
Who do you think sent it?

To be honest about it, when I stood up in front of a bunch of grizzled Rotarians and suggested a Celebrity Auction as a way of raising funds for the Farwell Community Center several weeks ago, I decided to hedge like mad.

I knew that such an auction had been tried successfully years ago elsewhere in the nation, but I had no firsthand knowledge of how it would go. I mean, just because you send a letter to someone seeking a donation doesn't necessarily mean that you are going to get something.

But I had been asked to attend a meeting of representatives of several community groups that had been called for the purpose of suggesting fund-raisers. I threw out the idea that night and the folks present thought it was worth investigating. The next day I made the same pitch before the Rotarians, the result: the Rotary Club decided to be the main sponsor for a Celebrity Auction.

The way it works is easy. Locally, you go to businesses and ask for donated items. The Rotarians agreed to do this in Texico-Farwell, Clovis and Muleshoe business districts. At the same time, you send out letteres to celebrities, such as movie and TV stars, sports heroes, politicians, musicians, etcs., asking for personalized items, too. Thus, if it works out, you end up with a couple of hundred items from businesses plus a goodly portion of stuff from celebrities. But I hedged at the beginning of the proposal because I just didn't know if any celebrities would send something. Now, I can breathe a sigh of relief Make that a BIG sigh of relief. The items have rolled in to Farwell from celebrities and that guarantees a really special auction. Even without the celebrity items, it's shaping up to be a great auction. A lot of nifty items like a stereo, commemorative half dollar and an electric heater, have been collected so far. But, unless I miss my guess, the celebrity items will act as a major drawing card. I have been wishy-washy on one point, though: whether to let folks know what we are collecting and who it's from. On one hand, if folks knew that, it might help bring them to the auction. On the other, if folks don't know that, the mystery also might bring them to the auction. I was talking to Curtis Smith about this dilemma the other day and he made a pretty good suggestion: that just before the auction, I run a big ad in the paper showing two lists - one for items collected and the other for the celebrities that donated them. Then, you could try to figure out who gave what. And if you turn in that at the auction -- or maybe if you're among the first ones to arrive -- you get a free celebrity items (since we have duplicates of some donations).



Hughes wins regional meet

Farwell's Andy Pat Hughes, son of Mr. and Mrs. Joe Hughes, earned the all-around trophy for class II, 16-18 year old boys in the Region III Gymnastics Championships held at the University of Oklahoma field house in Norman, Okla. on May 17-18.

This meet was for the states of Texas, Oklahoma, Louisiana, Kansas and Arkansas.

To compete in the meet, a gymnast had to have a qualifying score of 70 points. Andy entered with a total of 85.3. The all-around is determined by the highest number of points for six compulsory routines and 6 optional routines. Andy placed first on vault, parallel bars and pommel horse. He received second place for both floor exercise and high bar with a third place for steel rings. At the end of the first day's compulsory competition, Andy led by 1.4 points and had led his closest competitor by 7.10 points at the end of the second days optional routines. Andy, as well as the other local gymnasts, faces two difficult problems. Not all of our apparatus is competition size. It is difficult to train on a piece of "home made" equipment and then to compete on regulation apperatus. The distance that must be traveled to reach a meet is also a big drawback for local gymnasts. Most Texas meets are held in Dallas, Houston, San Antonio or Austin. Therefore because of the time, distance and expense involved, usually only one qualifying meet and the state finals are attended. In the metroplex cities, a student can participate in gymnastics as a UIL sport in their school as well as private clubs. Many will compete 3 or 4 times per month all spring. This additional experience is difficult to compete against.
