Strangely enough, interspersed with the panorama of junk is several business locations where flowers bloom, and care and concern on the part of owners is highly visible. Apparently the good example of the few has not rubbed off on the majority in the area of civic pride.

A community to remain successful must look successful. A business that adopts the attitude that it owes the community nothing soon has nothing for a community. The appearance of a derelict business district will drive off more trade and future business prospects than a Chamber of Commerce can ever hope to

No business is an island in the community. All will eventually fall or prosper as the total town grows or dies. If individually, a business, lot or location will not respond to the appears for betterment for everyone's concern, then there must be coercive action taken by the proper authorities to insure the general welfare of all the affected citizens.

It is a sad commentary when personal pride falls so low as to force governmental intervention in our private affairs. This attitude of local noninvolvement is probably symptomatic of many of our pational ills. Society always loses when government is forced to do what individuals can and should do for them-

#### THE FAITH OF JESUS CHRIST

the faith of Jesus Christ, unto all and upon all them that believe" (Rom. 3:22).

Note, the Apostle Paul here does not refer to faith in Christ, but the faith of Christ. Nor does he refer to what Christ believed, but rather to fidelity.

One is objective; it believes in another. The other is subjective, it is a trustworthy character. One refers to what a person does, the other to what he is. If I have faith in you lobjectively) you should keep faith with me (be trustworthy, subjectively).

Seven times in St. Paul's epistles he refers to "the faith of Christ" and each time his purpose is to emphasize our Lord's worthiness of our complete confidence. That he does not refer to our faith in Christ is evident on the surface. In the passage above he declares that the righteousness of God, which is "by faith of Christ." is conferred "upon all them that believe" (Here's your

Similarly, in Gal. 3:22 he states

that "the Scripture hath concluded all under sin, that the promise, by (the) faith of Jesus Christ, might be given to them that believe." Here again, we believe, because He is worthy of our confidence.

Again in Phil. 3:9, the apostle expresses his desire for a righteous ness not of his own, "but that which is through the faith of Christ" - and is of God by faith." Here's man's faith again! He has faith in Christ because Christ is completely faithful, completely worthy to be believed in. He paid the full penalty for our sins and is now in heaven dispensing the merits of Calvary - riches of grace, mercy and forgiveness.

But remember, "the faith of Christ" always precedes our faith in Christ. What good would it do to believe in Him for salvation if He were not wholly to be relied upon for this? But He can be trusted "to save unto the uttermost all who come unto God by Him" (Heb. 7:25). This is why Paul could say to the terrified jailor at Philippi: "Believe on the Lord Jesus Christ and thou shalt be saved" (Acts 16:31).



The Texico Municipal School today announces a free meal policy for school children unable to pay the full price of meals served in schools under the National School Lunch Programs.

Local school officials have adopted the following family size-income criteria for use in determining

Children from families whose income is at or below those shown are eligible for meals free. In addition, families not meeting this criteria but with either unusual expenses due to unusually high medical expenses, shelter costs in excess of 30 percent of income, special education expenses due to the mental or physical condition of a child, and disaster or casualty losses are urged to apply.

They may do so by filling in the application forms sent home in a letter to parents. Additional copies are available at the principal's office in each school. The information provided on the application will be confidential and will be used only for the purpose of determining eligibility. Applications may be submitted any time during the school year.

In certain cases foster children are also eligible for these benefits. If a family has such children living with them and wishes to apply for such meals for them, they should contact the school.

In the operation of child feeding programs, no child will be discriminated against because of his race, sex, color, or national origin.

Under the provision of the policy the principal of either school will review applications and determine

If a parent is dissatisfied with the ruling of the official, he may make a request either orally or in writing to A. D. McDonald, Superintendent whose address is Box 237, Texico, NM, for a hearing to appeal the decision.

Texico School Board has officially raised prices of school lunches as follows: Students from 35 cents to 45 cents - Adults from 50 cents to 60 cents.


