Deadline is today

116 celebrities donate items to auction

With the Celebrity Auction just over a week away, plans are falling into place.

The auction will feature items donated from celebrities throughout the nation. Doors will open at 6 p.m. at the Farwell Community Center June 22. Supper will be served and a concession stand will be open.

The auction is a fund-raiser for the Community Center.

The deadline for turning in donated items for the auction is 5:30 p.m. today (Friday) at the State Line Tribune office, 404 Third St.

Well over 100 celebrities have sent items to Farwell so far. One of the nicest donations arrived last Friday from Bob Field, assistant football coach at UCLA. Field is a former star football player for the Farwell Steers and Arkansas Razorbacks.

Field sent four items: two UCLA game jerseys, one UCLA football helmet and one UCLA football coach's cap.

The helmet belonged to Kenny Easley, a three-time consensus All-American at UCLA. He was drafted in the first round in 1981 by the Seattle Seahawks and was selected as the Defensive Player of the Year

in the NFL this past season.

In his letter, Field said:

"I hope that these few items may be of some help in your efforts to raise money for the community center. I am sure many members of the community will benefit from such a facility. I have many great memories of the years I spent in Farwell and continue to enjoy many friendships that were made during those years."

In addition to items listed in past State Line Tribune accounts that came from celebrities, the newest arrivals are:

official proclamation; Detroit Tigers, a coffee mug; Buck Owens, a photo; and Richard Gere, a picture.

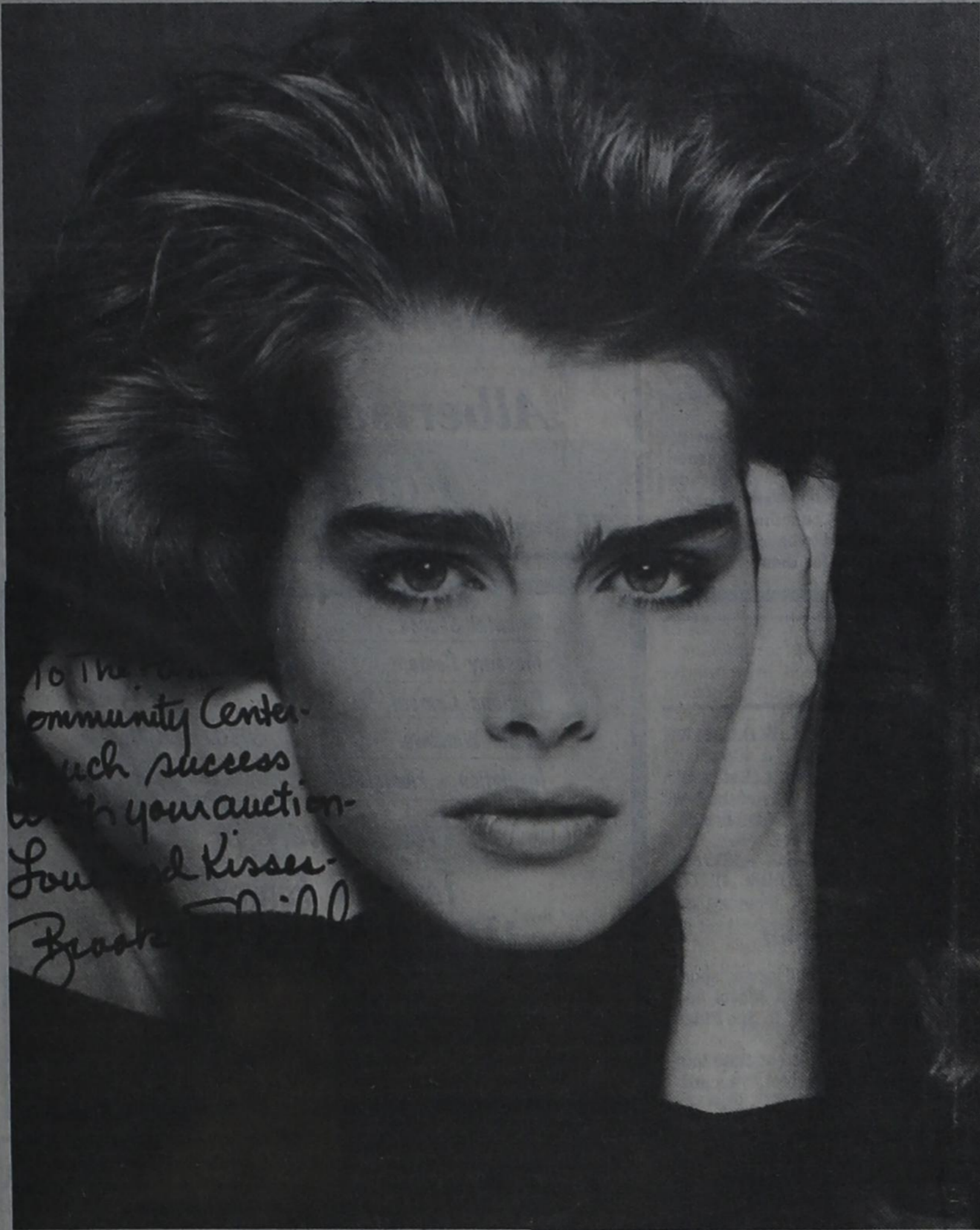

Also, David Kube, Jaycees; Sudie Foster, Girl Scouts; Billie Foster; Dollie Villeareal; Gladys Hardage, planning committee; Liz Phillips, City Council; John Grigsby, Farwell Schools; Ruth Bennett, Young Homemakers; Ricky Bennett, Cub Scouts; Charles Aycock, Boy Scouts; Jeneen Foster, Oklahoma Lane; Julia Symcox, Border Town Days Committee; Gloria Hutchins, 4-H; Mike Pomper, Texico-Farwell Lions Club; and all local ministers.

The committee has until July 1 to be sanctioned by the state Sesquicentennial Committee. This will enable Farwell to get its 1986

activities, such as Border Town Days, published in a state Sesquicentennial guide.

The committee discussed a logo for Farwell. It was decided to let Sheree Montgomery design it, which would feature corn, grain, cattle and the note "Last of the Capitol Land Trust."

Mrs. Kube also noted possible projects that the committee could get involved in next year. They included:

- Border Town Days.
- A newspaper commemorative edition (Pomper noted that next year will mark the 75th anniversary of the State Line Tribune and a special issue is planned).
- Renovating the XIT Marker at Parmer County Courthouse.
- Painting a mural on the side of the City Hall building.
- Have a quilting show.
- Design a city flag.
- Invite a descendant of the Farwell family to Border Town Days.
- Have a kickoff barbeque at the City Park.

The next committee meeting will be at 4 p.m. June 24.

Blacktopping for road asked

The Parmer County Commissioners Monday received a petition seeking the hardtopping of the extension of Farm to Market Road 145 for two miles.

This is the dirt road that runs off the "Loop" in Farwell to Highway 70-84 that leads to Muleshoe.

According to the petition:

"The construction of said hardtopped road will add to the safety of all travelers who now use the county roads, and particularly at the three intersections. Upon completion, this will add to the safety and convenience of all travelers leaving from Farwell toward Lubbock, and upon return from the Lubbock highway, as well as traffic to and from the State Line Road and south of Farwell. It will further alleviate Ave. A of traffic desiring to travel to Lubbock and other points East.

"This section of road out of Farwell probably has one of the highest, if not the highest, traffic rates of any unpaved road in Parmer County. This alone justifies being given a top priority for paving."

The petition asks that the commissioners urge the state highway department to take action.

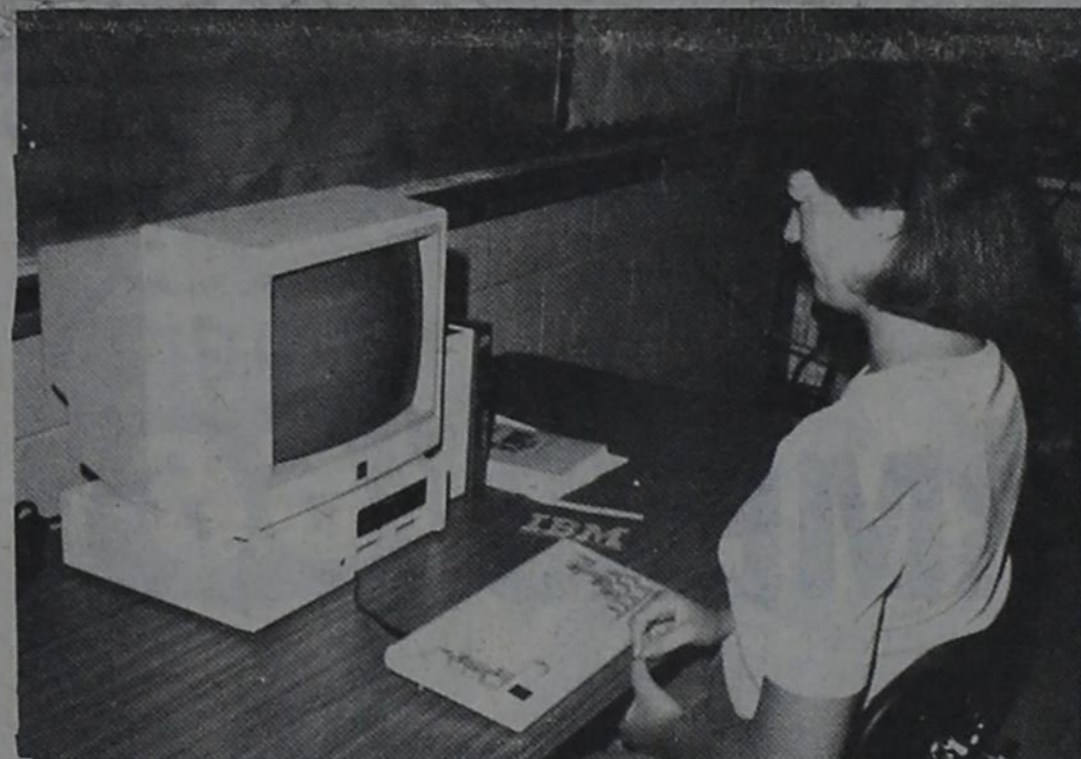
The commissioners took no action on the petition since it was withdrawn for amending purposes. The amendment, if approved, would say that all landowners involved would donate right-of-way for the project.

The petition is signed by Harold Travis, Tom Nichols, A.D. Corral, Diane McDaniel, Patsy Berry, Donald Watkins, Hurschel Harding, Johnny Atkinson, Buttons Howard, Don Williams, J.B. Sudderth, "Blackie" Williams estate, Mack Hancock and Pedro Arguelles.

If the state decides to do the work, the county still would be responsible for clearing poles and lines from the easement.

In other business, the commissioners:

- Renewed its liability coverage with a Friona firm.
- Tentatively agreed to a new health and hospitalization policy with Blue Cross/Blue Shield for county employees. The policy generally is more liberal.
- Approved increasing the part-time post in the District Court Clerk's office from three days a week to four days.

In other business, the council:

--Looked at new carpeting for City Hall. Firm estimated will be gotten.

--Bought a new calculator for \$149 for City Clerk Janie Bowery.

--Heard Mayor Walter Kaltwasser proclaim a resolution saying Farwell would be a Sesquicentennial Committee.

--Heard a request from Farwell United Drug asking for a dumpster, such as the Farwell Convalescent Center uses. The city is paid to remove trash. The request will be checked into.

--Still kept under advisement a suggestion made by the Farwell Chamber of Commerce last month proposing a person be hired to seek more businesses and housing for the city. Mayor Kaltwasser said he has heard a lot of unfavorable comment about it.

--Agreed that any funds raised from the Celebrity Auction would first go to pay off private loans, which are bearing interest, before paying back the city loan for the Community Center.

Jack Smith, 67, died Sunday in the Veterans Administration Hospital in Albuquerque. Funeral services were held Wednesday at Grady Baptist with Steed-Todd Funeral Home in charge.

Mr. Smith was born July 8, 1917 in Opolona, Ark., and moved from Oklahoma to New Mexico with his parents in 1929. He was a retired captain of the New Mexico State Police and past president of the New Mexico State Police Association. He was also a member of the First Baptist Church in Albuquerque and a member of the Lions Club and the Rotary Club of Farmington. Mr. Smith spent five years in the South Pacific during World War II while in the military.

Care needed with replanted cotton

Recent heavy rains and other bad weather have damaged or destroyed large acreages of cotton on the Texas High Plains. Thousands of acres will have to be replanted in June and producers need to use care in selecting varieties and cultural practices for an abbreviated growing season, warns a cotton specialist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service.

Replanting is complicated by several factors, said Dr. James R. Supak, the Extension agronomist. First, growers are nearing the cut-off date for planting to allow the crop to mature before harvest. Second, there are limited supplies of seeds for the more desirable varieties for late planting. "Many pro-

ducers will have to look at such alternate crops as grain sorghum, sunflowers, forages or, where they have sufficient water, soybeans," Supak said. He cautioned that before replanting with any alternate crop, the producer must get certified by his local office of the Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service.

Producers who replant cotton in counties north of Lubbock should consider varieties that fall into the very early maturity class, the Extension specialist said.

Late planted cotton generally requires a slightly higher than normal planting rate, Supak noted. He said research has shown that 55- to 60,000 plants per acre (4 to 4.5 plants per

foot of drill) is a good plant population for late cotton. This requires a planting rate of 20 to 25 pounds per acre, or six to eight seed per foot of drill.

Pre-emergence herbicide residues are frequently a problem in replanting. On land treated with Caporal of Karmex, seedling injury can generally be avoided by busting down to about four inches or more below the soil surface, Supak said. He said residual problems are unlikely to occur with Sancap and Dual unless the chemicals were applied to cotton planted in deep furrows. In such instances, it would be advisable to replant into untreated soil, he suggested.

Decisions concerning irrigation must be considered after late cotton is up and growing. "Because the yield potential for late planted cotton is reduced, fields having adequate moisture at replanting won't likely require additional summer irrigation," Supak said. In fact, yields and quality of late planted cotton are frequently reduced by overwatering.

Likewise, application of nitrogen fertilizers to late planted cotton tends to encourage vegetative growth and delay maturity, he cautioned. The specialist said the application of foliar fertilizer to cotton damaged by hail or foliar disease isn't recommended. "The leaf area of the damaged plants is usually too limited for such fertilizers to be of such benefit," he explained.

"Unfortunately, there is no way to

predict what type of weather conditions this crop will encounter later in the year," Supak said. "It's possible that warm, open weather will prevail into October and November. However, long term weather records indicate that generally, fiber development is essentially halted by cool night temperatures in mid-October."

Consequently, producers might be well advised to limit their inputs into a late planted crop, he cautioned.

USDA stresses conservation

Burning wheat stubble is bad business. For an average wheat crop, burning stubble sends about \$10 worth of nitrogen fertilizer an acre up in smoke. All nitrogen is lost by burning.

Using conservation tillage, however, you can plant in wheat stubble and use the nitrogen that is tied up in the residue said William Donham, district conservationist for USDA's Soil Conservation Service at Friona.

"The use of wheat residue is especially important in the Parmer County Soil and Water Conservation District, where more than 96,000 acres of wheat are planted annually," Donham continued. "Less than 3,500 acres are planted by conservation tillage. This practice, depending upon equipment used, leaves from 90 to 30 percent residue on the ground after planting.

"When residue decomposes in the soil surface, the nitrogen is made available for the next crop. In ad-

dition to the nitrogen, decomposing stubble adds organic matter to the soil, helps control erosion, deduces soil moisture loss, and improves soil aeration, tilth, and permeability. The stubble also helps provide a habitat for such wildlife as pheasants, rabbits, and quail."

Donham said to make the nitrogen in the residue available requires the activity of numerous soil organisms. They flourish in a soil rich in organic matter.

"One important organism is the earthworm," Donham said. "Research has shown that earthworms increase when a dependable supply of crop residue is available.

"They digest the organic matter and pass nutrient-enriched soil through their bodies. This recycles nutrients and makes the soil richer. In addition, their tunnels allow air and water to penetrate soil more rapidly. Burning stubble takes away possible organic matter.

"Don't pollute the air by burning money—that is, wheat stubble. Use conservation tillage to keep your nitrogen, protect against erosion, and improve the soil."

Home gardening can be an economical means of food production, with the added bonus of healthful outdoor exercise, opportunities for families to work together, a chance for children to learn how things grow and how much effort is needed to produce foods.

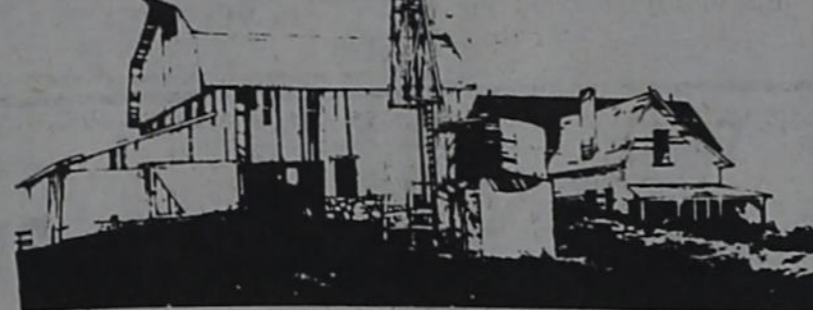

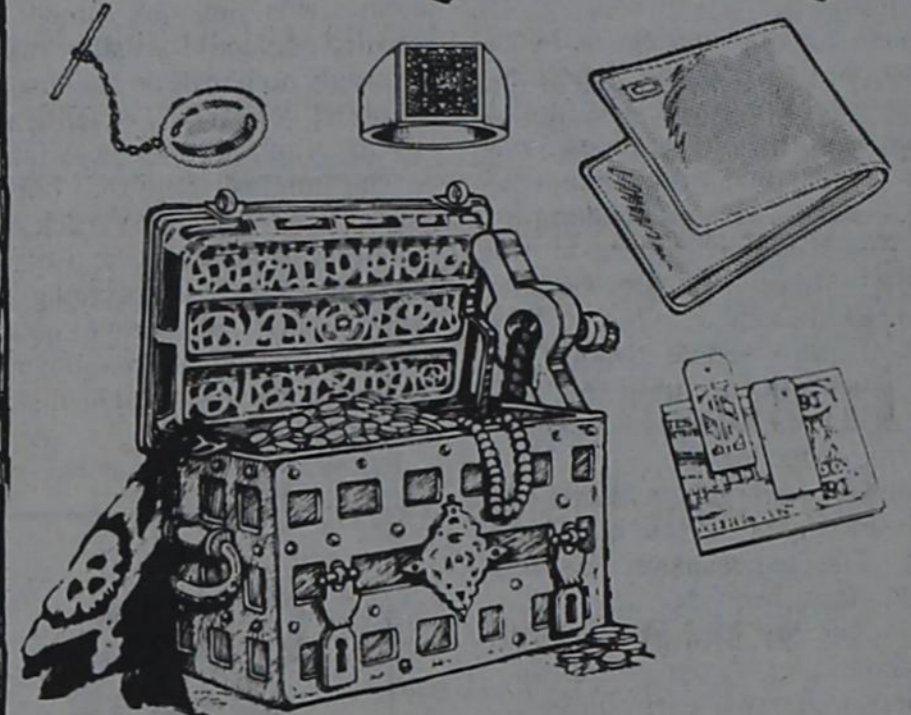

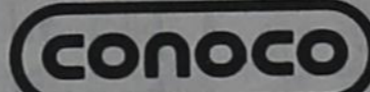

Franka Bungarten, foreign exchange student from Germany, will be leaving Farwell June 15 for Denver and a tour of the Western states.

She will return to Denver July 1 and fly to Washington, Boston and New York and should be home by July 19. During this time she will also be accompanied by Norbert Husermann, another foreign exchange student.

Franka has lost one year of schooling while she has been here. So she has two more years to go.

The schools in Germany are in three levels. First level is called low school. Second level is middle school, like our regular school, and if your grades are high enough you can go on to high school. The third level, or high school, includes foreign languages. Franka knows five—French, Latin, Greek, German and English.

Franka's school is not coed-educational so Farwell was something for her to get use to. She was taught languages and philosophies, not things like typing and home economics here. The teenagers in Germany are more aware of the world situation; here the students are not, said Franka.

In Germany people cannot get their driver's license until they are 18 years old so Franka is accustomed to riding her bicycle.

Things Franka has experienced over here cannot be taught in any school. The experiences she has learned have been personal. This year taught her how to be more independent, gave her more self-confidence and to learn different cultures. "I always have the chance to learn from books and teachers, but not from being an exchange student," she said.

She feels she took almost every chance she could possibly take and was only able to do so because of the support of the Texico-Farwell Rotary Club and her host families.

She was nearing the finish line when she saw a string going across in front of her. She didn't know what it was for and slowed down. The following Monday at school she was teased a lot about it.

Franka enjoys classical music,

Mexican food and gymnastics.

Franka has been able to travel here. Over Spring Break she visited Brady, Texas. Her older sister was an exchange student there the year before. From there she went to San Antonio. She enjoyed the museums, the Alamo and the river walk.

Franka traveled to Silver City and saw the White Sands and the Gila ruins.

She was able to see the space museum, White Sands and planetarium at Alamogordo.

The skiing trip to Taos-Ruidoso was a lot of fun. "People are so generous," said Franka.

Franka's school doesn't have a prom or caps and gowns for grad-

uation. Graduation there consists of a few speeches and diplomas are handed out.

She would like to go to college in Boston. She hopes to be a therapist for handicapped children.

Franka has lived with two families in Farwell. Her first family was Mr. and Mrs. Vernon Thigpen. The second was Mr. and Mrs. David George.

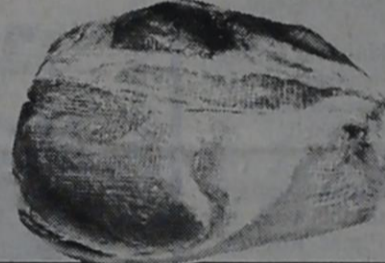
