#### A nation of criminals

committed a crime. And if you are just taking your little one to the nearby babysitter and you are in a hurry to get to work and you don't take time to use the child restraint seat, then you have committed a crime.

And if you fudge a bit on your income taxes, knowing full well how big corporations are getting away with murder, and knowing that you have to take advantage of every little break just to survive, you have committed a crime.

And so on. And so forth. Do you see what is happening, all in the name of "doing good" for society by our government? They are creating a mentality among the American people that "some" crime is accept-

able. Where do you draw the line? As you can tell from reading this column, I believe the less government interference in our personal lives the better. Their pushing into our lives is causing havoc with our trying to be law-abiding citizens. -And I doubt the government understands that they are the cause of what is becoming a national disgrace.

But what I see happening is that the government is putting more and more ropes around us. That is bad. The government virtually is forcing us to commit improper acts continually. And that's why I headlined this column "A Nation of Criminals."

#### Forced consolidation unacceptable Two of my colleagues, probably with the best of intentions, have of-

fered the Senate a bill that is completely unacceptable to many people in District 31.

Sens. Hector Uribe, D-Brownsville, and John Leedom, R-Dallas, recently introduced Senate Bill 263, a measure that would force counties or the state to do away with school districts that have an enrollment of less than 500 students.

To that extent, the bill isn't so awful. Our only objection would be that the school districts to be annexed or combined would have no say in the matter. We would have asked the sponsors to allow the

Their premise contains a basic flaw. School districts in rural areas often are dozens, even hundreds of miles from the next school district. The logistics of transporting students from an abolished school district to a new one 50 or 60 miles away are staggering.

If S.B. 263 passes, leaders of the new, consolidated school districts in the Panhandle and on the South Plains would have only two options. They either would have to expand greatly their transportation services to students or they would have to construct new schools at a point equidistant from the existing school district and the abandoned one.

Both options would involve new taxes and would create the very financial burden the bill is trying to

Forced consolidation might work for small school districts close to urban areas like Houston, San Antonio or Dallas, but it is not practical in the vast expanse of the Panhandle and South Plains. Nor, for that matter, would it it work in the far West Texas or on the Rolling

For all these reasons, we remain steadfastly opposed to S.B. 263 or any bill that would consolidate school districts without the consent of the affected district's board of trustees.
