

The unseasonably warm weather combined with the Easter break in the local school program have combined to give us a preview of the summer months ahead. There has been a goodly number of youngsters riding bicycles and otherwise playing in or near the streets and thereby creating unexpected traffic hazards for the local motorists. With the advent of summertime temperatures and longer daylight hours, the motoring public will be called upon to exercise more than usual caution as they go about the Twin Cities. Let us all be careful and not be the unhappy party to a youthful tragedy.

It is well for the older folks to take cognizance of the small fry and the hazards they pose, but it is also necessary for parents to have a heart-to-heart talk with their kiddies and point out the dangers to them and then insist that they, too, exercise caution when in the streets. We have noticed that when a fire siren calls the firemen to the station, many kids riding bicycles pay no attention to the extra emergency. It should be impressed upon the youngsters that the siren means danger and that they will also have a responsibility to make the streets as safe as possible. Real safety is a two-sided problem and some responsibility must be shown by anyone who is old enough to be accorded the privilege of using the public streets.

Also we have seen the beginnings of a community problem in regard to the disposing of paper cups and other containers for various soft drinks. This is almost entirely a youthful problem. Very few adults buy this type of refreshment and those who do are more apt to place the used containers in receptacles. We have personally seen several instances of youngsters deliberately, and with no thought, throw large paper containers down where they were and let them blow away to create a disposal problem for some homeowner, or to add to unsightly litter up and down the streets. Community pride should extend to all levels. It cannot be only an adult matter as we must begin early to instill a sense of responsibility in our upcoming generation. Ecology and litter are everybody's problem and will take everybody's cooperation to solve.

Dry continues to be the situation across much of the State of Texas and certainly in our locality. It is difficult for us up on the baldies to associate Texas with records in rainfall, yet Texas does hold two world records for rainfall -- 22 inches at D'Hanis on May 31, 1935, in ten hours and 45 minutes, and 36.4 inches at Thrall on September 9, 1921, in 18 hours. And even last year San Marcos received almost 7.5 inches in one day. At that rate we don't know if we envy those folks or not.

Man's unending service to mankind is the basis of many of our national programs and we recently heard of a heartwarming incident in that respect. It seems that a young man from a small town in South Texas had spent a long time reaching his heart's desire and that was to become a Doctor of Optometry. After he reached his goal, he was struck with the need for his profession in many of the harder places to reach in the world. Well, to make a long story short, he finally located a small place in the island chain extending out from Alaska and settled down to a lifetime of service to the natives in that area. Thereafter, he became known far and wide as the optical Aleutian.

Members of the New Mexico Junior Rodeo Association are getting ready for the two-performance rodeo planned at Farwell Arena by the Texico Riding Club on April 24 and 25. Entries for the rodeo close Friday, April 16.

First performance of the rodeo will begin at 7:30 p.m. Saturday and because of the change to Daylight Savings Time on the next day, the performance on Sunday will begin at 2:30 p.m. rather than at 1 p.m. as previously announced.

Other activities in conjunction with the Saturday event include a barbecue supper to be served at 5 p.m. by Texico Riding Club members and sponsors at the rodeo grounds. Adult plates will be \$1.25 and children's under 12 years of age will be 75 cents. Also on Saturday night, a \$45 pair of cowboy boots will be awarded. Commissioners Okay Ambulance Support

Farmer County Commissioners voted Monday in favor of helping support the county ambulance service which is headquartered in Friona. The present operator of the ambulance service, Claborn's of Friona, had voiced a request for help in keeping the service in operation in the county and had stated that they must have assistance in the financial operation of the concern.

After much discussion and somewhat heated debate on the subject, the commissioners voted 3-1 to contribute \$420 per month to the ambulance service. Voting for approval were Raymond Treider, Charlie Jefferson and Tom Lewellen. Guy Cox cast the lone opposing vote. Judge Archie Tarter com-

mented that he felt the county should help support the service if that was the only way it could exist, citing examples of need for the ambulance to continue its service throughout the county.

Earlier, the City of Friona had agreed to help with subsidizing the service by contributing \$200 per month to the needed \$720 as quoted by the ambulance service. It was believed that the City of Bovina would be agreeable to participate on a "per capita" basis for helping continue the service, but the City of Farwell, which has a new emergency ambulance vehicle operated by the Fire Department, voted not to help with the subsidization.

May 3 Final Date To Report Wheat Acres

The Farmer County ASCS office this week reminds county farmers that May 3 is the final date for reporting 1971 wheat acreage. The farm operator is responsible for reporting this acreage and there can be no wheat program benefits earned by a farm unless the wheat acreage is timely reported.

The ASCS office points out that this is true even though there may be no wheat seeded on the farm and that the farmer is substituting feed grain. The wheat acreage should be reported whether or not the farm is participating in the program.

Leroy Johnson 1970 Conservation Farmer

Leroy Johnson who farms in the Hub Community has been named the Conservation Farmer of 1970 by the Farmer County Soil and Water Conservation District.

Johnson's success as a conservation farmer can be partly attributed to his background in the hardware business and as an officer in the bank in Shallowater. This last activity has kept him current on money management, allows needed diversion from farming, and allows him to see both sides of the money business.

Johnson believes that conservation of irrigation water is a "must" on the High Plains, and to conserve his own irrigation water, Johnson utilizes several tailwater pits. He says that one tailwater pit will yield

as much as a 400 gallon-per-minute irrigation well, not to mention the fact that this water is cheaper.

Soil management is also an integral part of Johnson's operation. He believes soil tests give precise fertilizer requirements, and crop residues left on the soil give good tilth and wind erosion protection. Johnson, who is interested in preserving wildlife, believes the crop residues also provide cover and food for game birds. This concern for our natural resources is the mark of an outstanding conservation farmer, say officials of the county SCS office.

Johnson and his wife Christine have three children and they are members of the First Baptist Church of Friona.

Courthouse Gets New Heat-Cooling System

The Farmer County Courthouse in Farwell is undergoing a change this week which will make the offices more comfortable for personnel and patrons. The old heating and cooling system, which has been in use in the brick building since 1916, is being replaced with a central heating and air conditioning system.

Workmen began early last week tearing out portions of the old equipment and making the building ready for installation of the new system. In some areas, the noise from the workmen's tools and the debris strewn around the building attested to the fact that "something was happening."

Nance Construction Company is in charge of the project which is supposed to be completed and ready for use by May 15.

County Judge Archie Tarter explained that many costly repairs were needed at this point on the already out-dated system of radiators and evaporative air

coolers and that installation of a complete central system would likely be more economical for heating and cooling the entire building.

The warm temperatures of Sunday and Monday made it clear that the time for installing an air conditioner is none too early.

Mrs. Crume, left, came across the cookbook recently and remembered that her husband, the late C. E. Crume, had discovered the book in an old building many years ago. The book is thought to have been printed in 1909, about the same time that Mrs. Blair came here as a little girl. The cookbook was published by members of the St. Matthews Guild and contains names of recipe donors and advertisers that are familiar to many early day Twin City residents.

Old Cookbook Recalls Memories And Recipes

How long has it been since you've seen a recipe that calls for "butter the size of an egg," "French peas," or "a 5¢ cake of ice?" The Tribune staff recently enjoyed looking at a cookbook which was published many years ago by the St. Matthews Guild and was composed of recipes from ladies living in the Texico-Farwell area at that time. Unfortunately, the date of the publication of the book was not available, but after talking about it with several local people who have lived here for many years, it was decided that the book must have been printed about 1909.

Owner of the unique cookbook is Mrs. Eunice Crume who brought the book to the Tribune office. Mrs. Crume says that her husband, the late C. E. Crume, found the book many years ago and that she had forgotten she still had it until she discovered it recently and thought Tribune readers might be interested in the old-fashioned writing.

While talking with Mrs. E. G. Blair to get some help in dating the book, she recalled that in 1908 the block which is now occupied by Rip's Western Wear burned to the ground. Mrs. Blair says that was the year she moved here as a young girl and recalls that there were no fire engines, only dray wagons, and that the Texico Water works, which at that time was located where the present Fina station stands, also was on fire. She says it was quite a sight to see everyone loading dray wagons with liquor from the 15 or more saloons which were in Texico at the time.

seemed to think the book was printed about 1909. TWO MINUTES WITH THE BIBLE

TRUE UNITY

There are many unions all over the world, but in only one place is true unity to be found: the Lord Jesus Christ.

The children of fallen Adam have always been divided. Adam's first two children could not get along together. One killed the other. And now that the race has multiplied there are about three billion separate, individual wills in the world. Some of Adam's children try to get along together amicably and enjoy some measure of success, but this always takes effort. It does not come naturally. Even the dearest lovers must be prepared to yield to each other's wishes frequently to get along well together. There is no true unity in this world.

But where Adam's children have been divided by sin, they may be saved and truly united in Christ. As Christ became one with us when He died our death (the wages of sin) on the cross, so we may become one with Him as in faith we acknowledge that that death at Calvary was not His but ours. This is what the Apostle referred to when he asked: "Know ye not, that so many of us as were baptized into Jesus Christ were baptized into His death?" (Romans 6:3).

This verse does not refer to water baptism, for no one can be baptized into Christ—or become one with Him—by a physical ceremony. The only way to become one with Him is to accept by faith the fact that He died our death on the cross. The meeting place must always be Calvary. And as we acknowledge His death as ours and are baptized into Christ, we also become one with each other. "For by one Spirit are we all baptized into one body" (I Corinthians 12:13).

Unity in Christ is not something for which Christians are to strive. It is a fact of grace to be recognized and enjoyed by faith. True believers in and out of all denominations have been baptized into one body, whether or not they recognize this. Now it is for us to appropriate and enjoy this unity in Christ, "endeavoring to keep the unity of the Spirit in the bond of peace" (Ephesians 4:3), i.e. practicing the unity which the Spirit has made. Only those who have been baptized into Christ by faith can appreciate the blessed oneness which believers may enjoy in Him.

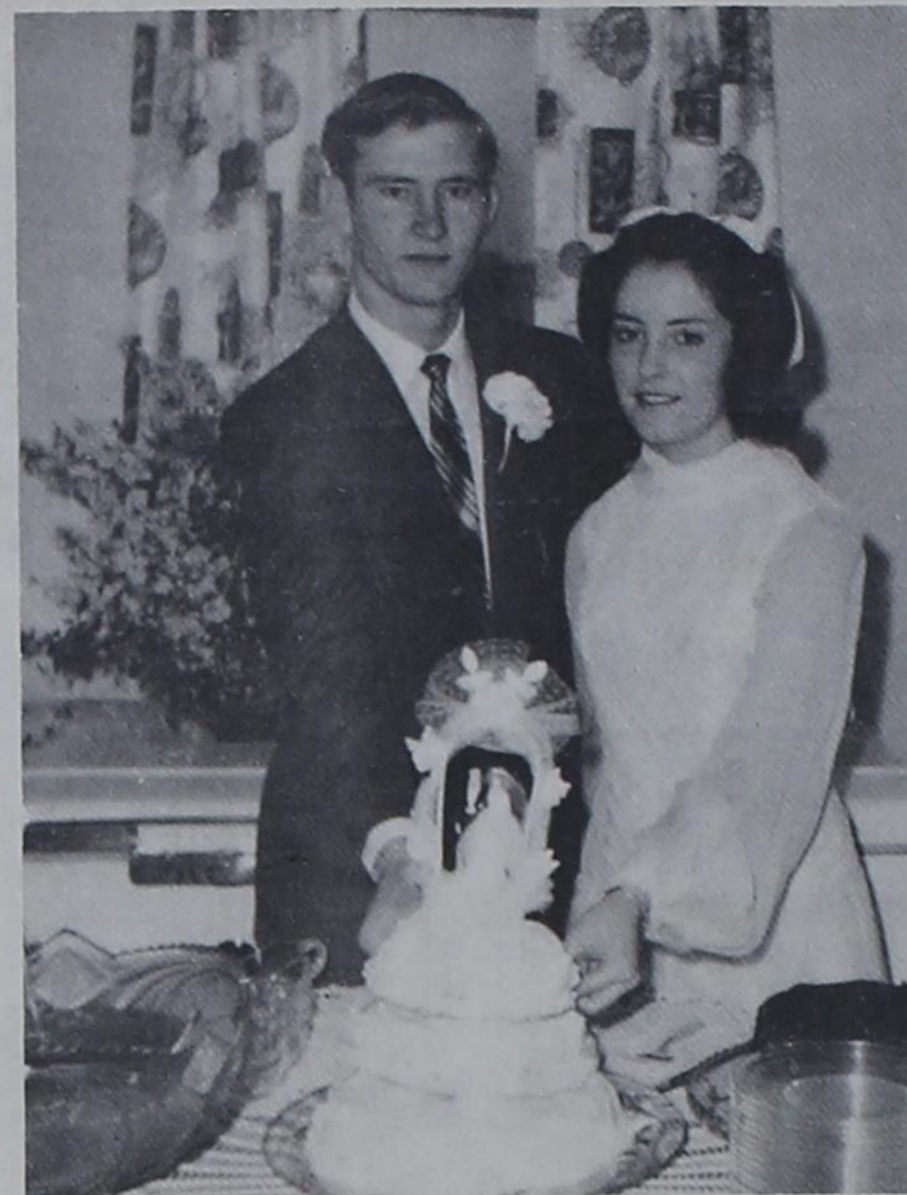
Attending the bridegroom as best man was Gary Blain of Texico. Groomsman was Jimmy Peoples of Farwell.

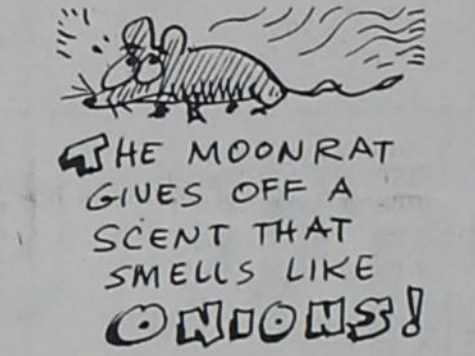

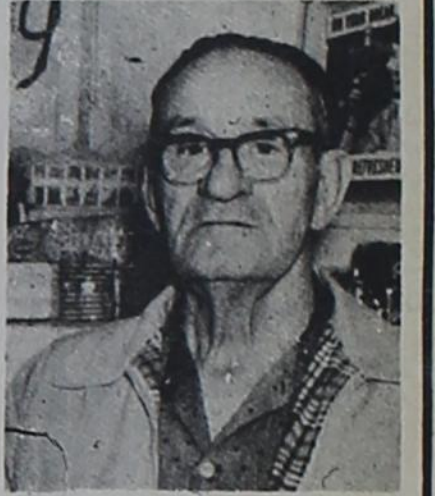

Mother" when the sorority meets April 22 in the home of Mrs. Patsy Berry. Members are to bring sacks of clothing for a "sack sale."



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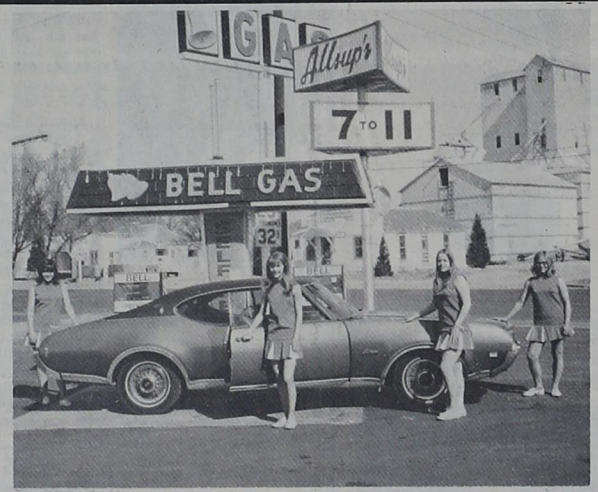
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
