

Peaches May Be Canned Without Using Sugar

water or strained fruit juice made from the softer peaches. Wash, peel ter to a boil and pour over packed Complete the canning operation by packing the raw peaches into a clean jar or can. Bring fruit juice or water to a boli and pour over packed fruit. Leave 1/2 inch headspace. Steam before sealing: pints, 10 minutes; quarts, 15 minutes; half gallons, 20 minutes. Press down and refil if necessary. Wipe off rim of jar and seal according to type of container being used. Process in a water bath after water starts boiling: pints and quarts, 15 minutes; half gallons, 25 minutes.

Another method to can without sugar is to drop the firm fruit into the fruit juice. Bring to a boil. Pack into boiling hot clean jars. Leave 1/2 inch headspace. Seal according to type of container used. Process in a boiling water bath, 15 minutes for pints and quarts, and 25 minutes for half gallons.

If a small amount of sugar i? available, the general wartime rule is to add one cup of sugar to two quarts of fruit. One cup of sugar syrup usually covers 1 quart of fruit when it is well packed. A thin syrup one cup sugar to three cups juice or water, is also desirable from a nutrition standpoint.

Corn syrup or corn sugar may be substituted for part or all of the sugar. One cup sugar and two cups corn syrup to 6 cups water makes a The largest peach crop farmers desirable syrup. 



man was in one of the eligible grades. Now all that is required to establish eligibility is proof that the wife was pregnant while he was in one of the eligible grades. The infant in these cases is also eligible for full care during his first year of life. Similarly, if the father of an infant whose mother did not receive care under the program was in one of those grades at any time during the infant's first year of life, the infant's eligibility for care is estab-

The greatest effort or the new policy, which is retroactive to January, 1945, will be in bringing infants of discharged servicemen under the program for the full year in which the infant is entitled to care. The new regulation also clears up a matter about which some confusion has existed, that is, whether widows and their babies are eligible. Under this interpretation, they are undoubtedly eligible.

The procedure to be followed in establishing eligibility is simple. A wife has only to show to her physi-



For more than 40 years Navy men and their families in distress have looked to the Navy Relief Society for assistance. The society is the Navy's official welfare service, and is now an integral part of the Navy. Four and a quarter million men and women-authorized strength on July 1 of the naval services—and their dependents constitute a very large group of Americans subject to all the normal risks of distress and hardship, and in addition subject to many war-born strains and the increased expectancy of death.

The Navy Relief Society has a very close working arrangement with the American Red Cross. In its effort to be of service to Navy families in distress, and to the families of Coast Guardsmen and Marines, the Society does not duplicate Red Cross work, nor does it extend relief in areas served by public funds. It extends financial assistance in the men in the naval services and their families for emergencies involving the distress of dependents for basic and for dental service where health den transfer, and distress in a number of other categories are dealt with by the Society.

Our domestic supplies of fats and oils will be approximately one and one-half billion pounds less than last year. Yet thousands of tons of fats are still needed to help make countless essentials for the battle- and home-fronts.

While country people have been doing an even better job of saving fats than the city folks, we must remember that, because of the meat situation, we are in a better position to save. That's why we can't afford to miss a trick.

So, let's save not only the big amounts from frying and roasting, but also meat trimmings, plate scraps, and scrapings. Melt them down once a week and add the liquid fat to the salvage can. Skim soups and gravies. Scrape every pan. Every drop is important.

When your salvage can is full, take it to your butcher, and get 2 red points and up to 4¢ for each pound. If you have any difficulty, call your County Agent or Home Demonstration Agent.


