



Start Storing Pecans Now, Is Advice

COLLEGE STATION,- Whether they are canned, frozen or in the shell, pecans go nicely with cold evenings by the fireside. And, if you intend to store any of this year's big crop of pecans, don't wait too long to get started. This information comes from Lucille Shultz, extension food preservation specialist of Texas A. & M. College,

Waiting to long before putting them away might give the pecans a chance to get rancid. So for best results, store them before January.

Freshly shelled pecans may be packaged in cellophane bags, tin cans, freezer jars, or heavily waxed cartons. Seal the container and store at 0 degrees F. in a home freezer or a commercial locker. No heating is necessary when freezing pecans.

If you're canning pecans, they should be shelled, sorted, and cleaned of all the little bits of shell. Put pecans in a slow oven for a pre-heating treatment, but make sure they don't scorch. When done, pack the pecans to within an inch of the top of hot,, dry jars, and drop in a piece of crumpled parchment paper to absorb the moisture.

Semi-seal the jars and put them in the pressure cooker. Adjust the lid and clamp. Leave the pet-cock open for seven minutes, or until you see the steam coming out. Close the cook lid and raise the pressure to five pounds. Release it immediately to bring out the moisture, and, at the same time, create a vacuum inside the jar.


Take the jars out of the pressure cooker and complete the sealing job. Wipe them dry and allow to cool before storing them on the pantry shelf Now they're ready for eating.

Turkey Talking Time For Texas Growers

COLLEGE , STATION .- Things are better this year for turkey growers. The turkey situation at present is putting turkey raisers in Texas in a slightly better place than they were last year at this time.

This is the year turkey producers get a fair price for the birds. And this year the feed costs were a little less than last says the extension poultry husbandman, Ted Martin, of Texas A. & M. College.

There were fewer turkeys produced this year than were last, and this year's turkey crop is better quality stock because of better breeding, feeding and general management.

Turkey producers should make their plans now for next season because the turkey hatcheries can do a better job of planning if they can check on the number of advance bookings. Chicken hatcheries like very much to have early bookings, and the turkey hatcheries are no differents, says Martin.

Quite a large number of high quality turkey eggs are shipped out of Texas, and the turkey growers have to compete against them at marketing time. So it's a good idea to book the turkey poults early in order to

get the best quality birds. Martin says to make your deal with the hatcheryman early, even though you don't plan on getting your poults until later in the season. It will pay to check now to be sure of your poults when you want them And, while you're getting poults, get the best. Buy them from producers that have high quality birds free

In other words, says Martin, a bird with lots of meat will make for a bet-

So start planning now for next seasons' turkey production.



Besides having the sport of tracking down a big ten-pointer, every hunter that bags a buck will add more than a hundred pounds of meat to the family menu. Game cannot be sold legally in this state, but landowners will still be on the legal side when they pocket money for leasing out hunting privileges on their land.

Callender says you can keep upland game birds or game animals in cold storage as long as you want, but 90 days is the limit after the season closes on migratory birds and waterfowl according to federal law.

The care of the meat should begin as soon as the animal has been killed Properly bleed and field dress the animal where he falls. Some hunters use a sack made of heavy canvas or bleached sheeting to cover the deer in the field or camp to protect it from the insects. Keep the carcass dry, and don't skin the buck until you get to a place you can put the carcass right into cold storage.

If the weather's cool, the deer can be kept in camp until the hunting party is ready to go back to town. But warm weather makes it mecessary to get the freshly killed carcass into storage right away. If this isn't possible, then it's a good idea to hang the carcass out at night and keep it wrapped in blankets in the shade during the day.

Callender advises saving the hide to tan later on. It can be made into gloves or jackets, and now it's legal to sell deer hides in this state. Extension Bulletin B-86 will give you ABILENE—A West Texas banker the clues on how to tan leather at




