Texico-Farwell All-Stars Are District Champions

Texico-Farwell Little League All-Stars are District 3 champions. They won the district championship Friday night in Clovis by topping the Clovis National Little League All-Stars 9-8.

The Twin-City team earned the right to represent District 3 and advance to the State playoffs which were to be in Artesia Thursday (Aug. 2) at 6 p.m. MDT.

The local team left for Artesia Wednesday at 10 a.m. for a practice session and to get used to the playing field. The trip to the state playoffs is supported by the Farwell Youth Commission, but any donations for the trip will be appreciated, say commission officials.

Coach Richard Deel commented that the boys played good sound baseball as they took advantage of the many errors made by the Clovis team and turned them into runs when the National's pitcher walked a total of 16 boys in the game.

Texico-Farwell All-Stars made the first runs which moved them ahead 3-0 in the first inning. Boys crossing the plate in the first inning were Keith Herington, Rowdy Chandler and Leslie Eubanks.

D. D. Foster and Mark Owen added two more runs in the top of the second and Stanley Goldsmith and Craig Kaltwasser scored two more runs in the third inning. The remaining two runs were added by Leslie Eubanks and Craig Kaltwasser.

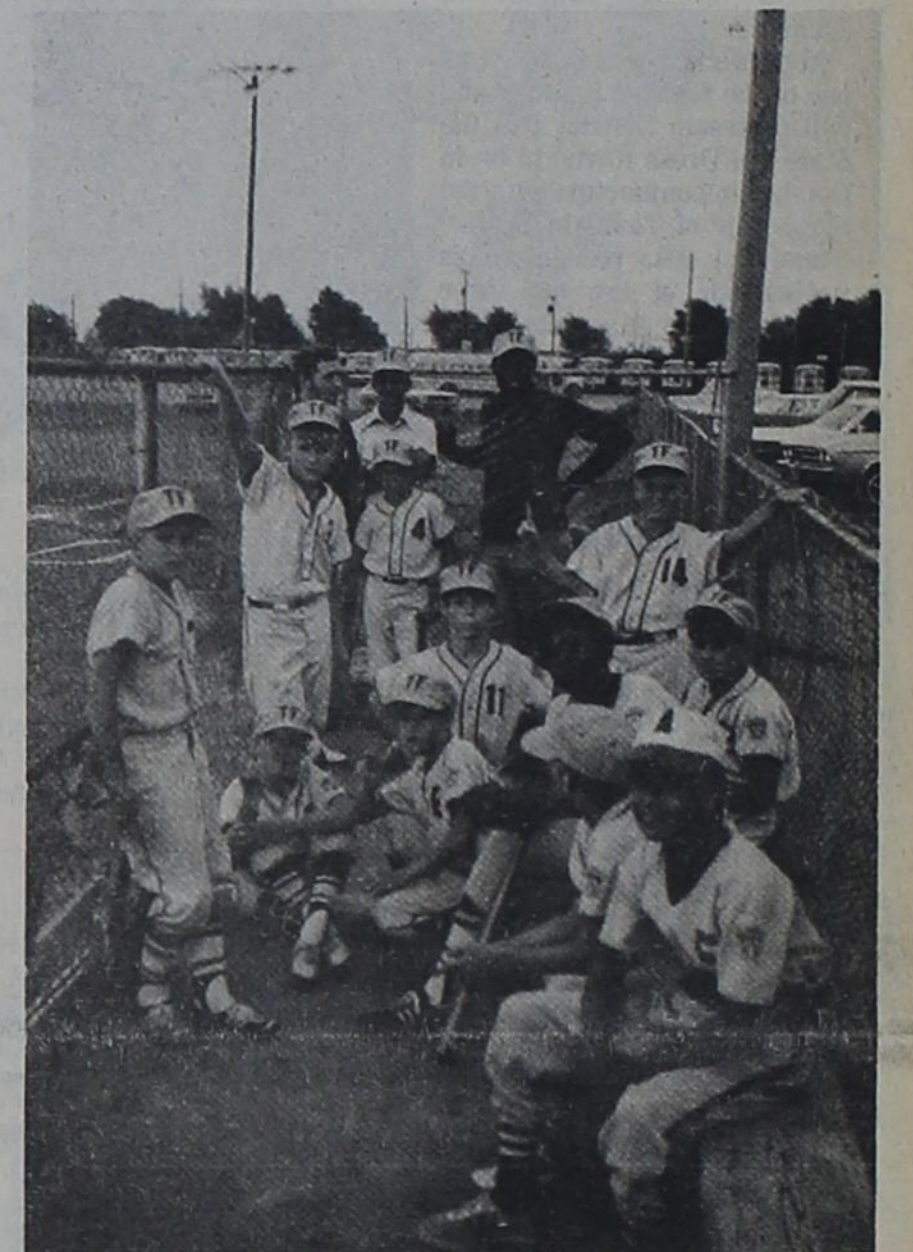
The local All-Stars held off a late game rally by the Clovis team to emerge as victors by the one-run margin.

Hear Firemen's Report - -

Farwell City Council Discusses Key Issues

Farwell City Council convened Monday, July 30, at 5 p.m. in City Hall. Members present for the regular session were Mayor Gil Patschke and Councilmen Fred Chandler and Jim Berry. City Attorney Charles Aycock and City Clerk Janie Bowery were also in attendance.

Firechief Lee Hutchins reported to the council on fire-training members received at the special school conducted on Texas A&M campus July 23-27. Fire department members Buster Gast and Jerry Mathis accompanied Hutchins to the school.

The men received three hours training per day Monday through Wednesday. They spent nine hours practicing new fire fighting techniques on Thursday. They trained for five additional hours on Friday before taking a final exam.

According to Hutchins, 15-16 different courses were offered during the week of instruction.

However, the entire session stressed the need for protective clothing and breathing apparatus in fighting fires. This is so, he said, because modern materials used in construction of houses and modern fixtures emit one of 20 toxic gases when subjected to intense heat. Of the 20, Hutchins reported phosgene and chlorine gas to be the most

Elbert Landrum, 64, of Farwell died Tuesday afternoon, July 31, at Memorial Hospital in Clovis after a short illness. He was admitted to the hospital Sunday.

Mr. Landrum was born in Saltillo, Tex., Nov. 12, 1909. He was a carpenter and retired farmer and had lived in Farmer County since 1920. He was a member of First Baptist Church in Farwell.

Survivors are his wife, Bessie; four brothers, Oliver of Dundee, Tex., and Douglas, Jesse and Gaston, all of Farwell; a half-brother, Billy of Florida; and one sister, Mrs. Nelson (Inez) Smith of Lubbock.

Services were to be Thursday at 3 p.m. CDT at the Farwell Baptist Church with Rev. Cliff Ennen officiating, assisted by Butch Franklin. Burial was to be in Lawn Haven Cemetery in Clovis, with Steed-Todd Funeral Home in charge.

Border Town Days - -

Parade, Rodeo Highlight Community's Celebration

The three-day celebration of the annual Border Town Days in the Twin Cities of Texico-Farwell featured a queen contest, rodeo, parade, barbecue, family reunions and toe-tapping music.

After two nights of rodeo

competition, citizens and visitors lined the main street through Texico-Farwell Saturday afternoon to see the 1973 version of the Border Town Days parade. The parade included riding clubs, floats, bicycles, antique cars and

various other vehicles and participants. Parade marshal was B. V. Hughes.

Capitol Foods float won first place and was awarded first prize money of \$50. Farwell Junior Cheerleaders won second place and Hughes Auto Parts was named third place winner. They received \$25 and \$15, respectively.

Four riding clubs participated in the parade. Farwell Riding club acted as host and was not eligible for competition. Trophies were awarded to the Y-L 4-H Riding Club of Muleshoe, first place winner; Friona Riding Club, second place; and Bovina Riding Club for third place.

Immediately following the parade, a barbecue was served in Farwell City Park with Floyd Trantham of Clovis catering the meal. Approximately 155 persons attended the barbecue.

Musical entertainment was provided by Ed, Juanita and Kevin Hardage, with Splinter Dorris as vocalist. Also, Fred Chandler and his western group played and sang. Butch Franklin, accompanied by Mrs. Cliff Ennen, sang several religious solos.

The Ray Ford family won the traveling plaque again this year with 26 members of the family in attendance at the Family Reunion. Ford's cousin traveled the farthest distance, approximately 700 miles from Little Rock, Ark.

In special recognition, Elmer Hargrove, former Farwell mayor, and L. R. "Jelly" Vincent, former councilman, were honored for their years of service to the City of Farwell, having served from 1965-1973. W. T. Perry presented each of them an inscribed plaque on behalf of the citizens of Farwell.

Climaxing the three-day celebration was the final performance of the American Junior Rodeo Association-sanctioned rodeo, sponsored by the Farwell Community Arena Association, and the crowning of the 1974 Border Town Days Queen Saturday night. Merchandise Recovered From Recent Break - Ins

Parmer County Sheriff Charles Lovelace reports that a warrant is out on a suspect who burglarized three area stores during the month of July. The suspect has not as yet been apprehended.

The suspect reportedly burglarized Surplus City of Clovis on July 19, Gibson's Discount Center of Clovis on July 22, and Rip's Western Wear of Texico, July 22.

The sheriff's office of Tulia turned over merchandise to

Parmer County authorities which was reportedly taken in the area burglaries. The merchandise was found by Tulia officers in an overturned pickup truck 12 miles east of Tulia. Items recovered were six pairs of western boots taken from Rip's Western Wear, and two hand guns, one deer rifle, a large amount of ammunition, four gun scopes, three cartridge belts and holsters, one ice chest and one new mud grip tire taken in the Surplus

City burglary.

Sheriff Lovelace reports that investigating officers on Tuesday also recovered merchandise from a home in the Oklahoma Lane community. Items recovered there were seven pairs of boots, six of which belonged to Rip's Western Wear and one pair which belonged to Surplus City. Also found were one color television set and stereo tape deck taken from Gibson's.

commonly produced. City Attorney Aycock suggested investigating modernization of city water lines necessary to decrease insurance key rates. Also, the addition of a high pressure pump was discussed to further modernize the water system. Weak fire protection for the business and residential districts in Farwell was attributed to the carrying capacity of present city water lines.

Fred Chandler moved that the project be put out for bids. Bids are to include charges for installing a 10-inch water main and necessary associated equipment. The City will reserve the right to reject any or all bids. The motion was seconded by Councilman Berry.

Mayor Patschke discussed further information he had acquired on proposed tennis court construction and costs. A regulation court is 60'x120'. He noted the City of Las Cruces constructed 12 such courts for a total of \$208,000. Patschke

was in contact with Clovis paving contractor, K. Barnett and Sons. The company estimated \$4800 for asphalt at \$3-\$3.50 per yard; \$3200 for vinatex, a finishing material, at \$2 per yard; and \$2000 for lighting the courts. Mayor Patschke estimated the proposed two courts would cost \$12,000.

Location of the courts was also discussed. A preliminary site has not been determined. City Attorney Aycock suggested the possibility of receiving government aid to build the facility. The tennis court motion rested until further inquiries are made into such assistance.

The weed ordinance was discussed. Attorney Aycock will draw up the format by which to inform land owners to clean their vacant lots. Two church properties were also placed on the tax rolls after consideration by the council.

Review of the City Budget was the final matter on the agenda. The Council determined to utilize \$11,000 accumulated under the revenue sharing program for city projects.

AJRA Rodeo Hands Take Top Hands

Results of the AJRA Rodeo in the Farwell Roping Arena over the weekend reveal two all-around recipients from New Mexico and four from Texas from a field of 463 individual event competitors.

All-Around Girl and Boy for the 12 and under age group were Kim Chesney of Andrews and Sterling Price of Tatum, N.M., respectively. In the 13-15 age group, All-Around winners were Shanna Bush of Mason and Ronald Graves of Silverton. Lisa Jo Mann, Hobbs, N. M., and Perry Rowland, Lubbock, garnered All-Around honors in the 16-19 age group.

Contestants had to be entered in three events before being eligible for All-Around honors. These cowboys and cowgirls were awarded trophy belt buckles for their efforts.

Miss Chesney, entered in the girls pole bending, girls flag race and girls barrel race, pulled down two second places and a third, respectively. Price entered the boys flag race and break-away roping, winning first place in both events to cop All-Around honors.

In girls' competition, ages 13-15, Miss Bush won second places in the barrel race, pole bending and break-away roping for All-Around recognition. Male counterpart and All-Around winner in this age group for boys was Ronald Graves. Graves placed first in bull riding and barrel racing.

Results of the 16-19 age group reveal Miss Mann winning a first in barrel race, second in pole bending and fourth in break-away roping. All-Around winner in the boys' division was Perry Rowland who clocked the best time in tie-down roping competition and had the second-best time in steer wrestling.

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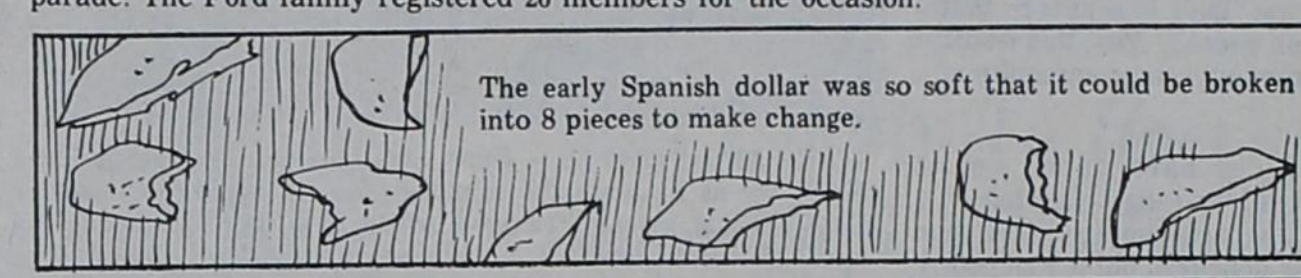

parades have bands but it takes long-range planning.

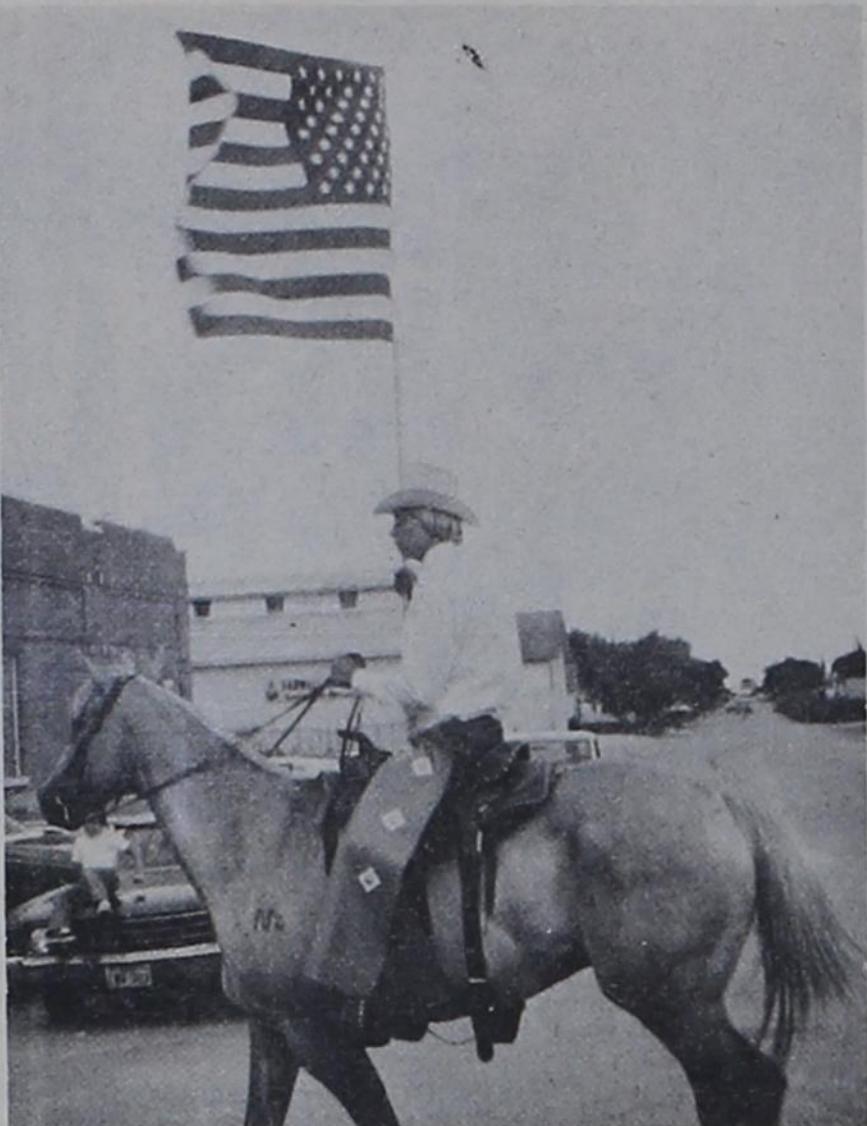

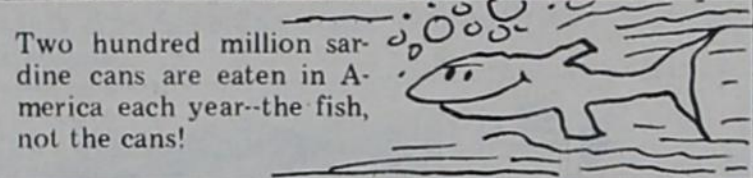
Too bad so many persons missed coming to the Park and hearing the entertaining music. There was plenty of toe-tapping!

Land Use Subject Of Abilene Conference

Long-range use planning is the subject of a day-long conference to be in Abilene August 7.

City planners, state and local officials, conservationists, and others interested in sound land use are being urged to attend.

The conference is co-sponsored by Texas Council of the Soil Conservation Society of America and West Texas Chamber of Commerce. The meeting will be in the McGlothlin Student Center on the campus of Abilene Christian College from 9 a.m. to 4 p.m.

Speakers will include Congressman Omar Burlison; Land Commissioner Bob Armstrong; Emil Rassman, president of West Texas Chamber of Commerce; A. B. Linford, president of Soil Conservation Society of America; Doyle Hutcheson, president of Texas Association of Soil and Water Conservation Districts; and other officials.

Paul Larson of Abilene, president of Texas Council of the Soil Conservation Society

of America, will preside over the morning session. Bob Scott of Fort Worth, chairman of Water Conservation Task Force, West Texas Chamber of Commerce, will preside in the afternoon.

Massive urban and industrial growth, coupled with shrinking land resources, is causing many concerned citizens to debate the feasibility of controlling the use of land at some time in the future. They point to the construction of homes in floodplains or factories on prime agricultural land as examples of misuse of land resources.

A total of 17 speakers - farmers, livestock producers, county and city government officials - are scheduled to discuss the advantages and disadvantages of land use planning from their viewpoint.

The overall cost of living index has risen by 73 percent in the past 25 years. The increase for all food was 61 percent.

TWO MINUTES WITH THE BIBLE

THE BIBLE IS FOR YOU

No matter which translation of the Bible we examine, one fact stands out with particular emphasis and clarity: The Bible was written for the people, for the populace at large, not for some special class among them. St. Paul addressed his epistles to both "laity" and "clergy": "To all that be in Rome" (Rom. 1:7), "unto the church...at Corinth...with all that in every place call upon the name of Jesus Christ our Lord" (I Cor. 1:2), "unto the churches of Galatia" (Gal. 1:2), "to all the saints...at Philippi, with the bishops and deacons" (Phil. 1:1), etc.

When Paul proclaimed the gospel at Berea his hearers did not take even this great apostle's word for granted, but "searched the Scriptures daily, whether those things were so," and for this God called them "noble" (Acts 17:11). They were the true spiritual aristocracy of their day.

Our Lord, when on earth, encouraged - even challenged His audiences to "search the Scriptures" for themselves (John 5:39).

Indeed, since God has revealed Himself and His plan of salvation in the written Word, we are responsible, each one for himself, to study the Scriptures. When Dives begged Abraham to be allowed to go and warn his five brothers about the horrors of hades, Abraham replied: "They have Moses and the prophets, let them hear them" and when Dives urged that a word from him would be more effective, Abraham answered: "If they hear not Moses and the prophets, neither will they be persuaded, though one rose from the dead" (Luke 16:29, 31).

Do not depend upon your clergyman to interpret the Scriptures for you but see for yourself what they say, for "every one of us shall give account of HIMSELF to God" (Rom. 14:12) and it will not be enough in that day to say: "But my minister or priest told me..." You are responsible to "search the Scriptures" for yourself to "see whether these things are so."

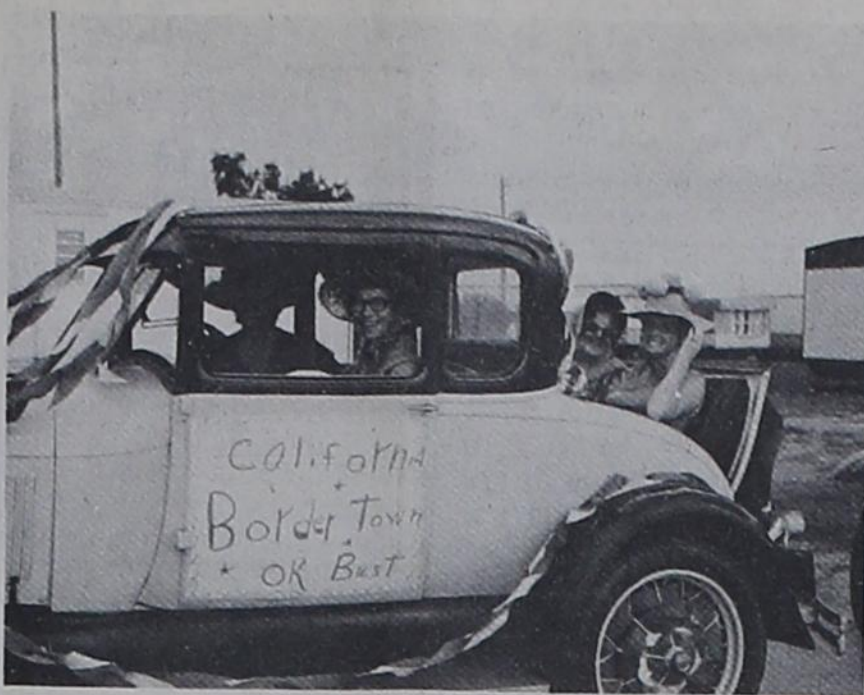
