I have just about concluded that I am waging a losing fight on hail and automobile insurance rates that I have been harping about for the past three weeks.

It seems every time I jump onto the subject in this column, one of the local insurance agents mails me a bill that is due on some policy.

Two weeks ago B. N. Graham mailed me a bill on one policy, and it was followed up last week by another IOU. And this week, Jess Landrum brings me a third.

So, it seems every time I open my mouth, the insurance boys cram a bill into it. They evidently think this is about the best way to silence me.

Notwithstanding these bills, I still contend that hail insurance rates on roofs and automobile insurance rates are unjust and unreasonable. The insurance boys will take your money for hail insurance for roofs year in and year out without telling you that they won't suffer in 99 cases out of 100 because of the \$100-deductible clause in their policies.

The same gang lobbied through the legislation making it mandatory to carry automobile liability insurance on the promise that lower rates could be given the insured. But now we are told that instead of reduced rates, the rates have actually been advanced.

One of the reasons, I am told, is that the hazards go up as insurance is extended to all drivers. If that be true, the former customer is getting it in the neck, an unfair deal to say the least.

He's being penalized to pay coverage for drivers who haven't been carrying insurance, and who are apparently considered greater risks. If it turns out that those who were brought under the wire by the force of the law are greater risks, then it would seem reasonable that the insurance companies would demand higher rates for them, and not saddle the lead upon drivers who have been paying the bill up until now.

A graduated scale, based on driving records, obviously is the fair way.

Bev Buchanan, living back over on the east side of the county, was making a comparison of how news spreads in these modern times.

Bev. one of the early cowpokes in this county, recalled that when he first came to Parmer County he was the only subscriber getting a daily newspaper at Friona. Said Bev, "I would come to town about once a week to get my paper, and when I'd take it from my box it would be nearly worn out by townspeople who had taken it from my box and read it before I came to town."

"But it was still all news to me when I got it," he added.

## 16 Indictments Voted By County Grand Jury

The Parmer County grand jury recessed Tuesday afternoon after returning a total of sixteen criminal indictments for offenses allegedly committed in this county.

Sheriff Chas. Lovelace said today that all the indicted persons were in custody, including two who are now serving time in the New Mexico penitentiary.

Milton Autrey, Alton Morgan and Foye Vinson entered pleas of guilty to charges of burglary in district court, and Judge E. A. Bills ordered them to appear again on May 19 for sentencing. Judge Bills indicated he would place the lads on probation, but wanted to study their cases more before passing sentence.

George Waldie, Bobby Gray, and William Ernest Gray, three Childress young men, indicted on charges of burglary and theft, were ordered to appear in court on May 19 for sentencing. The case of Wayne Raymond, who is being held on similar charges, was transferred to county court after it was determined he was a minor.

Raymond Cook and Melvin Trulock, charged with theft of over \$50, were placed on probation for three years by Judge Bills.

## Farmers Discuss Castor Bean Production Here

Approximately 25 interested farmers were present for a meeting Wednesday night of last week, to discuss the production of castor beans in Parmer County, Joe Camp, PMA secretary, reported today.

Attendants talked about the production of the crop, and explained the planting procedure, and it was explained that very little extra equipment is required for the production.

Around 400 acres have been designated for castor beans in this area, Camp says. The PMA has seed and contracts now, and anyone can sign up for castor beans, get the seed, and plant them in a short time. "We will be glad to discuss the crop with anyone who is interested," Camp states.

## Junior Livestock Show Has Record Entry List

A new record was established at Parmer County Junior livestock show the past weekend, with an overflow number of animals housed in the show barns. A record of 376 head of fat calves, breeding cattle, dairy cattle, swine and one lamb were entered in the show.

Stanley Anderson, animal husbandry instructor at Texas Tech in Lubbock, was judge for the show. Fat calves were classified by Anderson, Homer Brumley of Hereford, Dick Garner of Plainview, and Pete Buske of Friona. A total of 176 calves were entered in the division; 21 were named prime, 60 choice and 95, good. Bill Flippin of Friona and Dick Doshier of Farwell were auctioneers for the sale following the show. J. T. Gee, Friona FFA instructor, was show superintendent.

Ben Jordan, a Friona FFA member, was owner of the grand champion fat calf, a 1,060-pound Hereford Reserve champion was an Aberdeen Angus, owned by M. C. Osborn, also a Friona FFA member.

In the dairy division, the Friona FFA chapter entered the grand champion bull and D. O. Robason, Friona FFA member had the grand champion female. In the Milking Shorthorn division, grand champion bull was exhibited by Dale Hart, Friona FFA, and Darrell Thompson, Friona 4-H club, exhibited the grand champion cow. Top holsteins were shown by Gary Sherrieb, Friona 4-H boy; and Lester Burnett, Friona FFA, was owner of top animals in the Brown Swiss group.

Bob Geries, Farwell FFA, exhibited the grand champion barrow, with Vernon Petty, Friona 4-H, showing the reserve champion. Jerry Zachary, Friona FFA, was owner of Bovina FFA was exhibitor of the champion gilt. Dale Berggren of grand champion boar.

Sale average of the 176 fat calves at the auction was slightly over 35 cents per pound, with Ben Jordan's grand champion going to Bert Chitwood of Friona for \$373.40. M. C. Osborn sold the reserve champion to Red McDonald of Friona for \$399.98. Friona merchants gave \$400 in prizes to the winners in the show.

## John E. Speer Named Trustee By Creditors

John E. Speer, Lubbock insurance man, who has been acting as receiver for the C. M. Henderson properties in Farwell since March 22, was elected as trustee in bankruptcy at a creditors meeting held in Lubbock last Friday before Referee in Bankruptcy Frank R. Murray.

Speer's bond was set at \$100,000. He was appointed receiver in the case, succeeding Jesse Osborn, Muleshoe banker, who was originally named receiver for the Henderson interests after the government filed suit for shortage of an estimated \$1,000,000 in government-stored grain.

Henderson also faces a criminal charge in the case, and his trial will probably be heard in federal court in Amarillo in May or June.

The former Farwell grain dealer testified in Friday's hearing regarding various properties he owned and other details of the business.

Approximately 30 creditors attended the Lubbock hearing and selected Speer as trustee in bankruptcy. Speer said here today that he was hopeful of being able to pay a "good portion of the losses," adding that it would "be too optimistic" to expect to pay 100 cents on the dollar.

At the Lubbock meeting, Speer revealed that \$176,000 was now on deposit in a Lubbock bank in a federally designated depository.

Judge Murray announced that the decision of the court was to effect that the trusteeship will be a liquidating trusteeship.

Creditors were advised that they have six months in which to file claims.

## Light Rains Bring Only Slight Relief

Light rains that fell over this area last Friday and Saturday did little to relieve the extremely dry conditions that have prevailed here for more than three months.

Shortly less than a half inch was recorded here, with local rain gauges registering 42 of an inch. But the extremely dry conditions of the topsoil soon drank up the badly needed moisture with the result that none of it penetrated to the lower depths.

Wheat fields, that have been making a desperate fight against wind, sand and dry weather since the first of the year, have shown some response to the limited moisture. Farmers agree, however, that the moisture received brought only temporary relief, and additional moisture must be forthcoming soon to save any of the wheat.

Row crop farmers agree that the moisture received from Friday and Saturday's slow drizzle is not sufficient to justify planting operations.

T. W. (Tot) Bewley, who lives 4 miles west and 2½ north of Lazbuddy, stated today that he had leased out his farm and would have a general farm clean-up sale on Monday, April 28.


The sale is scheduled to get underway at 10 a.m. and the Baptist ladies of Lazbuddy will serve lunch at noon.

Lacy Gant, 18-year-old son of Mr. and Mrs. John M. Gant of Texico, was killed in a motorcycle accident last Sunday morning, according to information received here Tuesday by his parents.

The accident that claimed the young man's life happened at Astoria, Oregon, where he was receiving training in the Navy. Details of the accident were not revealed in the message received here.

Members of the family said the body was being returned here for burial, and they tentatively set the date at Sunday afternoon at the Baptist Church, with Rev. C. M. Fields, pastor, officiating.

Lacy was a junior in the Texico school at the time of his enlistment in March of last year. He received his boot training at San Diego, and had been in training at Astoria since completing his initial training.

The Gant family have been residents of Texico for the past 14 years. Lacy was their only child.

Besides his father and mother, he is survived by a grandmother, Mrs. Alta Fought, Texico, and an uncle, Harold D. Fought, also of Texico.

Other survivors include two uncles, and two aunts on his mother's side of the family. They are, Mrs. Verle Terry, San Jon, N. M.; Mrs. Myrtle Rosenbaugh, Los Angeles; Benson Fought, San Jon; Clarence Fought, with U. S. Forces in England.

On his father's side, survivors include six uncles and one aunt: Ray Gant, Clovis; Charlie Gant, U. S. Navy; Abraham Gant, Clovis; Clifford Gant, Corona, N. M.; Raymond Gant, Borger; Dick Gant, Colorado; and Miss Tiny Gant, Clovis.

## Palmateer Gets Rap In Court Decision

In a lengthy opinion handed down by District Judge E. A. Bills in district court here Monday, Ralph Palmateer was fined \$100 and sentenced to serve one day in jail on contempt of court charges.

Judge Bills further ordered that Palmateer be placed in the county jail "until he pays \$4,577.50 past due on child support into the registry of this court."

Further the court decreed that "the said Ralph Palmateer pay all court costs."

Monday's court action was the outgrowth of a suit filed in 1941, wherein Della Light, formerly Della Palmateer, sought support for her minor children. Palmateer was held guilty of contempt of court when it was found that he had not carried out the decree of the court in supporting his children.

Palmateer is at liberty on bond and court attaches said he was scheduled to appear here on May 19 for sentencing. Notice of appeal to the Court of Civil Appeals of the Seventh Supreme Judicial District was given in the case here Monday.

## Parmer County Fails In Red Cross Drive

Possibly for the first time in history, Parmer County failed to meet its quota of \$1,540 in the annual membership drive, it was revealed here today by Loyde Brewer, county roll call chairman.

Tabulations released by Brewer today showed that the county was \$310.55 short of its quota, with the following reports being filed: Friona, \$519; Lakeview, \$27; Black, \$69; Farwell, \$216.63; Lazbuddy, \$132.40; Lariat, \$11; Bovina, \$233.42.

## Check Issued 32 Years Ago Unpaid

A 32-year-old check, issued to J. J. Plaster, former Texico resident, by T. Sam Randol of this city, which had never been cashed, was found Monday by Miss Katherine Pullium, local high school student.

The check, drawn on the Farmers State Bank of Texico, was made payable to Plaster in the amount of \$3.00, and was issued on Feb. 18, 1920. Plaster is now deceased and the bank ceased to exist many years ago.

Miss Pullium picked up the ancient negotiable instrument near the Randol home, where it had drifted among some trash accumulation.

The check was well preserved in spite of its age.

## Texico Council Vote Held Void By Judge

District Judge E. T. Hensley Jr., has held the Texico municipal election, held on April 1, "void and of no effect" as concerns the vote cast for members of the town council, and has set April 29 as the date that the candidates in the election appear in Clovis and show cause why the election should not be so declared.

Judge Hensley's ruling does not affect the mayor's race in which M. C. Roberts received 133 votes with 26 write-in votes being polled for O. S. Alred. Neither does the ruling affect the \$12,000 waterworks bond issue, which the voters of Texico approved by a wide margin of 94 to 11.

Candidates in the election contacted by The Tribune on Wednesday, appeared to be somewhat disinterested in the final outcome. "I may go over and sit in on the hearing if it is convenient," one defeated candidate said. Another, contacted by telephone, said he had not decided whether he would attend the hearing or not.

A re-canvass of the ballots showed that 28 persons voted in the election who were not registered as required by law. It was further found that the ballots were not numbered "so that they might be identified."

Should the court hold in its final decree that the election is void, it would mean that the present town council, with the exception of the mayor, would continue in office. Present councilmen are, Grayson Roberts, Russell Johnson, Les Means and J. E. Stone, the latter two being hold-overs.

## Car Registrations Topping Last Year

Automobile and truck registrations in Parmer County are running well ahead of last year's figures, it was revealed at the tax collector's office on Tuesday.

Passenger car registrations lead the field with 1705 registrations already this year, as compared with 1660 for the entire year of 1951. Commercial vehicles were also ahead of last year's figures with 187 up to the present, compared to 180 for all of last year.

Up to Tuesday only 913 farm trucks had been registered here, which is 21 less than those tagged in 1951. However, attaches at the collector's office explained that many farmers had not yet put their farm trucks in operation this year, which accounts for the decrease in this category.

"The farm truck registrations will pick up when farmers begin their spring work," it was stated at the office.

## School Bus Hit By Soldiers On Leave

One of the Farwell school buses, driven by Kenneth Livingston, was hit by an old model Chevrolet car Tuesday afternoon when the bus was making a left-hand turn off Highway 60, just north of town.

None of the school children suffered injuries and the bus was only slightly damaged. The Chevrolet was so badly smashed that it was left behind and the soldier lads proceeded on a bus. The soldiers are stationed at Fort Bliss and were enroute home when the accident happened.

No charges were filed, it being found that the mishap was purely accidental.

**Phone Cut-Over Date Early In 1953**

Cut-over date for giving approximately 912 subscribers in Deaf Smith counties rural telephone service will be January-February, 1953, according to Leo Forrest, project-manager of the West Texas Rural Telephone Coop.

Forest said a contract for the central office equipment on the 950-mile rural phone network will be let on May 22. It is hoped that the contract for the outside plant will be let by July 1.

Estimated construction cost for the entire set-up will be about \$811,000, he said. The cooperative has been approved for an additional loan of \$361,000 and authorization for the funds will be ready by the time they are needed for actual work, Forrest commented.

The increased construction cost of the system will mean a general increase for all types of phone service of 50c per month.

An authorization for securing critical materials from the National Production Authority, Department of Commerce, was supposed to have been received in Hereford last Wednesday. All the allotments guaranteed by the NPA will give the local co-op materials for the third and fourth quarters of the year.

Seven automatic dial central office stations will be erected to serve the area, he said. These units will be small 16x16-foot buildings housing the automatic equipment for channelling the calls.

Location of the seven stations are: between the Dawn and Progressive schools, near the Frio school, three miles west of Hereford, three miles northwest of Friona, three miles southeast of Friona, 3 1/2 miles west of Bovina and between Oklahoma Lane and Lariat.

Forrest said the other connecting

companies are expected to be able to gear their change-over to the co-op's schedule. — from Hereford Brand.





ALBUQUERQUE, AP—Soil conservation officials from seven states today agreed that three of every four gallons of water available for crops are being wasted.

At a meeting on irrigation practices here, the SCS officials blamed water waste on:

1. Poor ditches which soak up water.
2. Over-irrigation.
3. Rows so long that the head of the row is saturated before water reaches the end of the row.
4. Failure to level land before irrigating.

In a statement the SCS officials said, "If efficient methods were used the amount of water available for irrigation could be doubled."

They said that the SCS is attempting to introduce efficient methods in more than 2400 SCS districts, covering 75 per cent of the farm land in the U. S.
