'Teachers are more caring in Farwell': Nelle Craig

Nelle Craig, graduated from Amarillo High School and went to Amarillo College for one year. She then went to Wayland Baptist College where she met and married James Craig in 1950.

They moved to Sunray and started to farm. While on the farm, the Craig's had four daughters--Loyce Anne Mills, of Big Springs; Nella Beth, who died in a car accident; Robyn Palady, a dispatcher at the Farwell Sheriff Department; and Jamye, Huntsville, manager of a fast food chain. Jamye is getting her Master's Degree in Criminology.

In 1960 the Craig's moved back to Amarillo. She attended Amarillo college while Mr. Craig attended West Texas State University and received his degree in agriculture.

In 1961, they moved to Farwell where James Craig started teaching history in high school. Then in 1962, James Craig became junior high principal and was the junior high girls' basketball coach. He became an administrative assistant for about four years. He has been elementary principal for the last four years.

Meanwhile, Nelle received her degree in 1967 from Eastern New Mexico University.

She started teaching in Muleshoe, fifth grade and Developmental Special Education. She taught in Muleshoe for one year while commuting from Farwell.

An opening at Farwell School gave her the chance to stay at home with her family and work. The position was in special education. She worked for a year and then took a leave of absence to go to Texas Tech on an Experienced Teachers Fellowship in Special Education.

She received her Master's Degree in 1971 and has taught in the Farwell school system for the last five years. Currently she teaches third grade. She teaches the children photography, genealogy and phonics. "Phonics taught for spelling, can't keep the kids from reading," said Mrs. Craig.

Some of her thoughts on teaching: "I feel every day that I'm having to fight to maintain that quality that makes learning delightful for children.

SPS files for rate adjustment

Southwestern Public Service Company (SPS) has filed a request for a 9.14% overall adjustment in retail rates for electric service in New Mexico.

The rate change, if approved by the New Mexico Public Service Commission (NMPSC), would raise the average SPS residential customer's monthly bill by \$3.39, a 9% change.

The average SPS residential lighting bill in New Mexico, for about 500 kilowatt-hours, presently is \$37.60.

SPS is asking the NMPSC to correct a \$12.6 million revenue deficiency, said Lloyd Davis, SPS New Mexico Division Manager.

teachers who are skillfully beyond being 'book-bound teachers' must return to just that. The demands of the system are squelching teachers' spontaneity and creativity. The incongruity is appalling. In a day when science and high technology are programming computers to behave like humans, education is forcing those human beings called teachers to behave rather like computers.

"But in every major reform I have experienced in my lifetime or learned about through history, there has been upheaval and turmoil before stability. We go too far, we ask too much, want it too quickly."

The new reforms, pertaining to curricula changes, are the greatest changes she has seen in 18 years.

"With the new reforms, Farwell will weather the storm better than most schools. Teachers here are more caring," Mrs. Craig said.

"Teaching is still very, very rewarding and I would not change my profession in any way," she added.

In her genealogy class a funny thing happened. "I have always told the children you would not be finished with your genealogy until you go all the way back to Adam. One of the children had great, great, great, great grandparents down and ended it in 'Jesus' (Spanish). A child walked in and looked at it and the remark was 'Gosh, she went all the way back to 'Jesus,'" said Mrs. Craig.

The best award is when a child considers you their friend, she added.

The Craig's are members of the Hamlin Memorial Methodist Church of Farwell. Mrs. Craig has been the choir director for 12 years. She is an inactive member of the Parmer County Teachers Association. She was nominated Panhandle Woman of the Year in 1976 by the ESA of Muleshoe.

In 1984 she received an award sponsored by the Farwell Study Club and General Federation of Women's Clubs for "Concern for Kids."

Mr. Craig raises Brittany Spaniels and has several field trail trophies. He belongs to the Lions Club and the Farwell Fire Department.

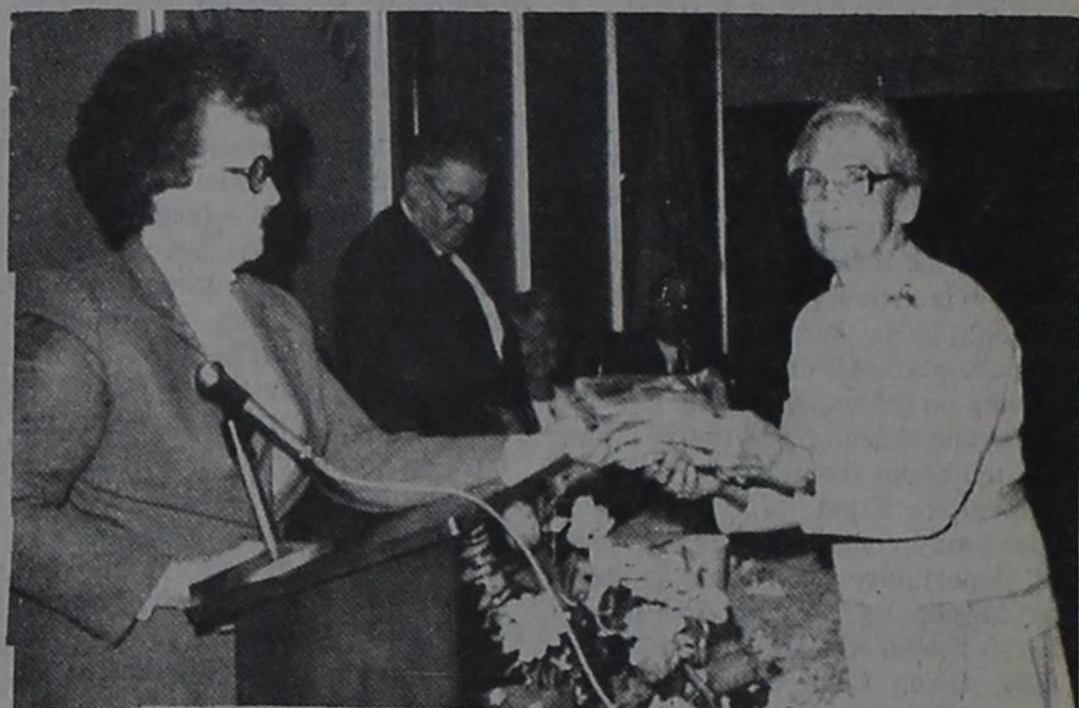

Epsilon Sigma Alpha sets up student loan fund

Mrs. Roberts graduated from East Texas University in 1929 with degrees in home economics and art and taught art in the Amarillo schools for three years after graduation. She resided in the Farwell-Texico community from 1936 to

In 1960, Mrs. Roberts moved to Clovis where she currently resides. Mrs. Roberts had one son, William R. Roberts who is deceased and two grandsons, Bill and John.

In addition to being active in ESA, Mrs. Roberts is an active member of the First Presbyterian Church of Clovis and the American Business Women's Club of Clovis in which she was selected as the Outstanding Business Woman of the Year in 1978. In addition, she still finds the time to be active in the Garden Club of Clovis and was elected as Lifetime Gardner of the Garden Clubs of New Mexico. In 1975, she was selected to the Who's Who Women of the Year for the United States as well as receiving the award of "Personalities of the West and Southwest" in 1971.

REFRIGERATOR DATE ROLL

1/2 lb. graham crackers
1/2 lb. small marshmallows

1 cup heavy cream or Dream Whip
1 lb. dates
1 cup nuts

1 teaspoon vanilla
Crush the graham crackers. Combine 1/2 of the crumbs, dates (chopped), marshmallows (chopped) and nuts (chopped). Whip the cream until stiff and fold in vanilla. Fold cream in other mixture. Shape in rolls and and roll in remaining crumbs, place rolls on waxed paper and chill for 12 hours. Cut in slices and serve with or without whipped cream.

Signup under way for baseball program

Signup forms have been passed on to Twin City youngsters for the Farwell-Texico Pony Baseball League.

Any boy or girl may sign up for one of the three divisions:

-If you will be at least 7 years old before Aug. 1, 1985, but will not be 9 years old before Aug. 1, 1985, you may register for Pinto League (tee ball).

-If you will be at least 9 years old before Aug. 1, 1985, but will not be 11 years old before Aug. 1, 1985, you may register for Mustang League.
