### **County Agent Jones** Urges Farmers to Buy Cottonseed at Present Assembly Features

farmers in the area to make arrangements for their cottonseed now.

In addition to the available registered and certified seed, good gin run seed of the adopted varieties should be saved, Jones adds.

Discussing the cottonseed situation, Jones states that farmers should check their own seed and not allow seed to heat. Small lots should be stirred with a seed fork. Those stored in warehouses should be checked and if necessary stored in a building where air can be pulled through them.

When seeds are cut with a knite, the inside should be light grey in color. Also, 100 samples should be Observe FFA Week planted, or germination tests be run to determine if a thicker rate of planting is necessary.

Seed treating recommendations should be followed, the county agent

Also Jones recommends that farmers not only lay away cottonseed, but fertilizer as well. Although the domestic fertilizer supply is expected to exceed last year's, the increased supply does not mean that every crop producing area will have an adequate amount when it needs it.

Therefore farmers should purchase their supplies now and store them for future use during the peak season. Well-cured fertilizer does not cake, Jones explains.



Consequently, Santa Fe now has substantially less cars on its rails than when the "outlaw strike" began. Naturally, this will result in a shortage of cars until this complex situation has been cleared.

### A word to our shippers

We are doing everything possible to speed up the return to normal. We ask, however, that shippers who now need cars bear with us during this period.

Santa Fe expresses its thanks to its shippers and passengers for their patience and understanding during the trying times we have all just passed through - and also to all our people who cooperated in this emergency, many of them responding beyond their normal call of duty.







### **Agent Jones Says** Dairy Cows Need

a lot of milk, and dairy cattle do there with the Army. Mrs. Bradfield not always drink enough water and Mrs. Bagley are sisters. during the winter months, County Agent Joe Jones says. Quite often, this is because an adequate supply

of good water is not available. Jones quotes R. E. Burleson, associate extension dairy Kusbana man of Texas A. & M. College, who says: "Good water is clean and cool, but not colder than 50 degrees F. There should also be an adequate supply of water and the cows should not be forced to walk long distances for their drink. They prefer to stay in the barn or under a shed on cold days, and the water supply should be nearby".

Weather Used To Be Cold

Cold weather has been prominent in the minds of Texico-Farwell citizens the past few weeks, and the Bob naturally turned to that way couple was asked if they could remember when the temperature had

Both replied, "It's not nearly as cold out here as it used to be." Bob recalls 1918 as the worst winter he ever endured on the High Plains.

As an example, he told of hundreds of head of cattle that were lost to the cold, driving winds. "Not so many froze to death as were trampled to death," he reported. "They would turn their tails to the wind and retreat from the storms and would finally pile up in a bunch in a fence corner and trample one another to death trying to get away from the

The worst loss suffered was by a man named Galloway who lived north of Farwell. Galloway lost 2300 sheep in one storm, Kyker recalls. Terrible Droughts, Too

Also, Mr. and Mrs. Kyker can recall some of the devastating dry cycles this part of the country has survived. They remember a period of about three years-believed to be about 1909 through 1911-when it stayed so dry that even the tumbleweeds never grew above three inch-

"People would have moved out of this country if they could have," said Bob. "They couldnt leave because they were so poor. None had enough money to buy a railroad ticket, and all the horses were so nearly starved they couldn't pull wagons, so the people just stayed."

Asked if he could remember when the first car came to town, Bob said he could-very definitely. In fact, he added, he owned the second car in
