HEALTH NOTES

AUSTIN—Food poisoning and the spread of food-borne diseases can be "things of the past," State Health Officer Geo. W. Cox asserted here today.

"People need only remember three things to bring about the end of the food poisoning disease classification," Dr. Cox declared. "Buy food from safe sources, prepare it in a sanitary fashion, and serve and store it correctly."

He said state laws covered the sale of contaminated food to the housewife, but "only the homemaker can see that food is properly stored and cleanly prepared for serving to the family."

There is a difference between food infection and food intoxication, he pointed out.

Food infection comes from eating or drinking a product contaminated by a germ. Dysentery, typhoid fever, para-typhoid fever and tuberculosis are examples. Animal parasites can also gain entry to the body in this way. That, the doctor said, is how people get trichinosis and tapeworm.

The growth and multiplication of certain toxin forming bacteria in unrefrigerated foods bring on food intoxication, according to the explanation. That is the source of staphylococcus infection and the deadly botulism. Some kinds of mushrooms and certain shellfish are also poisonous.

Some poisonous substances may be accidentally introduced into foods, Dr. Cox said. "For instance, rodent and insect poisons, spray residues on fruit and vegetables, and poisons from metal containers."

Questions & Answers Given for Veterans

Q. I am the stepmother of a World War II veteran who was killed in action. He was in my care and custody prior to his entrance into service. May I file a claim for compensation?

A. Yes.
Q. My brother, an honorably discharged World War I veteran, was buried in Potter's Field because his estranged wife was not interested where he was buried. What procedure must be followed to have him buried in a National Cemetery and will VA pay the expense?

A. Application for burial should be made to the superintendent of the National Cemetery where burial is desired. Upon application to VA an amount not to exceed \$150 for items of disintering and reburial may be allowed, it being assumed that no allowance has heretofore been made by VA for burial purposes.

Q. I have been receiving compensation from VA and \$21 additional for a dependent wife. She has now gotten herself a job and is earning a fair salary. May I still claim her as a dependent?

A. The additional compensation provided on account of wife or child to veterans having a disability of 50 percent or more is not based on de-

pendency but solely on relationship.

Q. I married shortly after I was discharged in World War I, but my wife left me after a few months without reason. Can she obtain part of my total disability pension?

A. If the separation was without

any fault on your part and you can establish that fact the regulations governing apportionment will preclude an allowance of such apportionment to her.

Irrigation Activity Continues At SCS

FRIONA—Bill Kennedy, of the Parmer County SCS office, said on Monday that irrigation activity over the county still is continuing at a fairly high level, with the staff locating an average of two wells per week.

"Principally," Kennedy said, "we are being called to locate wells near Friona, with some in the Lazbuddie area. We also have located some near Bovina, but not in recent weeks," he went on, estimating that the SCS staff had located "about 90" since the first of the year.

In the main, the wells are being set up to water an average half-section, with some larger and some

smaller acreages.

SCS workers are continuing work on the N. L. Tharp project, near Farwell, where concrete pipe lines for irrigation are to be used for the first time in Parmer county. A soil survey has been made, and general mapping has been completed, with the planning program slated to be completed this week, Kennedy said.

SCS Program Popular Over Parmer County

FRIONA—Interest in soil conservation work continues to increase over Parmer County, it is reported by Bill Kennedy, of the local SCS office, who said that at the present time the principal interest is in irrigation.

SCS workers are available for assistance in locating wells and helping farm owners lay out land for proper irrigation by means of surveys, Kennedy said, adding that good distribution of water is the only way in which an irrigation well will pay off for the owner.

The Parmer SCS office was established in Friona some two years ago and calls for technical assistance in farming problems are received from all over the country.

MARINE RECRUITING

The U. S. Marine Corps recruiting office in Lubbock Federal building remained open Saturday and Sunday from 8 A. M. to 6 P. M. on orders received from headquarters in Dallas late Friday.

The office at Dallas had been notified by headquarters, Marine Corps, in Washington, D. C., that recruiting offices would remain open over the weekend because of the international situation.

The Lubbock office is accepting volunteer enlistments in the regular

and reserve Marine Corps and they ordinarily close at noon on Saturday. It has not been officially announced as yet but they expect to be open the weekend of 15th and 16th of July probably during the same hours.

Baked Eggs in Toast Cups



Company variation of an American favorite, bacon and eggs, are these baked eggs in scalloped toast rings. Rashers of bacon, hot coffee, and extra enriched toast with preserves complete the menu.

Best way to wish your family a sunny good morning is with a good breakfast. Favorite foods include golden toast and scrambled eggs. For variation, try baked eggs in toast cups. You'll find the cups attractive and an easy way to serve a crowd or provide a special family breakfast.

They're this easy: drop an egg into each bread cup, then bake in muffin pans. The number of eggs desired are baked all at one time. Slide pans out of the oven and lift cups onto a warm platter for service. While the eggs bake, fry the bacon and make the coffee.

Bread rounds may be cut and buttered the night before and wrapped in wax paper, so that in the morning only a second is needed for breaking the eggs into the cups, adding milk, and putting them into the oven.

You'll want extra toast to serve with the egg cups and bacon. Temptingly browned toast is an easy way to see that your family gets a good portion of the B-vitamins and iron they need daily. Six one ounce slices of bread per day provide about 1/4 of the daily minimum requirement for iron, even more of the thiamine and niacin needed for pep and all-around good health.

BAKED EGGS IN TOAST CUPS

12 slices enriched bread Butter or margarine 6 eggs 6 tablespoons milk

With a scalloped cookie cutter cut rounds of bread from bread slices. Use a smaller cutter to remove center portion from 6 of the slices. Brush each slice with melted butter or margarine. Place plain rounds of bread in bottoms

of muffin cups and top with a ring of bread. Break egg in center of each ring and add 1 tablespoon milk to each. Bake in moderate oven (350° F.) 20 to 25 minutes. Serve with broiled bacon. Makes 6 servings.

Environment Is An Important Factor In Egg Quality

In many areas in Texas this summer, egg producers will have an opportunity to take advantage of the better prices offered for quality eggs. According to F. Z. Beanblossom, extension poultry marketing specialist of Texas A. & M. College the egg grading programs in these areas are showing just how important environment, especially heat and humidity, are to the production and marketing of quality eggs.

The temperature of the freshly laid egg, he says is above 100 degrees Fahrenheit and if quality is to be maintained, rapid and thorough cooling of the fresh eggs is a must. Beanblossom points out that eggs will cool from 100 degree F. to 50 degree F. in three hours when they are spread out on a wire tray. It will take five hours for them to cool, if held in a wire egg basket, twelve hours when held in solid pails and eighteen to twenty hours when held in an egg case.

Here is what excess heat does to egg quality. He says eggs 100 days old may be better than some eggs that are only three days old because eggs held at 99.6 degrees F. drop to "B" grade in three days or less. Eggs held at 77 degrees F. will usually hold up for at least eight days; when held at 45 degrees F. they were still tops at 65 days and when they were held at 37 degrees F., they retained

their top quality for 100 days. This, he says, clearly indicates that age does not effect the quality of eggs as directly nor as rapidly as does the environment the egg receives.

The importance of humidity in the egg holding room is reflected in the fact that only 31 percent of the top grade eggs will be maintained when the humidity in the room drops below 75 percent and the temperature rises above 65 degrees F. The failure of egg producers and handlers to pre-cool egg cases, packing eggs before the animal heat is removed and marketing eggs less than twice weekly greatly effects the percentage of high quality eggs marketed, says Beanblossom.

Here is another item that is mighty important in handling eggs. Beanblossom says that research studies show that when eggs are given a ride to town on the big end instead of the little end, five and one-half cents per dozen is lost due to loss in grade. Here is the way it works out; only 73 eggs out of 200 improperly packed eggs graded "A" or better when the eggs rode to town on the big end, while 164 graded "A" or better out of 200 when packed and transported with the large end up.

Beanblossom concludes that egg producers can do something about the quality contained in the eggs they market, and he adds, an egg grading program will make it possible for quality producers to cash in on the better prices offered for the top quality eggs.

WOMEN NAVAL DOCTORS

The first women to complete training under the Navy civilian interne training program, seventeen of them, have been ordered to duty at installations in this country. The new doctors hold reserve commissions as lieutenants, junior grade. They will join two regular Navy and three reserve women doctors already on active duty.

FACTORY LAYOFFS

Fewer factory workers were laid off in April than in any month since October, 1948, according to the Bureau of Labor Statistics. In contrast with April 1949, when workers were being furloughed at the rate of 28 for every 1,000 on a payroll, the rate for April, 1950, fell to 13 a thousand.

FARM PRICES UP

Farm prices advanced about 2.5 percent between mid-April and mid-May to reach the highest level since September, 1949, according to the Agriculture Department, which said that sharply higher prices for hogs, together with increases in prices of most other meat animals, cotton, wool, soybeans, and corn, pushed the general average up.

STRIKES

While the number of strikes increased during April, time lost by the walkouts declined, according to the Bureau of Labor Statistics. There were 400 new shutdowns during March, while idleness, caused by all stoppages during April, declined 15 percent.

**Wives Should Use
Care In Selecting
Peaches**

COLLEGE STATION — Some peaches are now being harvested in Texas but the total crop will be smaller than usual due to the unfavorable weather during the past winter and spring. Louise Mason, extension foods and nutrition specialist of Texas A. and M. College, says homemakers should bear this fact in mind and make the best possible use of the small crop that will be harvested.

First, she says don't let that "skin you love to touch appearance" mislead you when selecting peaches. The best tasting peaches ripen from the seed outward and it is the poor quality varieties that ripen from the outside in to the seed.

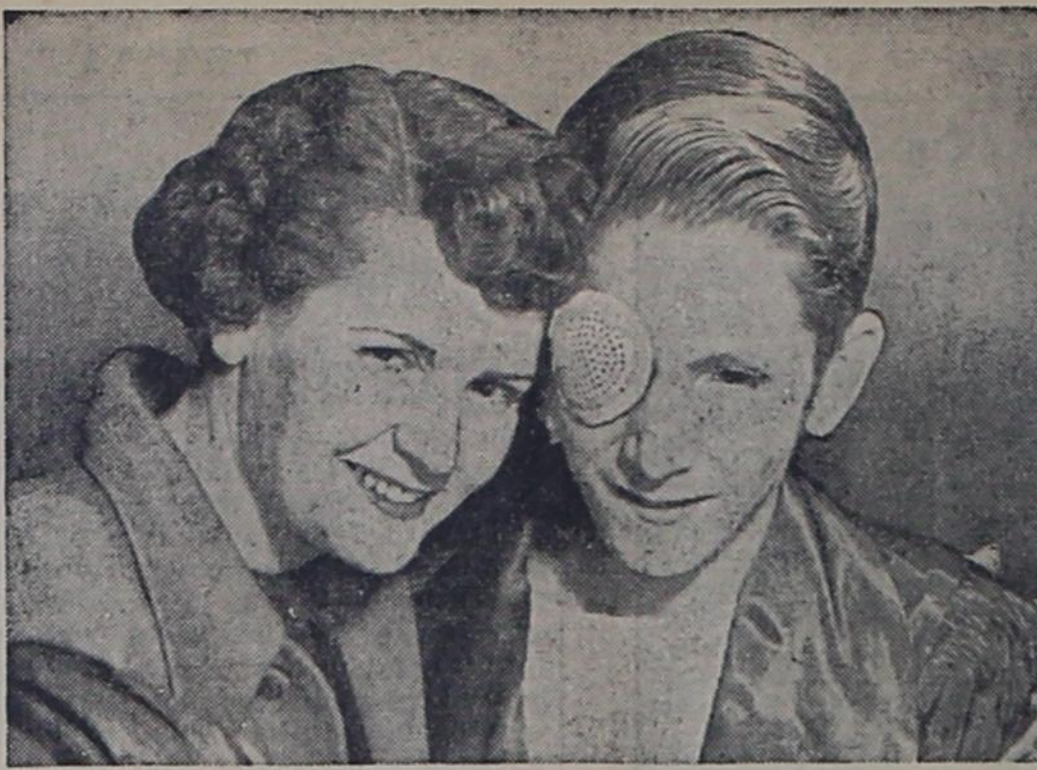
Tree ripened peaches have a more desirable flavor because the fruit enzymes have an opportunity to do their job, adding the luscious flavor that is lost when the peaches are packed before they are mature. She says fruit that is harvested before it is well matured never becomes soft not even when canned.

The tree ripened peaches must be handled with care for they bruise easily and deteriorate rapidly. They should be, according to Miss Mason, eaten, canned or frozen as soon as possible after picking. If they must be held over for several days, keep them in cold storage at 36 to 40 degrees F.

She says the delicious flavor is reason enough for eating peaches but they also supply needed vitamins. At the peak of ripeness, they supply a fair amount of vitamin C, some vitamin B and yellow peaches contain vitamin A. They also contain needed minerals.

From a nutritional standpoint, Miss Mason says each person should get a serving of at least two fruits a day and peaches can be used to fill at least a part of the bill.

For breakfast, she suggests serving a bowl of prepared cereal with sliced peaches and cream; for dinner, a peach chiffon pie or an old fashioned peach cobbler will taste mighty good to the family and for supper, you might try fresh sliced peaches and cream, frozen peach salad or a

cottage cheese and peach salad. Canned or frozen peaches may be substituted for the fresh fruit, she adds.

Other suggested ways of serving peaches include, peach shortcake, peach ice cream, peach sherbert, peach upside down cake, boiled custard and peaches, peach torte, peach tarts and on fruit plates.

She says be sure there are some canned peaches, preserves, peach pickles and peach butter on the pantry shelves for use when the fresh peach season is over and don't forget to stock the home freezer or locker box.

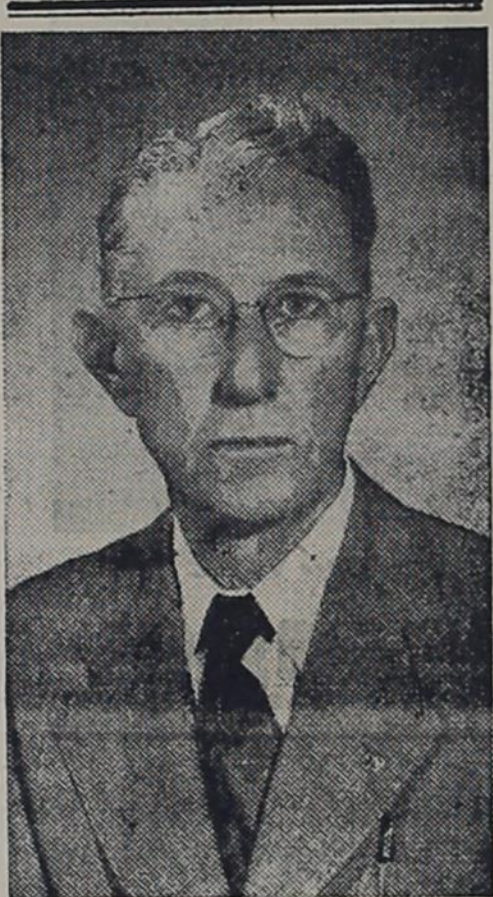

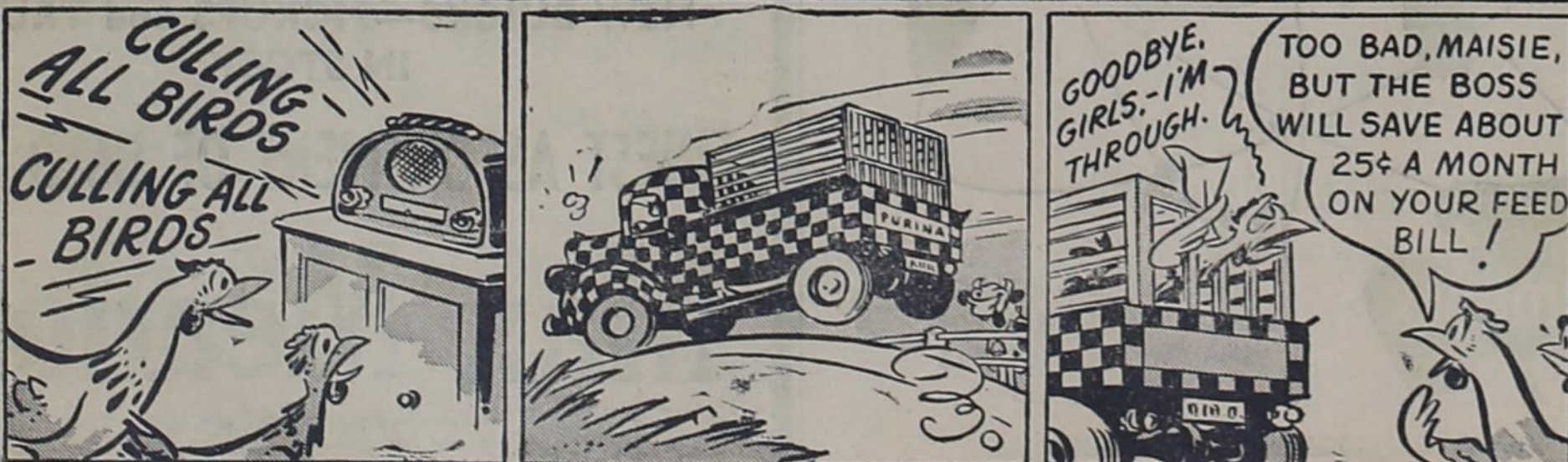

Gov. Shivers Asks Hard Work From Economy Group

Responding to the call of Gov. Allan Shivers to work for the preservation in Texas of "a sound government and a sound economy", several hundred members of the Texas Economy Commission met in Austin last week to set up their permanent

organization and to start work. Former Senator John Redditt, Lufkin was elected chairman; Mrs. Charley Ward, Louise, vice-chairman; John Ben Shepperd, Glade-water, secretary and E. P. Cravens Austin treasurer. Membership of the Commission was appointed last March by Governor Shivers. The Governor principal speaker at the Austin meeting, expressed himself as deeply concerned that the people of Texas be fully informed about their State Government. "There is a definite job to be done, and we are here to tackle it," he de-

clared. "We must preserve a sound government and a sound economy, for our own interests and to encourage new business and industry to come to Texas. To that end it is necessary that we find a way to stop the trend toward bigger and bigger State spending, without depriving our people of essential services. "To determine our limits and define our goals, we need to bring to bear all the intelligence, the courage, the unselfishness, the good will and the sound business judgment that we have in this State." Questions & Answers Given for Veterans

Q—What are the compensation rates payable to World War II veterans for service-connected disabilities?

A—The rates range from \$15 per month for 10 percent disability to \$150 per month for total disability. Additional amounts are payable for such disabilities as loss of arm, leg, eye, etc., and also for dependents if the disability is over 50 percent. For certain specific disabilities, the rates may be as high as \$451 per month under laws enacted by Congress.

Q—Am I entitled to more compensation for my service-connected disability incurred during World War II than a veteran who did not have overseas service?

A—No. There is no distinction based on place of service in benefits paid by veterans administration for service-connected disabilities.

Q—I am the widower of a woman World War II veteran whose death was not service-connected. Are the children and I entitled to a pension?

A—Under present laws, you, the widower, are not entitled. Surviving children may be entitled to a pension if they meet the requirements of the law.

Q—Is it possible to grant power of attorney to other than a lawyer to represent a veteran in a claim before the Veterans Administration?

A—Yes, it is possible. Accredited representatives of recognized organizations such as the American Red Cross, the American Legion, Disabled American Veterans, Veterans of Foreign Wars, etc., are authorized to accept power of attorney for such purposes. Also, agents have been admitted to practice before the VA and a power of attorney may be recognized for the purpose of a particular claim upon filing of a power of attorney from the claimant and a statement signed by such person and the claimant that no fee or compensation of any nature is to be charged or paid for such service.

FRIONA—The Parmer County Community Hospital at Friona now has an ambulance on hand for use by hospital patients, Ralph Roden, manager, said today.

The LaSalle ambulance was delivered to the hospital last week by Marvin Gilliland, of the Gilliland Funeral Home in Hereford, for use at the hospital, Roden explained.

Surface Lakes Fill, Crops Bloom With Recurring Rains

FRIONA—Showers that ranged from light to heavy and in most cases distributed three or more inches in general over the Friona area during the past week have sent thousands of acres of row crops on a growing spree and have put the first noticeable water in surface lakes.

With planting in general complete—although there are some scattered areas where re-planting will be necessitated by heavy precipitation—most farmers are wearing broad smiles over the alternating showers and bright sunshine, following the

near-fiasco of the 1950 wheat crop. Many acres which customarily see wheat plantings have been seeded to various graincrops by farmers determined to get something out of the current growing season, and with continued favorable weather there is every indication that the harvest will be one of the largest in recent years.

Good rains of around one to one and one-half inches were received in most cases last Monday night, and on Tuesday night a deluge of 2½ inches was recorded within the city limits, varying over the area from

1½ inches up, farmers report. Both falls came with little wind and fell over a period of hours, so little washing and damage to young crops was reported.
