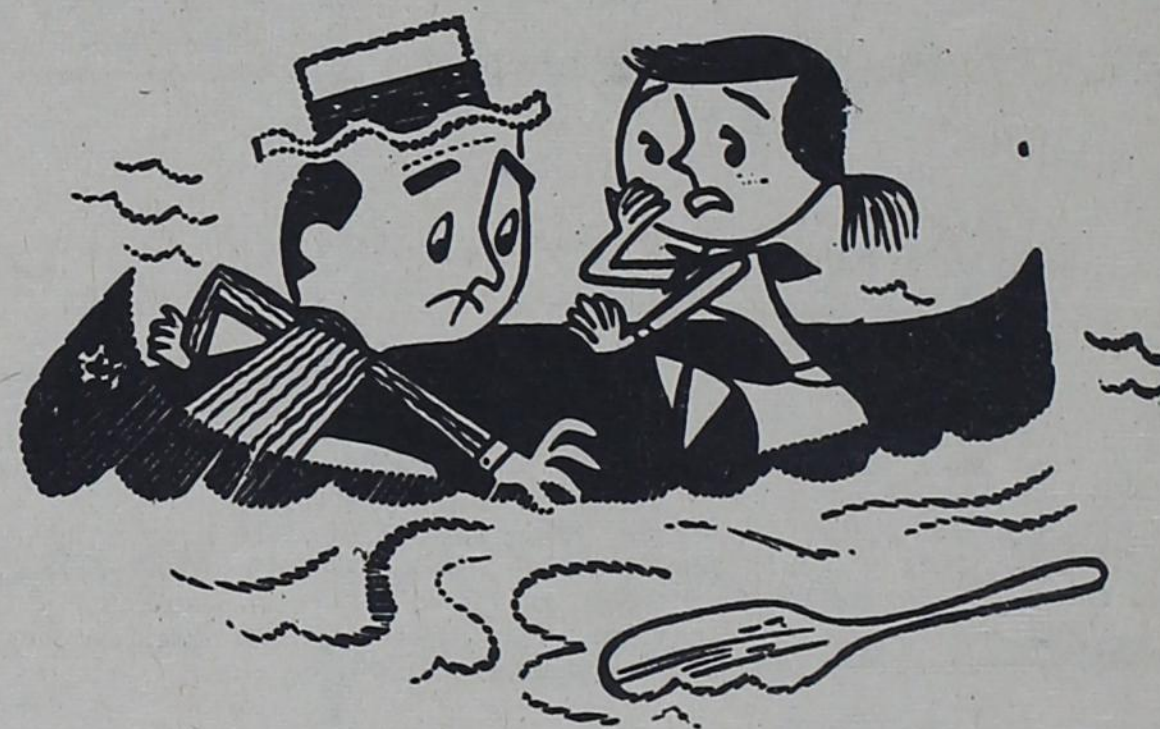
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
