HEALTH NOTES

AUSTIN—"Now is an excellent time for school children of all ages to make a trip to their dentists' offices," Dr. George W. Cox, state health officer, reminds Texas parents. Since school is influenced by pupil's health, which is in turn affected by mouth conditions, it is wise to visit the dentist during the summer vacation and obtain any needed treatment before school starts.

"It is dangerous to assume that there is no need for dental atten-

tion simply because a child does not complain of a tooth ache or the parent does not notice any cavities. Only careful examination by a dentist can justify such a conclusion.

"Children entering school for the first time are particularly in need of dental attention. Usually they are at the age when the first four permanent teeth, the six year molars, appear. Because these erupt before the shedding of any baby teeth, they are often mistaken for baby teeth.

Since these are important teeth they should receive early and regular attention by the family dentist.

"Postponement of a visit to the dentist may result in pain and discomfort for the child later on. To avoid such suffering and to prevent the development of conditions that may require more extensive dental services at a later date, parents are strongly urged to take their children to the dentist for an examination now.

"Prompt action will allow time to complete any needed corrections before school opens."

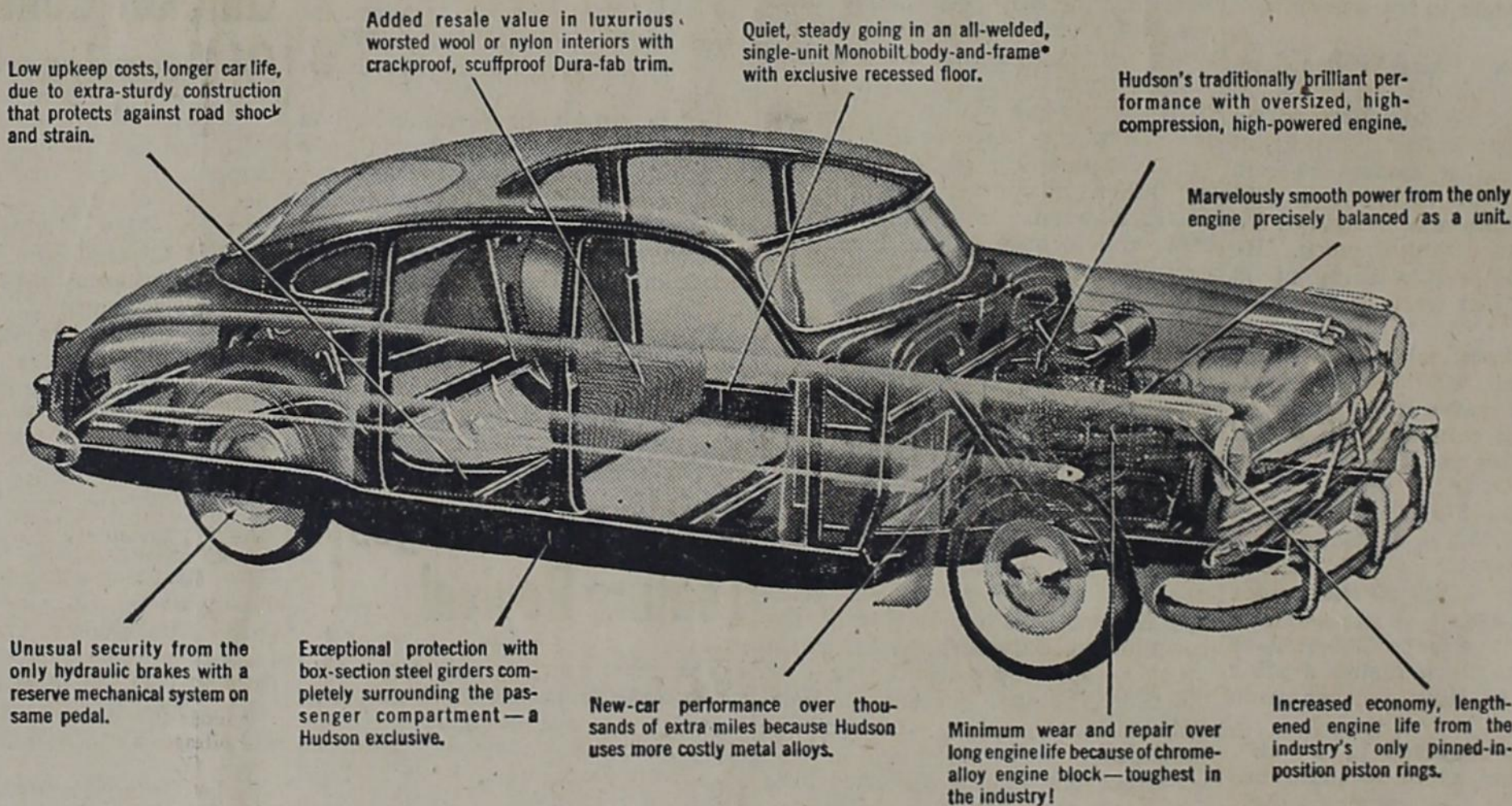

Dry Milk Turns Meat Loaf Into Favorite Family Dish

Meat loaf can be just a budget stretcher—a last resort for an uninspired meal planner—or it can be turned into a very special dish for the family.

Add tastiness of extra good nutrition to meat loaf by mixing in nonfat dry milk on your pantry shelf along with other food staples.

A one-pound package, costing about 35 cents, contains the equivalent of five quarts of fluid skim milk, and may be purchased at your grocer's.

As long as the package is closed carefully after each using, the nonfat dry milk can be kept indefinitely in a cool, dry place.

Here is a note of variation for meat loaf. Fashion the mixture into individual patties and top with a tomato sauce of real nutritious goodness.

The sauce, too, has a nonfat dry milk as an ingredient. It's so simple. Just add nonfat dry milk as it is to the mixture of both meat loaf

and the sauce.
Individual Meat Loaves
Ingredients: One and one-half pounds ground chuck beef, 1 egg, beaten; 1 1/4 teaspoons salt, one-eighth teaspoon black pepper, 1/4 cup nonfat dry milk, 2 cups dry bread poultry stuffing, 2 cups dry bread crumbs and 1/4 teaspoon poultry seasoning, 1 cup water, 1/4 cup catsup.

Method: Using fingers, lightly mix beef, beaten egg, salt, pepper, and nonfat dry milk. Soak dry poultry stuffing or bread crumbs in water. Add wet crumbs to mixture and blend well.

Add catsup, mixing well. Pack in well-greased muffin tins. Cook in

well-greased tins for forty-five minutes. Makes 8 small loaves.

Tomato Sauce

Ingredients: Two tablespoons fat, 1 tablespoon finely chopped onion, 1 tablespoon flour, three-fourths teaspoon salt, dash of pepper, 1/4 cup nonfat dry milk, 1 cup tomato juice.

Method: Melt fat. Cook onions in fat until soft, but not browned. Remove from heat. Blend in flour and seasonings. Sprinkle nonfat dry milk on tomato juice. Beat with rotary egg beater until blended.

Gradually add to flour mixture. Cook, stirring constantly, over medium heat until mixture comes to a boil. Serve hot over individual meat loaves.

Persons May Have Impetigo Repeatedly Warns Health Officer

AUSTIN—When a state health officer says there is no such thing as a natural resistance to impetigo, parents of small children know exactly what he means. Those parents know, perhaps from bitter experience, that the same individual can suffer repeated attacks from what State Health Officer Geo. W. Cox calls an "offensive, annoying skin infection."

Although children are usually susceptible, impetigo can be found in any age group, Dr. Cox said. It is most prevalent during the summer months, but has been known to occur at any month.

Impetigo according to Dr. Cox's explanation, is a purulent skin infection. It isn't too serious, except in new born babies. An invasion of a hospital nursery ward calls for extreme attention to keep uninfected babies from getting it, for it spreads like fire in dry grass.

Impetigo is caused by a pus forming bacteria called staphylococci—

the same sort of germ found in boils and sores where pus is present. Usually it forms an unsightly crust over wide areas of the body. The pus underneath the crust is highly infectious if allowed to get on any other skin surface.

The infection is easily transmitted when a non-infected person uses the towel of someone infected, since the towel moisture permits the germ to survive.

Children living in the most hygienic home frequently get impetigo, although it is perhaps more common among children living in homes where personal sanitation isn't considered too important.

Dr. Cox says soldiers are often infected, because they have small chance for keeping consistently clean. It may involve a whole arm or a side of the face and neck.

The only way to minimize the ill effects of impetigo is to keep the infection located, that is, keeping it from spreading. This can be done only by preventing the pus or serum from exuding onto "clean" skin surfaces.

The family physician is the infected child's best friend. He'll advise the mother how best to combat the ailment, and how to keep it from spreading to other family members.

State Accepts Two Top-Notch National 4-H Awards Program

Two highly important national 4-H awards programs—meat animal, and soil and water conservation—have been accepted for the current year by the Texas State Club of fice.

This will be the 21st consecutive year that Thomas E. Wilson, meat packer and chairman of the national committee on Boys and Girls Club work, has provided incentives to help encourage 4-H boys and girls in livestock club work.

Awards in the meat animal activity include gold-filled medals, gold watches, Chicago 4-H Club Congress trips and \$300 college scholarships, on county, state, sectional, and national levels, respectively.

The soil and water conservation program is now set up for two age groups—one for boys and girls 15 to 21 years old, and the other for those 10 to 14, inclusive. The older group is required to complete a more comprehensive project.

Medals for county winners, and gold watches and \$25 savings bonds for state champions are provided by Firestone Tire & Rubber Company. Sectional winners get Chicago Club Congress trips.

National awards are \$300 college scholarships. This revised program is the result of combined planning by representatives of the Cooperative Extension Service, Soil Conservation Service, Firestone, and the national committee.

Bennie John Gallagher, of Clarkwood, Nueces county, was last year's national and state champion in the meat animal program. Carroll Fowler, of Lakeview, Hall county, won sectional and state honors in soil conservation.

Complete information on these programs may be obtained from County Extension agents.

After a while, the rushing water abated somewhat, and it came Morgan's turn to ford the current. Midway, the motor drowned. He opened the door, and to his dismay, a flood of murky water rushed into the car, soiling upholstery.

"It didn't look that deep," he said.

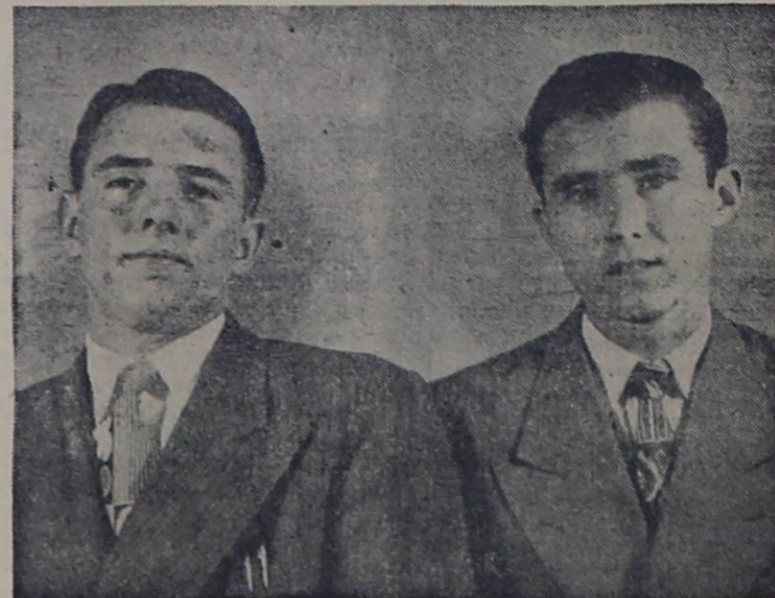

Fair to Encourage Better Practices

Contest rules and special awards to junior livestock exhibitors at the New Mexico State Fair to encourage better breeding and commercial feeding of cattle have been announced by Roy Forehand, president of the New Mexico Cattle Growers Association. The four top winners in the Breeding Heifer contests will be awarded heifer calves valued from \$100 to \$130 each and the Commercial Feeding project will offer the five high exhibitors an all-expense trip to Kansas City Stock Yards, Forehand said. The two contests are to be sponsored jointly by the State Fair and Cattleman's Association.

"These contests are open to all members of recognized 4-H or FFA Clubs in New Mexico and we expect junior exhibitors from every county in the state to participate," Forehand said.

Requirements for entries in the Junior Breeding Department provide that boys and girls shall have owned and managed the heifer entered for a period of at least five months under the supervision of a County Agent or Vocational Agricultural Instructor. Records must be kept showing progress of the calves and winners of the four heifer awards must exhibit their prize animals in the State Fair the following year.

Winners of the heifer calves last year included: Alice Moore, Raton; Douglas George Amisted; Gene Roberson, McAlister and Leon Musick of Portales. Because of a general misunderstanding in contest rules last year the above winners will not be required to exhibit their animals in the fair this year, Forehand said.

In the commercial feeder-steer class contest, rules provide that pens of five fat steers must be shown and winners of the first five pens will be awarded an all-expense trip to some livestock marketing terminal.

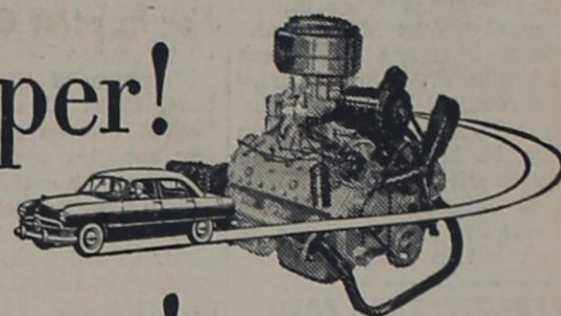

Grain Loss Slight In Flooded Bins Of Elevator

W. M. Sherley, co-owner of the Sherley Grain Company at Bovina, reported today that the loss sustained Tuesday night of last week, when run-in water flooded the huge elevator, was slight.

"The damage to stored grain sorghums was negligible, and we probably lost about 200 bushels of wheat," Sherley said.

Flood waters poured into the elevator pits through highway culverts near the elevator at night when no one suspected danger of high water when more than three inches of rain fell in the Bovina area during Tuesday night.

After filling the pits underneath 32 full tanks of grain, the water rose to a depth of 18 to 36 inches in the grain bins, wetting the stored grain. Six pumps, including two fire trucks, worked all day Wednesday pulling the water from the pits.

Sherley said that practically all of the moistened grain had been saved by "airing it out and mixing it with dry grain."

machine to be equipped with a scarifier.

Warrants in the amount of \$16,000 will be issued in part payment. The successful bidder will be expected to accept one Galion Model 102 motor grader and one No. 12 Caterpillar motor in trade.

Bids will be opened at 10 o'clock Monday morning, August 14 in the County Court Room of the Parmer County Courthouse, Brewer says.

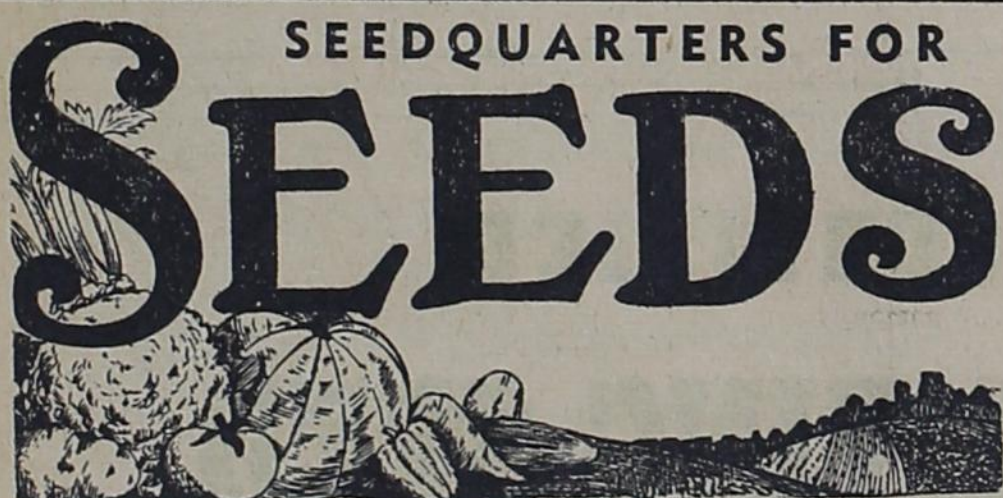
