Seen last Sunday afternoon, just out of Portales, a horse-drawn bundle wagon being driven across a field by a farmer.

Reflecting over this unusual sight of this day, I began to wonder how many teams are still in use on the farms of this county. I don't mean teams that are just kept about the premises to use in cases of emergencies, such as pulling the family car out of the mud, or to use in helping to get the tractor started on cold mornings.

But how many teams are actually used on the farms in this county to do the actual farm work? It would be quite interesting to know their number, if, indeed there are any.

There are any number of farms in the county today that do not possess a single hoof of livestock; not even a cow nor a hog. The farmer goes in exclusively for grain and wheat production.

This is a far cry from only a few years ago. Only a few year ago, any farmer who did not include a few head of livestock and a flock of chickens would have difficulty in getting financial backing. That was the day of the "cow, sow and hen."

The Santa Fe Railway Company, in promoting a farming program based on these essentials, ran an annual "cow, sow and hen" train all over this region to emphasize the importance of the program, and to introduce better breeding and feeding practices among the farmers.

We have gone through a great transition during the past 25 years in our farming practices. Today, the only horses produced are race and roping stock, used primarily for entertainment and sports events.

I used to think when I came home with a poor report card and suffered a good licking for my bad grades that I was a most unfortunate lad. But I realize now how lucky I really was. Now lads who come in with poor report cards are drafted into



The Krohne glider, an Army surplus craft which its operator converted from tandem to a single, soared in from Odessa in four hours, after the Krohnes has attended a onvention of Flying Farmers at Fort Worth. Last year, using Odessa as his take-off point, "Pop" landed at Hereford.

The first load of the 1951 feed harvest received in this county was reported on Monday of this week by Boone Allison, operator of the Lariat Elevator.

Bringing in the first load of Martin mile was Allen Stancel, of West Camp, who is operating a dry-land farm in the area. The grain was received at the Lariat Elevator on Saturday afternoon and the customary premium payment was made for the initial load.

Boone stated that the Stancel crop optomistically estimated, would har vest out around 1,000 pounds per acre, and the Saturday load tested 15 per cent moisture. The size of the field was not learned here.

Local elevator men contacted the first of the week, reported that they had no receipts of 1951 grain, with C. M. Henderson, of the Henderson Grain & Elevator, adding that he understood some of the "dehydrated" crop over the county was in the process of early cutting, to make way for possible wheat sowing this

Insofar as this immediate area is concerned, things remain rather serious for the majority of fields, with the spotted showers of recent weeks hitting only here and there and failing to do any real good over a comprehensive scope. Some farmers, those who have been in the rain bent, are exceedingly pleased with the outlook for their feed, while others, less fortunate, have been forced to watch dry-land stuff deteriorate

Good showers, ranging from .60 of an inch to a full inch are reported from the Hub community in the center of the county, and also north

The rains have brought out wheat seeding equipment in the soaked sections, while a large portion of the county remains too dry for such activity. All the sowing reported has been confined to summer tilled fields where the land has been kept in condition and free from weed growth. Some growers agree that the moisture is not as deep as they would like to see, but are proceeding with their sowing operations as a measure of protecting the soil from wind erosion when the fall winds begin to sweep over the level, unprotected fields.

Considerable dry land feed will not be aided by the moisture, but late plantings wil be greatly benefitted, farmers agree.




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

New Chicken Processing Plant Is Opened For Business In Texico On Tuesday

Birds-chickens to the laymenby the thousands are due to roll out of Texico's newest business during the next few days, as the Texico Produce Company began operations in its chicken processing plant Tues-

John Getz, responsible for the introduction of the new Northwester chicken-a cross between the everpopular fryer and the white-meated juicy pheasant-said Monday afternoon that he already had commitments over New Mexico which some 3,000 birds per week.

Serving as foreman of the new plant will be E. L. Chambless, and local ladies will be used to de-pin and clean the chickens after they have been mechanically dipped in boiling water and run through a mechanical picker. This picker, incidentally, actually doesn't "pick" the feathers. On the contrary, rotating flexible rubber "fingers" the feathers from the carcass.
