

#### **Base Material For Road Being Hauled**

A fleet of dump trucks began hauling caliche material to be used on Texico's farm-to-market road on Monday and good progress was being made Tuesday afternoon when a Tribune reported made a checkup on the job.

The material is coming from a pit in Roosevelt County, some eight miles from the extreme end of the -mile road project, with dumping beginning at the north end of the road, just south of the city.

The new road, an all-weather, blacktopped project, will extend from downtown Texico to a point 7.2 miles tapping a Bailey County farm road that ends at the Texas-New Mexico state line. Water for the job is being secured from the Frank Seale irrigation well just south of the city limits.

#### Wheat Allotment For County Boosted

The Parmer County wheat allotment for the 1951 crop has been boosted a total of 6,947 acres over last years' allotment, Joe Camp, secretary of the ocal PMA office, announced here today.

The allotment for the county wheat acreage has been increased from 204.135 acres for the year 1950 to 211,082 acres for next year, Camp

Camp warned, however, that the increased allotment for the overall county acreage does not necessarily mean that every wheat grower in the county will receive a boost in his individual wheat allotment. The 1951 individual quotas will be based on the "base years" of 1946 through 1949, while the 1950 allotment figure was determined by the wheat acreage the individual producer had during the years of 1945 through 1948.

"Actually," Camp said, "the new allotments will mean that a farmer who had 100 acres in wheat last year will get only an 80-acre allotment this year. On the other hand, some farmers who had only 100 acres last year will receive a 150-acre allotdividual historical average of the

#### The State Line Tribune FAILURE TO NOTIFY DRAFT BOARD OF STATUS CHANGE MAY MEAN INDUCTION

AUSTIN-Filling of the Texas draft quota of 2513 men for September is being jeopardized by the fact that many men, now classified in 1-A, have failed to report marriages and other changes in their circumstances, Brigadier Gen. Paul L. Wakefield, state director of Selective Service, charged in a strongly-worded statement today.

"If we fail to furnish the number of men desired from this state, this failure on the part of many men will be the chief factor in that failure," Gen. Wakefield said.

Selective Service wants to "be reasonable about this situation," the state director said, "but we know that the patience of our local board members are wearing thin. We just want to point out that it is no mandatory under the law that married men be re-classified into III-A under such circumstances."

"Such men who fail to report change of status, such as marriage, or a change of address legally, are eligible to be declared delinquent for failing to comply with the law. A delinquent can be inducted immedlately ahead of all others under this law, and if we are forced to do so in order to meet our calls, we will comply with the law to the letter, Gen. Wakefield continued.

The state dierctor concluded with the statement that notifications concerning marriage, change of address, and other changes of status are "the entire responsibility of the registrant," and that notifications of a

change must be sent to local boards in writing over the signature of the registrant.

"Too much damage already has been done," he said. "The time is almost past for men to get things squared with their draft boards."

According to Lucille Shultz, associate extension foods and nutrition specialist of Texas A. and M. College, fish ranks high among the more nutritious foods.

She points out that fish supplies the same high quality protein that is found in other meats and that it is easily digested. Most fish, she continues provide vitamins A and B and one of the more recently discovered vitamins, D, is present is some fish such as the mackerel and salmon.

Fish also score well on the nutritionists check sheet so far as mininerals are concerned. Minerals are present in both quantity and variety in most fish. Salt water and shell fish are very rich sources of iodine and should be included regularly in

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

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

#### TIMELY SUGGESTIONS OFFERED TO LOCAL FARMERS BY COUNTY AGENT JONES

Most farmers know that Johnson grass can be killed out of fields and most of them know that it should be killed; but, for some reason, many of them make no effort to rid their farms of it.

August and September is a good month to eradicate the plant while it is growing and vigorous. While the grass is in boot stage is the very best time for extermination, says County Agent Joe Jones.

Farmers with irrigation wells or those who are planning to put down area. Treated with the chemical, the wells should take extra precautions. If possible, the Johnson grass should be killed out before the well is installed because it is more difficult to eradicate afterwards. If enough moisture is present, Johnson grass takes root and spreads much faster says Jones.

Three recognized chemicals for Check Cotton Insects killing Johnson grass are sodium chlorate, atlacide and polybor chlovarious lengths of time depending on varying amounts. the amount used.

Land Prepared For Wheat

Land preparation is very important for irrigation whether it is for row crop of for drill crops. It is actually more important for drill crops such as wheat, if the farmer is to abtain proper water distribution, says Jones. This should be kept in mind before seeding wheat.

If farmers do not own land levelers or cannot obtain one for use, they should remember that the Soil Conservation District owns five over the county which are available to farmers, Jones explains.

When the wheat farmers begin distributing water, it follows gravity unless the land is prepared to give even distribution.



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

Q-What is the best way to clean wicker furniture?

A-First, brush it with a stiff brush. Then dip the brush in lukewarm, soapy water and scrub the furniture. Do a thorough job of rinsing and then wipe the piece as dry as possible with a dry, lintless cloth. Leave the furniture in an airy place until it

dries completely.

Q-What is a Fuller faucet?

A-The Fuller faucet is going out of use. It uses a washer shaped somewhat like a bottle cork. To renew the washer, the entire faucet must be unscrewed from the pipe because the only way to reach the washer is through the back opening. The compression faucet, in which the washer is replaced by taking off the handle only, is the newer

Q-How many nails should be used to hold down a rtrip shingle? A-Six nails are recommended for a three-tab, square butt, asphalt strip shingle. If the tabs are being exposed five inches, all nails should be on a line 5% inches up from the bottom of the butts. There should be a nail one inch in from each side and two nails, three inches apart, centered above each cutout.

A-Because it dries so rapidly it tends to retain brush marks. As a rule, only an expert painter or furniture finisher can be expected to do a good lacquering


Q-What can be done to keep the corners of a rug from curling

A-Rug corners curl because the sizing on the bottom of the rug has worn off. To renew the sizing, stretch the rug upside down on the floor and spray it with a solution of half a pound of chip glue in two quarts of water. Let it dry for about a day.

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

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


