Immediately we knew that we were among the uninformed, and could not for the life of us recall any name associated in the past election with a candidate running for that office. Of course, we have a bad habit of remembering political names only when they spend a modest sum advertising in the Tribune. Last Friday we were given the Cook's Tour of the new Southwestern Public Service coal-fired Tolk Station, east of Muleshoe. It is a huge plant and is in the process of being doubled in size already.


SPS is a Golden Spread asset which helps us all. It not only produces juice for all its customers, but it is the primary source of power for some 19 electric cooperatives throughout the entire area. It now has, has had, and will continue to have power available for future industrial and residential use. The same cannot be said for many areas of the country.

It has demonstrated a remarkable ability to plan ahead for our growth. It also plans and builds its own plants. It has been able to get its new Tolk Station on line at about one-half the cost for similar generating plants in other parts of the country.

This ability to do its own planning and engineering is reflected in lower electric rates. Now we know you may hoot at the term "lower electric rates" but in comparison to others, we really are better off.

SPS's decision to go to coal as a primary boiler fuel was taken several years before the rise in natural gas costs. This business acumen is only one bit of evidence that, in spite of the charges of certain politicians, utility executives are not money gouging ogres, but folks trying to see that sometime in the future when you flip the switch, the light bulb works.

There will be other times set aside for the public to tour that imposing facility and we recommend that you avail yourself of the next one which comes along. You will be impressed.

T. J. Kittrell Wins Grand Prize Packet

T.J. Kittrell of Farwell outguessed 404 total entrants in the 12 weeks of the 1982 Merchants Football Contest to

win the Grand Prize. Kittrell was also the Grand Prize winner in 1970, winning two tickets to the Cotton Bowl in Dallas on New Year's Day, 1971. Also included in the those days was \$50. Second place winner received two tickets to the Sun Bow plus \$25:

The grand prize packet consists of two tickets to the Dallas Cowboy-New Orleans Saints football game in Texas Stadium on December 19, one night's lodging at the Regent Hotel, and transportation to and from the stadium, plus \$50 in expense money.

Kittrell picked nine correct games in the last week of the contest to surge ahead of Roy King of Texico who picked only six. The two men were tied for the lead in the contest the

week before. With a total of 108 points in the overall contest, Kittrell guessed correctly 75 percent of the 144 possible points in the 12 weeks of the contest - putting him two points ahead of all other contestants.

It is important to leave adequate crop residue on the soil surface to protect the soil from water and wind erosion. By decreasing the erosion occurring with crop residues,

Public Safety Dept. Urges Safe Driving

Major C.W. Bell, Commander of the Texas Department of Public Safety, Region 5, said, "As we approach Thanksgiving Day weekend, all of us are making plans of one kind or another for observance of this traditional season of the year. Many DPS officers will make plans of a different kind. They will be on duty to stimulate safety-consciousness throughout this feastive holiday."

During the last Thanksgiving holiday weekend, Texas experienced 53 fatal accidents and 57 traffic fatalities. Major Bell said, "Speed and alcohol are the main contributing factors in the majority of traffic deaths in Texas.'

A total of 4,701 fatalities was recorded on our streets and highways for 1981 and statistics show 923 fatal accidents caused 1.082 deaths and 17.343 injury accidents that caused 27,907 injuries in Texas that involved a drunk driver, according to Major Bell.

Texas has no law requiring chemical tests on drivers in fatal accidents and it is probable that more than 50 percent of the deceased drivers in Texas were driving while intoxicated and were not reported as DWI."

The Texas Department of Public Safety urges all motorists to avoid the use of alcohol when driving. Let's all slow down a little and live a lot.

the finer, more easily erodible soil particles remain in the field where needed instead of blown along fence rows or washed into creek beds.

Crop residues left on the soil surface not only help prevent erosion but improve the soil tilth by increasing the organic matter content of the soil. By increasing the organic matter content, the soil is capable of taking in greater amounts of rainfall and reducing runoff. Also crop residues left on the soil surface shade the ground and help prevent the evaporation of the moisture in the soil which can make the difference between a following crop

emerging or not. Most of the cropland in Parmer County should be maintained with approximately 1000 and 1750 lbs. of residue on the soil surface of clay loam and fine sandy loam soils, respectively, until the seedbed for the next crop is prepared. Residues can be maintained on the surface by using tillage equipment such as a chisel, field cultivator, or tandem disk which covers only about 20-25 per cent of the residues with

each tillage operation. One way disk, offset disk, moldboard plow, and listers should not be used until preparation for a clean-till seedbed is needed because about 50-90 per cent of the residue is covered by each tillage operation with these implements.

In order to maintain 1000 to 1750 lbs. of residue on the soil surface, there is a guide for estimating residue production from projected yields of crops.

A corn crop which yields 200 bushels/acre will produce about 14,400 lbs. of residue; 20 bushel wheat will produce "Many drivers are not about 2000 lbs. of residue; 1 tested," Bell said, "because bale cotton will produce about 1500 lbs. of residue; and 3000 lbs/acre grain sorghum will produce about 4050 lbs of residue/acre.

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

Prairie Dog County-wide **Control Program Formed**

Several producers attended a November 1, concerning Prairie Dog Control. Mike Yeary, area predator control officer with the U.S. Wildlife Service, presented the program.

Those in attendance agreed to form a county-wide control program, and to encourage their neighbors to participate in the program. Bob Wilson, Bovina, was elected as chairman of the control program.

It was recommended to have meeting at the Bovina bank on a two-step control program. The first step would be to treat with the zinc phosphide oats this winter and then to use phostoxin tablets in the spring. These products are available from the U.S. Wildlife Service for a fee.

December 1st is the deadline for signing up. All interested producers are urged to contact Bob Wilson of Bovina or Seth Ralston, the county agent, for additional details.

Venison Traditional Holiday Food

holiday turkey, try barbecued venison. "Venison was an important part of the first American Thanksgiving and many successful deer hunters will have fresh venison in their freezers this year," says Mae Martha Johnson, Extension food and nutrition specialist for New Mexico State University.

Since game animals lead such active lives, their muscles keep firm and relatively lean. To make this tougher meat tender, cook it as you do lean beef-slowly with moist heat at low temperatures. Use tenderizing methods if necessary.

For barbecuing a roast, one of the best tenderizing methods is to marinate with an acid, such as lemon juice, tomato juice or vinegar. To make your own marinade, mix garlic salt, salt and pepper with equal parts of worcestershire sauce and your two favorite steak sauces. Use this as a baste,

Wild game fat becomes rancid quickly so you'll need to trim fat closely. Rub the roast with butter, beef suet, bacon fat or sour cream to put back moisture, richness and flavor. Baste with additional fat. let it stand in the refrigerator at least 24 hours.

For outdoor cooking, place

If you want an interesting roast in an aluminum pan and witch from the traditional wrap with foil. When the coals are glowing, set on grill and cover. Allow 20 to 25 minutes

Try this savory roast served piping hot. Game fat solidifies

SAVORY ROAST

5 lbs. roast, trim fat 1/4 c. cider vinegar 1 Tbs. flour 4 c. chili sauce or catsup 1 tsp. worcestershire sauce

1 tsp. dry mustard ½ tsp. chili powder 2 tsp. salt ¼ tsp. pepper

2 Tbs. honey or brown sugar 4 strips bacon ½ c. butter or margarine 2 c. hot water

Wipe roast with damp paper towel. Make a paste of vinegar, chile sauce or catsup, one tablespoon flour, worcestershire sauce, mustard, chili powder, salt, pepper and honey or brown sugar. Lay strips of bacon over top and hold in place with toothpicks. Dot with butter or margarine and pour water around meat (in aluminum pan). Wrap in aluminum Cover roast with marinade and and place on grill. Baste occasionally. Use flour to thicken drippings for gravy. Serves eight.

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


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
