

## Primary Ballots To Printer This Week

### Car Situation Improves During Week

With the announcement that the ballots for the first Democratic primary would be turned over to the printers this weekend, G. D. Anderson, county executive chairman, today released the names and the positions the respective candidates would occupy on the voting sheets.

The Democratic Executive Committee met at the courthouse in Farwell last Wednesday and made the initial preparations for the first primary, including determining assessments against the candidates. Positions on the ballot were determined by drawing the names of the candidates from a hat.

All candidates, with the exception of John Armstrong, had entered their requests for places on the ballot. Armstrong's name, it was ruled by the Executive Committee, could not appear on the ballot for the reason that his name had not been properly filed before the deadline on June 15th.

In an interview today, Armstrong announced his intentions of continuing as a candidate for the office of County Commissioner of Precinct No. 3, and said that he planned to launch an active campaign just as soon as he completed his wheat harvest. "It was through a misunderstanding of the requirements," he said in explaining his failure to file for the office.

"I either misunderstood Mr. Anderson or he misunderstood my questions when I talked the matter over with him," Armstrong said, going on to add that he had no fault to find with anybody.

In the absence of the names of the State candidates, yet to be made up for the ballot, here is the way the names will appear on the ballots to be used in Farmer County:

### Cousin Of Local Man Killed In Accident

Mr. and Mrs. John Martin and family returned last week from Temple, where they had been called by the death of J. D. Stewart, 37, a cousin of Martin who had been reared by the local man's parents. Stewart was killed on the 15th, when he either stepped or fell in front of a fast-moving passenger train near the switch at Meridian. Martin reported. The accident occurred at 2:30 in the morning, when the Santa Fe train on which Stewart was brakeman was on a siding, waiting for the passenger train. Funeral services were held at Temple on June 16th, and interment made in the Belton cemetery. Stewart is survived by his wife and five children, the eldest of which is only seven years.

### Suits Instituted On Delinquent Taxes

Taxing units of Parmer County, through County Attorney Sam Aldridge, have taken steps to collect delinquent taxes on 23 tracts of land located in the county, and are citing the owners to appear in district court on the second Monday in July, the 8th, to show cause why judgment should not be rendered against the property.

The principal taxing units taking this action are the Friona Independent School District and the Farwell Independent School District, with the majority of suits coming from the Friona district. Practically all the land involved consists of town lots, located in Friona and Farwell, which have been on the delinquent rolls for many years, some dating back to 1915.

District Judge John Aldridge stated today that judgment would likely be rendered against the delinquent property and Sheriff Earl Booth would be instructed to sell the lots at public auction, "probably in September". Judge Aldridge also explained that parties interested in the lands could stop further costs by appearing in court and paying off the accumulated taxes, together with the costs.

The move on the part of the taxing units is to clean up all delinquent property and get it back on the tax rolls. Officials have stated that ready buyers are expected to bid in the delinquent lands when they come up for sale under a sheriff's order.

### Expect Completion Of Veteran Loan Soon

Although the check is not in hand, Frank Seale, supervisor of the Parmer County Farm Security Administration, stated today that he expects completion of the first GI farm purchase loan in this county within a short while.

While he reported that he anticipated no slip-ups, Seale added, "I always feel better when I get the officials' check," the final step in making a loan for farm purchase.

The initial loan goes to Randal M. Wilson, Army dischargee, who is buying 160 acres from W. H. Garrett, in the Midway community. Wilson is to take possession as soon as funds arrive to complete the deal.

Seale added that other loan applications were on file, but that nothing was definite along that line at present. It is hoped that a farm enlargement loan can be made on one application now on file, he said.

### Thieves Get Cream In Produce Burglary

Thieves entered the Milstead Produce Company here last Wednesday night and made off with six cans of cream, valued at \$86.00, it was reported by A. Milstead and son, Floyd, operators of the business.

In addition to the cream, pennies, estimated to amount to about \$2, were taken from the office. Entrance was gained by smashing a window at the rear of the building.

An investigation disclosed that the thieves carried the cans of cream several hundred yards north, across the Santa Fe tracks and near the Phillips wholesale warehouse, where it was loaded into a car. No arrests have been made.

### Drops Dead While He Walks Along Street

Death suddenly overtook H. T. (Uncle Harve) Hollis, age 83, as he walked along the street with R. E. Williams here, at 1:20 p. m. on Tuesday.

Hollis was walking along and in conversation with Williams, when he was suddenly stricken. He slumped to the ground and died without uttering a word. Williams, assisted by others standing in front of the Farmers Supply Company, picked him up and removed him from the street among the Santa Fe tracks.

Dr. Wm. V. Coventry, who was called, gave it as his opinion that death was due to coronary occlusion. The doctor said that he had examined the old gentleman early on Tuesday and found no indications of heart trouble at that time.

"Uncle Harve" homesteaded seven miles south of Texico in 1904, and for many years lived and worked alone. He owned two quarters of farming land in Roosevelt County. Hollis was a bachelor, and little is known of his relatives. He was known to have some nephews in Hale County, Texas, who have been notified of his death.

Due to ill health, he rented his farm out more than a year ago, and since that time has been living in a small house in Texico, belonging to Bob Williams.

The Steed Mortuary, of Clovis, removed the body to their mortuary, where funeral plans are pending.

### Heavy Barley Harvest Revealed At Lariat

One of the heaviest barley harvests of years has been reported and verified at Lariat, with Grady Childress cutting an average of 100 bushels of grain to the acre on an irrigated patch.

The barley, County Agent Lee McElroy reported, was used as a nurse crop for alfalfa. Childress had two alfalfa plots, both irrigated, and one was grazed so heavily by hogs that the alfalfa was ruined. Phosphate was applied to the land and barley planted, with the 100 bushel harvest resulting. On the other plot, not fertilized, the yield was 30 bushels per acre.

Childress operates four 1500-gallon wells on 480 acres, most of which is in alfalfa, and reports that he "still doesn't have enough water", the agent said. The barley crop was watered three times during the growing season, "probably about nine acre inches of water".

McElroy quoted the yield as definite proof of the advantages of fertilizing and irrigating in this area. "The phosphate, combined with nitrogen left in the ground by the legume (alfalfa) and the water did the trick," he added.

### New Period Opens For Dairy Subsidy Paying

A new period in receiving applications for dairy subsidy payment opens next Monday, July 1st, County ACA supervisor John Martin reported today.

Producers may make application for payment during July and August, for sales of milk and cream made during April, May and June of this year, he explained.

## Road Projects Turned To State For Work

The Parmer County Commissioners Court, in session here Monday, entered into agreements with the State of Texas, turning over to the state two strips of county roads, on the provision that the State Highway Commission will designate such as farm-to-market roads, under the Federal farm-to-market road improvement program.

The projects in this county, turned over to the State, include what is commonly referred to as the "Farwell project", which is designated to begin at the railroad underpass east of town and run to the Oklahoma Lane School.

The other project, known as the "Friona project", is designated to start at Friona and run four miles south of Hub. The original plan, it will be remembered, called for this project to run to Hub and then extend four miles north of Friona.

Officials here expressed the opinion that the Friona project would be completed during 1947, with the Farwell project being set up for 1948. Both roads are to be graded, drained, and black-topped, it is understood.

Other business attended to by the Court included an order setting the tax valuation "on all property in the Black School District at \$1.50 on the one hundred dollar valuation", and the payment of current bills.

### Dashing Shower Leaves Light Moisture Here

A dashing shower at noon Sunday deposited less than a half inch of moisture on the parched earth of this immediate section, and farmers are still looking for that rain that will bring sufficient moisture to start planting operations.

Some farmers close to town are "gambling" on the moisture of Sunday and are planting some small crops, but the majority of them are waiting for additional rain.

In some localities of the county the rain has been sufficient to start planting. This is particularly true of the Lazbuddy section, where about an inch of rain was reported last Sunday. The Hub and Lakeview communities, south of Friona, are reported to have had ample moisture the past two weeks.

### No Auto Tax Stamp Required This Year

Tax-paying citizens have a slight relief in sight—they will not have to buy Federal auto stamps for their vehicles this year.

Instigated as an extra money-raising tax several years ago, auto operators have been required to secure the \$5 federal stickers at the postoffices by July 1, or face the consequences. But the act has been killed this year, and motorists have an extra \$5 to spend.

### Vets Advised To Secure Exemption Certificates

County officials and members of the Democratic Executive Committee seem to be somewhat confused as to the requirements for veterans to vote in the forthcoming primary.

The Attorney General's office has been asked for a ruling on the matter but as yet it has not been received here. Pending receipt of this opinion, officials are recommending that veterans apply to the office of Tax Collector Earl Booth and obtain exemption certificates.

Exemption certificates will be issued without charge, but they must be obtained before July 12th.

### Unpaid Taxes Take On Another Hike, June 30

Tax Collector Earl Booth stated today that during the few days remaining in the month of June, delinquent county and state taxes for 1945 may be paid at considerable savings.

The penalty of 5% on all delinquent taxes will be increased to 8% on July 1st. In addition, interest at 6% will be added after July 1st, together with an additional \$1 costs. It will be to the advantage of those owing delinquent taxes to make payment before June 30, Booth emphasized.

### Scout Meeting Date Changed For Summer

Meeting Monday night, the Farwell Boy Scouts decided to hold meetings only every other Monday evening, instead of each week, during the summer. Scoutmaster Frank Seale reported today.

The next meeting of the troop will be on Monday evening, July 8th, and will be held, as usual, in the Scout room at the Parmer county courthouse.

**Summer Enrollment At Tech All-Time High**

LUBBOCK—Aided by more than a two thousand percent increase in enrollment of veterans over the summer of 1945, Texas Technological College summer school enrollment has hit an all-time peak of 2304. Last summer 57 veterans were enrolled in summer school; this term there are 1280.

Enrollment of veterans in the last fall term was 234, moving to 1233 in the spring semester, and expected

to reach 2500 for the term starting next September. Married vets attending Texas Tech during spring semester numbered 400, with 800 expected in the fall.

The 2304 student enrollment for the present term of summer school surpassed the previous highs of 1647 for the first term of 1939 and 1934 total enrollment in 1934 summer sessions.

Tech's increased vet enrollment is in line with experience of other colleges and universities of the nation. There were about 15,000 vets enrolled in the fall term of 1945, with

400,000 in school in the spring term. H. A. Anderson, associate professor of economics and management, and for almost four years a captain in the ground school of the San Antonio Aviation Cadet Center, is serving as Tech Veterans Adviser this summer.

**Camp And Picnic Menus Available In Leaflet**

COLLEGE STATION—Camping and picnic season is here in earnest and tasty menus for outdoor excursions must be planned. Edith Lawrence, specialist in food preparation, says the task can be made easy with a few simple rules and some interesting recipes.

Meals should be kept simple. One main dish, possibly combining protein and starchy food, a crisp or chewy vegetable, one starchy food, and fruit for dessert will make a substantial meal. Beverages which can be prepared ahead of time or that require little preparation at camp should be served. Water should be taken along unless source of supply is known to be safe.

After planning meals, Miss Lawrence advises listing supplies needed. A checking of all recipes will prevent something being left behind.

Recipes for chicken risotto, bean-hole beans, campfire stew, and other camp foods, with detailed menus for 2½ days and rules for successful meal planning are found in Extension Service leaflet, MS-742, "Food For camp". The booklet may be obtained by writing to the Extension Service at College Station.

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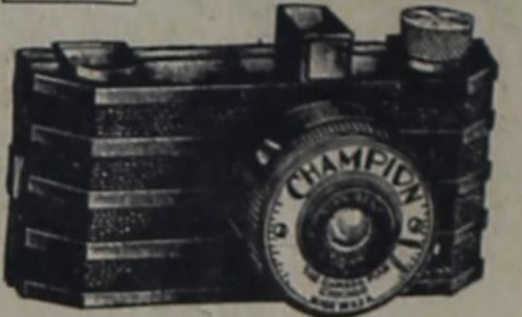

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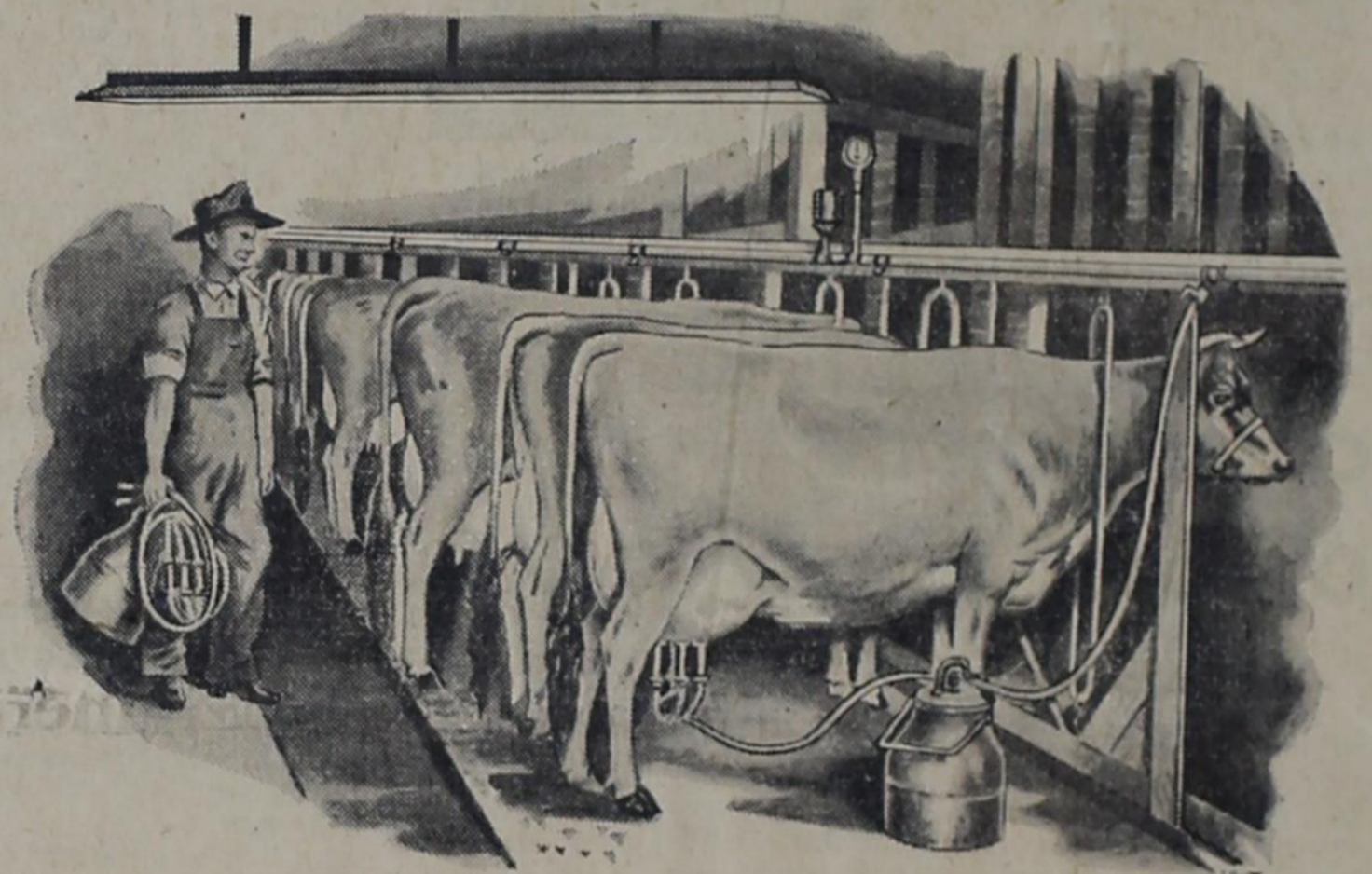

### Veterans May Secure Purchase Certificates At Lubbock Office

LUBBOCK—Beginning Thursday, July 11, World War II veterans can be certified for the purchase of surplus war materials in Lubbock instead of having to make the time-consuming trip to Fort Worth. According to M. M. Calvin and C. W. Holcomb, representatives of the district office of the War Assets Administration in Fort Worth, two WAA officials will be at the American Legion Home, 910 Texas Ave., Thursday and Friday of every other week, their first appearance being July 11 and 12.

This schedule will be maintained as long as veterans indicate a desire for the service.

While conferring with officials of the Lubbock CC, the Legion and area VA office, Calvin and Holcomb said that certification of veterans for station wagons, staff cars and typewriters was halted as of June 1. As property becomes available those vets holding certificates longest will be given first opportunity to buy, so it is advisable for all veterans desiring certification to see a WAA representative as soon as possible.

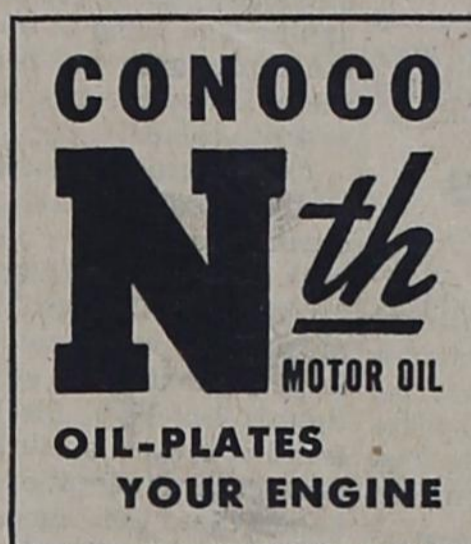

**More Home Canning Urged For Season**

**COLLEGE STATION**—More home food preservation than ever before is being urged as food insurance for the coming winter and spring. Gwendolyn Jones, specialist in food preservation for the Extension Service, reports that this year's goal is to exceed the record of four billion jars of food canned by 25 million housewives in one year.

To safeguard American diets during the months to come when wheat products will continue to be in less than full supply, more vegetables especially will be needed to replace some of the food values and the "filling" quantity of the wheat that goes abroad. The more garden vegetables that are put up in homes and in community canning centers, the better the food insurance for this country.

Prospects so far as for good vegetable and fruit crops this season, but production predicted so early in the season can rise or fall as weather hurts or helps the crops. Adequate supplies of glass jars, jar rings and closures are expected. The supply of pressure canners has been increasing steadily. Housewives are advised, however, to lay in supplies of containers and equipment now to enable manufacturers to gauge demand and keep up production as needed.

They are constructing apartment houses so fast now that you can watch one going up on the way to work and see the landlady evicting tenants for non-payment of rent on the way home.

**Texans Invest Money In Savings Bonds**

With the first peacetime promotion for the sale of Savings Bonds by the U. S. Treasury only nine days old, Texans have invested almost one-fifth of their \$33,000,000 quota in Series E Bonds. Sales through June 15th were reported at \$6,429,123.75 with a total of \$9,206,266 in all U. S. Savings Bonds at that date.

In encouraging the citizens of Texas to increase their purchases of Savings Bonds during the present promotion. Nathan Adams, Chairman of the Texas Advisory Committee on Savings Bonds, said: "A bad case of inflation would be a national catastrophe, affecting each and every one of us. It would distort every economic value, private and public. Investing in Savings Bonds will go a long way toward averting inflation. We must invest our savings and take as few of our dollars as possible to market until production shall match demand."

"Spending money recklessly, buying scarce goods at inflated prices," Mr. Adams continued, "is like cutting down the tree to get at a few green apples. The thing to do is wait until the apples are ripe before you eat them. Leave the tree to bear fruit in years to come."

The Treasury reports a total of 3.4 billion dollars in Savings Bonds sales during the first five months of this year. Redemptions have amounted to 2.8 billion dollars. Strikes, tax payments, etc., were credited with this large percentage of redemptions, but figures for May disclose that the trend is toward a much lesser percentage in redemptions. It is further hoped that the current promotion will accelerate the downward trend, giving renewed impetus to the regular purchase of Savings Bonds.

Joe DiMaggio's record of scoring a hit in 55 consecutive major league baseball games, during the 1941 season, is the modern record.

The minor league record for hitting safely in consecutive games was made in 1919 by Joe Wilhoit of Wichita, in the Western League. His total was 67 games.

**RETAIL SALES INCREASE**

**AUSTIN**—A gain of 33 per cent in retail sales during May over May, 1945, was reported this month by the University of Texas Bureau of Business Research.

Twenty-one lines of retailing were included in the survey made by the Bureau, and the greatest increase was made by motor vehicle dealers. These dealers reported an increase of almost 50 per cent in May sales over April, 1946, and a gain of more than 100 per cent over May, 1945.

**SPECIAL INFANT STUDY**

**AUSTIN**—Dr. Arild Hansen, professor of pediatrics and director of the child health program of the University of Texas Medical Branch, will conduct a special study of infant diarrhea this summer.

The study will be made by the department of pediatrics at the medical school in Galveston, with the support of the William Buchanan Foundation of Texarkana. Dr. Daniel C. Darrow, professor of pediatrics at Yale Medical School, will be a special research investigator in connection with the study.

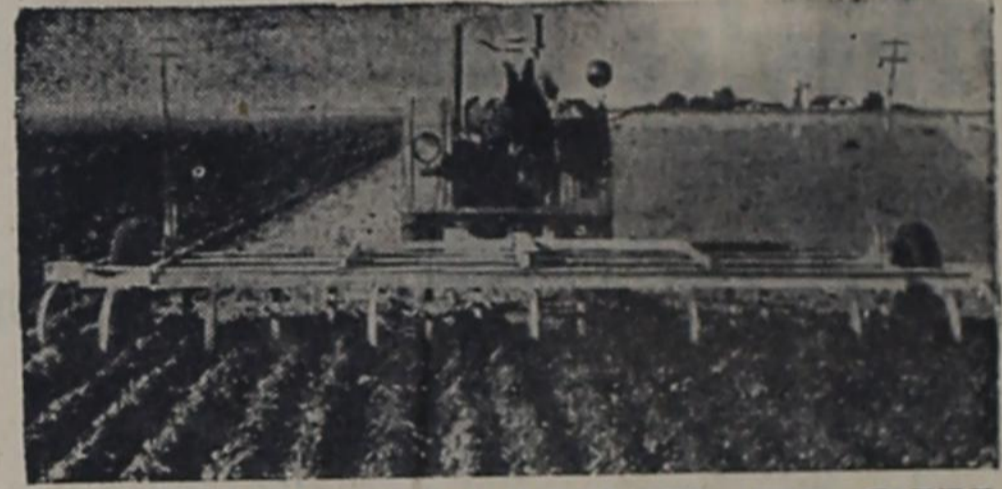

**Veteran Financing At New High For FSA**

Farm Security Administration financing of veterans in Region 8 (Texas, Oklahoma and New Mexico) reached new levels during the first five months of 1946, when 3,051 loans were made to ex-servicemen for the purchase of farm operating equipment or familytype farms, E. Lee Ozbirn, regional director, says.

The loans constitute almost two-thirds of the total number the agency has approved for veterans during the past two years.

"We expect this record lending to continue," Ozbirn said. "More than 7,500 veterans' applications, most of them of recent date, are now on hand in our county offices and are getting preferential attention. Applications are coming in heavily each month and there is no indication that the peak has been reached."

Nearly 5,000 veterans have already received FSA assistance in Texas, Oklahoma and New Mexico. Of these, nearly 500 obtained farm purchase loans under the terms of the Bankhead-Jones Farm Tenant Act from earmarked funds set up by Congress for this purpose. The rest have loans to buy farm machinery, livestock and other operating needs. In all, vets have received \$9,270,481 loans in Region 8.

Veterans have had to overcome handicaps before obtaining loans, especially in the farm purchase program.

During the week, the Scouts made an 18-mile hike to the Weed lookout tower, and were shown around the area by the Rangers stationed there, one of the highlights of the trip.

**Beef Subsidy Program Expires On June 30th**

John Martin, head of the local AAA office, reminded cattlemen today that the government-sponsored beef subsidy program expires on June 30th, next Sunday.

In this connection, Martin explained that producers who had beef animals "ready to go" and who wished to take advantage of the subsidy payment of 50c per hundredweight, must dispose of their stock to slaughterers by midnight, June 30th, to be eligible for payment.

Application for the subsidy payment can be filed during July and August, but the animals must be sold by the end of this month.

**TO REPRESENT TECH**

**SANTA FE CARLOADINGS**

Santa Fe System carloadings for week ending June 22 were 28,457 compared with 30,495 for same week in 1945. Cars received from connections totaled 10,162 compared with 14,637 for same week in 1945. Total cars moved were 38,619 compared with 45,132 for same week in 1945. Santa Fe handled a total of 39,599 cars in preceding week of this year.

**Information Offered On Artificial Limbs**

An improved nation-wide program to provide accurate information and prompt service on artificial limbs for some 23,000 amputees—most of whom served in World War II—is under development by the veterans administration, Dr. Oza J. LaBarge, chief medical officer at the VA regional office, Lubbock, says.

The program will be conducted by newly-designated and specially-trained contact representatives, all of whom have major amputations themselves. They will operate from the Dallas branch office and from VA's regional offices in Texas, Louisiana and Mississippi, Dr. LaBarge said.

The new type of contact men will be trained not only to provide information and advice on prosthetic devices, but also to help amputees select proper devices and to assist rating boards considering cases.

Their training further will enable them to explain veterans' rights generally so that they may serve as advisors to all veterans.

Men hired for this work will be given special training in VA's central offices, Washington, D. C.

Dr. LaBarge said the operation of the prosthetic appliance program will revolve around the specially trained contact representatives because they will meet the vets daily and learn their individual problems.

They will also aid vets with hearing aids, artificial eyes and other prostheses.

W. H. Jarrell, who formerly lived north of here, is here overseeing the harvesting of his wheat crop. He now resides at Vista, Calif.

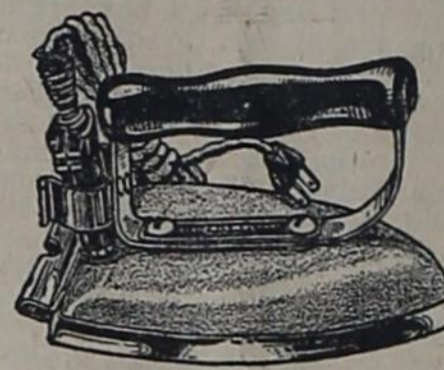
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
