

A. rite of passage

A very familiar rite of passage is upon us: commencement time.

It seems there is a veritable plethora of graduations: of college, of high school, of junior high, of kindergarten and even of preschool.

Each in its own way is important. Because it's a clearly-defined way that society has of crediting its young people with improvement in their lives. And such improvement is necessary for society to maintain and expand its own living standards.

The significance of graduation is probably lost upon some of its participants. It's easy to take for granted. Often we are so close to the trees that we can't see the forest. But observers, such as parents, relatives and close friends, may be in a position to better appreciate what is occurring as they watch this maturation process.

Probably the most important local graduations deal with 12th graders -- the culmination of high school. Youngsters realize an important decision is at hand: college or the work force. Or sometimes both.

I'm sure some youngsters who are raised in small towns can't wait for the moment when they get their high school diplomas so they can move on to what they think are bigger and better things. Having watched the TV shows based in places like Miami and Los Angeles, some probably can't wait to get to the big city. They may look back on their small town as a place to view from their rear view mirror. But us old folks, through our own experiences, know that time has a knack of changing people. And we know that when the brood leaves the nest, there often comes a time when a return home results. It's a matter of time. As I've written, the big cities just don't have the kind of life the Twin Cities, for example, can offer. But all of us need to find our own answers. So, I suspect, some youngsters are avidly looking forward to spreading their wings afar. But the day may come when those who can't wait to beat a path farther afield can't wait to make an about-face. Home. The magical word. As we wend our way through life, that little, old word assumes more and more significance. That's not to say that I believe everyone should stay put. On the contary, our society has many experiences to offer. The only advice I would offer, though, to those who are ready to try them, is a note of caution: Remember your roots. Remember your home. There may come a day when they become the most important things in your life. And to those graduates who will stay closer to the nest, don't be concerned that "life may be passing you by." There are plenty of places to visit during a lifespan; few worth spending a lot of time in. What have they always said of New York City? "A nice place to visit, but I wouldn't want to live there." When you stop and think about what's most important in life, the security and comfort of a home and family, and doing God's work, probably ranks at the top. Yet those concepts often are difficult for a youngster to comprehend. They just don't jive with "sowing a few oats." That's the way it has been and likely will always be. Let's just hope that youngsters, having been given the necessary moral fiber, understand that, in the long run, the setting of their youth will be a special place to return to. It will always be there. And, in time, graduating youngsters will look back and better appreciate the understanding, help, advice, friendship and love that

Marriage began on the side of the road

Ardie Stockton and H.P. Winkles were married on the side of the road June 27, 1914.

They were in her brother-in-law's car. He was a Justice of the Peace. They were planning to stop and get married anyway.

Just out of the clear blue, they decided to stop on the side of the road and get married. They had a few friends following in a horse and buggy and waited until they caught

Ardie lived in Anlow, Texas, near Paris. Her family farmed in the Greenwood community. There were 10 children in her family--seven sisters and three brothers.

Harvey, Ardie's husband, came to the Greenwood community from Alabama. They met each other through school.

After they married, they farmed in Anlow. In 1921, they moved to the Black Tower community with their two children and continued to farm. This is located in Clovis.

The children went to school at Port Air, now Cannon Air Force Base. During this time, Mrs. Winkles had five more children.

In 1932, the Winkles moved to the Pleasant Hill community. On their farm they raised chickens, cows, wheat, maize, kaffer corn and pinto beans.

"The dust bowl had hit about this time. It blew in from the north and you couldn't see anything," said Ardie. "We drove to town and you couldn't see the front of your car."

While living at Pleasant Hill, their last two children were born.



water over them. Then they added the grease or cracklings and poured

that into jars. In 1916 the Winkles got their first car--a Ford. She did not drive much. Once while she was driving she hit a tree and she decided that wasn't for her. Back in those days you didn't take tests like today. You just filled out papers and you received your license.

Mrs. Winkles remembers the store run by Ruby Stone, which has gone out of business. Also, Rip's Western Wear, which is still there. Some hobbies of Ardie's are cooking pies, crocheting, quilting and tatting. Mrs. Winkles' late husband, Harvey, liked to play checkers anytime and anywhere. He would travel great distances to play.

In 1969 at the age of 72, Mrs. Winkles rode on a motorcycle and enjoyed every minute of it. At the age of 80 she went deer hunting by Carlsbad. She didn't see a deer but had fun anyway.

businesses proposed

Three members of the Farwell Chamber of Commerce appeared before the Farwell City Council Monday to suggest that a person be hired to seek more homes and businesses for the community.

John Getz, Chamber president, noted that some small towns in West Texas are on the decline and it would be good for Farwell to act now to avoid any such occurrence happening here.

Getz stressed that more mediumincome housing is needed; something needs to be done about empty buildings along the highways; and that more small businesses are needed, which would expand the tax base and help keep taxes down.

"We need planning to protect our community's future," said Getz. Speaking next was I.W. Quickel, Chamber executive secretary. He noted that a questionnaire had been sent to local groups and organizations asking if they felt a person was needed to seek more business. He said the majority of the responses favored such a course, to be jointly financed by the Chamber and city.

Quickel pointed out that the medium age of Farwell residents is increasing and there is a need to get more youth into the community. The lower school enrollment was also mentioned.

Then Mike Pomper, State Line Tribune publisher, made the following proposal to the council:

1. The Chamber would give \$2,400 over 24 months for a two-year project whereby a person would be hired part-time to work on the ideas mentioned by Getz.

2. The total cost for the project would be between \$13,000 and \$14,500--or between \$6,500 and \$7,250 per year. This would be for salary and expenses for the person hired. 3. The council would appoint two ing for city hall.

of its members to draw up a job description. Then the city would place ads in area papers seeking applicants. The council would hire a person for the job.

After the Chamber presentation, councilman Curtis Smith moved to table the proposal until the June meeting so the council would have time to consider it. The motion was approved unanimously.

In other business, the council: -Awarded a bid for seal coating the city streets to Eastwood Construction, Clovis, which bid \$29,824. Other bidders were: Appian, \$29,745.25, and Lipham, \$30,720.

--Appointed councilwoman Elizabeth Phillips to work with Gladys Hardage on seeing how Farwell could be named a Sesquicentennial community.

--Appointed Mrs. Phillips and councilwoman Ysleta Kittrell to check into the cost for new carpet-

"If I keep a living I will get old," says Mrs. Winkles.

The baby girl named Emily Katherine, weighed seven pounds an acreage allotment of 54 million acres and a marketing quota of 1,955 million bushels for the 1986 wheat crop.

Unless new legislation prevents it, Martin L. Chandler, Parmer County Executive Director, said marketing quotas will be required if approved by at least two-thirds of the producers voting in a referendum to be held July 19-26. "While new farm legislation is being enacted, farmers need to know the program provisions that could be in effect," he said. If marketing quotas areproved, the 1986 wheat program would include mandatory acreage controls with stiff penalties for overplanting of the allotment, a two-tiered price support system, a domestic and export certificate program financed by processors and exporters, and, under certain conditions, a mandatory land diversion program. "If more than one-third of the eligible producers voting in the referendum reject marketing quotas, the basic wheat program would contain a price support loan program set at 50 percent of parity. This would be available only to farmers planting within their acreage allotment, with no acreage controls or penalties for overplanting, no domestic or export certificate program, and no land diversion authority." Chandler said eligible farmers are those who have an interest in a

farm with an established acreage allotment that will be derived from the wheat allotment history that has been suspended since the 1977 crop.

Used under large crop conditions, marketing quotas allocate the market among farms growing the crop. "They are made effective through farm acreage allotments and monetary penalties on production or marketings from excess acreage if the acreage exceeds the farm allotment," the ASCS official

**Parmer County farmers enroll** 

When the 1985 farm program sign-up period ended April 1, Parmer County farmers had enrolled 375,221.6 acres, or 80 percent of their eligible wheat, feed grains, and cotton acres in the acreage reduction programs.

Martin L. Chandler said Parmer County producers enrolled 1152 farms in the programs and agreed to take out of production, at least 30 percent of their wheat and upland cotton base acres, and 10 percent of their feed grain. "This means that as much as 77,300 acres of cropland in Parmer County could be idled this year, depending on how many acres of program crops are planted by participants," Chandler said. The cropland taken out of production must be devoted to an acreage conservation reserve to protect it from wind and water erosion, he said.

Crop base acres enrolled in the 1985 farm programs include

176,332.2 acres of feed grains, 109,-442.8 acres of wheat, 89,446.6 acres of upland cotton.

Designed to control excess crop supplies and maintain a level of stocks in line with market demand, the acreage reduction program offered incentives to farmers to reduce plantings. Program partici-

pants will be eligible for price support loans at National Rate of \$3.30 a bushel for wheat, \$2.55 for corn, \$2.08 for barley, \$1.31 for oats, \$2.42 for sorghum, and \$0.55 per

pound for upland cotton. They are also eligible for target prices of \$3.03 per bushel for corn, \$2.88 for sorghum, \$2.60 for barley, \$1.60 for oats, \$4.38 for wheat, and 81 cents per pound for upland cotton.

In addition to the above benfits, wheat and upland cotton participants will be eligible for land diversion payments. These payments compensate farmers for taking land out of production in addition to the acreage reduction requirement, the ASCS official said.

#### **Cattle totals given**

In 1984, almost 5.3 million cattle moved through the feedlots, and 4.9 million were slaughtered in the packing plants located in Southwestern Public Service Co. service territory, reports the electric utility's recent annual Fed Cattle Survey.

# Laney thanked for support

#### Dear Rep. Laney:

This morning I had an occasion to review the history of the Water District's efforts to release water from the wet sand section of the Ogallala formation and your contributions to this effort came to mind.

As I recall, shortly after I came up with this idea, I visited you in your office in the capitol. You took the time to listen to the idea, asked questions, and offered suggestions. At the conclusion of our visit, you encouraged me to pursue the idea. In doing so, you offered me an opportunity to present the idea before the Natural Resources Committee in the House of Representatives along with an opportunity to request research funds from the state through the Texas Department of Water Resources to fully investigate and field test secondary recovery of water from the wet sand section of the Ogallala.

The support you provided during the hearing, your efforts to see that funds necessary for the study be recommended by the Natural Resources Committee, followed by your support before the appropriations committee, then on the floor of the house, followed by your support in the House-Senate Conference Committee on final approval of the state appropriations for natural resource agencies resulted in funds being made available for the study. The above required a tremendous effort on your part.

An idea or theory without necessary funds to test or develop it is of very limited value, therefore, without your help in securing funding, we may never have found out that a tremendous volume of water is in storage in the wet sand section of the Ogallala Formation above the water table and further that a substantial portion of it can be released for recovery from wells by injecting air under pressure into the wet sand section.

Future generations who use the technique to obtain water in this area, other areas of the state, the nation, or the world will likely never be aware of your contribution to this effort, but please be assured that the residents of the High Plains of Texas, especially we at the Water District, appreciate the vast contribution you have made to this effort.

We are pleased to report that the water levels in the area of the first two test sites since the air-injection test ended are still higher than they were before we conducted the test. The enclosed maps reflect the water level rises which remain in the area of each test even though three seasons of pumping for irrigation have occurred since the tests.

We have recently completed another air-injection test near the City of Wolfforth in Lubbock County. The results of this test are presently being analyzed and will be published in the next few months. We will provide you a copy of the summary of this test when it is released.



# Summer annual forages available

Many Parmer county horse owners are wondering what types of forages may be available under the open grazing and hay harvesting programs available to producers on set-aside acres in 1985, says Gary Patterson, county Extension agent for agriculture.

Many good forages are available, Patterson said. But he offered several cautions and suggestions to improve the picture.

"Many of the sorghum and sorghum sudan grass hybrids cause a problem called sorghum cystitis in horses," he cautioned. He said this can lead to kidney and coordination problems, as well as death.

"Pearl millet can be planted about the same time as the other forage materials. Plant from five to seven pounds of seed per acre in 38to 40- inch rows or drill 15 to 20 pounds per acres if using a grain drill. The seed should be covered with from 3/4 to an inch of soil because of their small size. "The millets can be grazed when they reach a height of 18 to 24 inches. This will give excellent quality as well as adequate forage," he said. By utilizing rotational grazing, allowing livestock to graze pearl millet to a shorter height and moving to fresher forages, better quality can be maintained throughout the summer, he advised.

Excess forage can be cut at the boot stage to have a good quality hay that can be used during the winter and other times when forage is needed, he said.

"One disadvantage of pearl millet is that under drought stress conditions where high fertility levels have been maintained, nitrate toxicity may occur," the Extension agent said. He urged producers to watch their livestock when stress conditions occur. Material can be cut and tested for nitrate levels so you know when to remove animals to prevent death due to nitrate toxicity, he said. Pearl millet hybrids are sold by various companies and producers should check with local seed dealers for them, he said.

The program serves students in school as well as those that are not attending because of special needs. Child Find puts children with special needs in touch with qualified people that can help."

Children eligible for Child Find services include:

Behaviorally Disordered-children with serious problems getting along with other children and adults. This acting out or withdrawn behavior may affect the ability to perform in school.

Communication Disordered-this child has trouble talking or understanding language. Children may be unable to make certain sounds, leave sounds out, make sounds that cannot be understood, stutter, or have difficulty understanding or

Hearing impaired-evaluation has shown that this child is either hard of hearing or deaf. Hard of hearing indicates they have serious hearing loss, but may use the sense of hearing with or without a hearing aid or other special instrument. Deaf indicates that children cannot use the sense of hearing as other people do.

Learning disabled-this child has shown problems in listening, thinking, speaking, reading, computing, or writing skills. This child is not retarded or physically handicapped, but does learn in a different style. This can cause serious problems acquiring knowledge and may affect one or more subjects at school.

Mentally handicapped-evaluation has shown that this child learns slower than others of the same age. Their social, physical, language, and motor development, may lag behind that of other children. The three terms used to describe mental handicap reflect the general range (or degree) of impairment, educable mentally handicapped-to trainable mentally handicapped.

Multiply impaired-children have more than one serious handicap. Such as a mental handicap and a physical impairment so involved that together they cause a new educational issue.

Physically impaired-this student has either an orthopedic impairment or a chronic health impairment which affects the ability to perform in school.

School age children who are not in school and who seem to have special needs should be referred to your local school district. Children younger than school age who seem to have trouble moving, hearing, seeing, talking, or understanding are also eligible for Child Find.

### **Texas farmers under stress**

The story of agriculture in Texas is the same as in other states-farmers are under severe financial stress.

While gross farm income in Texas stood at about \$11 billion in 1984 (the same as in 1979), net income totaled only about \$1 billion--half of what it was five years ago. Thus the purchasing power of Texas agriculture is about 25 to 30 percent of what it was in 1979.

The current farm financial stress in Texas and across the nation stems largely from depressed crop and livestock prices, steady increases in costs, adverse weather





The only way a spot that large can be cared for is to clean it with hoe and rake and keep it clean daily. To burn those weeds would ruin every monument in the cemetery. I imagine that would be cause for a few lawsuits. The cemetery is always open for family and property-holders to go in and clean their grave sites. Seemingly, they are pleased with it as is. I talked to Mrs. Overstreet last week about the cemetery and my commitment to Mr. Overstreet. She and I think the same way: I'm still in charge. We each feel this way about this cemetery: "These defendants have been tried in the court in the land beyond the sun where the weak are made strong, the poor rich, where the oppressor's rod is broken and all earthly distinctions fade away."

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
