Today I am boiling over with disgust at the way our defense program is being handled; and I do not know of a better way to get this off my chest than to boil over on you.

Last Saturday I was at Alamogordo, N. M., the site of the two largest saw mills within the State of New Mexico. These mills have the lumber contract for the new bomb plant at Roswell and the new bomb-sight plant at Alamogordo. One of these mills is shut down completely; the other one is barely running on parttime on account of strikes. The lumber dealers' prices have been frozen and a ceiling placed on the lumber market as of March prices. Consequently, the saw mill owners, not being able to advance the price of their lumber, cannot advance employees' wages. But the Union men will not listen to this and have struck. The two big government projects being bui't at Roswell and Alamogordo are hundreds of carpenters idle in these two towns as a result of the strike.

meeting the owner of one of the mills which is shut down This man informed me that he had told these Union ished that a seat on the sideline is men that on account of the price of his lumber frozen he could not advance their wages; but that if they would go to work, he would guarantee them enough overtime that their monthly checks would never be less than \$140.00. The Union considered this offer very unsatisfactory and the men are still on a strike; the mills are still shut down; and our defense plants are being seriously handicapped on account of lack of

lumber. Why is our administration at Washington so foolish as to set a ceiling on lumber prices as of March and not place a ceiling on Union labor scale wages as of March?

One of the best carpenters of this section went to Amarillo to contact the Pan-Tex plant for a carpentering job. He was asked if he had \$50 to make a down-payment on his initiation fee into the Union, and was told that he could pay the balance out of his pay checks later on. Not having this surplus money, and not wanting to buy a job or get robbed to get it, he came home thoroughly disgusted. He has lost confidence in his government and in the way our defense program is being operated. The government needs this work done and needs this, carpenter. This carpenter needs the job and has a large family to support.

Why are the sane, sensible people of the United States standing idly by and seeing our defense program run in this manner? Can't somebody do something to make Congress realize that a war is being fought for our very existence, and that labor racketeers and gangsters should not interfere with a great nation's struggle for its existence?

Ninety days ago a small camp was built in Clovis. Before a carpenter was hired, he was compelled to see a Union labor representative and pay unreasonable dues. The camp was completed in two weeks, and very few, if any, of the carpenters who built the camp were able to earn enough money to reimpurse them for the Union dues which they paid out in order to buy the job

I often wonder if the good American people really know what is going on, and that the administration at Washington is solidly behind and cooperating with, these labor unions. Can it be possible that the people are going to stand by and see our nation wrecked and ruined from the same sources and causes that were the downfall of France?

We buy lots of our lumber from the Marshall Lumber Company at Marshall Tex. whose manager told us this story on the long distance telephone this week. He says that the government is building a TNT plant within fifteen miles of his lumber saw mill at Marshall; that he was given a contract to supply the lumber. Then the government sent a recruiting officer to his saw mill and hired all the men working there. Consequently, the saw mill was shut down. The men at the TNT plant are now unable to work full time because they have no lumber with which to work, since the Marshall Lumber Company, which has the contract to supply the lumber has had to shut down. This is the worst case of inefficiency and inability that I have ever seen.




