No action was taken on this petition, members of the Court agreeing to postpone action until the regular meeting of that body on Monday, June 13. Meanwhile, a movement was

launched by Farwell, Bovina and Lazbuddy citizens on Tuesday, with the circulation of petitions, asking that a second county-wide bond issue election be called to vote on an issue of \$800,000 to be used in construction of rural roads in the coun-

Voters of the county turned down a bond issue in the amount of \$1,-150,000 by a mere eight votes on June 3.

The first petition, asking for the creation of a new road district in the county, was filed last Saturday. and bore the names of 65 propertyowning taxpayers in the county. Plus Six, Minus Six, Is **Present Outlook** On Ag. Buildings

COLLEGE STATION-The old story of "six of one and a half dozen of the other" works pretty well in the outlook for agricultural buildings. According to this outlook, building

estimates indicate a six percent increase in dollars worth of construction for 1949, say extension agricultural engineers of Texas A. and M. College.

While a slight increase in farm construction is in sight, the six per cent national increase will tend to hold material prices right where they are now. The prices index on lumber has dropped about six percent since last August, but the price jumps in other building products have cancelled this advantage for the prospective

Right now there are more than twice the number of farm implements-not including tractors-on rubber tires than were in 1932, so the rubber industry is pretty important to the mechanized farmer. One of the national rubber companies figure they'll produce two million more tires this year than they did last year. Farm tires are in on this increase, too.

Statistics show that 55 percent more rubber has been used in the farm industry since V-J Day than in any three peak years up to that time. From the production angle, this year's picture is an encouraging one, say the agricultural engineers. From all indications there will be plenty of farm tires to replace the used ones and ones for new equipment.







Save Your Own Grass

COLLEGE STATION—If the trend and forage production, you'll need seed for new plantings or reseeding. Grass and legume seed are not too plentiful, and they are expensive, says R. R. Lancaster, extension pasture specialist of Texas A. and M. College. Growing and saving your own is mighty good insurance and considerably less expensive.

There is plenty of some pasture for someone to harvest them, adds Lancaster. One of these is rescuegrass. It grows in abundance along roads, ditches, fence rows and in oth-

Rescue can be harvested with a combine. When the seed are ripe enough to shatter, it's ready for combining. 
