

Former Texico Boy Dies In Jap Prision

Pvt. George B. Duke, son of Mr. Machines Not Made and Mrs. W. B. Duke of Clovis and For Modern Times formerly of Texico, a member of New Mexico's famous 200th, has been reported dead by the War Department.

In a telegram received Sunday by his mother, information was to the effect that Pvt. Duke, who had been reported as a Japanese prisoner of war, had "died in the Philiopines". The date of his death was

Pct. Duke, who was only 20 years old, would have been in service two years on July 11, Mrs. Duke report-

Wheat Shipments Near 700 Carloads

Roberts Reported Killed

ported as "missing in action" has been listed by the German government as having been "killed in action", it was revealed in a telegram from the War Department received here early last week.

Still clinging to the slim chance that their son might yet be held as a prisoner, the parents of the local boy have postponed a memorial service scheduled to be held in his honor at Lone Oak, Texas, next Sunday.

They point out that some press dispatches announcing the death of American flyers over Europe indicate reports from the German government in the past have proved to be false, and that boys actually reported to have been shot down have later turned up safely in Alliea

The message received by Mr. and Mrs. Roberts from the War Department would indicate that there might be some question as to the fate of the local flyer. It read:

"The German government has reported to the International Red Cross your son has been killed in action on June 22.'

All the hopes of the bereaved parents that Lt. Roberts is still alive are pinned to the word "reported" in the foregoing message.







Dr. Chandler believes the chances for accidents are too great to be worth the risk if people undertake to can non-acid vegetables or meats by the boiling water bath method. Outbreaks of botulism will almost certainly occur." he says. "It is like having rattlesnakes on your golf course. You may keep your ball on the fairways and treat rattlesnakes with impunity, but sooner or latter somebody a little less careful will suffer. By comparison (with botulism) rattlesnake venom is only

mildly poisonous." Bacteria that cause botulism grow in non-acid vegetables when strictly protected from air. Dr. Chandler there is one case on record where the spores survived heating and germinated after 22 months. The poison produced is so deady that a person has been known to die after eating one piece of a string bean.


AUSTIN-Following recent sug gestions for comfortable and saf living during hot summer days, Di George W. Cox, State Health Offi cer, today released a statement con cerning the danger of over exposur to the sun.

"Sun stroke is not thought to be due to the heat of the sun, but to certain direct effects of the sun or the human brain. It is likely to occur after the sun has shone excess ively on the back of the neck and head," Dr. Cox explained. "This can be prevented by protecting the head and back of the neck from the sunshine," he added.

Dr. Cox asserted that exposure of the skin to the sun has some virtue since the action of the sunshine tends to kill the germs on the skin. Further, sunshine produces vitamin D from the fats in the skin and this product is absorbed and used by the

"In general the good effects of sunshine are not due to the heat rays but ultraviolet rays," Dr. Cox stated. "It must be remembered, however, that it is these same rays which burn the skin and extensive application of direct sunshine to the skinmay produce painful and severe burns which actually may endanger life."

The State Health Officer advises those who wish to obtain an extensive suntan to get it by slow degrees. Expose small portions of the skin to the sun for a short period of time. When tanning is established, exposing a greater area for a longer period of time should prove safe and comfortable.



Some cotton improvement areas in Texas have reported increases in return of more than \$7 an acre.


