




Champions Named In Junior Livestock Show

Pet Clinic Set In Twin Cities



The rabies vaccination will cost \$4 and the three-way shot (Distemper, hepatitus and lepto) will be \$5. A four-way shot featuring the above three vaccines plus a pneumonia preventative will cost \$6.

Texico-Farwell and area residents are encouraged to take advantage of this onetime-only pet clinic to have their dogs and cats vaccinated.

City ordinances for both Texico and Farwell require pets to be vaccinated and registered. According to a Farwell ordinance, both dogs and cats must wear the registration tags available from the city. These tags may

be purchased for \$2 each. A Texico ordinance requires that only dogs be registered. The tags may be purchased for \$1.





The number of layers needed for comfortable warmth depends on personal activity. An active person generates more heat so fewer layers are needed.



SHARE, which was conceived this year for the first time, was designed to be a three-year program. "When we applied for federal funds we asked for three years," Pierce said. "Federal evaluators will visit us in a few weeks and if they approve of our work we will be granted funds for another year of operation," he said.
