Destination: Parmer County

One thing I have found out, Hugh Moseley sure is knowledgeable about Parmer County.

For the past couple of months, Hugh and I had talked about traveling around the county so he could point out various landmarks. I wasn't too sure I wanted to do it with him, since he assesses taxes (just kidding, Hugh).

Anyway, Memorial Day came -- at least the day officially designated as the legal holiday -- and most businesses were closed. So Hugh stopped by the Tribune office bright and early to pick me up.

The key area I wanted to visit was the Rhea community, being as it's out-of-the-way and an area I hadn't been to yet. So we headed north.

It felt kind of funny to drive on a New Mexico road from one place in Parmer County (Farwell) to another (Rhea). But Hugh explained that was the best way to go, so we headed for Pleasant Hill.

We hit Pleasant Hill and kept on going. It's a farming area and the wheat was already standing tall. (Or was that barley?) Finally, the Rhea Elevator came into view and we knew we were nearing our first destination.

Rhea, I found, was a quiet community. There seems to be a few families named "Schuler" out there. Make that more than a few. We stopped at the Rhea Cemetery, which we found well kept up. Then Hugh showed me an old, old house that now serves as a museum. I plan to take Judy and the kids up there one of these weekends.

Leaving Rhea, we headed east, then took the turnoff to visit the Dixon Six spread. It's along the Deaf Smith County line and sure seemed big. Then we turned toward Bovina, stopping at another farm. The fella there was awfully proud of his big white sheep dogs.

Coming into Bovina, we made a stop at Big Nick's. It was the first time I had met Big Nick, and his brother, T-Bone. What is it they have there? Thirteen acres of machinery? Unbelievable. They must have parts for just about every tractor or combine ever made.

While in Bovina, we stopped by the cemetery. Hugh pointed out the graves of the Aldridge brothers, who meant so much to Farwell.

Then it was on to Oklahoma Lane. Hugh pointed out that the original settlers of that area were from Boomer Sooner country, but I already had figured that out. We were going by Oklahoma Lane Farm Supply but Floyd Coates had taken the holiday off. Couldn't say that I blamed him.

We took a bunch of back roads through Oklahoma Lane and I got to find out where several folks I've already gotten to know lived. And, once again, we stopped at a cemetery. I think it was befitting of the holiday to pay our respects.

Then it was "On to Farwell." Our final stop was at the Farwell Cemetery, where we ran into some folks also honoring the dead. As with the other cemeteries we visited, it was well maintained.

Oops, I should have mentioned one extra item. While traversing the countryside, Hugh gave me a running commentary on who lived where, on who planted what and on which draw flooded when.

He also showed me the old Rhea school house, which now serves as a study club headquarters in Bovina.

In all honesty, I felt I learned more about Parmer County's history in those few short hours with Hugh than I had in all the months I've lived here. If ever a teacher needs a local historian to come into her class and tell the students about Parmer County, then Hugh has got to be the one.

Maybe I shouldn't have made that blanket statement. I'm sure a lot of longtime residents know the history of the county as well as Hugh. It's just that Hugh was the first to grab me out of the office and give me a good historical perspective. I have promised Dutch Quickel to take a drive with him for the same reasons.

What's next on the agenda? Fred Chandler of Sherley-Anderson-Pitman said awhile back he would show me through a grain elevator. One of these hot summer days, when things are slow, I'm going to take him up on it.

Dad took soil sample back to Illinois

Nora Kaemper and her family moved here from Illinois in 1914. Her father, Henry, had visited New Mexico and found it to be "the land of enchantment." He took soil back to Illinois to show how rich it was.

They sold their home and land and chartered a railroad car. They loaded furniture, fruit trees, grapevines and flowers.

Nora said they didn't know how the wind blew here and that having an orchard was out of the question.

The Kaempers rented a house in Clovis next to Gov. Hockenhull and family.

Nora didn't like the idea of leaving their home in Illinois. Leaving all their friends and relatives--especially teen-agers and their grandfather--was difficult.

They moved to Pleasant Hill. They lived in a half dug-out. Beef was hung from the windmill and the weather stayed cold enough to keep the meat frozen. For lights, they used kerosene. They cooked on a coal stove and washed clothes on a rub board.

They walked 2 1/2 miles to school. "There were four of us in school. Once, it snowed so much and drifted so high that the horse walked on top of the drift," she recalled.

About a mile north of Pleasant Hill was a lake, that Nora ice-skated on. The lake is no longer there.

In 1917, she met Roy L. Day and they were married in 1919. He had been a state evangelist for two years.

After they married, they went to DeLeon, Texas, then to Hope, N.M.

"At Pleasant Hill, we held a revival and there were 30 conversions. I was number 30," Nora said. "The Lord blessed us with five children -- three boys, R.L., Harold and Dan, and two girls -- Danielle and Lynette.

Times were hard with the Depression. Nora remembers buying pork

chops at 25 cents a pound.

Roy died in 1963. Nora was alone at the time with her grand-daughter, Cheryl.

"Two of my dearest friends, Olan and Susie Schluster, made phone calls and stayed with me. There is so much difference in a real friend and a handshaker," said Nora.

Traveling became something she always wanted to do. She has been to Florida, California, Hawaii, Utah, Mexico and Canada.

Nora enjoyed the Polynesian food in Hawaii and watching the small children do the hula.

On her trip to Canada, she saw Niagara Falls and rode on the boat ride. They were furnished heavy black coats so they wouldn't get wet.

In Salt Lake City, she saw the Mormon Tabernacle Choir.

Nora has 12 grandchildren and seven great-grandchildren.

Nora enjoys collecting mugs from Canada, Switzerland, Mexico, just to name a few. She has about 50 mugs.

Currently, she is helping the First Baptist Church in Texico with Vacation Bible School.

Plans progressing for Border Town Days

Plans for the 1985 Border Town Days celebration, scheduled for July 25-27 in the Twin Cities, are beginning to take shape, due largely to the efforts of the BTD Committee.

Committee members met for the third planning session of the year Monday night at the Spur Restaurant, under the chairmanship of John Getz.

The community event is planned each year in conjunction with the High Plains Junior Rodeo, which will be sponsored by the Jaycees and Farwell FFA.

Here are some highlights from the committee meeting:

--Groups wishing to reserve space for concession stands and booths at the park are urged to call Sheree Montgomery at 481-3676 or Cindy Patterson at 825-2094. Booths for baked goods and homemade items have been popular in this area.

"Groups should call now before the spaces are all gone," alerted committee member Joann Getz.

--All entrants for the Big Parade must be officially entered to be eligible to win prizes. To enter, just call the State Line Tribune office.

481-3681; John Getz, 481-9123; or Weldon Smith at 482-3839.

--At the suggestion of committee secretary Ann Cooper, money will be given to float entries that win fourth place. Here is the breakdown: first prize in the float competition, \$75; second prize, \$50; third prize, \$35, and fourth prize, \$25.

--The honorary parade marshals will be all the former living mayors of Texico and Farwell. For Farwell, this includes: Johnny Williams, Gil Patschke and Elmer Hargrove. For Texico, this includes: Howard Billingsley, Walter Freeman, Joe Helton, W.D. "Dub" Howard, Manfred Turnbough and Perry Winkles.

--The former mayors will be invited to ride in the parade in special cars, to be provided by the two Chambers of Commerce.

--The number of Border Town Days queen candidates will be limited to 16. Entrants must live in either the Texico or Farwell school district areas.

--BTD will be broadcast live over KLZK-FM Radio in Texico.

--The annual parade will begin at

11 a.m. CDT Saturday, July 27, sponsored as usual by the Texico-Farwell Lions Club. Weldon Smith is parade marshal.

--The annual barbeque, sponsored by the Texico-Farwell Rotary Club again, will be served in Farwell City Park following the parade. It will be served until everyone is served.

--As is the custom, no commercial booths or individuals will be allowed in the park area with resale items. Booth spaces are available only to area civic or non-profit groups.

--The Arts and Crafts Show will be set up on the front lawn of the courthouse, and spaces are available at \$10 a booth. Spaces may be reserved by calling Janie Bowery at 481-3620 days or 481-9251 nights.

--Other BTD highlights will be the Merchants Promotion, where many prizes will be given away, the Farwell Volunteer Fire Department's promotion, which includes the giveaway of a GMC pickup truck.

--The next BTD committee meeting will be at 8 p.m. CDT July 1 at Luce's Spur Restaurant.

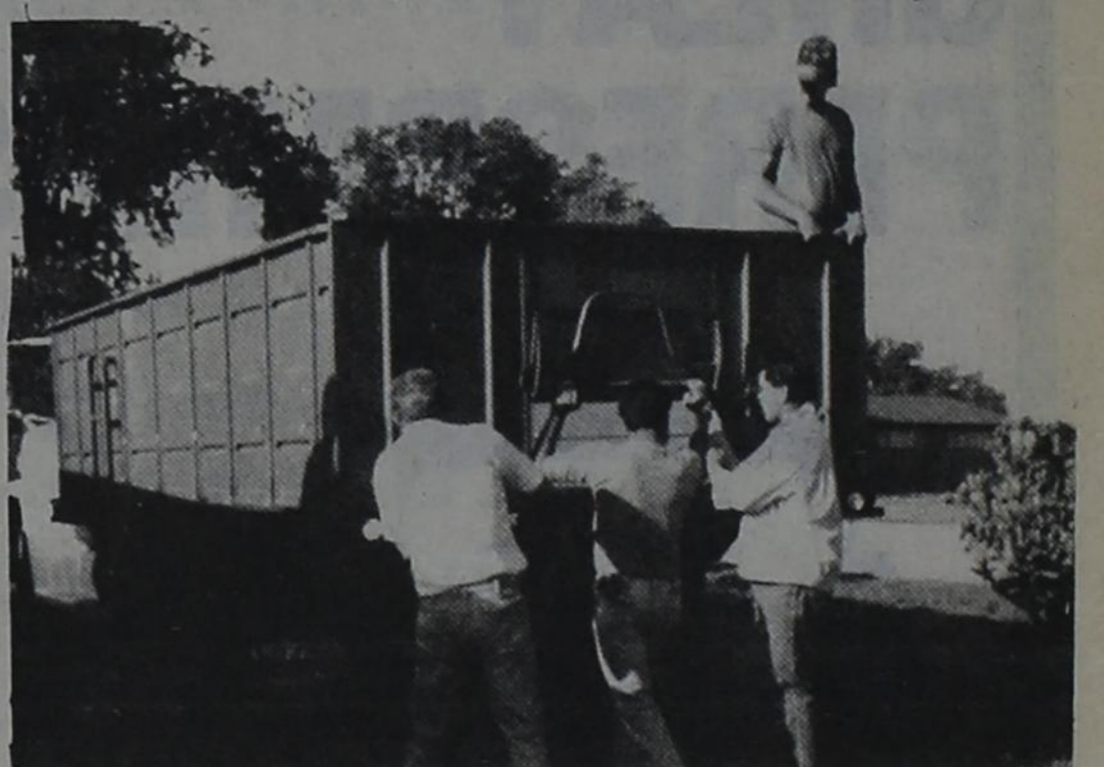
Flyers will be printed up, listing all the items. They will be placed in various Clovis businesses. Items will be on display at the Community Center the day before the auction

Afterwards, the Chamber of Commerce paid for their meal at Luce's.



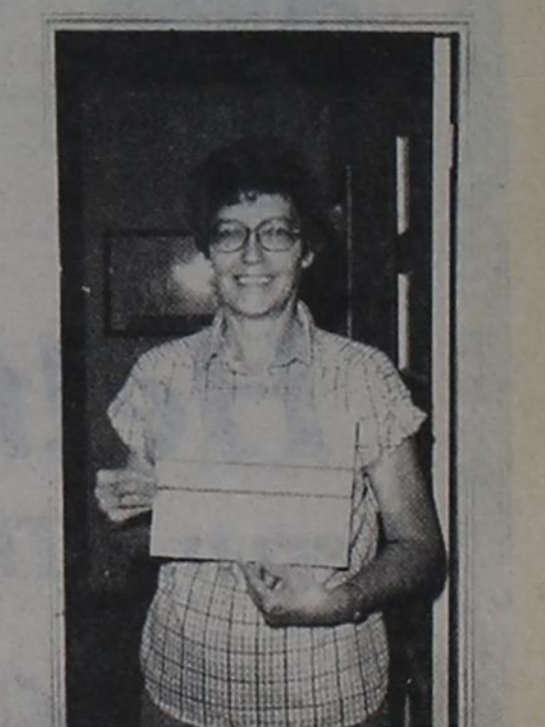
ASCS honors Fleming

With the recent rainfall, potential yields could be increased with additional plant nutrients.

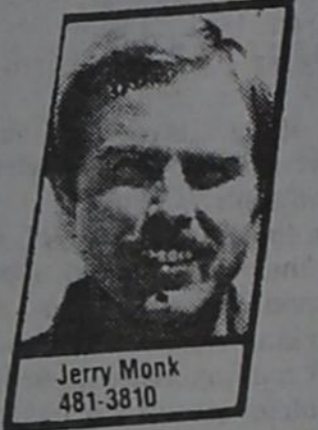

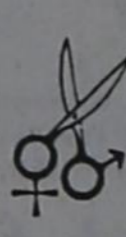
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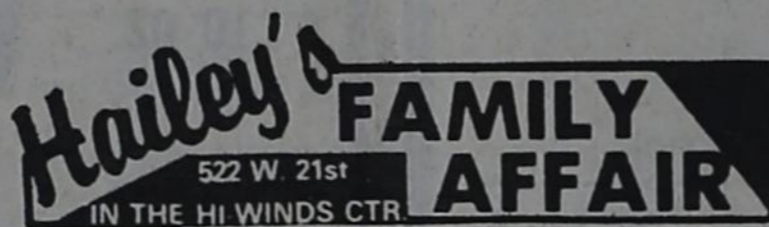
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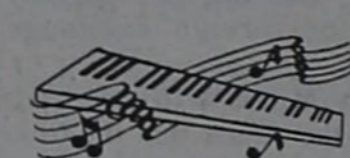


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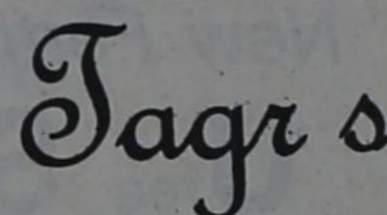


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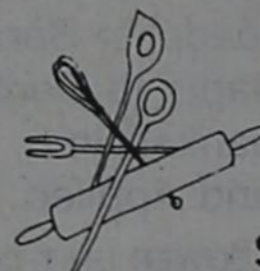
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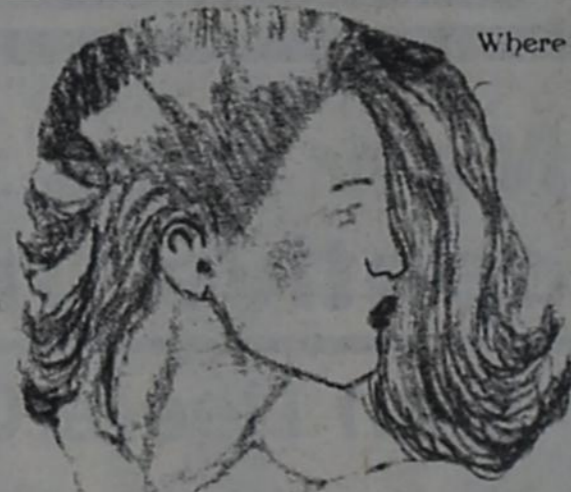
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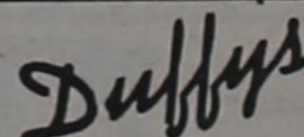
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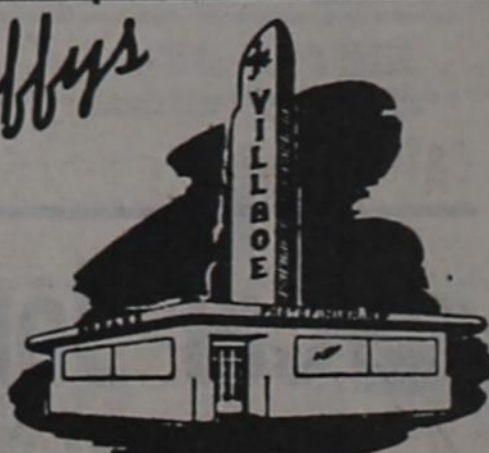
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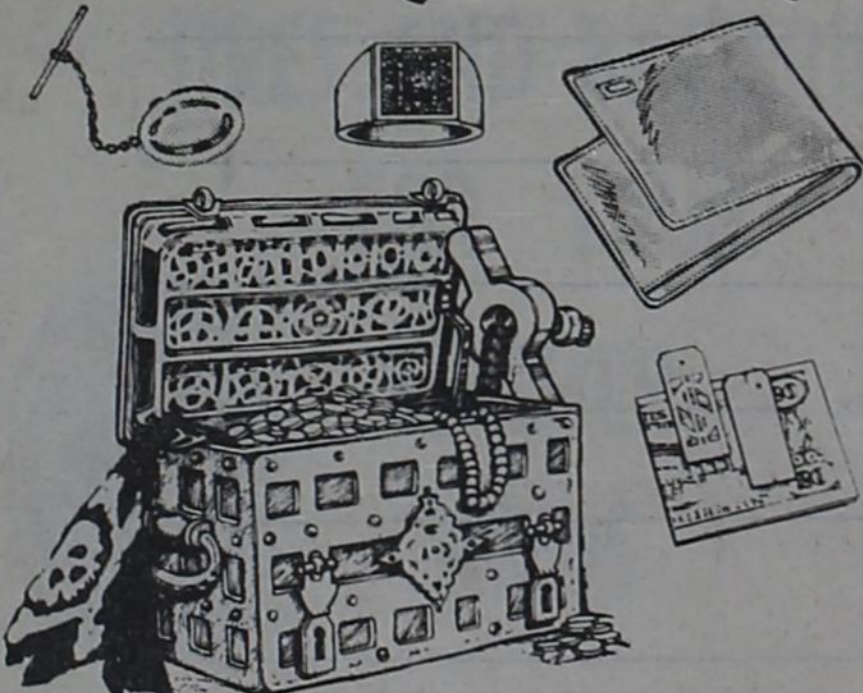
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Hudson, Martin wed

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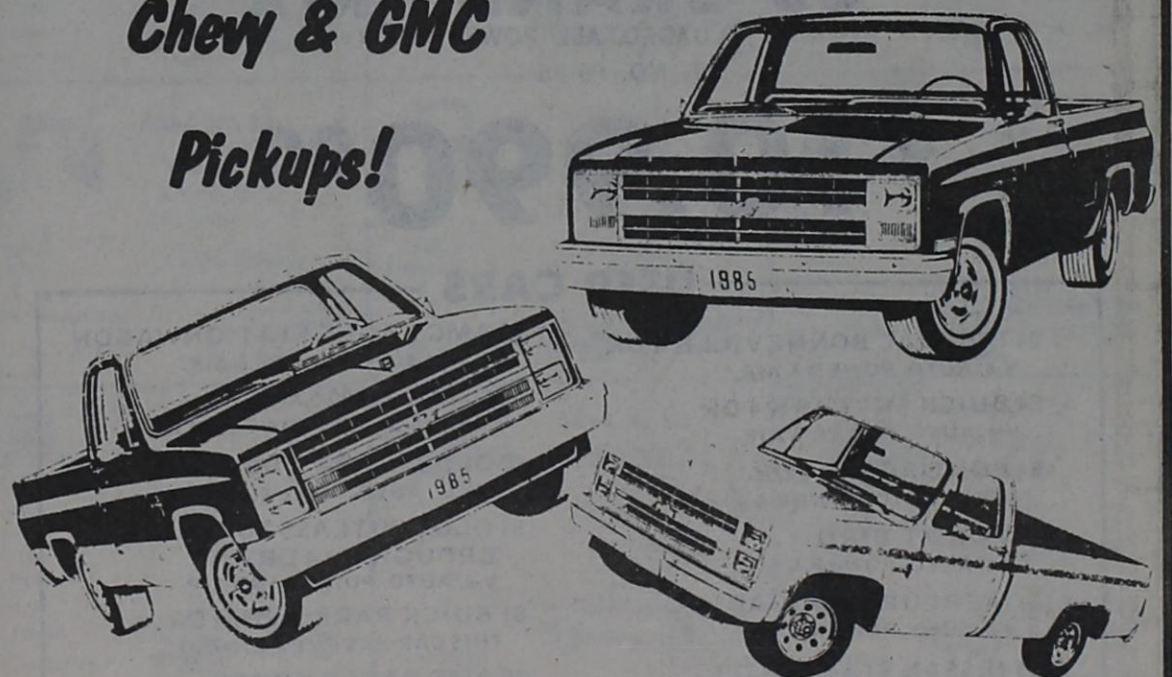
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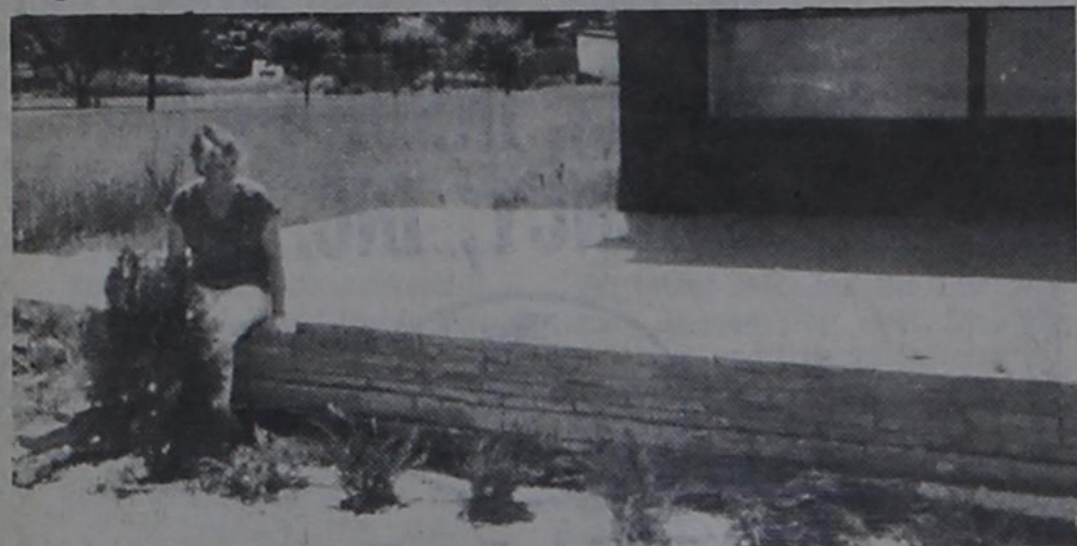

Combest says Texans footing bills for federal grants

For the fourth year in a row, Texans paid more in federal taxes than residents of any other state for each dollar in federal grants received, a recent study by the tax foundation shows, and congressman Larry Combest (R-Texas) said the study reveals that reduced federal spending would not harm Texas nearly as much as it would some other states.

According to the Tax Foundation's study, Texans paid \$1.61 in Federal Taxes for every \$1 of Federal Grants received in fiscal 1984. That same year, Texas received only \$4.13 billion in federal grants, but paid \$6.64 billion in federal taxes.

The study by the foundation shows the federal government disbursed \$92.8 billion in grants-in-aid to state and local governments in 1984, 4.5 percent more than in 1983. The 4.5 percent increase was sharply lower than the annual 15 percent increases common in the 1970's.

The five largest federal grant programs in 1984 were interstate highway construction, aid to families with dependent children, general revenue sharing, Medicaid, and subsidized housing. Overall, these

categories accounted for \$47.8 billion -- more than 51 percent of the total grants awarded.

Texas was one of 19 states whose citizens paid more in federal taxes than they received in federal grants. The 131 million persons living in these states paid \$53.84 billion in federal taxes so that their states could receive \$44.25 billion in grant money. On the average, residents of these 19 "paying" states paid \$1.22 in federal taxes for each dollar their state received in federal monies.

"The study reinforces the concept I favor of keeping the dollars at home to be spent by the people without needless red tape, bureaucracy and eventually revenue loss," Congressman Combest said.

"For the past four years, Texans have sent a buck up to Washington and gotten 62 cents back from the Federal Government." "This type of system certainly is not fair and should be revised," the Congressman added.

The tax foundation is a non-profit, non-partisan research organization founded in 1937 to monitor tax and fiscal activities at all levels of government.

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
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Legislation recounted

Agriculture producers fought an uphill battle during the Texas Legislature's recent regular session, but Sen. Bill Sarpalius said farmers and ranchers did not come away empty handed.

Sarpalius, D-Canyon, pointed to passage of a new farm and ranch security program, improved with laws for heavy machinery and a new seed labeling bill as proof that agriculture was not completely forgotten by lawmakers.

"Agriculture had a tough time this session," said Sarpalius, who serves as chairman of the Senate Agriculture Subcommittee. "There were more bills introduced this session to hurt agriculture than to help it."

"Still, we won a few battles and got some good ag bills passed. With farmers hurting all over the state, we'll take anything we can get," he said.

Sarpalius said he was proudest of the passage of House Joint Resolution 19 and House Bill 196, both of which he sponsored in the Senate and co-authored with Rep. L.E. "Pete" Patterson, D-Brookston. Together, the resolution and bill create a \$500 million loan program for young farmers.

H.J.R. 19 is a constitutional amendment authorizing the state to sell \$500 million worth of bonds and the General Land Office to implement a loan program similar to its Veteran's Land Board. The amendment must be approved this November by Texas voters.

H.B. 196 serves as companion legislation to the constitutional amendment. If the amendment is approved, the Land Office will be able to follow the guidelines in H.B. 196 when administering the program.

Guidelines include requirements that applicants for loans under the program be a U.S. citizen and Texas resident, be part of a predominantly farming household and have a net worth of less than \$250,000. The idea is to give young farmers a chance to purchase their own land through low interest loans generated by the bond sales.

Sarpalius also said he was proud of Senate Bill 16, which cleared up a problem caused by a law passed two years ago. S.B. 16 makes it legal to take oversized farm vehicles on state highways, a practice accidentally made illegal by the old law.

He said S.B. 16 went on to spell out specific width limitations for trucks carrying hay bails and other agri-

culture items. It also allows implement dealers to deliver tractors without a permit.

Along similar lines, Sarpalius also passed Senate Bill 1114, allowing custom harvesters to buy a single yearly permit instead of daily permits every time they travel on the highway.

Sarpalius also said he was pleased with the passage of Senate Bill 559, streamlining the state's seed labeling requirements. Instead of having a lengthy list of labeling requirements, seed companies now need to put only the information that is of vital importance to the farmers such as weight, variety and germination date for seeds.
