The worst part of something that is held year after year is that it sometimes gets stale to some people. I think that's the case with some holidays, like the Fourth of July. In its infancy, the Fourth brought

out large crowds in every municipality and hamlet throughout the United States. It was a time for fireworks and speeches and get-togethers. It was a time to share the happiness of living in a free society. Since TV had not come on the scene yet, people still talked with each other.

Today, at least we still have the fireworks. We went to Clovis with friends last week to enjoy the spectacular fireworks show. It was a time for "oohing" and "aahing." Probably the best fireworks display I've ever seen.

But I noticed that once it was over, everyone went their own way. That's too bad. The Fourth of July commemorates one of the greatest days in the history of the world and it ought to be recalled vividly each year.

Although on many issues I can be a left-winger, on the subject of patriotism I'm way to the right. I guess it comes from reading a lot of history books when I was a young-What a marvelous array of super people this nation had in 1776. Tom Jefferson, a true genius. Ben Franklin, a man for all seasons. George Washington, a leader of men and one of our wisest presidents. Patrick Henry, patriot. And so on. The story on the American Revolution is a familiar one to all of us. We know of Bunker Hill, Valley Forge, Saratoga and Yorktown. We recall Lafayette and John Paul Jones and the Swamp Fox. What a glorious time. Even at the beginning of this nation's history, we already found what being in a pluralistic society means: some folks favored independence, others wished to remain a British colony. Today, political divisions are as strong as ever, although now we call them conservatives and liberals (no, you can't call them Democrats and Republicans -- that's a political stew, right now). The people who fought the American Revolution accomplished one of history's great feats. England was a nation of winners for many centuries; yet a bunch of farmboys knocked out their best soldiers and mercenaries. Remember what the British fife and drum corps played at Yorktown after Lord Cornwallis was forced to surrender? "The World Turned Upside Down." Very appropriate. The days of 1776 were difficult for the young Americans. Washington had to overcome supply shortages, manpower shortages and food shortages for several years. Congress was of little help, spending countless hours in debate (so what else is new?). What a man Washington was to achieve success when so much was going against him. What an example for a new nation. And in constructing the new republic, the Declaration of Independence was written. And that was followed by the Constitution of the United States. What beautiful documents. They were a beacon to men everywhere.

Tax changes discussed for Farwell

Changes in Farwell's tax structure were discussed at Monday's City Council meeting.

City Clerk Janie Bowery suggested raising the sales and property taxes but deleting the personal property tax. She said increasing the first two taxes would make up for the loss of the third tax.

The idea is to eliminate the personal property tax currently being charged by the city; this is mostly for motor vehicles. It is a lot of administrative work to handle the personal property tax, which raises about \$5,000 annually. If the council changes the tax structure, it would be to eliminate the administrative work involved in collecting personal property taxes.

The council authorized Mrs.

eliminating the personal property tax.

In other business, councilman Curtis Smith pointed out the need for purchasing a new fire truck. He said the old pumper will be 30 years old in January and the state doesn't "recognize" fire trucks after that age is reached.

There was a question involved over whether the city's key rate insurance would go up unless a new fire truck was purchased. Chandler and Smith will check with the state fire marshal and insurance offices to verify it.

Much of the discussion centered over what type of truck to buy. If, indeed, the insurance rate would climb unless a large pumper was bought, then it was indicated this

council.

The council talked about care of the cemetery, too. The council said better care of the headstones is needed and that the front of the cemetery needs to be mowed on a regular basis. They will talk with supervisor Doug Landrum about this.

The Texico City Council discussed a flooding problem at College and Hereford streets without coming to a solution Tuesday night.

Douglas Ditto, of the state highway department, appeared and said the options were: raise the state road, which would mean more flooding on the city's streets; lower the pond, from where the flooding starts, which isn't feasible; build a storm sewer, which isn't feasible because the city doesn't have the money, or leave it the way it is.







Study shows hay weathering losses

With the hay making season in full swing, producers need to give serious thought about storing bales properly. Failure to do so can result in sizeable losses to weathering.

A hay storage demonstration on the Cannonade Ranch at Gonzales last year showed various effects of weathering on baled hay. The demonstration was conducted by Dr. David Bade, forage specialist h the Texas Agricultural Exten-

on the ground lost 110 pounds. Those that were uncovered but stored on pallets off the ground lost 80 pounds on the average while covered bales on pallets lost only 35 pounds."

Although the interior of outsidestored bales was comparable in quality to hay stored indoors, feed value of hay that was weathered on the top, sides and particularly bottom of the bales was reduced sharply, notes Bade. Energy content of this weathered hay was reduced by 50 percent of the energy in the unweathered hay. These losses will be greater in loosely baled hay. "The biggest savings comes from storing hay off the ground," empha-sizes Bade.



The hay was stored from July until January during which time about 20 inches of rain fell. Weathered parts were removed and weighed to determine losses, and samples of both weathered and unweathered hay were checked for quality. Bales averaged 1575 pounds at harvest and 1400 pounds at feeding.

According to Bade, the storage method greatly influenced the amount of hay weathered. "Largest losses were in bales stored on top of the ground because the hay acted as a wick and soaked up moisture from the ground," he points out. "Uncovered bales on the ground lost 220 pounds on the average (16 percent of their weight) while covered bales







Control white grubs in lawns

White grub control in lawns is important during the summer season.

May or June beetles are emerging from the soil and starting to swarm in late evenings. Females are laying eggs and white grub worms that hatch will soon be feeding on roots of bermudagrass and St. Austinegrass in home lawns. Once grubs begin feeding, control measures should be taken says Gary Patterson, Parmer County Extension Agent.

Treatment time varies with the particular area of the state and ranges from early July in South Texas to mid-August in the Panhandle. Homeowners in Parmer county will need to treat between now and mid-August. Timing of application is critical for adequate control.

White grubs in excessive numbers can heavily damage lawns. Check for white grubs by cutting a square foot section of sod with a shovel and examining the roots and soil to a depth of 4 inches. Examine at least one square foot of sod for 1,000 square feet of lawn area. Chemical treatment is needed if there are more than four grubs per square foot of sod.

Diazinon, Dursban or Dylox provide adequate control and should be used at recommended rates given on the chemical container label. The granular form is easier to apply and to wash into the soil than liquid or spray formulations. After using granules, drag the grass with a tow

sack or waterhose to knock them down to the soil. Then apply enough water to soak the granules into the soil.

> Apply diazinon sprays at the rate of 25 gallons of water, including the insecticide, per 1,000 square feet to wash the insecticide into the soil. Wetting the lawn before spraying also helps. Always keep children and pets off the treated lawn until the grass is dry.

The key to white grub control in home lawns is proper timing of chemical applications and getting the insecticide through the grass to the root zone where grubs are feeding.

Further information is provided in the publication, "White Grubs in Texas Turfgrass," available at the county Extension office.
