Hail Damages Crops In Okla. Lane Area

Crops in the Oklahoma Lane area were severely damaged by heavy winds and hail Friday afternoon while other parts of the county received only minor rain showers and high winds and dust storms. The hail in the Oklahoma Lane area was spotted and seemed to follow no direct line; however some wheat crops in the Troy Christian vicinity, south of Bovina, received heavy damage.

In Texico-Farwell, heavy

dust and high winds caused some damage to trees and homes, with at least one plate glass window blown from a business building in Texico. The winds and dust were followed by a heavy deluge of rain which lasted only a short time. Temperatures dipped sharply and remained in the high 50's until afternoon on Saturday.

Heavy hail damage was also reported in the Friona-Hub area; however the storm in that vicinity was not accompanied by the high winds and blowing dust.

Okla. Lane Area --

Green Bugs Discovered In Parmer County

Green bugs have already been discovered in Parmer County in the Oklahoma Lane area in volunteer grain sorghum and Johnson grass, according to Ronny McNutt, Parmer County Agricultural agent.

These reports indicate that an early control program for green bugs is in order with emphasis on weed control and eradication. Herbicide is most effective in eradication of Johnson grass and weeds when the plant is in the young succulent stage of growth as it is at this time. The Johnson grass and weeds not only compete for water, nutrients and sunlight, but may also serve as a habitat

for insects and other plant diseases.

Rainfall is required to move the herbicides into the ground, according to the county agent. Some heavily treated soil will remain sterile for two or three years. Shorter periods of sterilization can be obtained by use of a mixture of sodium TCA and dalapon.

Good soaking rains in the past few weeks have been both a hindrance and a boon to area farmers. Residents in all sections of the county report varying amounts of rain in the past week, with the most severe rain and hail falling in the Friona-Hub area on Friday evening.

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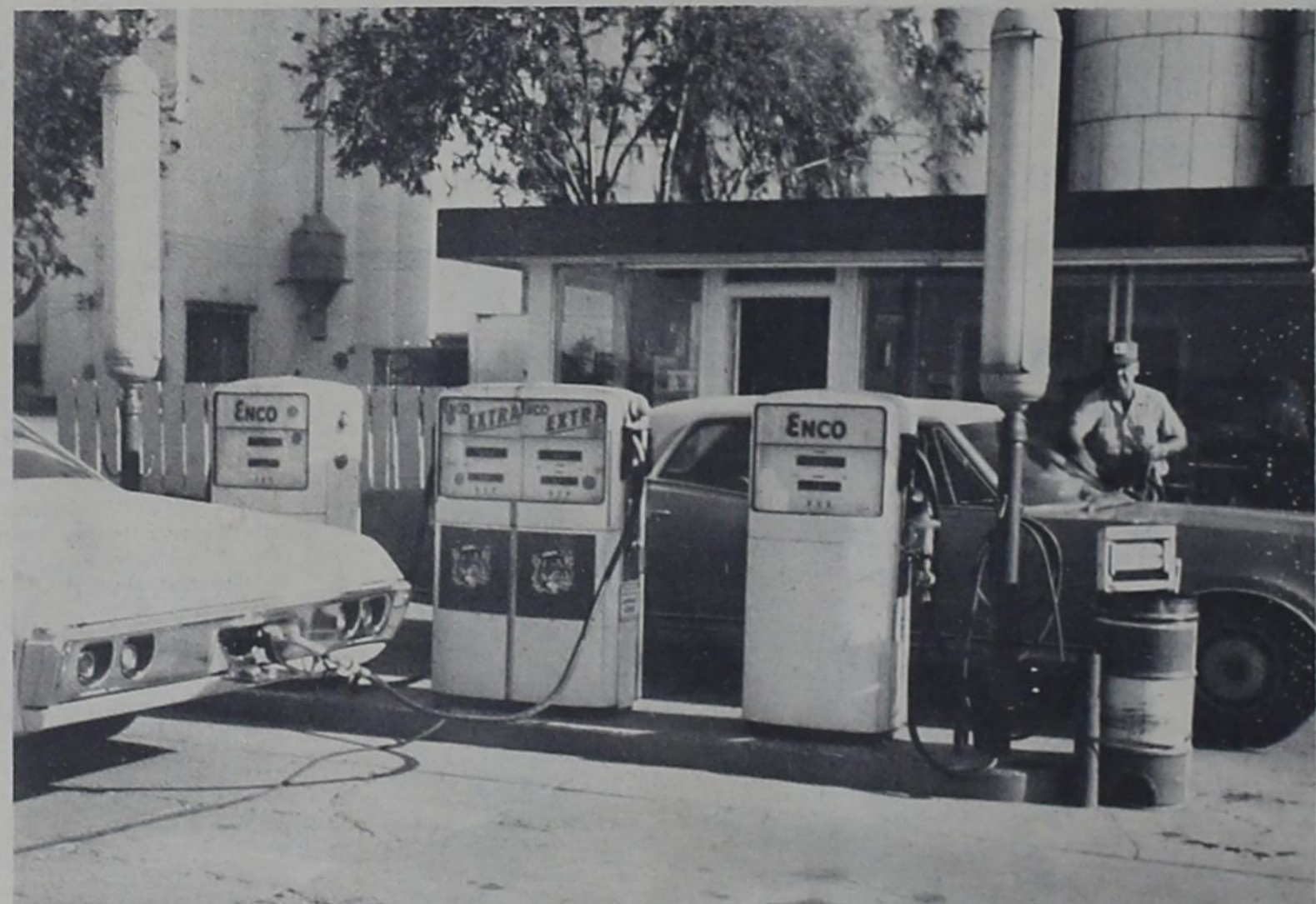
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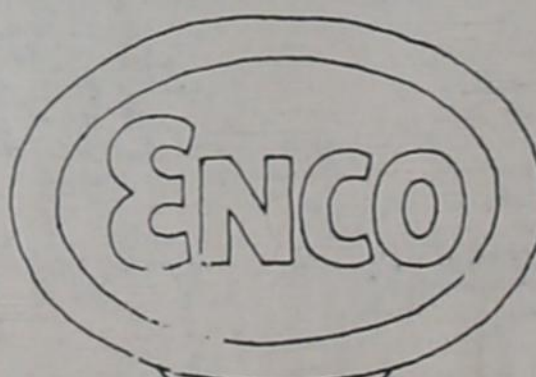
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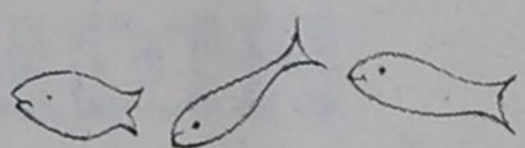

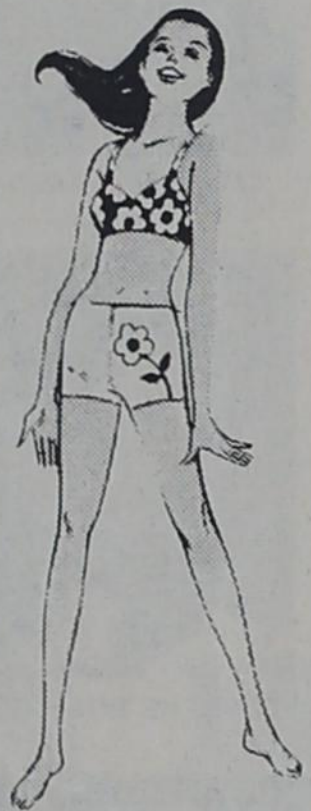

PUBLIC NOTICE Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NUMBER NINE ON THE BALLOT (HJR8)

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS: Section 1. That Section 5, Article III, Constitution of the State of Texas, as amended, be amended to read as follows:

"Section 5. The Legislature shall meet in regular session each year at such time as may be provided by law and at other times as convened by the Governor. When convened in odd-numbered years in regular session, the Legislature shall devote the first thirty days to the introduction of bills and resolutions, acting upon emergency appropriations, passing upon the confirmation of the recess appointees of the Governor and such emergency matters as may be submitted by the Governor in special messages to the Legislature; provided that during the succeeding thirty days of such session the various committees of each House shall hold hearings to consider all bills and resolutions and other matters then pending; and such emergency matters as may be submitted by the Governor; provided further that during the following sixty days the Legislature shall act upon such bills and resolutions as

may be then pending and upon such emergency matters as may be submitted by the Governor in special messages to the Legislature; provided, however, either House may otherwise determine its order of business during this session by an affirmative vote of four-fifths of its membership. "Regular sessions in even-numbered years, commencing in 1972, shall not exceed sixty days and shall be limited to legislation on the subjects of providing funds for the support of functions and activities of the state government and emergency matters submitted by the Governor in messages to the Legislature. At each regular session, commencing in 1971, appropriations shall be made for the support of functions and activities of the state government for the next fiscal year. Sec. 2. The foregoing constitutional amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this state at an election to be held on August 5, 1969, at which election the ballots shall be printed to provide for voting for or against the proposition: "The constitutional amendment to provide for annual legislative sessions."

PUBLIC NOTICE Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NUMBER FOUR ON THE BALLOT (SJR6)

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS: Section 1. That Section 2, Article VIII, Constitution of the State of Texas, be amended to read as follows:

"Section 2. All occupation taxes shall be equal and uniform upon the same class of subjects within the limits of the authority levying the tax; but the legislature may, by general laws, exempt from taxation public property used for public purposes, all real and personal property owned by a nonprofit water supply corporation which is reasonably necessary for, and is used in, operation of the corporation in the acquisition, storage, transportation and sale of water as authorized as its sole legal purpose; actual places or (of) religious worship, also any property owned by a church or by a strictly religious society for the exclusive use as a dwelling place for the ministry of such church or religious society, and which yields no revenue whatever to

such church or religious society; provided that such exemption shall not extend to more property than is reasonably necessary for a dwelling place and in no event more than one acre of land; places of burial not held for private or corporate profit; all buildings used exclusively and owned by persons or associations of persons for school purposes and the necessary furniture of all schools and property used exclusively and reasonably necessary in conducting any association engaged in promoting the religious, educational and physical development of boys, girls, young men or young women operating under a state or national organization of like character; also the endowment funds of such institutions of learning and religion not used with a view to profit; and when the same are invested in bonds or mortgages, or in land or other property which has been and shall hereafter be bought in by such institutions under foreclosure sales made to satisfy or protect such

Water Development Board to execute contracts or issue revenue bonds when such contracts or bonds are not secured by the general credit of the state.

The foregoing constitutional amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this state at an election to be held on Tuesday, August 5, 1969, at which election all ballots shall be printed to provide for voting for or against the proposition: "The constitutional amendment broadening the powers of the Texas Water Development Board and the purposes of the Texas Water Development Fund; eliminating the interest limitations on Texas Water Development Bonds; raising the authorized amount of Texas Water Development Bonds by \$3,500,000,000; extending the maturity schedule on Texas Water Development Bonds; eliminating the procedures for curtailing and the curtailment date of financial assistance to be provided by the Texas Water Development Board."
