This first Thanksgiving was not merely a feast-there were prayers, sermons, and songs of praise; three days went by before the Indians returned to their homes.

From Plymouth the custom spread to the other colonies until, in time, the governors issued a proclamation each year. For many years there was no uniformiy; each state was in charge. Some had a day of thanksgiving and others did not.

President Lincoln was the first president of the United States to proclaim a Thanksgiving Day. The same day was set aside each year for seventy-five years. President F. D. Rousevelt changed it to the third Thursday in November when he came in office, but in 1941 congress passed a law which set aside the last Thursday in November as a national holiday for Thanksgiving.
