

Looking into our private crystal ball in the past has proven to be risky for this writer. In fact we have put our ball in storage temporarily, and now depend on other and more recognized authorities for prognostications contained in this column.

So, in saying that the future solving of the "Energy Crisis" will be done in the field of atomic and nuclear energy release, we will quote from J. Hunter Chiles III, who has impressive credentials as a planning consultant in the Business Planning and Analysis Section of Power Systems Planning of Westinghouse Corporation.

Chiles contends that a nuclear-electric energy base constitutes the only viable long-term solution to the energy problem. He also says that he is dismayed because this solution is always tied in with the idea that we as a country and the world as a whole must reduce the consumption of energy. He thinks that a reduction of energy consumption would also be a step backward in man's progress.

Given the proper backing NOW, says Chiles, a future energy crisis can be averted and future consumption of energy can increase and therefore guarantee mankind continued progress and development.

In arriving at this contention, he makes the analysis that by the end of the next century the sources of the world's energy supplies will be depleted. This can be stretched out a bit by reducing the energy growth rate, but this is very temporary and the world fossil fuels are in finite supply and will be exhausted by approximately 2060-2070. Of course in the meantime as the total exhaustion point comes nearer, fossil fuel will become more expensive. Therefore, this will rule it out, economically speaking, for most of the uses to which we put it today.

Considering the sources of his information and data, one must agree that these findings will come very close to being correct. This means that immediate steps toward implementation of plans for uses of nuclear energy must be taken.

Instead of scattering our research dollars, Chiles suggests that we concentrate in the areas of fusion power, clean burning coal, uranium enrichment, synthetic liquid fuels, electric energy storage, heat pumps, superconducting generators and electric cars.

If you are familiar with energy research, you will readily see that these suggested fields will at once cut off areas of research which are presently being conducted. We do not know to what all this will eventually lead, but it is fairly evident that a comprehensive national plan to deal with this ever-looming problem must soon be forthcoming.

In view of our politician's track record of grappling with great national problems, (out of storage comes our crystal ball) we will wager that in the years to come we will eventually wind up depending on the hot air from Congress for a substantial portion of our national energy resources.

Let us hope that in the area of energy research and development we find a few statesmen in our national legislature, because unless you specifically have one foot in the grave and the other on a banana peel you will be affected by this energy problem.

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**In Annual Ceremony - -**

**Medium Dry Year Seen In Fire**

When J. W. "Indian" Crim of Muleshoe read the signs given by the ceremonial fire on the old Crim place 18 miles east and one mile north of Oklahoma Lane Thursday morning, March 22, at sunrise, he saw a medium (or moderately) dry year with spotted rain and no bad storms to speak of.

As Crim studied the smoke from his 51st ceremonial fire, he predicted the coming year as "not the best in the world", but maybe fair. When the sun rose, the smoke was blown from a west wind that varied a little to the north.

According to old Indian legends, wind out of the west,

south or southwest indicates a poor crop year. Winds from the north or northeast indicate the crop will be average or above.

Three of Crim's six children, his grandchildren and his two sisters, were on hand Thursday morning to witness the family custom of predicting the coming year's weather by watching

which way the smoke blows from a teepee-shaped fire on March 22. All of Crim's children and his grandchildren have grown up watching the ceremony.

Crim learned the technique from his father and has carried the custom on throughout the years. His father learned how to predict the weather throughout the ceremonial fire when he was working near Sierra Blanca, Tex. The technique was used by the Indians each spring.

"My father learned how to predict the weather this way through a Mexican man. The Indians didn't usually tell anybody how or why they did things," Crim said.

Crim said his weather prediction was really for dryland farmers. Since irrigation has come to this country weather is not an overriding factor in crop production any more.

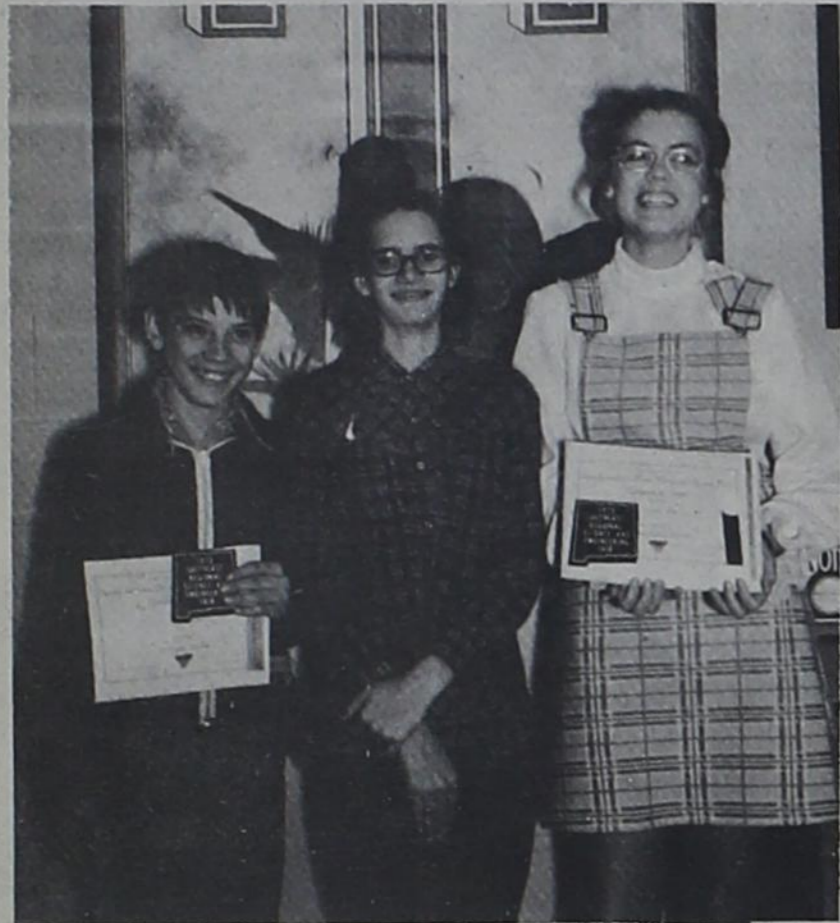

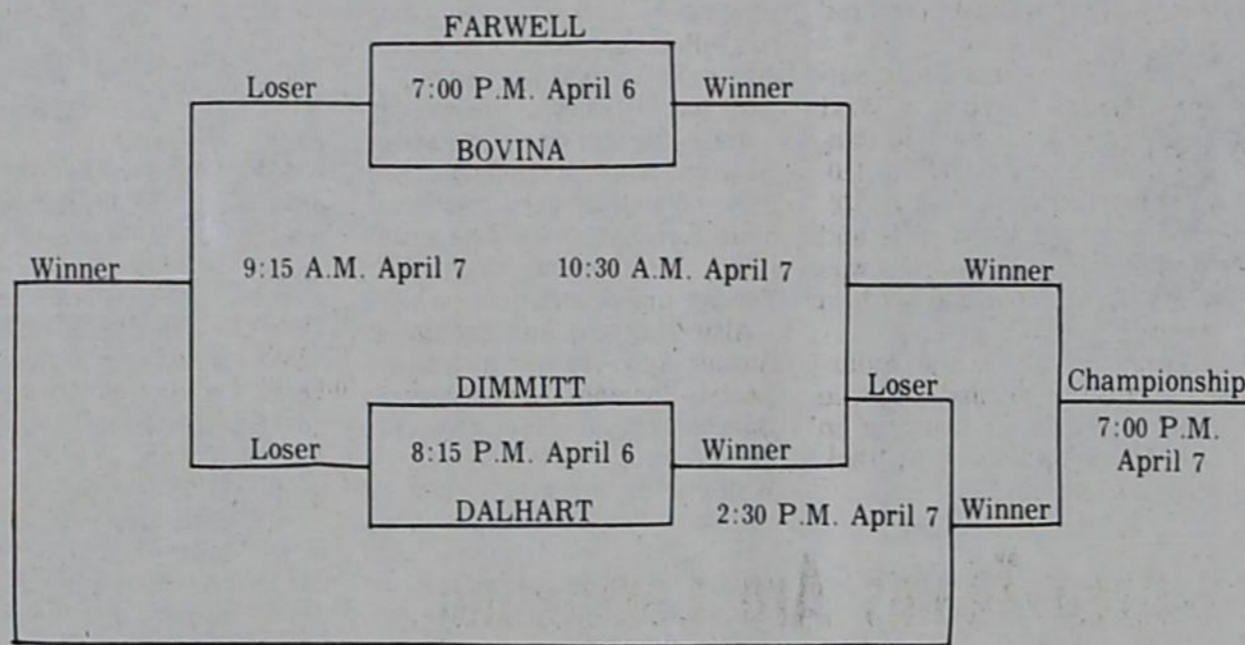
## Farm Team All-Stars Headed For Regional

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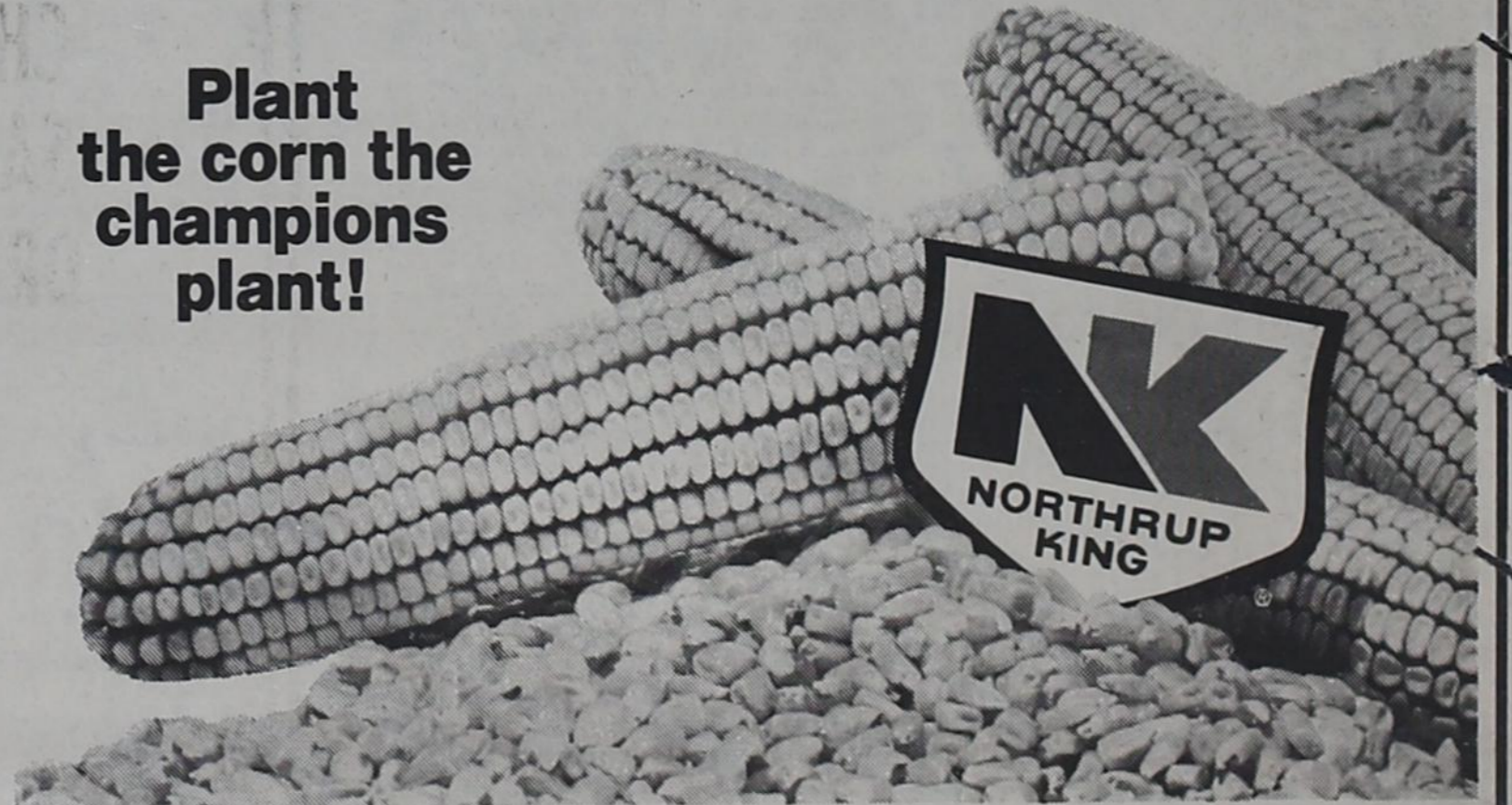
Matt Irwin knows that it takes a good corn hybrid for intensive management to produce champion yields. Last spring he went with PX 50A. "The 207.08 bushels per acre is the highest yield I have raised."



On April 10th Irwin preplanted 200 lbs. of NH3. Five days later he applies 600 lbs. per acre of 4-10-10 and 1 lb. of boron, 2 lbs. zinc and 3 lbs. of manganese. In mid-July he added 75 lbs. per acre of 28-0-0 to the soil through his pivot sprinkler system. He irrigated 8 times. Weed and insects were controlled with chemicals.

Likes Harvestability of PX 50A. "I like the way PX 50A dries down early in the season", (16.2%), stated Mr. Irwin. "Standability was good. It threshes good with no problems. After harvesting was completed on October 18th he let his cattle in the stalks - "for that extra profit".

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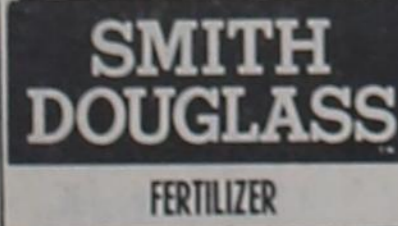

## Students Are Learning From 'Operation Balloon' Launches

Texico Elementary School students are learning science, math and social studies from "Operation Balloon", an idea Jim Rogers, principal, said was obtained from a magazine article.

Elementary school students have already written to the woman in New Jersey who originated the idea and thanked her for providing them with a project which is also a

learning experience. Each school day, beginning Wednesday, March 21, and ending Tuesday, March 27, two classrooms brought balloons to release. Rogers filled balloons from a helium-filled tank and the students attached notes wrapped in plastic bags.

The notes were wrapped in plastic in case they fell into water. On the notes, finders of balloons are asked to return their names and addresses, along with any facts they may know about how far the balloons have traveled, how long they stayed up, how high they went, etc.

Through the launching of these balloons, students at Texico Elementary School hope to learn facts concerning science, mathematics and social studies. Rogers said a classroom has already written a poem about balloons, making the project a learning process

in English, too. Rogers expects music to become involved as well.

Rogers said some of the balloons were released in clusters, while others were released one at a time. He added that each day the youngsters hoped for different wind directions to take their balloons to a variety of places.

One of the balloons, sent off by Alvina Lopez, has already been found and reported on. Earl Monroe, a rancher working cattle 45 miles north of Hereford, reports he found a balloon Friday, March 23. The balloon was estimated to have traveled 70 to 75 miles.

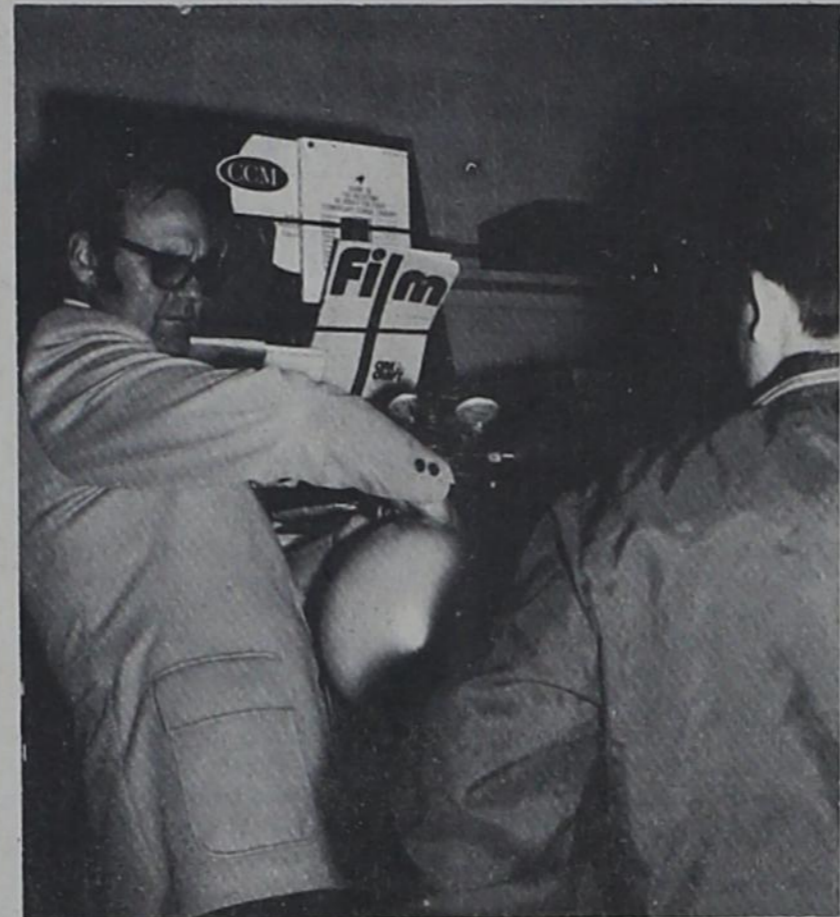

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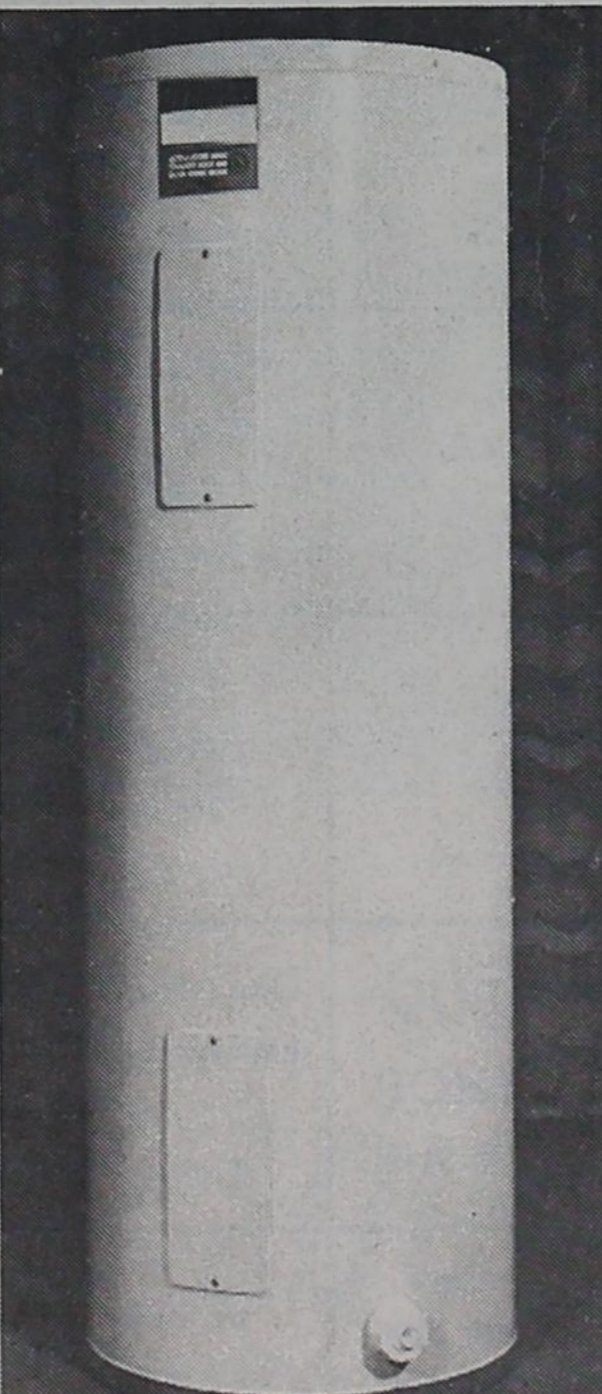

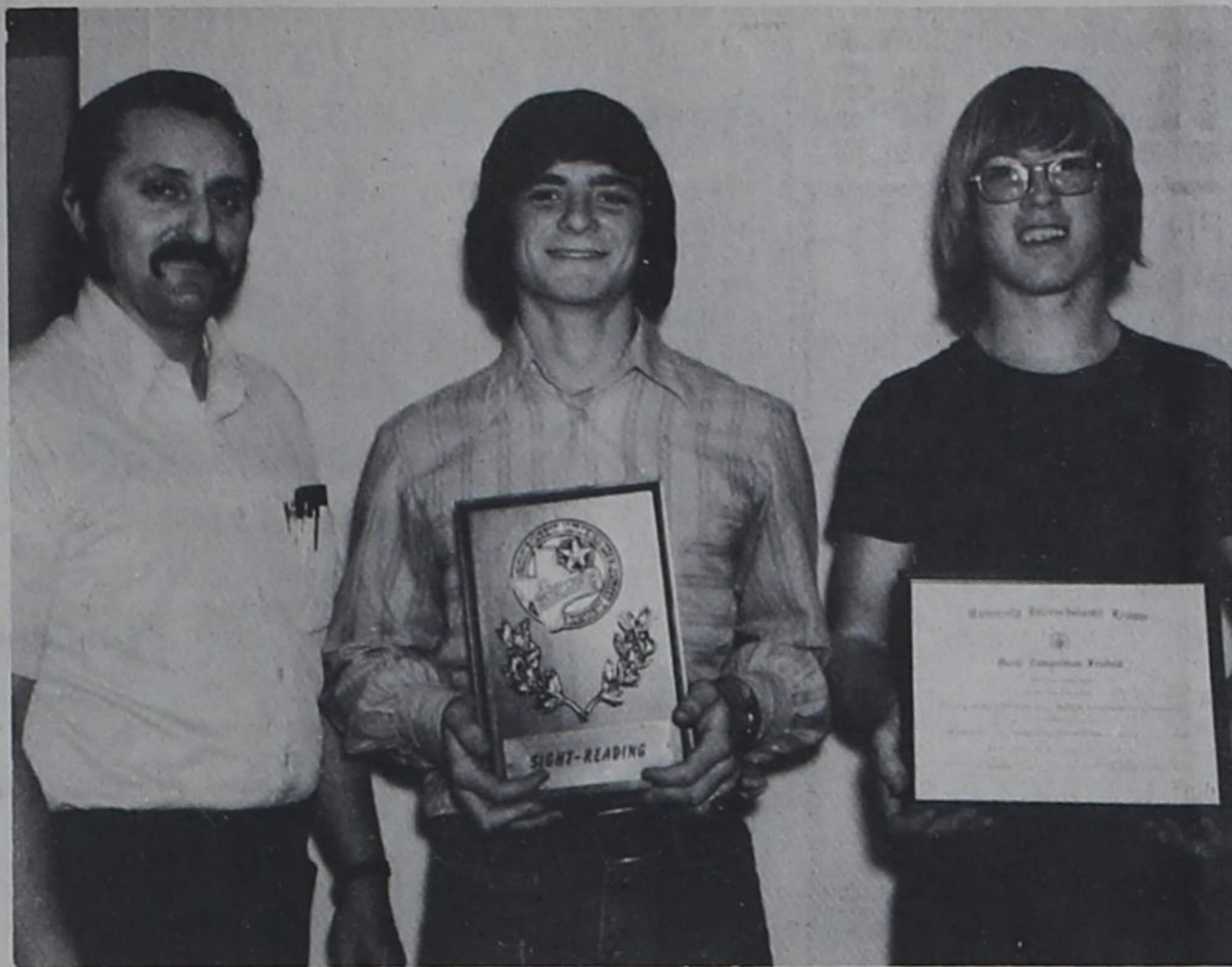
