### ARREST OF SEAGRAVES FARMER MAY SOLVE CATTLE THEFT RING HERE

Although he stoutly denies any connection with any cattle theft ring, Sheriff Chas. Lovelace is continuing investigations that might connect J. C. Bowers, 40, Seagraves farmer, with a ring of cattle thieves that have been in operation in this section for the past several months.

Bowers, described by Sheriff Lovelace as a "two-time loser" was taken into custody by Texas Ranger Razz Renfrow on his farm near Seagraves. Being arraigned here Monday, Bowers waived his preliminary and was bound over to await the action of the grand jury in October on a \$3000 bond.

He had not furnished bond early Tuesday morning, but Sheriff Lovelace expressed the belief that bond would be made.

Specifically, Bowers was charged here with the theft of one cow from the Fred Kepley farm, east of this city, last January. Sheriff Lovelace, acting on a tip, located the cow in a dairy herd near Texline. Investigations revealed that the animal had Jo Sondra Magerus been sold through an Elkhart, Kansas, auction ring by Bowers, officers here said, adding that two other cattle were sold through the same ring by Bowers, at about the same

Three cows disappeared from Sheriff Lovelace is investigating the probability that Bowers might have been responsible for the disappearance. Archie McCutcheon, of Bovina, and G. H. Meissner of Lariat, each reported the loss of a cow in January of this year.

Impressions made in the ground by tire treads, lead officers to believe that the same vehicle was used in removing all three of the cows, Sheriff Lovelace added.

AUSTIN-"Now is an excellent time for school children of all ages to make a trip to their dentists' offices," Dr. George W. Cox, state health officer, reminds Texas parents. Since school is influenced by pupil's health, which is in turn affected by mouth conditions, it is now. wise to visit the dentist during the summer vacation and obtain any needed treatment before school starts.

## State Accepts Two **Top-Notch National** 4-H Awards Program

Two highly important national 4-H awards programs-meat animal, and soil and water conservationhave been accepted for the current year by the Texas State Club of-

This will be the 21st consecutive year that Thomas E. Wilson, meat packer and chairman of the national committee on Boys and Girls Club work, has provided incentives to help encourage 4-H boys and girls in livestock club work.

Awards in the meat animal activity include gold-filled medals, gold watches, Chicago 4-H Club Congress trips and \$300 college scholarships, on county, state, sectional, and national levels, respectively.

The soil and water conservation program is now set up for two age groups-one for boys and girls 15 to 21 years old, and the other for those 10 to 14, inclusive. The older group is required to complete a more comprehensive project.

Medals for county winners, and gold watches and \$25 savings bonds for state champions are provided by Firestone Tire & Rubber Company. Sectional winners get Chicago Club Congress trips.

National awards are \$300 college scholarships. This revised program is the result of combined planning by representatives of the Cooperative Extension Service, Soil Conservation Service, Firestone, and the national committee.

Bennie John Gallagher, of Clarkwood, Nueces county, was last year's national and state champion in the meat animal program. Carroll Fowler, of Lakeview, Hall county, won sectional and state honors in soil conservation.

#### Fair to Encourage **Better Practices**

Contest rules and special awards to junior livestock exhibitors at the New Mexico State Fair to encourage better breeding and commercial feeding of cattle have been announced by Roy Forehand, president of the New Mexico Cattle Growers Association. The four top winners in the Breeding Heifer conests will be awarded heifer calves valued from \$100 to \$130 each and the Commercial Feeding project wi'l offer the five high exhibitors an all-expense trip to Kansas City Stock Yards, Forehand said. The two contests are to be sponsored jointly by the State Fair and Cattleman's Association.

"These contests are open to all members of recognized 4-H or FFA Clubs in New Mexico and we expect dessert in itself, but they are exjunior exhibitors from every county in the state to participate," Forehand

Requirements for entries in the Junior Breeding Department provide that boys and girls shall have owned and managed the heifer entered for a period of at least five months under the supervision of a County Agent or Vocational Agricultural Instructor. Records must be kept showing progress of the calves and winners of the four heifer awards must exhibit their prize animals in the State Fair the following

Winners of the heifer calves last year included: Alice Moore, Raton; Douglas George Amisted; Gene Robberson, McAlister and Leon Musick of Portales. Because of a general misunderstanding in contest rules last year the above winners will not be required to exhibit their animals

in the fair this year, Forehand said. In the commercial feeder-steer class contest, rules provide that pens of five fat steers must be shown and winners of the first five pens will be awarded an all-expense trip to some livestock marketing termianl.


