At a meeting on irrigation practices here, the SCS officials blamed water waste on: 1. Poor ditches which soak up

water. 2. Over-irrigation.

3. Rows so long that the head of the row is saturated before water reaches the end of the row. 4. Failure to level land before

In a statement the SCS officials said, "If efficient methods were used the amount of water available for

irrigation could be doubled. They said that the SCS is attempting to introduce efficient methods in more than 2400 SCS districts, covering 75 per cent of the farm land in the U.S.
