Texico Council Sets Conference Oct. 6

Texico City Council, meeting Tuesday night in its bi-monthly session, set the pre-construction conference for its water improvement project for October 6 at 10 a.m. MDT at the city hall. Present will be the project engineers, contractors, Farmers Home Administration

officials, and city officials. The conference is open to the public, and will include the signing and letting of the construction contracts, as well as an explanation of the

At 11 a.m. the same day, the formal groundbreaking ceremonies will take place at KKR Park, with all officials present.

In other action by the city dads, discussion was held on mobile home variance within the city. It was decided that the variances will be nontransferable.

Sand in the waterlines was another matter the council discussed. Although some action had already been taken, the discussion brought forth other options for consideration in

Mayor Walter Kaltwasser has proclaimed this time as "Child Abuse Prevention Week" in Farwell. In his proclamation, Mayor Kaltwasser challenges "the people of Farwell and surrounding areas to educate yourselves of the opportunities available to help abused children."

Through the newspapers and airways, information concerning child abuse and neglect is being distributed. You will find pamphlets about the subject in many local businesses."

That kids should be seen and not hurt is the philosophy behind the Parmer County Child Welfare Board. The rate of child abuse and neglect in Texas, and in Parmer County, is tragically high, said Rev.

"The statistics are always surprising to me, but what always moves me most is to

realize that over 50 percent of those abused and neglected are too young (under six) to seek help. You soon discover that the older children are either too confused or too terrified to seek help," said the chairman, "so it is our responsibility to

help these children." In Parmer County, the Child Welfare Board consists of 12 members from all parts of the county. "These are men and women who are vitally interested in protecting children. Your County Commissioners, working with the Department of Human Resources, created this Board over three years ago, to meet the obvious needs in Parmer County,"

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

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

Seagraves Soars By Stubborn Steers, 24-6

The Farwell Steers dropped their homecoming outing 24-6 last Friday night at Steer Stadium, in the same way they have lost two other games this year. The big plays got away from them. The visiting Eagles scored on a 36-yard pass play and two romps of 67 and 54 yards, all by scatback Mike Nelson, with a field goal sandwiched in between the

The game opened with the Steers receiving the kickoff, and quickly running off three first downs, two by Santiago Lucio on runs of seven and 12 yards and the third one by quarterback Alan Eubank's pass to Roger Robertson, before losing the ball on downs in visitor territory.

Seagraves retaliated by taking the ball from their own 35 for two first downs before lofting a long pass to Nelson in the end zone. The PAT kick was true, and with 3:29 left in the first quarter, Farwell trailed 7-0.

The Steers held the ball for the duration of the quarter, making two more first downs. On the first play to start the second quarter, the drive ended with a Steer pass reception and subsequent fumble which was recovered by the Eagles on their own 33-yard stripe.

The Steer defense quickly forced an Eagle fumble with the Blue and White recovering to begin a long drive.

Behind the running of Lucio and Eubank, and two completed passes to Robertson, the Steers drove deep into Eagle territory with five first downs before finally losing the ball on tries. The Steer defense again held firm, and with a pass interception by Jimmy Bernal, the half closed out on the 7-0

The second half opened with Raymond Sierra's kickoff deep into Eagle territory. The visitors set up shop on their own 20, and on the fourth play from scrimmage, Nelson scampered 67 yards for the second Eagle touchdown. The conversion kick was good, and it was 14-0 with 9:50 left in the

drive but after one first down, the next series of plays resulted in another Blue and White fumble and recovery by Seagraves. After three first downs, the Eagles, on a 4th and 5 from the Steer 6, kicked a field goal with 1:57 left, and the third quarter ended with the Eagles holding a 17-0 lead.

Following the kickoff, th Steers made one first down or a 15-yard completed pass Lucio, but had to punt on their next series of downs as th third quarter ended.

The Eagles quickly iced the game when on the third play of the fourth quarter, that #2 Nelson again broke loose for 54-yard TD jaunt, and with th PAT kick, took a 24-0 lead.

After one first down on a completed pass to Robertson, the Steer offense bogged down and they had to punt. Seagraves made one first down, but on the next series the Steer defense held and the Blue and White took over on downs.

On the first play from the Steer 40, Lucio broke through the Eagle defense for a 60-yard run that put the Blue and White on the score board for six points, with 4:43 left in the p.m. ball game. The two-point conversion was stopped short, and the visitors held what proved the final score of 24-6.

In commenting on the game, Coach Bruce Dollar said, "We played real well in the first half, but we had some mental letdowns in the second half which cost us the game."

He also said he was pleased with the effort the boys put out, but "we just made too many mistakes."

The Steer games have been drawing good crowds all year long, said Coach Dollar, with last week's game having a really big crowd due to the homecoming activities. "We appreciate all of the support we've been getting from the fans and the entire community. They've really been great," he
