This country rides on red tape. A tidal wave of government obfuscation was generated by the ill-conceived environmental laws and their attendant boards, bureaus and agencies.

Impact statements are also necessary for most any government project. Included among these projects are Urban Development, Health (as our Hospital Board can testify to), transportation, etc.

Occasionally an opportunity arises to bite back at these monsters and an opportunity did arise for the City of Midland. It seems that the Housing and Urban Development brass phoned the city dads of Midland asking for parking space for one of their vehicles at the Midland airport.

Thereupon, a blow was struck for liberty, as Midland replied:

"Reference is made to the request of Mr. J.C. Hays, Community Development Area Representative from your office, for a parking place at the Midland Regional Air Terminal for a U.S. Government vehicle to be used by your staff when they visit the West Texas area from time to time.

"We will of course be happy to process a proper application, but a simple request by telephone or letter just won't do at all. In order to justify as many public employees as possible and to make things as difficult as possible for anyone trying to do business with the City of Midland, we have adopted a few regulations and guidelines with which you must comply which are set out as follows:

"1. You must obtain from the U. S. Government Printing Office, or the National Archives, or the Library of Congress, or someplace, a supply of application form COM-1975. You must submit three executed and fourteen conformed copies of this application which we will then distribute to our Department of Aviation, Fire and Police Departments, the Public Works Department, the City Attorney's office and anyone else we can think of when they arrive.

"2. With the application submit the make and model of the proposed vehicle together with certified assurances that everyone connected with the manufacture, servicing and operation of same were paid according to a wage scale that complies with the requirements of the Davis-Bacon Act.

"3. Submit a genealogical table for everyone who will operate said vehicle so that we can ascertain that there will be a precisely exact equal percentage of whites, blacks and other minorities, as well as women and the elderly.

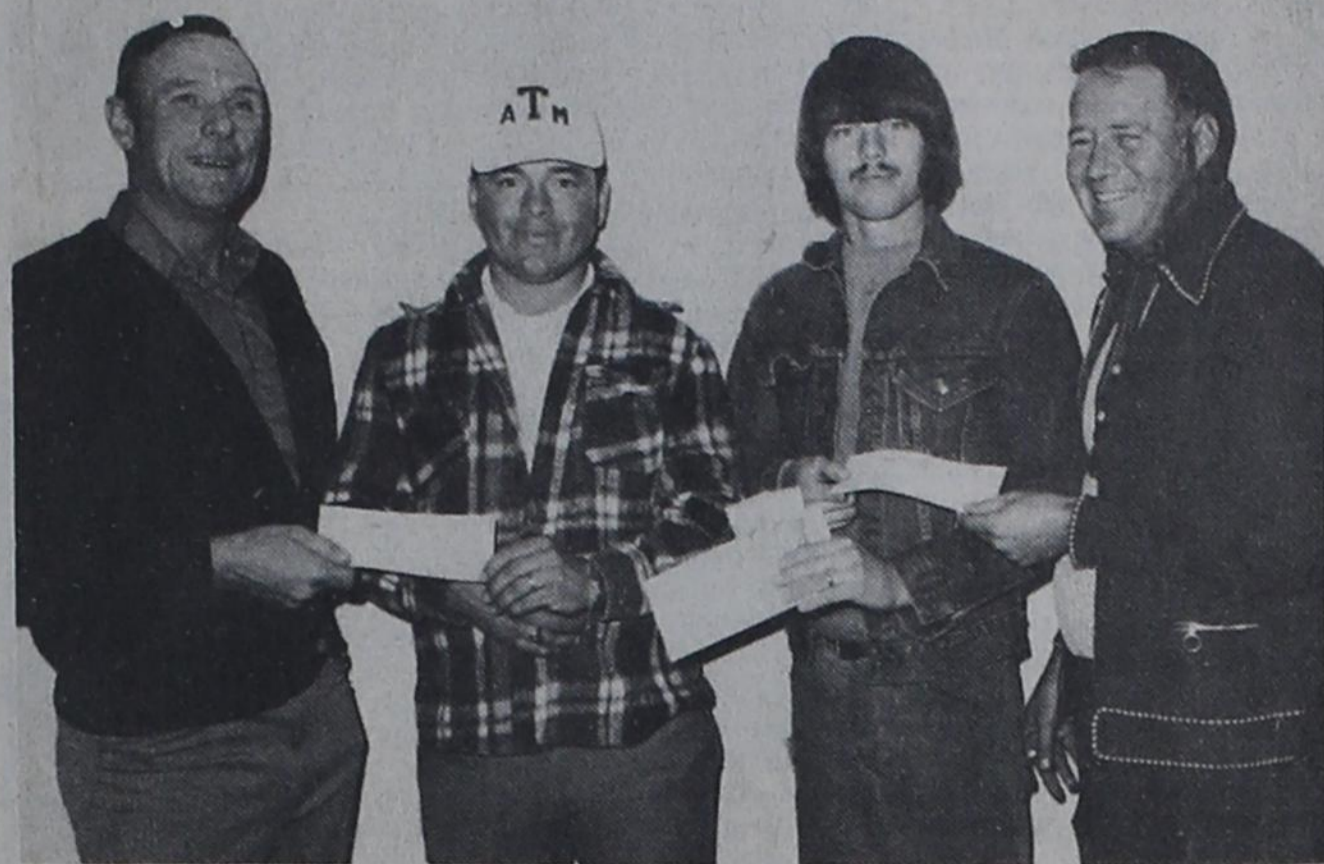
"4. Submit certified assurances that this plan has been discussed at length with the EEOC and submit that commission's certification that requirement 3 above has been fully complied with.

"5. Submit certified assurances that all operators of said vehicle and any filling station personnel that service same will be equipped with steel toed boots, safety goggles and crash helmets and that the vehicle will be equipped with at least safety belts and an air bag to show compliance with the Occupational Safety and Health Act.

"6. Submit an Environmental Impact Statement. You will probably want to hire an expensive consultant for this item, as you probably have no one on your staff with the expertise to prepare it. The statement should show the number of times the vehicle will be operated, times of day, the name of the operator of the vehicle, the number of other vehicles that might be coming into or leaving the parking lot at the same time, as well as the number and type of aircraft that might be landing or taking off at the airport at the same time and an exact conclusion as to the effect this will have on the atmosphere in West Texas.

"7. In order to obtain approval of a negative Environmental Impact Statement, you will not be able to:

Kirkland Takes Second - -

Gonzales Going To Cotton Bowl

Sam Gonzales of Muleshoe reaped a harvest for the second year in a row as he took top honors over 406 contestants in the 17th Annual Area Merchants Football Contest and received the Grand Prize.

The 12-week contest concluded last week with the winner winding up with a total of 93 points. A total of 119 points were possible and with his 93, Gonzales averaged out at 78 percent correct picks for the contest.

The prognosticator will be going to the Cotton Bowl to

view the game to be played New Year's Day 1976. Along with the two tickets he received for the game, the winner was also awarded \$50 in expense money.

Hot on the heels of Gonzales was Carl Kirkland who garnered Second Prize in the annual contest. Kirkland was six points behind the winner in the final tally of points with 87. For his second place win, Kirkland received two tickets to the Sun Bowl Game and \$25 expense money.

The Sun Bowl Classic will be played December 26 at Sun

Bowl Stadium in El Paso with kickoff set for 10:10 a.m. MST. Several persons were in the running for the two top prizes but lost out with the final week of guessing by only one game. Earlene Porter of Clovis closed in on the leaders and finished the contest only one point out of second place with a total of 86.

Fourth place holders at the end of this year's guessing were Frances Norton, Sue Kirkland and Albert Smith. The three contenders each had a total of 84 points.

With the 1975 football contest now history, Gonzales' name will go on file as a Grand Prize winner but not for the first time. He came out of third place during the final week of the 1974 contest and swept contestants to take the Grand Prize. This is the first time in the history of the local contest that a competitor has won the Grand Prize more than once, and Gonzales managed to do so for two consecutive years.

The 406 contestants who made bids for the 1975 prizes can now sit back and enjoy a ball game without wondering who called it correctly and who will be named winners in the weekly football contest. But have no fear, the football fever will return about the same time next year as the 18th Annual Area Merchants Football Contest kicks off.

For Committees - - Farmers Urged To Cast Ballots

Farmers are reminded of the December deadline for returning ASC committee election ballots to the County Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service Office. Voters will elect three committees and two alternate committeemen for each community in the county. Those elected will serve during calendar year 1976.

The election of ASCS Community committeemen is held by mail. Any producer of agricultural products is eligible to vote. An eligible voter will cast a ballot in the election in the county and community in which he or she resides or has farming interests.

Ballots were mailed last week to all known eligible voters. Anyone who believes themselves to be eligible to vote who did not get a ballot may pick one up at the ASCS Office.

Any eligible producer can vote, regardless of religion, race, sex, color or national origin. Voter lists are open for public inspection through the final date for returning ballots on December 1.

The ballots will be counted on December 2 in the ASCS office in Farwell. The ballots are counted (in public) by members of the ASCS County Committee.

Farmers are urged to mark their ballot and return it to the ASCS office by December 1.

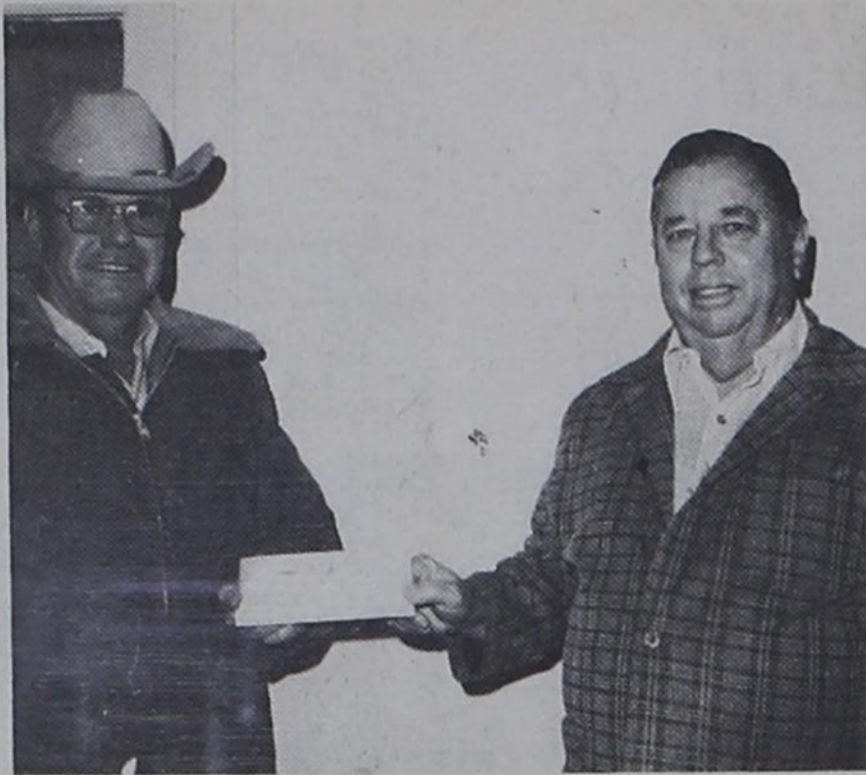

Roberts Realizes Weekly Prize

The final week of the 17th Annual Area Merchants Football Contest saw two new weekly winners step into the limelight as W.M. Roberts, Terry Newell and Sam Gonzales took the three top weekly prizes.

Roberts took the first place seat on a tiebreaker decision when he called eight games correctly. His predicted tiebreaker score was 15 points off the mark and he was awarded \$5 for the first place card.

Second place in last week's contest went to Newell of Muleshoe who also called eight correct games but was 25 points off on his predicted tiebreaker score. His second place award was a \$3 cash prize.

Sliding into third place in the 12th week of the 1975 contest was Gonzales, also of Muleshoe. Gonzales correctly predicted the outcome of eight games and was 27 points off on the tiebreaker for the third place post and \$1 in prize money.

Three other persons were successful in calling eight games during the final week of guessing but each was too far off on the tiebreaker score to take a place in the contest.

Others calling eight games were Bobbie McFarland, Edwin Lingnau and Shawn Smith. A total of 406 persons entered this year's contest and competed against such prognosticators as Sam Gonzales and Carl Kirkland. Gonzales topped the overall contest this year and garnered Grand Prize while Kirkland came in with second place and took the Second Prize.

Gonzales accumulated a total of 93 points for the season and won two tickets to the Cotton Bowl Game to be played New Year's Day 1976 in Dallas and \$50 expense money. For the second place post Kirkland called a total of 87 games and received \$25 expense money and two tickets to the Sun Bowl Classic to be played December 26 in El Paso.

Gonzales put a statistic in the history books of the local contest. He is the only person to take Grand Prize in the contest more than once. And when he did take two first place wins, he did it in two consecutive years. Last year the prognosticator came from a third place position in the final week of the contest to sweep contenders and grab the Grand Prize.

It was noted that the State of Texas will pay the salary of this investigator but no travel allowance has been designated. Members of the Court unanimously agreed that a monthly travel pay of \$42.87 be made to Dick Pylant, special assistant to District Attorney Young.

In other business, Commissioners reviewed a request for \$100 for bus fare for a county resident to travel to Houston to the M.D. Anderson Hospital for treatment. Court members agreed to donate the needed funds.

An extension of permits previously granted to Western

Geophysical were discussed. The Court agreed to permit Western Geophysical to extend a previously designated line and that County Judge Paul Fortenberry be instructed to execute this permit.

Letters regarding the position of the Court on Revenue Sharing and answers thereof were discussed. It was reported that the right-of-way needed for the middle section of 214 was being completed and will soon be ready for the state office.

Other miscellaneous letters and invitations and the insurance situation were discussed at length by Commissioners.

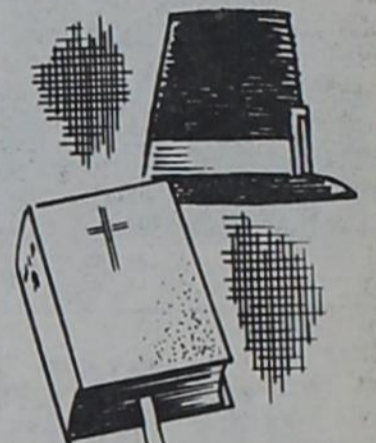
The coach commented, "I was very pleased with the defensive effort in the ball game. The girls played very well for the first game of the season. It was a very good effort."

In Lubbock - - Local Youths To Compete In District 4-H Food Show

Eight Farmer County youths, by virtue of winning top honors in the County Food Show competition Saturday, Nov. 22, will match their skills and knowledge in food preparation against those of youths from 20 other counties Saturday, Dec. 6, in Lubbock.

The occasion is the annual District 2 4-H Food Show to be held at Texas Tech University with about 150 youths expected to participate. Theme of this year's show is "Heritage Foods."

Four seniors and four juniors from Farmer County will be competing, according to County Extension Agent Jana Pronger. Senior competitors include Linda Gohlke, Cheryl Gohlke and Jacquelyn Langford, all of Farwell, and Joan Carson of Bovina.

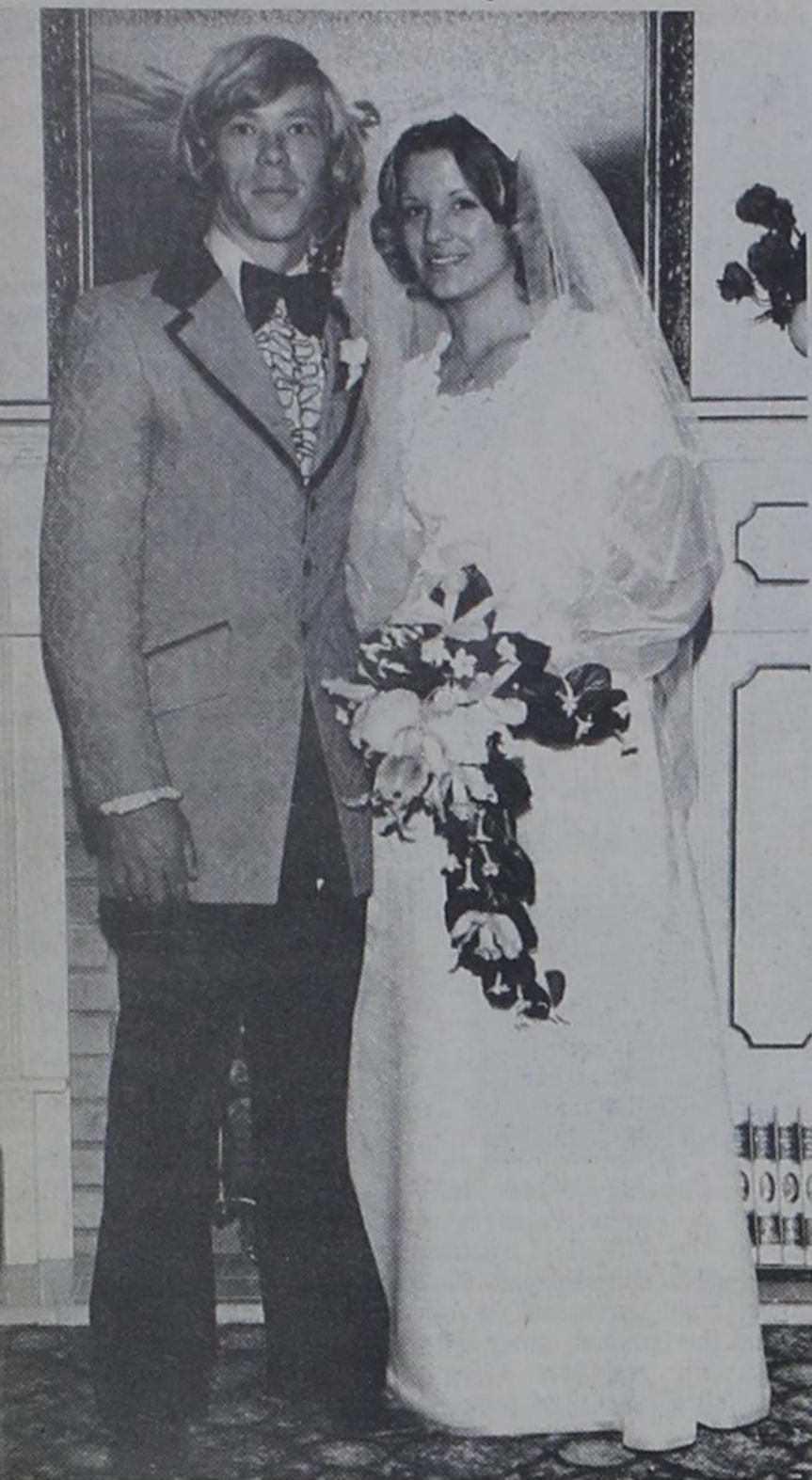

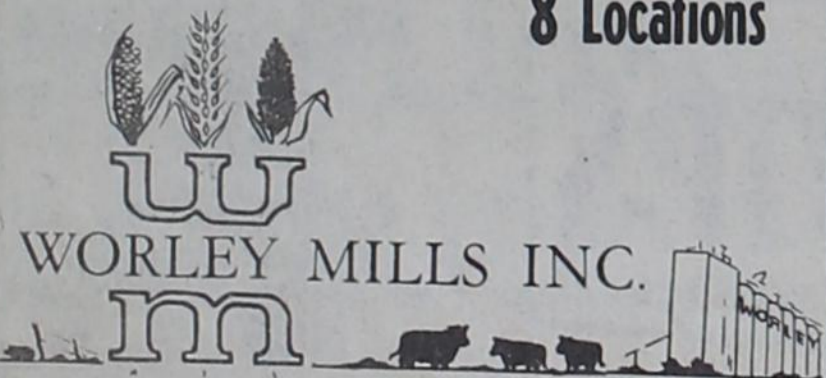

TRUE THANKSGIVING
Many people entertain only vague notions about thanksgiving, just as they do about faith.
They confuse faith with optimism, will power, presumption, imagination, and all sorts of other things. A doctor tells his patient that, but for his faith, he never would have come through his illness. Somehow the patient was "just sure" he would recover. A smiling mother encourages her married daughter to "have faith that everything will turn out all right." But faith is simply believing, and faith in God is believing God; believing what He has said. Faith is based on the written Word of God. See Romans 10:17.
But unregenerate men also have vague ideas about thanksgiving. A man escapes some great harm and thanks his "lucky stars." Another says: "I'm grateful for a healthy body," but to whom is he grateful? He doesn't say. In many cases it doesn't even occur to him to ask. He's "just thankful!"

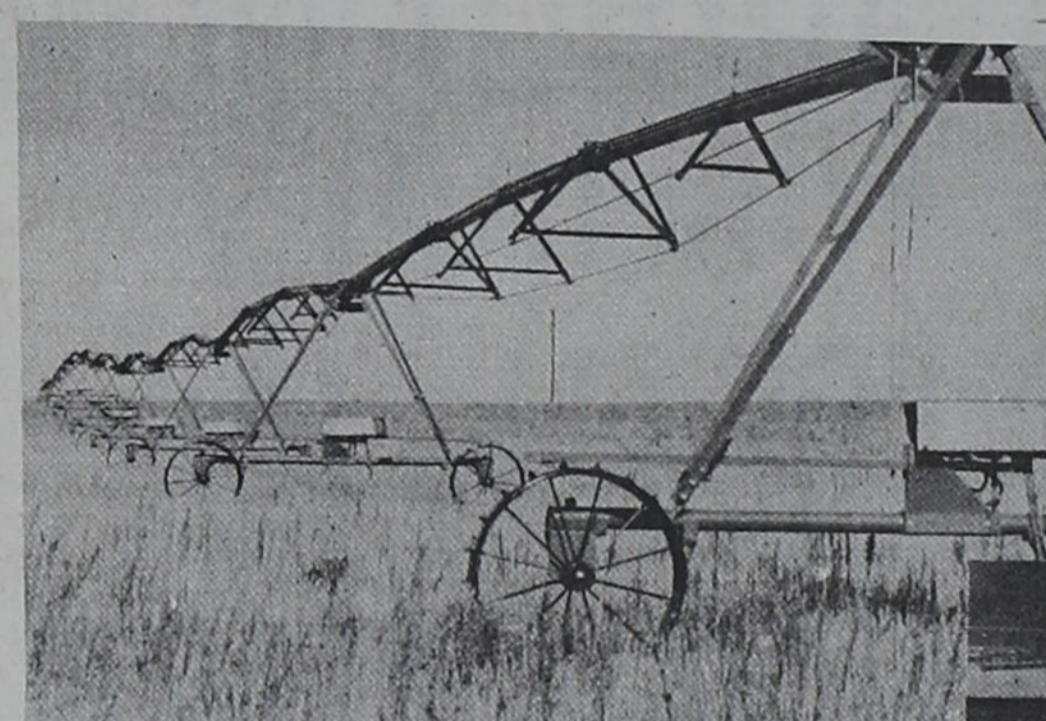

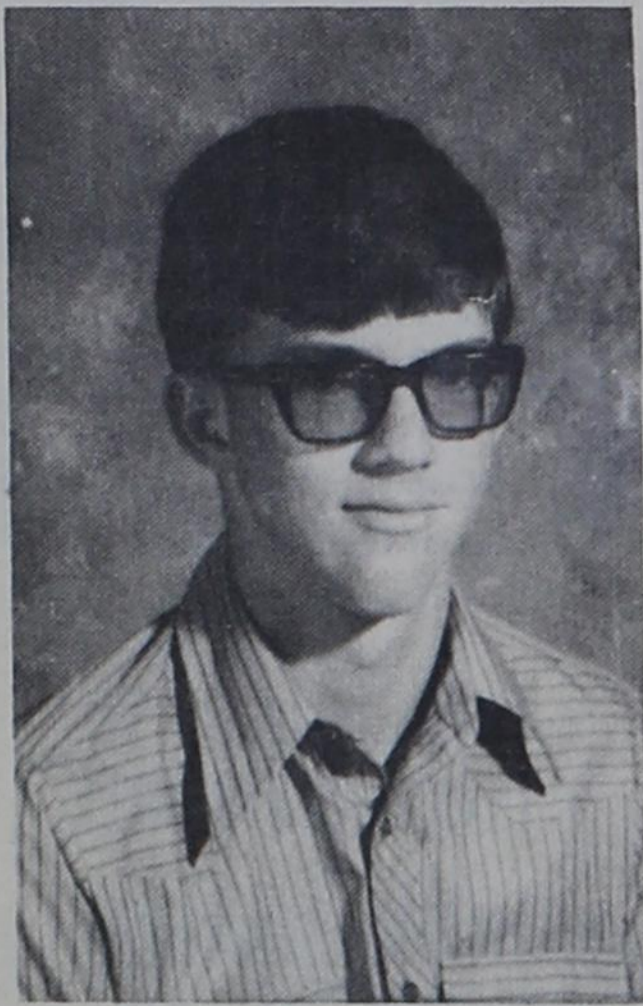

"There were outstanding performances by Foster, Christian, McCully, and Clay Roberts, before he fouled out."

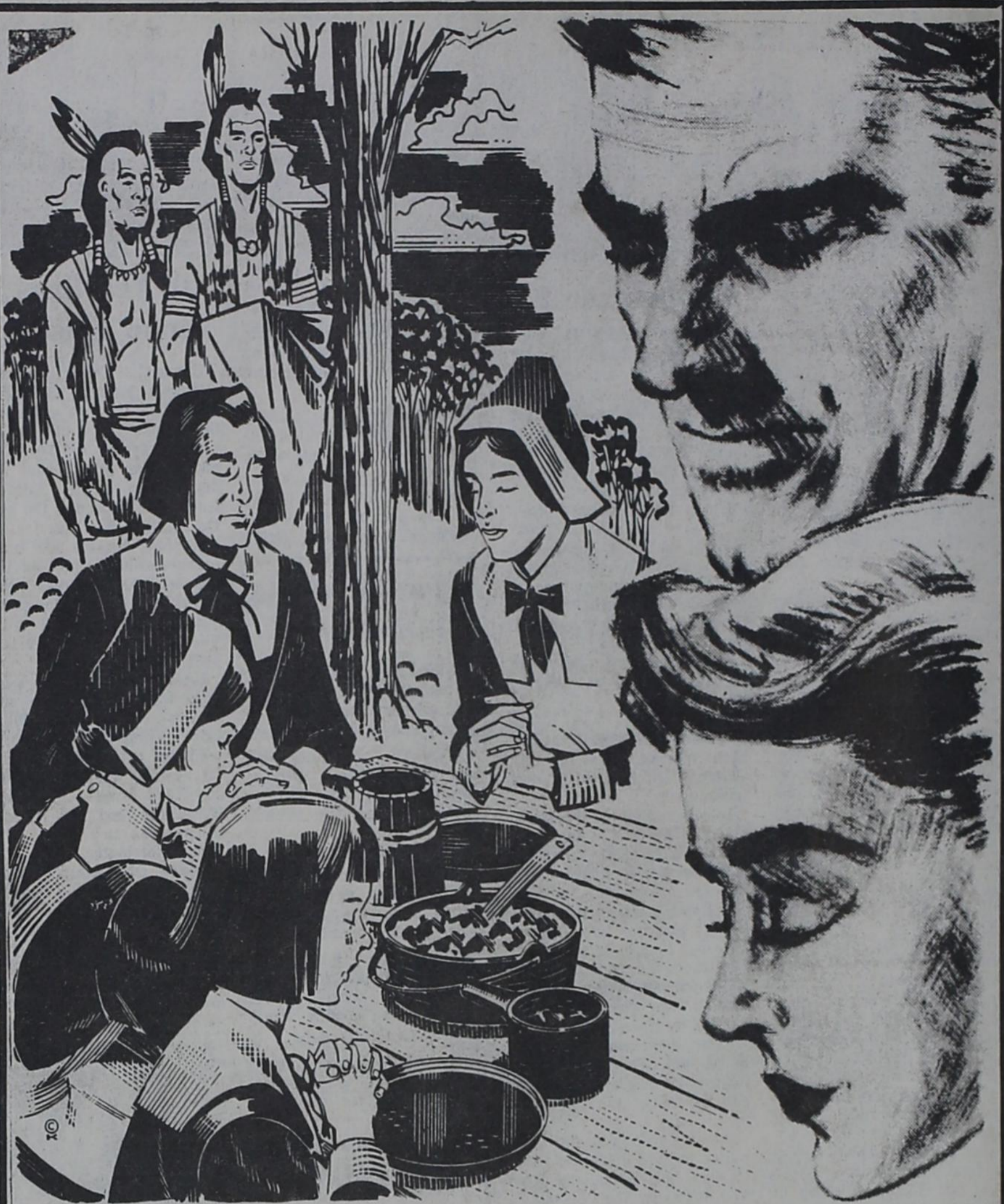

Salt water ponds made of plastic may be the answer to solar energy supplies for farm buildings. Such a pond would be designed as a solar heat trap. Research on such a contraption is now underway at Ohio State University where they are using a 150-thousand gallon model with a depth of nine feet. Solar ponds are special in that they utilize a black plastic lining and are filled with salt water. The lining attracts and absorbs more heat . . . salt water keeps the heat from rising to the surface. Fresh, cool water is then pumped through plastic tubes at the bottom of the pond . . . that water is heated then pumped back through the floor of a building to provide natural heat. Scientists warn of one problem in trying to utilize the pond as a swimming pool . . . temperatures at the bottom have been measured as high as 194 degrees.
