

Question of Poll Tax Payments Perplexing

Special Polio Fund Response Is Slight

FARWELL THE STATE LINE TRIBUNE New Mexico

The Emergency Polio Fund Drive, launched throughout the nation during the month of September to care for the unprecedented number of polio victims all over the country. amounted to \$323.48 in Parmer County.

These figures were released today by Loyde Brewer, infantile paralysis chairman of Parmer County.

In announcing the figures, Brewer said that he was only able to account for contributions collected at Friona and Bovina, where the funds were collected and turned over to him by the respective postmasters.

So far as Brewer has been advised, no other collections were made except in Farwell, where all contributions were sent direct to Dallas withpostoffice explained that contributions were forwarded to Dallas in the original envelopes, "and we have no way of knowing the amount". Contributions from Friona amounted to \$184.48, while Bovina contributors chipped in \$139.00.



AUSTIN-Scarlet fever is one of the most disabling and dangerous diseases usually associated with childhood, although actually it is confined to no age limit, according to Dr. Geo. W. Cox, State Health Officer. While only six cases were reported in the state during the week ending September 24, it brought the year's total to 911 cases.
