Buyers and sellers of both new old-age pension rolls. and used 1942 automobiles were reminded today by the enforcement division of the OPA that a dealer States was instaled in 1842 by who refuses to sell a 1942 car to the holder of a certificate, when offered dealer of Cincinnati. the ceiling price for the car, is violating rationing regulations

This regulation has been in effect since November, but many instances have been referred to the district office of dealers attempting to evade the regulation by saying the car is for their own use, or that it has been promised to someone else.


Dealers are required to post in a conspicuous place a complete and current list of all 1942 cars held for sale.

Workers at the local ration office also reminded that ceiling prices were being enforced on sale of used cars not requiring a certificate.





### **Ration Books May Be** Difficult To Replace


Warning that there is a definite shortage of "replacements" for ration books which are abused and disfigured, Mrs. Mose Glasscock, at the local ration office, today urged homemakers to take better care of their books.

We have repeated visits from persons wanting new books, after they have rolled and folded their originals until they become torn and loose," she said today, adding that such replacements were scarce and every effort to conserve the books should be made.

If a book has become loose at the binding, and stamps are getting out of place, the district office suggests that owners paste their stamps on a sheet of thin paper, or use Scotch tape to repair the sheets. In addition to the fact that not many more books are obtainable, ration officials remind that it wastes a good deal of time for merchants or board members to sort through the books and put them in usable condition.
